Yarbrough Hits Shivers Policy

APILENE, June 20 (UP)—Ralph Yarbrough of Austin, former Travis county judge who is opposing Gov. Allan Shivers' bid for re-election, accused Shivers in a radio broadcast Thursday night of "consistent support" of organized gambling in Texas.

Yarbrough charged that Shivers was entertained aboard the yacht "Balinese" out of Galveston in 1948 by Anthony J. Ferritto, who was identified in testimony before a state House crime investigating committee last year as a kingpin of the Galveston island Maceo empire.

The gubernatorial candidate also accused the present governor of "consistent" voting in "the interests of big-time gambling" while a Texas Senator.

Tulsa On The Move In Texas League; Take Seventh Straight

Somebody is going to have to make way in the Texas League standings for the fast moving Tulsa Oilers.

The Oilers hung up their seventh straight victory Thursday night over the Beaumont Roughnecks 4 to 3 in 11 innings. It was a sweep of the series from Beaumont and it gave Tulsa eight out of nine victories on their present home stand. For the first time this year it gave them an even .500 mark for the season.

Meanwhile, league leading Dallas lost an 11 to 7 slugfest to San Antonio, Fort Worth shutout Houston 3 to 0 and Oklahoma City tagged the cellarite Shreveport Sports 8 to 3.

The games caused a bit of shuffling in the standings among the first division teams. Fort Worth regained second place over Houston by one percentage point, two games back of Dallas. Beaumont fell to fourth place, three notches below the league leader.

Despite a loss, cellar team Shreveport is still only eight and one-half games behind Dallas.

Fort Worth's Ralph Butler made his first appearance of the season in turning back the Buffs. He has been with the Cats all year but broke his ankle in spring training.

The 21-year-old righthander issued nine walks but limited Houston to only three hits. He tied in the seventh inning and was relieved by Pete Wojcik.

Rudy Payne's seven hit pitching and a timely Oklahoma City 11 hit attack netted the Indians an easy win over Shreveport.
