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### Polio Experiment Extended Day To Complete Goal

HOUSTON, July 12—A historic medical experiment which may mean the end of paralysis and death from polio was extended Saturday one day past its scheduled end to reach the goal of inoculating 35,000 children.

Research workers conducting the test said there was no doubt the goal would be reached. From Saturday on, doctors will watch the youngsters anxiously. Incidence of poliomyelitis among them will reveal whether a new serum, gamma globulin, has won the long fight against the dread disease.

Half the group of children inoculated during the 11-day experiment at Houston, where the virus, not gamma globulin, the other half harmless gelatin. If polio incidence is normal among the controlled group, and does not occur among the children who were injected with GG, doctors will know the serum is successful in robbing polio of paralysis and death.

Results of the experiment were to be announced sometime next year, and until then no one will know which children got gelatin and which GG.

By noon Friday, 29,309 children had received injections. Dr. Lewis Coriell, who has been helping direct the test in eight clinics, was confined to headquarters dispatching three radio-equipped Air Force vehicles as they shuttled between the clinics to replenish supplies of gamma globulin. The hard-pressed clinics have been awarded by parents bringing their children for inoculations and Friday was one of the biggest days of the experiment. Coriell said if the supply of GG held out, the clinics also would re-open Monday to meet demand, but he expressed doubt that GG would last that long.

### Hospital Still Needs Water Meter Dollars

A few days ago it was announced that the Eastland Hospital broke even during its first month of operation. This was true, though probably misleading, it now seems. The hospital broke even, alright, but it took the water meter fund to make this possible. Quite a few people have held back, and stated that as the hospital was self-sustaining they didn't care to contribute their dollar each month. This dollar-a-month water meter contribution is still necessary, it is reported.

Of course it can not be collected by law, and no attempt will be made to force collection, though the hospital is still in need of the fund it is said.

### Yellowjackets Win 15-2 Over Throckmorton

The Yellowjackets took the Throckmorton team to a first class cleaning Friday night when they met that team on A.B.C. field in Cisco. The score was 15 to 2 in the Jackets favor.

The game was hotly contested from the first moment. Throckmorton has taken two games from the Yellowjackets this season, and they didn't have any intention of letting them make it three in a row. In the first inning the Jackets made nine runs. Able went to bat, knocked a home run and brought in 3 men who were on bases.

This was one of the best games of the season, it is said. On Sunday the Jackets will go to Clyde and will meet the Clyde team in the afternoon. Manager Able asks that Eastland fans attend the Sunday game.

Mrs. John R. Black of Dallas became national committeewoman for Texas, succeeding Mrs. Carl Stearns of Houston. Porter and Mrs. Black were nominated for the committee jobs at a caucus last Sunday by the pro-Eisenhower delegation. They automatically got the national committee jobs when their delegation was seated over Zweifel's rival slate at the convention.

### Taft Gives Up Hope Of Stay In White House

CHICAGO, July 12 (UP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft knows now that he'll never move back to the White House, where he lived as a boy.

It was a hard blow for "Mr. Republican" when his party's presidential nomination was snatched from his grasp Friday for the third time in 12 years. But he proved a better loser than many of his supporters, who remained openly bitter toward the man who beat him, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"He took it better than anyone else; he was trying to cheer us up," said a red-eyed member of the Taft campaign staff who was present in the Ohio senator's hotel suite when the blow fell. While Taft could not mask his disappointment, he could and did swallow any bitterness that remained from his down to the line slugfest with Eisenhower for the nomination. He promised to campaign for the general, and everyone who knew Taft knew that he meant just what he said.

At 62, Taft knew it was his last try for the presidential nomination. He now moves into the rank of Republican "elder statesman," but he still will be a very powerful man in his party's councils and in the nation's government. As chairman of the Senate Republican policy committee, he will be one of the key men in the next Congress—whether it is controlled by Republicans or Democrats.

Taft and his beloved Martha, who once was one of his best campaigners, but is now a semi-invalid, will leave here this weekend for a long rest at Murray Bay, in Quebec—the first real vacation they've had since Taft began running for the nomination last year. Mrs. Taft took her husband's defeat as calmly as he did. "I'm content," she said. "I'll see much more of my husband than if I gave him to the public."

### Funeral Services For Ocie M. Hunt 4 P.M. Sunda y

Funeral services for Ocie M. Hunt, who died in Eastland at 2:15 p.m. Friday, will be held at 4 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Eastland. The Rev. Homer J. Starnes, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Weatherford, will officiate.

The deceased had been in ill health for several years, but his death was quite unexpected as he had been on his job as assistant manager of McGraw Motor Co., of Eastland, all week. He complained of feeling badly Thursday and was unable to go to work Friday.

Mr. Hunt was born in Ranger, April 8, 1902 and with the exception of five years the family lived in Taylor County during his childhood, he had lived in Eastland county all his life. He had been a resident of Eastland for the past 39 years. Survivors include his wife, the former Miss Floy Atkissons whom he married December 21, 1925, one daughter, Mrs. A. G. Sanders of Weatherford, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Hunt of Dilly; one brother, C. L. Hunt of Del Rio; three sisters, Mrs. Marcus Grieger of Eastland; Mrs. W. J. King, Abilene and Mrs. O. M. Musser of Dilly.

Pallbearers will be Carl Johnson, J. M. (Doc) Davis, O. L. Hooper, Frank Williamson, Hugh H. Hardeman and L. E. McGraw. Burial will be in the Eastland cemetery under the direction of Hamner Funeral Home.

### Stevenson Says He Will Not Run For President

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 12 (UP)—Speculation that Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson would succeed to presidential fever was seemingly scotched Saturday after his office issued a statement that he definitely would not run. On-again-off-again rumors that the Illinois governor would attempt to capture the Democratic presidential nomination have come with machine-gun speed ever since January when he was called to a secret meeting at the White House.

Friday, after the Republican national convention nominated Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Stevenson issued a statement through his press secretary, William F. Flanagan. It said the governor had "no comment" on the nomination of Eisenhower. "His own position has not been altered in any way by the Republican convention," the statement said. "He is a candidate only for re-election as governor of Illinois and, as he has often said, wants no other office."

Stevenson added, however, that he is "confident that the Democratic nominee will win in November." The governor will address the Democratic national convention which opens in Chicago July 21.

"Exciting—Women" HELSINKI, July 12 (UP)—The Finnish Olympic organization committee said Saturday it will open special dance halls next week and limit admission to Olympic athletes with one exception—women. Women "are invited to make the living for foreigners as pleasant as possible," the committee said.

# Democrats Predict Eisenhower Defeat

## THE 91ST DISTRICT COURT EDITORIAL

A Committee of the State Bar of Texas has recommended that three District Courts in Texas be abolished. One of these is the 91st District Court of Eastland County. According to the plan on foot, Eastland County will be annexed to the 90th District which now consists of Stephens and Young Counties. Eastland is the most populous of these three counties and produces more court work than the other two counties combined. Under the proposed plan, new courts will be created in counties containing the larger cities. The matter will be decided finally by the Legislature which meets in January.

We find that the Bar and the citizens of Eastland County generally are deeply interested in this matter, and should unite in preventing the abolishment of the 91st Court. The defeat of the plan to abolish the 91st District Court will rest largely on the Representative we send to Austin for the next Legislature.

It is the considered opinion that our present Representative, Mr. L. R. Pearson, by reason of his thorough knowledge of the situation, and by virtue of his legislative experience and ability, is the best qualified man for the office of Representative to defeat this movement in the Legislature. Mr. Pearson personally knows every member of both the Senate and House, and has worked with them through the years. This newspaper believes the election of Mr. Pearson will improve and strengthen our chances to retain the 91st District Court for the citizens of Eastland County.

### Debt Settlement Enter Elevator Operator's Trial

AMARILLO, July 12 (UP)—A Farwell, Tex., elevator operator accused of selling government-owned grain paid off \$293,000 in debts three months after a shortage was discovered in his warehouses, his former bookkeeper testified in federal court at Amarillo Friday.

U. S. District Judge Joe B. Dooley recessed court for the weekend after hearing testimony from the former bookkeeper, Stanley Wojenski, now of Clovis, N. M. He expected the case to reach the jury late Monday. C. M. Henderson, the elevator operator, is being tried on charges of converting 126,775 bushels of government wheat and 13,834,770 pounds of grain sorghum stored with him by the Commodity Credit Corp.

Wojenski said Friday that Henderson owed \$293,000 in notes to banks in Amarillo, Lubbock, Farwell and Clovis, N. M., in November, 1951, and was being pressed for payment. The bookkeeper said the debts were paid the next month.

"It would be difficult to say where the money came from to pay them off," Wojenski said. But he added, "some of it" came from the sale of grain. Ross Stuard, warehouse examiner for the Dallas office of the Production and Marketing Administration, said he inspected Henderson's warehouses in September, 1951, and discovered the government grain shortage.

### Mrs. Stephen Is Home From Tour

Mrs. Joe Stephen has returned from the TSCW Traveling Workshop tour which highlighted Washington, New York, Canada, and Detroit. In the Capital City they visited all the historical spots including Mt. Vernon and Arlington Cemetery. By special arrangement they were auditors at a session of both the House and the Senate at which time they were debating on Price controls and allocations.

In New York the group attended a session of the Economic and Social Council at the U. N. Headquarters after which they had lunch in the delegates' dining room. The session was a report on UNESCO given by a Frenchman, Mr. Beaudry. The speech was translated into five languages with an ear phone at each auditor's seat so he could dial whichever language he chose.

At Detroit the NEA members were guests of the Ford Co. on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week for a tour through the plant, the Ford museum, and Greenfield Village, after which they were guests for lunch in the Ford plant's cafeteria. The show rooms had to be converted into dining rooms to handle the crowd. There were over two thousand in the party on Tuesday and nineteen hundred on Wednesday.

### Hopefuls For Nomination Get To Work

WASHINGTON, July 12—The Democratic presidential race, temporarily slowed down as the Republicans picked their standard-bearer, roared into the final lap Saturday.

With the Democratic convention eight days away, Democratic presidential hopefuls opened their throat in the wide-open scramble to face Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in November.

Democratic party leaders generally viewed Eisenhower as a "strong" candidate. They agreed, Eisenhower's nomination would necessitate a vigorous campaign and a powerful vote-getter to assure a Democratic victory in November.

There was no unanimity in the divided Democrat camp, however, over the proper candidate to lead the Democrats to victory.

President Truman, who probably will play a key role at the party's convention in Chicago in swinging the tide to a single candidate, kept his political silence. He had no comment on Eisenhower's victory. The president has repeatedly stated in the past, however, that Sen. Robert A. Taft was his "favorite" candidate for the GOP nomination on the grounds the Ohioan would be the easiest for the Democrats to beat.

Four avowed Democratic candidates—Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Richard B. Russell of Georgia, and Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma, and Foreign Aid Administrator Averell Harriman—each wasted no time in campaigning himself as the candidate to tangle with Eisenhower in November. The candidates agreed that regardless of whom the Democrats nominate, victory for their party is assured.

Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois refused direct comment on Eisenhower's nomination, but expressed confidence that the Democratic nominee will win in November. Stevenson said Friday night he definitely would not run for the Democratic nomination.

### More Heat With No Rain Is In Store For South

By UNITED PRESS Partly cloudy skies blanketed most of the Southwest Saturday. Underneath citizens were hot and crops were dry.

No real rain was expected, only the usual scattered thundershowers. Even those were only a "possibility" in many areas. U. S. Weather Bureau forecasters said. For the fourth consecutive day, temperatures failed Friday to zoom past the 100-degree mark. But the reports showed plenty of 95's and minimum temperatures were uncomfortably high.

It was 63 degrees at Denver early today and 81 at Fort Worth. Friday the warmest morning low temperatures of the week were reported in Oklahoma.

None fell below 65 at Hobart. Warm air over the Southwest successfully fought off Canadian weather masses which have air-cooled northern ears.

**POTPOURRI AND WORSE**

When the Republican National Convention nominated General Dwight Eisenhower as their standard-bearer for 1952, we have an idea that they also elected a president. At these big conventions nomination does not mean election, by any means, but this year there may be a different story. In Texas if a man gets nominated in the primary, we say he was elected. As a matter of fact he will not be elected until the general election in November, but you don't often beat a Democratic nominee in Texas.

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Louisiana and Georgia, and the Convention pitched the whole gang out. It cost Taft so many votes that Ike won the nomination on the first ballot, which is unusual.

We are going back to the teachings of Washington and Lincoln—even the Bible. We are Americans first, and after that we may become Democrats or Republicans.

America today is standing on the verge of bankruptcy, and while he has spent more money than all other presidents of the United States combined, Harry is still yelping for more money. Whether he gets it or not remains to be seen.

Harry is pretty good at having his own way whether it is right or wrong. Of course he gets so wild at times that the Supreme Court or Congress has to inject a sedative, but that doesn't worry Harry.

Right here we would like to make a prediction that it is not too late for Harry to nominate himself for re-election during the Democratic Convention which convenes in Chicago July, 21. He might have given Taft a chase for the money, but Ike would make him look as small as a minnow in the Pacific ocean.

Right now the convention is trying to nominate a running mate for Eisenhower, and this should be a simple problem.

There was no doubt that Ike was the peoples' choice. It was in the stars for him to win as he did. And he will win again in November.

After the shooting had died down from the "vice-president" question came up, Ike, it seemed, was at liberty to choose his own running mate, and while he offered this honor to Senator Taft, he likely was not surprised when Taft refused. But Ike had done the right thing, and he had made that "unity gesture" that will never be forgotten.

The name of Senator Richard Nixon of California was mentioned, and it seemed that Ike and most delegates were so well pleased that the young senator was nominated. Jack Porter of Texas, had much to do with this selection. Both Eisenhower and Nixon have accepted their nominations, and are to relentless campaigns until the General Election.

Just what the Democrats will do is not known. Of course Harry is disappointed, and rightfully so. He knows that Ike is almost as popular among Democrats as he is Republicans. He knows that Ike is honest and courteous, and he fears this.

Harry has been rather quiet for some days, though we know he has not been sleeping. The Republican nomination may upset his plans, but he is not the type of man who will throw in his hand and leave the table. He will answer the challenge but God only knows what the answer will be.

He may be expected to do most anything—even run again. He may nominate a good "fair dealer" or he may ask Congress or the Supreme Court to extend his term of office for a few years, because of an emergency.

PLUG 'N TRIGGER

By FRED EDER United Press Outdoors Expert

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service recently announced through the Secretary of the Interior a liberalized framework of opening days for the 1952-53 migratory waterfowl hunting season. It will place the earliest opening date at Oct. 1 and the latest Jan. 10, within the pattern of shooting days to be allocated to the States by virtue of the particular flyway in which they are located.

This is welcome news to the duck hunter, but even more significant is the revelation that more and more each year, a closer harmony and co-operation exists between state and federal agencies governing hunting regulations. That is as it should be.

The announcement by the Department of the Interior of a liberalized framework governing opening and closing dates means that this year the states can have their first day of gunning on any date or day of the week on or after the first of October.

This complete departure from the former regulations which specified that a state season must open on a Friday certainly will result in more satisfactory regulations for the hunter and the state.

It is a long step toward a goal of complete harmony and unity between federal and state wildlife agencies, permitting the states to co-ordinate opening dates for migratory wildfowl should make it easier for Texas and Oklahoma or any other state bordering this duck season.

Daily bag limits and the length of the season for each state will not be announced until the latter part of August because recommended regulations are approved and signed by the Secretary of the Interior.

Such hunting provisions can be determined only after detail surveys, now in progress throughout Canada, Alaska, and the United States, give us the necessary information and data concerning production and survival of young birds.

Every angler is interested in any new lure, reel, rod or gadget that either will catch more fish or add to the success and fun of

angling. In this respect, one of the most interesting deadly fishing methods to appear in many years is an innovation combining tackle and technique, in the use of a casting plug and trailer fly.

The trailer fly is a small weighted fly, tiny plug, or jig fastened to the rear end of an underwater or surface plug by means of a 14 to 16 inch leader.

The popularity and effectiveness of this tackle technique is emphasized by the fact that the technique threatens to be a major factor in angling as soon as fishermen learn how to use it. The versatility of the new "back-running" lure has made this technique a most deadly arrangement.

Agriculture In Limelight Of Plans For Fair

New-fangled methods of agriculture in the Heart of Texas will be the subject of a talk between an old-fashioned scarecrow and a crow in an impressive capture of the all-new "Story Book of Texas Agriculture" at the 1952 State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Oct. 4 through 19.

Illustrative of modern farm practices are the home freezers in which Central Texas folks are putting up their produce now days and the legumes which farmers are using to restore their soil.

A diagram of the way in which legumes put nitrogen back into the soil and an exhibit of products from the region in a home freezer will flank the scarecrow and the papier mache crow. An enlarged color photograph in the background will show a typical farm scene.

The Heart of Texas region is included in the Texas A&M College System Extension District 8, which covers the following counties: Bell, Bosque, Brown, Burnett, Callahan, Comanche, Coryell, Eastland, Erath, Falls, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Lampasas, Llano, McLennan, Milam, Mills, Somervell and Williamson.

The Story Book will be one of the 1952 fair's most spectacular exhibits. It will include colorful, animated dioramas devoted to each of the 12 extension districts, plus displays telling of the work of Four-H clubbers and Negro Extension workers. Many of the "show window" type displays include live animals, growing plants, sound effects and clever mechanical figures.

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A mammoth central exhibit will feature a huge map of Texas which shows the various soils of the state. The map is portrayed in phosphorescent paints that will glow dramatically when pinpointed by hidden spotlights. Blueberries, wheat, rice, sorghum and cotton will encircle the map. Yucca, cacti and century plants in the display will represent West Texas and roses and pine trees will lend an East Texas flavor.

One of the many surprises of the 1952 Story Book will be the tiny "Tommy Texas" character, hovering above the central exhibit in a miniature helicopter. At intervals, "Tommy" will briefly tell the interesting story of Texas' two-billion-dollar agriculture empire.

## Shivers Thinks Democrats Will Win In Texas

By United Press  
Gov. Allan Shivers, who thinks the Democrats will win as usual in Texas if a strong candidate opposes Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, concentrated Saturday on his own platform for re-election and noted some "mighty queer statements from by opposition."

In a West Texas tour which ended a week-long campaign pointing toward the July 26 first Democratic primary, Shivers outlined eighteen planks which included approval of some federal aid programs as "desirable and necessary."

On a statewide radio broadcast from Odessa, he emphasized his thoughts on federal aid.

"Contrary to some of the things you may have heard lately," the governor said, "and there have been some mighty queer statements from my opposition, I am not trying to stop all federal grants."

Shivers said, however, "I am opposed to federal control over state affairs, and any schemes that will take federal taxes out of the pockets of Texas people, carry the money to Washington and send some of it back with strings attached and a note saying: 'Look what Santa Claus is doing for you.'"

Shivers said late Friday that he still believed Democrats could win against Eisenhower, nominated earlier as Republican presidential candidate, with a strong

candidate of their own. He would not stipulate who he thought would be the strongest Democratic standardbearer.

At Dallas, meanwhile, Ralph Yarborough, one of two persons opposing Shivers' bid for re-election, also shrugged off the Republicans.

He said he was "sure I can be elected governor over anybody the Republicans put up," refusing to predict if Eisenhower would carry Texas.

Yarborough said he would cut the expenses of the governor's office \$100,000 a year if he was elected. The former Travis County Judge repeated his recent statements that "I don't believe we should cut off federal aid to the state, as Gov. Shivers has advocated. We need it especially for

road construction and old age pensions."
