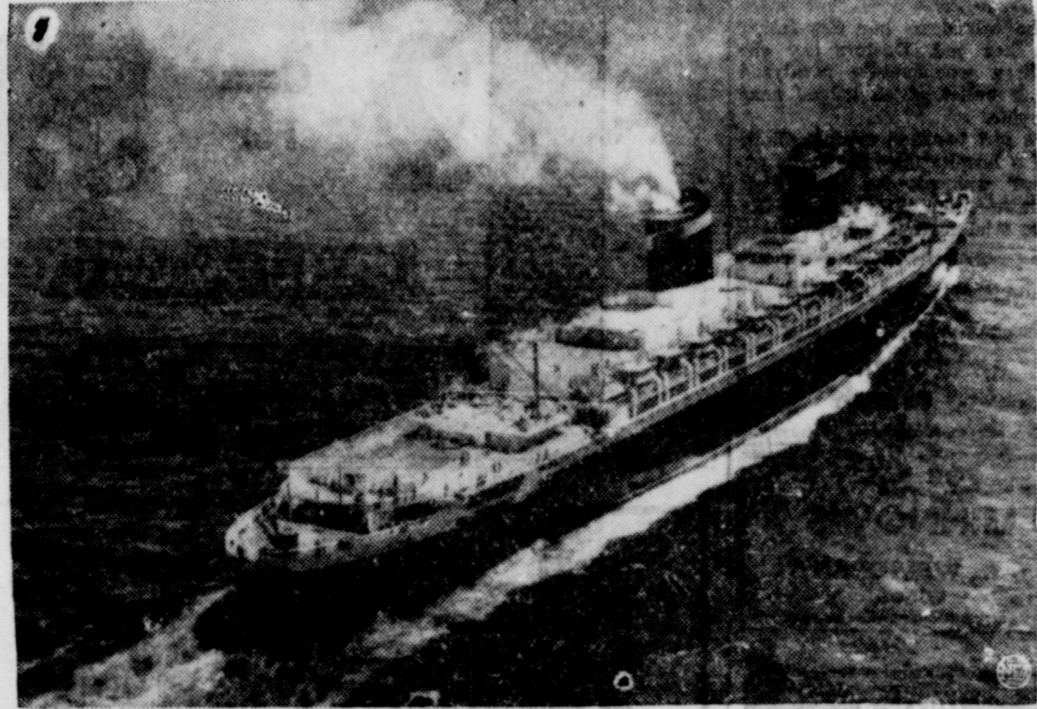
We wish that it was in our power to vote for all of them, but we can't. Now use discretion when you select our cigar.

Stewardship Of Soil Observed Some Churches

Hundreds of churches of all denominations in the South and Southwest will observe Soil Stewardship Sunday on May 18. The relation of the soil to the church and its people will be the theme of special sermons by the pastors. The setting aside of one Sunday annually to acknowledge the individual's responsibility as a steward of the soil was first observed in the Southwest seven years ago. Farm and Ranch-Southern Agriculturist, in cooperation with local ministers and soil conservation district supervisors, originated the observance.

"As we realize that man's entire existence springs from the soil, we become more interested in conserving this precious heritage," according to Dr. L. R. Neel, Senior Editor of Farm and Ranch-Southern Agriculturist. "Only by doing this can we retain our present high standard of living. Throughout the South, the assistance of Soil Conservation Service workers is available to help anyone with conservation problems. Under these workers' direction, much worn-out farm land throughout our nation already has been reclaimed. It is our duty and responsibility to carry on this good stewardship—to care tenderly for our land and keep it rich and green for all generations to come," Dr. Neel said.

NEW YORK, May 16 (UP)—John D. Rockefeller has been admitted to a New York hospital for a minor operation to remove a small growth on the back of his neck. Speculation has arisen that the 79-year-old millionaire might be seriously ill when he was suddenly brought to the hospital last night.

Prison Board Votes Tougher Prison Policy

AUSTIN, May 16 (UP)—The State Prison Board has voted to back general manager O. B. Ellis Jr., "to the limit" in a get tough policy should a mass prison disturbance occur in Texas. The board's meeting in Houston comes just after one of the most spectacular prison breaks in Texas in recent years, the escape of four men from the Ramsey Farm at Angleton. Ellis says the break was a "chain reaction" resulting from the riots in out of state prisons and he predicts more trouble at Ramsey.

The board has also voted to ban sightseers from the state's prisons. And members say they will ask for an enlarged budget so that salaries of prison personnel may be raised. More than one-third of all people over 65 in the United States who could not count on income from work for support, were getting social security insurance benefits. Fisher pointed out that this federal program is affording substantial survivor insurance protection. Three out of every four mothers and young children in the nation are now assured of monthly payments if the insured breadwinner of the family dies.

In this connection, he cited monthly payments totaling \$39,659 to 1277 children and 288 widowed mothers in the Abilene area. These monthly payments are going to families deprived of earned income by the death of the working member of the family. They are making it possible to keep families together, and keep children in school. They are, at the same time, lessening the drain on both public and private welfare funds.

General Bradley Speak At Houston

General Omar Bradley will arrive in Houston today to speak at Armed Forces Day dinner tonight. General Bradley is chairman of the joint chiefs of staff. Tomorrow, he will review a parade staged by all branches of the Armed services before returning to Washington tomorrow afternoon.

Social Security Checks Arrive; Many Are Aided

Checks for insurance payments under Federal social security went to 706 aged persons, children and their widowed mothers in Eastland county for December, 1951. These payments amounted to \$20,690.00 in the county for that month.

In releasing these figures today, Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, also said that these monthly payments under the old-age and survivors insurance system amounted to \$130,831 for the 16-county area served by the Abilene office, and went to 4,670 persons. "Without these payments earned by workers under this contributory system, the ability of many people to pay for necessities would have been drastically curtailed or entirely ended," he said.

WASHINGTON, May 16 (UP)—Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall has decided to hold up orders which would have suspended ceiling prices on raw cotton and most textiles. The orders have been drawn up and were to be issued today, but officials are still wary of what de-control might do to cotton prices.

The planned de-control fits into a general trend toward relaxing economic controls. Price officials say that present indications are that ceilings will soon come off whiskey and clothing without hurting the consumers' pocketbook.

Second Well For City Should Be Finished Today

A more or less abundant supply of good water has been found below the south spillway at the city lake, it is thought at this time. Well No. 1 was completed yesterday, with all pipe set and ready for a test. Well No. 2 was drilled at 17-feet at nine o'clock this morning, and formations in this well are similar to the No. 1, though the sand and gravel formation is a little thicker. No. 2 well is 500 feet from No. 1.

This well will, in all probability, be completed by noon today. A fire truck is to be sent to the scene this morning to give both wells a thorough test. After this operation city officials will have some idea as to what size pumps to buy.

It was stated yesterday that water from the wells will be pumped into the lake and then into the mains. In all probability the water will be pumped to the curing plant and from the curing plant into the city's mains. If the supply proves inadequate, lake water will be used also.

Barring accidents or unforeseen trouble, the 10 wells should be completed within as many days.

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Death Sentence To Be Appealed

SAN ANGELO, May 16 (UP)—The death sentence of 42-year-old Charles D. Clark assessed yesterday in San Angelo will be appealed.

Clark was convicted of killing his ex-wife of one day, 42-year-old Mrs. Laverne Clark, and crippling for life his 15-year-old stepdaughter, Joan Potts.

Mrs. Clark was shot to death as she lay in bed at the Clark home the night of March 26th. And Joan Potts was shot twice as she talked to her step-father from her bed. Doctors say she has been permanently paralyzed from a bullet which lodged near her spine.

The girl testified against Clark from a hospital stretcher. His attorneys' who pleaded that Clark was insane, say they plan to file a new trial motion today.
