The editors of "Seventeen" magazine were recently successful in getting a number of teen-agers across the country to take the stereo headphones out of their ears long enough to answer some survey questions about what they expect in their future lives. The biggest majority of them, boys and girls alike, expected to fall in love, get married and raise a family.

The family unit is still the single most important item in our society and I was happy to see that the dream has not faded in spite of the fact that it has taken quite a beating in the past few decades.

Just getting from childhood to adulthood is no simple task in today's world. In a single day's time, 2,269 illegitimate children are born, 2,753 teenagers get pregnant, five teenagers commit suicide, 609 teenagers get a venereal disease, 988 children are abused, 110 babies die before their first birthday, 49,322 children are in public juvenile-correctional facilities, 2,989 kids see their parents get divorced, and 3,288 children run away from home.

Fifty-one per cent of our population is currently involved in a divorce and by 1990 there will be more people living in second marriages than those who are living in first marriages. It is difficult, but still possible, to raise our children in an atmosphere of love in spite of awkward family situations created by divorce. It requires a great deal more dedication on the part of the parents.

The following "Child's Ten Commandments For Parents," author unknown, came to us from friend Geneva Williams:

1. My hands are small; please don't expect perfection whenever I make a bed, draw a picture or throw a ball. My legs are short; please slow down so that I can keep up with you.

4. My feelings are tender; please be sensitive to my needs; don't nag me all day long. Treat me as you would like to be treated.
5. I am a special gift from God; please treasure me, holding me accountable for my actions, giving me guidelines to live by, and disciplining me in a loving manner.
6. I need your encouragement to grow. Please go easy on the criticism. Remember you can criticize the things I do without criticizing me.

What was meant to be a birthday present turned into a nightmare for two Bovina young people on Sunday night.

Jennifer Beauchamp was taking her cousin, Corey Kirkpatrick, to a concert in Lubbock for his birthday. Two other friends were also with the couple.

On their way to the concert, a car passed them, almost hitting them. Later both vehicles were parked at the parking lot where the concert was being held. An argument began between Corey's and Jennifer's friend and occupants of the other vehicle.

A short time later, three Hispanic young men appeared and began shoving Jennifer around. Corey asked that they leave her alone and one of the men struck Corey in the face with his fist.

Law officers were summoned and the Bovina youths identified the three Hispanic men who were then standing in line for the concert. The one who hit Corey was arrested and Corey was taken by ambulance to the Methodist Hospital.

Kirkpatrick had to have oral surgery to wire his broken jaw, and seven stitches were taken inside his mouth and several on his lip. His mother said the dentist at the hospital said his retainer was what kept him from losing several teeth.

Corey was released from the hospital Sunday night. He is the son of Daryl and Karen Kirkpatrick and Jennifer is the daughter of Garry and Carolyn Beauchamp.

Mustangs Rout Groom -- Face Higgins Test

Bovina High School's Mustangs scored an impressive 60-22 win over visiting Groom in a game last Friday night. The win gave the Mustangs a 2-1 season record.

Just three minutes into the game, runningback Manuel Porras ran five yards to give the Mustangs the lead at 6-0.

Later in the opening quarter, the Mustangs again completed a scoring drive when Robert Guevara ran 55 yards. The PAT try for two points again failed, but Bovina led, 12-0.

Early in the second period, freshman Andy Stormes capped a drive with a two-yard run, and Genaro Ruvalcaba's kick gave the Mustangs a 20-0 edge.

Groom sophomore Brian Baker completed a 50-yard scoring pass to Robert Miller to cut the halftime deficit to 20-8.

In all, five different players scored for the Mustangs. Those scoring touchdowns included Guevara, Manuel Porras, Stormes, Jimmy Gilbreath and Angel Porras.

Angel Porras was just moved up to the varsity prior to the Groom game. He responded with two interceptions, one touchdown, and kicked three PATs good for six points.

"I guess that was his way of saying he didn't want to go back and play on the JV anymore," said a pleased Coach Terry Bean.

Guevara ended the game with only five carries good for 85 yards, including the 45-yard scoring run. Manuel Porras had 84 yards on ten carries.

Juan Reyna completed eight of 17 passes for 214 yards and three touchdowns. Gilbreath caught scoring passes of 31 and four yards, and Guevara caught a TD pass for 43 yards. Bovina outgained the Tigers, 457 to 276 yards.

"It's hard for us to get a good ground game going, as small as we are, but they (the Mustang players) are beginning to block their larger opponents," Bean said.

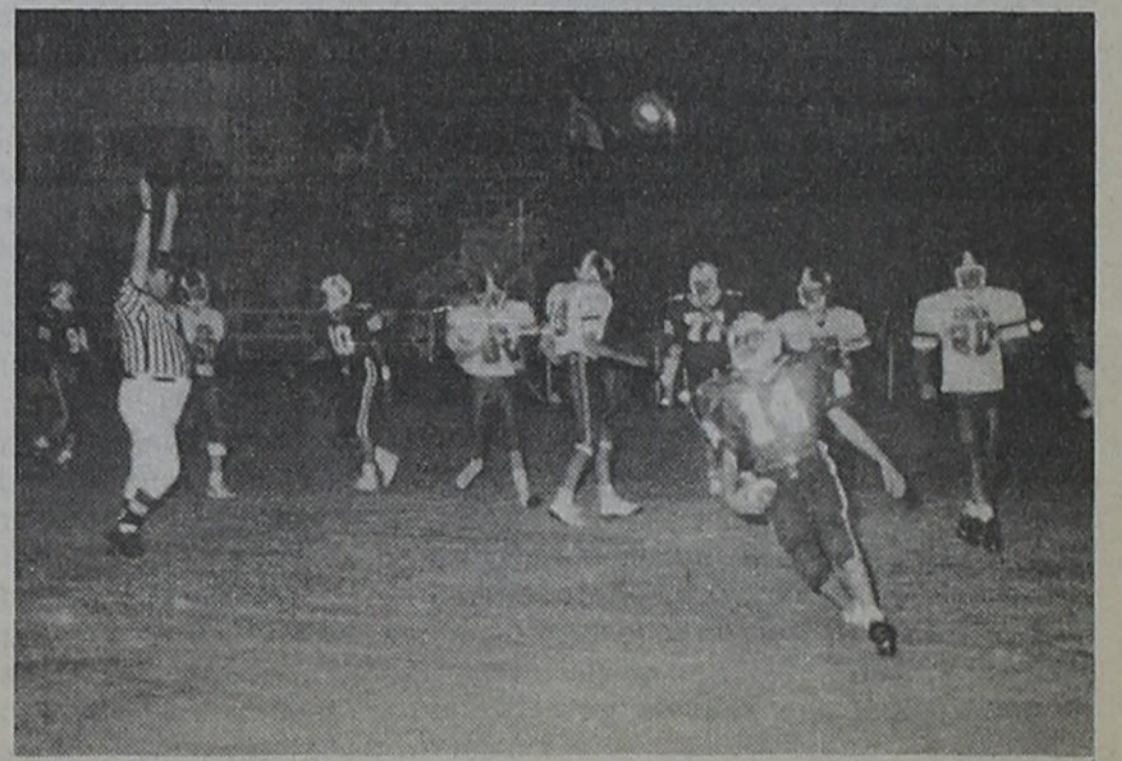
This week, the Mustangs meet Higgins, one of the power teams in the northern Six-Man district, on a neutral site, at Groom. The game begins at 7:30 p.m.

"We're attempting to nurse our players back to full strength," said

Coach Bean, giving the following injury report:

*Robert Guevara has a bruised shoulder and hand; *Manuel Porras has a deep thigh bruise and was being held out of workouts this week. His status for this week's game was questionable on Monday; *Genaro Ruvalcaba has an elbow and thigh injury; *Juan Reyna has TWO sprained ankles; and *Corey Kirkpatrick is still out of the lineup.

"In a way, I'm looking forward to playing Higgins, to find out how good we really are. But I know they're a tough team. They will be bigger, on the average, than Silverton was, and they lost only two players from last year's team," Bean said.

His score of 11 moved Morgan into the lead in the overall contest standings with a score of 29 after three weeks. Dave Miles is second with a score of 28.

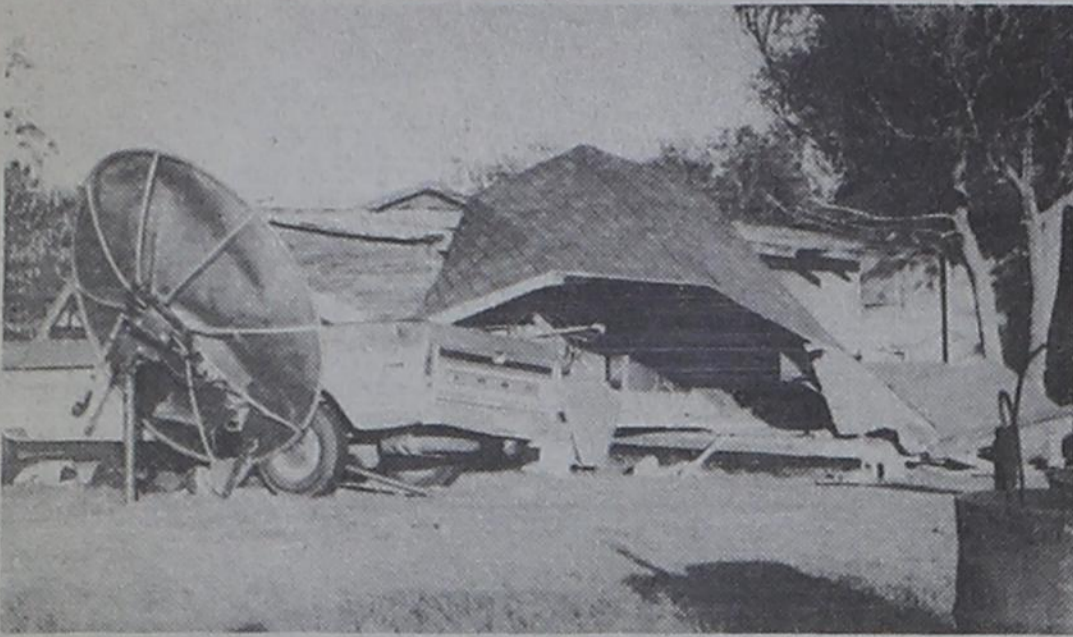
Next at 27 are Dennis Field, Penny Johnson, A.M. Wilson and Mary Jane Wilson.

From The Chief's Desk

This week's topic will be the increasing number of persons driving a vehicle in Bovina without a driver's license. It is the responsibility of every parent, to see that their children do not drive until the children are properly licensed to drive. I don't really believe that parents understand the consequences of letting their children drive without licenses. You should always remember that your liability insurance is not valid when an unlicensed driver is driving your vehicle. Should an unlicensed driver have an accident, it makes no difference of fault, then you are responsible financially for the other vehicle damage and also for personal injuries. If you are unable to satisfy the financial responsibility laws of the state, then you are subject to losing the license plates of all the vehicles in your name, plus your driver's license. So, as you see, you are gambling a lot, just because your child wants to drive. You also commit a misdemeanor by allowing your unlicensed minor to drive. This law is found in Vernon's Civil Statutes, Article 6687b, Section 35, which states: "No person shall cause or knowingly permit his child or ward under the age of eighteen (18) years to drive a motor vehicle upon any highway when such minor is not authorized hereunder or in violation of any of the provisions of this act."

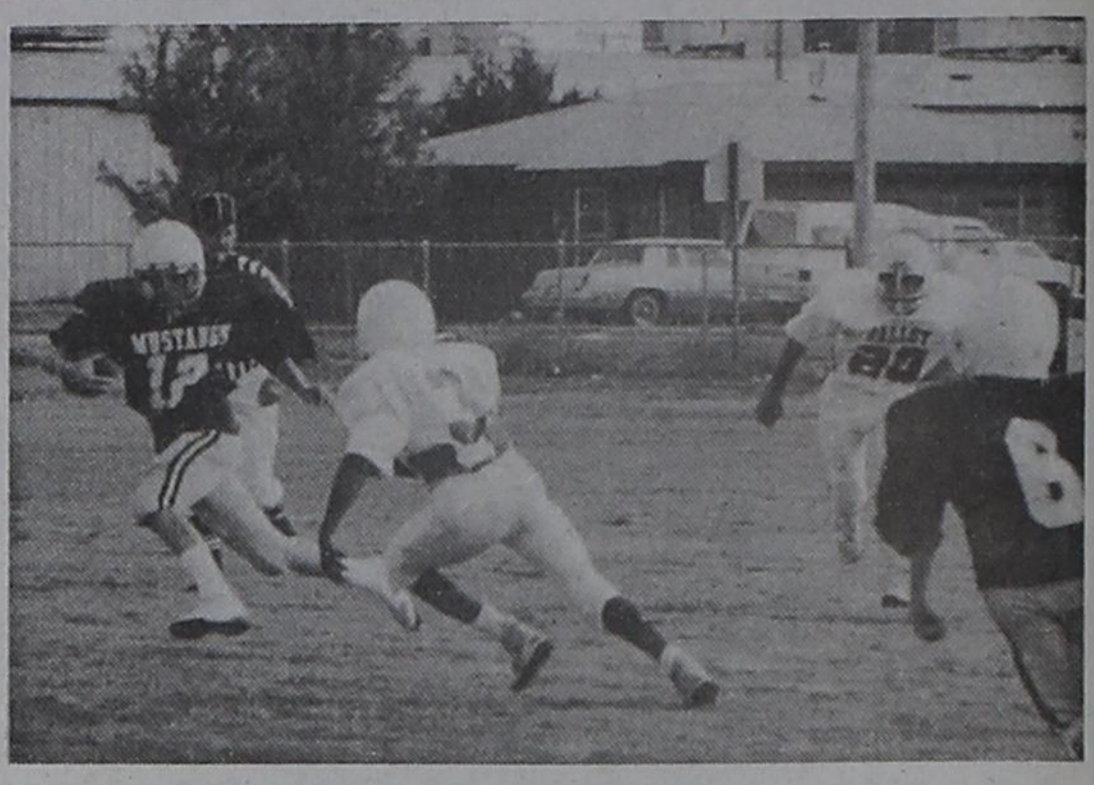
5 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 26, 1984

LEORA HASTINGS Rites Are Held For Pioneer Resident

Funeral services were held in Bovina Friday, September 22 for Leora Hastings, 95, a Bovina resident since 1909. Services were held at the First United Methodist Church of Bovina, with Rev. Jeff Taylor officiating. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home. Mrs. Hastings died Tuesday, September 19, at Prairie Acres Nursing Home, following a lengthy illness. She was born September 2, 1894 in Somerset County near Johnsbury, Pennsylvania. At the age of 15, she arrived in Parmer County with her parents, the J.A. Tidenbergs, who bought 80 acres of land four miles north of Bovina. Mrs. Hastings recalled that her father bought his land for \$10 per acre, and broke out the pasture land for cultivation using a walking sod plow and two mules. Leora Tidenberg married Frank Hastings May 20, 1915 in Amarillo. They came back through Bovina by train, enroute on their honeymoon trip to the San Francisco Exposition. Hastings had been a partner in the Bovina Mercantile store. They sold their interest in the store in 1921. They invested in cattle and land near Bovina. Mr. and Mrs. Hastings celebrated their 50th and 60th wedding anniversaries prior to Frank's death on April 15, 1978. She had been a member of the First United Methodist Church of Bovina since 1916, was a member of the Women's Society of Christian Service and of the Order of the Eastern Star, earning her 50-year certificate. Survivors include two daughters, Alethea Wilson of Bovina and Anna Hastings of Plainview; four grandchildren, Ann Kingsley of Fairfield, Iowa, Kregg Wilson of Bovina, Candy Dyer of Farwell and April Gober of Farwell; two sisters, Mary

(Tillie) Porth of Canon City, Colorado and Ella Tidenberg of Colorado Springs, Colorado. Seven great-grandchildren also survive. Pallbearers were J.T. Hammonds, Gene Ezell, Earl Stevenson, Earl Whitten, Leon Grisson and Durwood Bell. The family suggests memorial contributions be made to their favorite charity.
