Well, it is about time for those Republicans to sober up, get busy, nominate somebody as standard bearer, and go on back home. One week is enough of such foolishness, especially during this hot weather.

We thought they went up to Chicago to choose a presidential candidate, but so far they have taken no steps in that direction. As a matter of fact, fighting and fussing seems to be the order of the day, with oratorical contests staged each evening.

Ar television has been good this week, and we have heard and seen about everything that has gone on. Fact is you can get a better and more comfortable reception here than you can in Chicago. In Chicago's convention hall all you can see is what is right before you. On the television you see everything—even the man who slips up from behind and crowns you with a ball bat. The television gives everybody a ring side seat, and you can hear words uttered by the speaker. That is more than 90 per cent of them can say who are seated in convention hall.

They have had some excellent speakers, whether they have very much convention or not. General Douglas MacArthur has the smoothest flow of gab we have ever heard. He is a real orator, and can handle the King's English a lot better than the king could handle it himself. They may make a dark horse of him, and that wouldn't be too bad.

GOP PLATFORM PROMISES AIR BUILD-UP

LESS FOREIGN AID, AND NO CORRUPTION

CHICAGO, July 10 (UP)—The Republican party Thursday unveiled a 1952 platform pledging a speedy buildup of U. S. air power, reduced foreign aid spending and "an end to corruption" in government.

The 4,800-word campaign document, sent to the convention floor for approval Thursday, charged that the rearmament program is "ungracefully lagging" under the Truman Democratic administration.

It called for the "quickest possible" achievement of a "completely adequate" defense force with emphasis on air power and atomic weapons "in abundance."

Agreed on Foreign Plank
The foreign policy plank—a compromise carefully tailored to satisfy both Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Robert A. Taft—rejected isolationism and pledged GOP support of "collective security."

But it said foreign aid programs can and should be conducted more economically lest the United States "bankrupt" itself trying to bolster its Allies.

The GOP also promised to do away with "injurious wage and price controls" and to balance the budget so that "a general tax reduction can be made."

Record Breaking Cold Memory As Temperatures Up

Memories of a cool spell lingered, but it was the same old weather story in the Southwest Thursday: Hot and dry except for scattered thundershowers which brought no real relief to parched furrows.

The cool front which passed through this week produced some soaking rains in Oklahoma and discouraged a record-breaking drought in Kansas and Missouri.

It also dropped temperatures into the 40's and 50's throughout the area and broke low temperature records for early July in several cities, including Denver, Oklahoma City, Dallas and Fort Worth.

But the Southwest was an arid section again Thursday with only the usual scattered thundershowers forecast as the mercury climbed steadily. Showers in the Southwest Colorado mountains Wednesday represented the only precipitation in the Wyoming, Colorado area, and Wyoming temperatures were running from five to 15 degrees above normal again.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture at Austin, reported that intense summer heat was crippling Texas' feed crops and pasture. The USDA weekly crop report for Texas said soaking rains were needed in all sections.

Some temperatures included a low of 61 at Dallas, a second consecutive all-time low mercury reading for the date, July 9, and these warmer ones, all state highs:

Cotulla, Tex., 97; Gare and Guymon, Okla., 92; Russell and Hill City, Kans., 95; Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo., 86; La Junta, Colo., 93; and Sheridan, Wyo., 93.

\$4.5 MILLION FIRE SWEEPS WARNER FILM STUDIO LOTS

BURBANK, Calif., July 10—Detectives searched for evidence of Aaron Thursday in the charred back lot of Warner Brothers film studio, where more than \$4.5 million worth of sets and equipment were destroyed by flames that finally burned out in nearby hills.

The fire, described as much worse than a blaze that razed 25 acres of studio property last May, 15, was brought under control late Wednesday night after it covered about 75 acres and swept into hills behind the studio.

Total damage was estimated at between \$4.5 million and \$6 million.

Sheriff Suspects Arson
Officers of the sheriff's arson squad investigated the possibility that the fire was started Wednesday by an arsonist and pointed out that it apparently began simultaneously in two different locations on the studio back lot.

Four youths seen near the studio fence earlier in the day were questioned by detectives, but they later were released.

Studio officials first saw the blaze broke at about 3 p.m. on a boat dock at the south end of the lot. The dock and an ocean liner movie set were destroyed quickly, and brisk winds swept the flames on to other sets, a property storage shed, a generator shed and a train shed.

Planes, Trains Destroyed
One of the first structures destroyed was a large mental hangar containing real and model airplanes. New and old-fashioned trains were destroyed in the train shed.

IKE EXPECTED TO GET 37 OF 38 VOTES ON SECOND CALL

CHICAGO, July 10 (UP)—In one wild, exciting moment the Republican national convention early Thursday seated Texas' pro-Eisenhower delegation and sent the Lone Star state's "old guard" GOP dynasty down to ruin.

When the first roll call on the presidential nomination is taken, probably Friday, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will get 33 Texas votes and Sen. Robert A. Taft five.

One the second ballot, the odds were good that Eisenhower would get 37 of the 38 votes.

The Texas fight, a classic in political invective since the Mineral Wells state convention in May, came to its crashing climax on the floor of international amphitheatre at 12:38 a.m. est when the Taft people surrendered without a roll call vote.

to the fact that I was employed in defense work, I withdrew and did not make the race; however, I came back to Kokomo and Eastland and voted. I have never voted out of Eastland County but one time in my life, and that was when I was in defense work. Before I went into essential war work, I was rejected for the Army, because of an injury, but I am not asking for one single vote because I was rejected for Army service. I considered it more important to remain with the defense work, than make a political race, at that time. I feel that if the people are not willing for me to be District Clerk now, they never will be.

I have always been interested in court procedure. Early during the boom, due to a large amount of litigation, the 91st District Court was created, even then, the dockets of the two courts were crowded. Several years ago one court was discontinued. The salary of the District Clerk is larger now, than during the oil boom.

In my campaign, I appreciate the support and encouragement of my friends both old and new. It is nice to hear a voter say: "Keep knocking these doors, as you are now." Sometimes an office holder is inclined to brag how he performs the duties of the office. It is the duty of any public officer to perform his services politely, honestly, and efficiently; if he cannot or does not, he is not worthy of the honor that the people have bestowed upon him.

If the office of the District Clerk is a good thing, pass it around; if it is a burden, let someone else bear it for awhile. I would like to be that person. Korean Armistice Talks Enter Their Second Year

PANMUNJOM, Korea, July 10—Korean armistice negotiations entered their second year Thursday with a 40-minute secret session described by a UN spokesman as "just another day."

There was no ceremony or any kind of observance at Panmunjom to mark the occasion. The three talkers walked into the green conference tent, talked for 40 minutes and walked out again.

The year had brought the United Nations and Communists to within one paragraph of agreement on ending the shooting in Korea. The only issue remaining is exchanging prisoners of war.

There was no information on what took place in the seventh secret meeting Thursday.

"Just another day," said Brig. Gen. William P. Nuekels, official UN spokesman. Asked to say something about the beginning of the second year of negotiations, he cautiously commented: "We are one year closer to the possibility of an armistice than a year ago."

He had "no prediction" for the coming year.

Some 33 correspondents, photographers and newsreel cameramen the largest press delegation at the talks in several weeks, were on hand for Thursday's meeting. They found nothing unusual. The only excitement was generated by Allied fighter-bombers which bombed and strafed a Communist mortar position on a hill overlooking the truce village.

Smoke and flame billowed up on the skyline when the warplanes dropped bombs and napalm on the position. One pilot flew so low over the target his plane disappeared for a second behind a ridge.

The Red mortars had been dropping shells on a U. S. Marine position on a hill overlooking Panmunjom.

Disagreement Among Nonsan POW's Reported

PUSAN, Korea, July 10—Twenty-four prisoners of war were injured, one seriously, in a fight between two prisoners groups in a compound at the Nonsan POW camp, it was announced Thursday.

The compound held North Koreans who had declared themselves anti-Communists.

The clash started shortly after midnight Wednesday when some 40 prisoners armed with clubs made from tent poles and stakes began tearing tents apart and attacking other prisoners.

During the fighting, 16 prisoners crawled under the barbed wire surrounding the enclosure and sought refuge with prison guards.

American doctors treated the injured at the compound. Fourteen were taken to a hospital at Taejon. No Americans were hurt.

Water Action Postponed
SAN ANTONIO, July 10—A decision on the Lower Rio Valley's request for a water injunction remained under advisement of the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals Thursday.

Chief Justice W. O. Murray said it was an "important and complicated case" when he postponed the decision Wednesday.

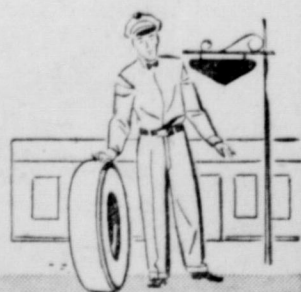

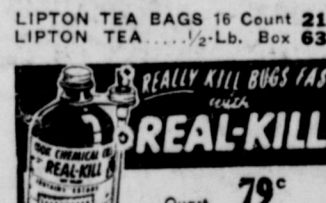

BILL OF RIGHTS GUARANTEES INALIENABLE PRIVILEGES

The American "Bill of Rights" consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution, all adopted at one time in 1791 specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today. Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those relating to freedom of religion, of speech, and of the press. The same article protects the right of peaceable assembly

and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of grievances.

Another amendment secures our persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, and specifies that no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, and unless supported by oath or affirmation.

The due process of law amendment encompasses not one but several guarantees. Every American is secured against being placed in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; against having his private property taken for public use with out just compensation; and against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamous crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And, of course, no person may be deprived of life, liberty or property without orderly court procedures, on due process of law.

The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to compel attendance of defense witnesses and to have the assistance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the "Bill of Rights."

Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII, other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.

Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "Then enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," has been carried forward into the highest law of our land.

British Spy Found Guilty

LONDON, July 10 (UP)—William Marshall, a pale, young British foreign office radio operator, was convicted Thursday of betraying official secrets to a Russian diplomat and sentenced to five years imprisonment.

Marshall, 24, could have been sentenced to 14 years but the 12-man jury recommended "utmost

leniency" on grounds he had been "led astray" during the time he coded and decoded foreign office messages to British diplomats aboard.

The jury found him guilty of three charges of passing information to a Soviet embassy official in a series of "cloak and dagger" rendezvous in London and of a fourth charge of recording information which might be useful to an enemy.
