In all probability actual construction will start either Wednesday or Thursday of next week. Definite announcement will be made later.

C. H. Arkett was chosen to supervise the "job", in order to make it possible to have all work done in orderly fashion. Those who are to give free labor may see Mr. Arkett at the Crowell Lumber Co. office, Rev. J. Morris Bailey, Methodist pastor, or the writer, Ray B. McCorkle, at the Daily Telegram office.

Considerable material has been donated, and in all probability the lot will be leveled, surveyed and the foundation laid, before the "kick off" date.

The house is to be a 4-room cottage, neatly constructed. Should sufficient money come in, a small shed room, for storage, will be added.

No special church or group is responsible for this movement, but as a matter of fact, is being constructed and paid for by friends of Whitney Butler.

Shivers Exchanges Caustic Remarks With Kefauver

CHICAGO, July 24 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas and Sen. Estes Kefauver absolved some personal differences after a heated exchange outside Convention Hall. They ended up shaking hands.

Kefauver told Shivers he understood the Texan was angered because the Tennessee senator's appearance in the hall Wednesday touched off a noisy demonstration by those backing him for Democratic presidential nominee.

Shivers told Kefauver he understood it was customary for presidential candidates to remain away from the convention hall until nominated. He added that Kefauver had been quoted as describing Shivers as no Democrat.

Kefauver said if the latter was the case, he had been misquoted. He explained that he came into Convention Hall only to show his \$1-year-old father what a national convention looked like.

The senator and the governor shook hands.

Democrats Adopt Platform Over Objection Southerners

CHICAGO, July 24—The Democrats dodged a floor fight on civil rights Thursday and adopted a party platform pledging the American people continued prosperity and "world peace with honor."

The uneasy truce was reached in the stockyard convention hall shortly before 1 a. m. edt after three days of clamorous dispute over racial discrimination that threatened for a time to blast the South clear out of the party.

House Majority Leader John W. McCormack of Massachusetts read the 8,500-word platform to the convention delegates. Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas, convention chairman, called for a voice vote.

Agreeing chorus of "ayes" welled up from the amphitheatre, followed by a loud roar of "no." Rayburn slammed down his gavel and announced that the "ayes" had it.

Texas Votes No
Gov. Herman Talmadge of Georgia grabbed the microphone to demand that his state be recorded as voting against the platform. Rayburn agreed, and said he would comply with a similar request from Mississippi.

Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas said his delegation also "wanted to vote no" but didn't get a chance to have its opposition recorded.

Social Security Payments Are To Be Larger After October, Claim

Over 500 people in the Abilene area will receive higher social security payments beginning early in October as a result of the social security amendments which President Truman signed into law on Friday, July 18.

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, emphasized that no one needs to apply for the increased payments. "The Social Security Administration is already changing the amounts," he pointed out. "We expect to get them changed in time to have them in the mail October 3, the regular delivery date, but in a few cases we don't meet that schedule. We will send the regular check and make up the difference in a later check."

Mr. Fisher pointed out that although nearly every family receiving payments would receive an increase, the additional amount would not always be divided among all the members of the family receiving monthly checks. In some cases the entire increase will go to the retired worker.

Under terms of the law, most families will get an increase of about \$5; some will get less, some will get more. A few benefits now being paid, and most of those payable in the future, will be based on earnings after 1950 instead of after 1936. The amended law provides a new formula for determining the amount of the payments in these cases. Under it, a retired worker's monthly benefit would be 55 per cent of the first \$100 of his average monthly earnings plus 15 per cent of the remainder up to \$300.

Beginning September 1, the new law increased to \$75 a month instead of \$70.

Democrats Adopt Platform Over Objection Southerners

The American people, farmers, labor, businessmen, never had it so good as they have under the past 20 years of Democratic rule.

Our foreign policy of aid to and alliances with anti-Communist nations abroad is costly and will continue that way. But it is halting Russian expansions and keeping the peace.

The Democrats want strong and balance defense forces—land, sea and air.

Taxes are high because of that military spending, and the Democrats aren't making any "reckless promises" like the Republicans did to reduce them.

Farm prices will continue to be supported under Democratic rule at 90 per cent of parity to keep

Rayburn Predicts Party Victory In General Election

ALBEN WILLIAM BARKLEY Democrats Pay Tribute To Grand Old Man Of The Party

CONVENTION HALL, July 24 (UP)—The Democratic party handed its heart Wednesday night to Alben W. Barkley.

It was in part payment of the gigantic debt it owes its grandest old man.

For one hour and 52 minutes the 74-year-old Vice President stood gallantly in the heat and glare before 12,500 other Democrats.

For 46 minutes of that time he talked, delivering off the cuff an address so packed with the old time religion of Democratic politics that at times he had his hearers shouting and all but weeping.

The other hour and six minutes he spent receiving—humbly but gallantly—a great outpouring of unashamed affection.

Labor Leaders Said No

Since 1905, long before a good half of the thousands jammed in Convention Hall Wednesday night were born, Alben William Barkley has been serving his party's cause.

This year he got in his head that the Democrats, having made him a Vice President, might need his services as President. He came to his party's 31st national convention here ready and willing to take on the job.

Last Monday he was told that the men for whom he had done most, the leaders of organized labor, didn't want him and wouldn't support him. They told him bluntly that he was too old.

He said the hell with it; he issued a bitter statement withdrawing from the race.

He left a sorely divided convention and got ready to go home to Paducah. He was an angry man. His "walk" lasted just two days. Democratic National Chairman Frank E. McKinney told him he was the one man who could pull the party together.

Got Great Ovation

So Wednesday night Alben Barkley took on one more chore for the Democrats.

Possibly it was his valedictory, although he never would concede that. In the main it was an assignment to make the Democrats remember that they were the party of Jefferson and Jackson and FDR and Harry Truman, not a patchwork of wrangling factions.

For the people out front, the delegates and alternates on the floor and the lucky guests who got seats in the gallery, it was an occasion of undiluted drama.

The first cheers went up at 10:08 p. m. edt. In the galleries blossomed blue "Barkley for President" banners. On the floor, state delegations scrambled to get their delegations into the parade for the old man.

Barkley gave the crowd the boxer's salute and it went wild. Bands played "Dixie," "My Old Kentucky Home," "Happy Days Are Here Again," "East Side, West Side"—all the right tunes.

For 28 minutes that went on before Barkley could begin his speech.

Grand Jury To Investigate Car Death Of Youth

Following investigation, Wm. H. Knight of Snyder, driver of the car which took the life of Oliver Ingram (colored) of Breckenridge, is being detained on a charge of "failing to render aid." Knight was making his bond Wednesday, and the case will come up for grand jury investigation, it is said.

The accident occurred Monday night at a point just west of Morton Valley, when it is alleged that the boy was fatally wounded by Knight's car. He drove on to Eastland and reported the accident to police, but did not accompany officers back to the scene of the accident, it is said.

Eisenhower's Bid Taken Lightly By Texas Speaker

CONVENTION HALL, July 24

—Sam Rayburn, permanent chairman of the Democratic national convention, predicted that the nation will vote Democratic in November because it will never "trade prosperity for promises."

"The American people are not going to ramble away a sure thing for an unknown uncertainty," the veteran House speaker said.

Rayburn delivered an address to the convention Wednesday night which sharply criticized the Republican choice for a presidential nominee and its platform.

He described Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as a new "face" on an old party, but called in question the leadership that put Eisenhower over as the GOP nominee.

Like "Not in Command" "General Eisenhower was not in command of his own campaign," Rayburn said. "He did not make the big political decisions. He did not win the nomination upon the strength of his ideas stated to the people."

The Texas Democrat said Eisenhower won because his campaign managers "exploited the weaknesses of Senator Taft" and behind the managers wanted him. "They wanted him because they wanted the same old Republican party changed in nothing but the clothes it wears," he said.

Rayburn ridiculed the GOP platform as empty of affirmative proposals and one which harped on the song: Anything You Can Do I Can Do Better.

Rayburn said he did not believe the Democratic party was "all-wise," but suggested that it was the best qualified to keep the world at peace.

Cites Foreign Aid
"Many a war has been prevented by patience," he said. "Action for action's sake alone is the last refuge of the mentally bankrupt; the dangerous equivalent of leaping before you look."

"What American then, in his right mind, would recklessly run the risk of precipitating a third world war and the possible destruction of all civilization, if there were other means at hand with which we can deter the enemy while pursuing the peace?" he asked.

Rayburn said the administration already has furthered such an aim with the Marshall plan, aid to Turkey and Greece, intervention in Korea and the North Atlantic Treaty.

He also said the prosperity given the country by the Democrats was the greatest deterrent to the spread of communism.

No Progress At Truce Site

PANMUNJOM, Korea, July 24 (UP)—UN and Communist truce delegates held another secret meeting Thursday, but there was still no indication that any progress was made.

Thursday's meeting lasted 26 minutes, the longest in five days. It was the 17th of the secret sessions that began July 4.

The delegates will meet again. The negotiations apparently were still deadlocked on exchanging prisoners of war, the only obstacle to peace in Korea. The Communists want the UN to return 170,000 prisoners of war but the UN has refused to return 100,000 who have renounced communism.

Giles Cites His Record

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office of Texas, stated that the \$100,000,000 Texas Veterans' Land Program which he sponsored has far exceeded his expectation both in number of applications and accomplishments to date.

The personable Giles, a native of Travis County, points out that during his administration the two Texas school funds have been increased by more than \$260,000,000.

Commissioner Giles' experience in the General Land Office dates back to his graduation from Austin high school; he was employed by the state department almost immediately. With the exception of a two year span, when he was seeking promotion from the ranks by the Texas electorate, he has given continuous service. His election in 1938 was regarded as the biggest political upset of the election.

Since then he has never had serious opposition and has received the highest vote given any candidate for any office in a Democratic primary.

When Giles first became land commissioner the Permanent Public Free School Fund was \$56,000,000. It is now almost \$200,000,000. The University of Texas and A&M Permanent Fund has been increased during his tenure from \$27,000,000 to \$144,000,000.

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

A public service feature

Home purchase involves serious legal problems.

Thinking of buying a house? Before you sign anything, be sure you know the effects of your action. Many legal problems are involved in such a transaction. This column, and those to follow on this subject, will attempt to point out and explain some of the legal angles connected with your purchases.

For the average person, the buying of a home is the largest single transaction of his life. It is also

in most instances, the most permanent or longest term investment he will ever make. Whether or not he bought wisely will be determined by his ability to resell without difficulty, or enjoy the use of premises without annoyance or interruption.

Possibly the first legal problem you will meet will be when you are asked by the seller or his agent to sign a contract of sale or earnest money contract. In connection with the latter, you will be asked to deposit a sum of money which would be forfeited to the seller and agent for damages in event you do not fulfill the contract. Although no forfeit money may be required with the former, you may still be legally liable for damages if you renege. Be sure, therefore, that you know exactly what your obligations are.

The next legal problem would probably be to determine the status of the title to the property. Many persons become confused during this stage, thinking that securing possession of an Abstract or Title Insurance Policy will af-

ford them complete protection against title defects. This is not necessarily true in either case.

Keep in mind that an abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract. Any person may purchase an abstract covering any piece of land, whether he owns it or not. A Title Insurance Policy indemnifies you only up to a certain maximum sum of money, and contains various exceptions to the specified coverage.

Following this would be the problem of transferring the title from the legal owner to you, as purchaser, in such manner that no legal question might later arise concerning your sole and exclusive ownership.

Incidental to your title problems is that of ascertaining what restrictions exist upon the lot you are buying and upon the neighborhood generally. Municipal zoning ordinances and restrictive covenants placed upon the tract by previous owners or developers of the subdivision may prove a protection or a hindrance, according to the plans you may have for future use or improvement of your property.

Other legal questions may arise in arranging the method of payment for the house. The fact that most people need years in which to complete such payment makes this a matter to be considered carefully.

These are some of the major problems you are likely to encounter in purchasing a home. Of course, a number of others may arise in some cases due to peculiar individual circumstances.

Subsequent columns on this subject will seek to explain these and other interwoven legal considerations.

Truman Calls Labor And Steel Leaders To White House Meet

WASHINGTON, July 24 (UP)—President Truman called the top steel industry and labor leaders to the White House Thursday in a gloves-off attempt to end the defense-cripple 53-day-old steel strike.

Summoned to the conference were President Benjamin Fairless of U. S. Steel Corp., and CIO President Philip Murray, the two major protagonists in the prolonged dispute which is beginning to strangle defense production.

Acting Defense Mobilizer John R. Steelman, who has tried unsuccessfully to break the deadlock between the steel industry and the CIO United Steelworkers, also was evidenced by the fact that he directed Defense Secretary Robert A. Lovett Wednesday to detail for the first time the crippling effects of the steel strike on defense production.

Shortly after Lovett warned a news conference that defense production "is beginning to grind to a halt", as a result of the steel walkout, Mr. Truman issued his invitation to Fairless and Murray to come to the White House. It was accepted immediately.

In personally intervening in the dispute for the first time since Congress "requested" that he use the Taft-Hartley law to end the strike, Mr. Truman gave no advance indication of what steps he might propose to end the walk-out.

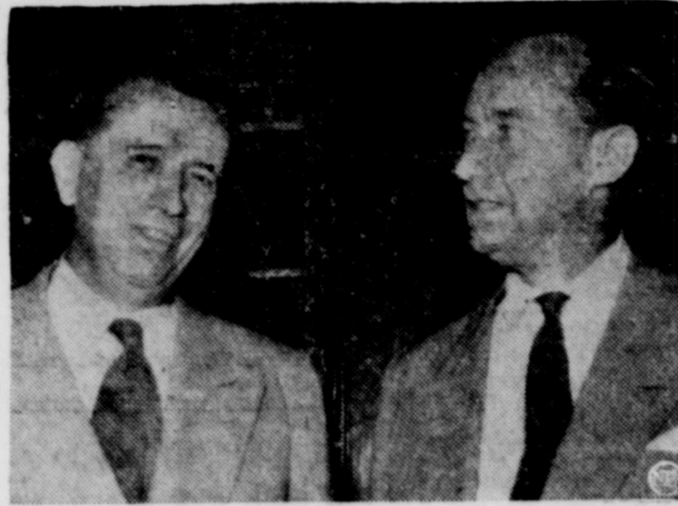
Some sources speculated that the President might call on both sides to resume production and submit their differences to arbitration. The industry and union are generally agreed on wage increases, leaving an "escape clause", for workers to drop out of the union at the start of a new contract the only major issue.

While both sides have adopted a no-compromise stand on the escape clause—a corollary to the union shop issue—it was thought a presidential appeal might prove a face-saving device which would allow them to submit the question to arbitration.

Five Men Picked Up Floating On Rafts In Gulf

PORT ARANSAS, Tex., July 24 (UP)—Five men were picked up from rafts in the Gulf of Mexico Wednesday but Coast Guardsmen said Thursday they still don't know if any were from a ship which earlier reported it was sinking 190 miles south of New Orleans.

An unidentified trawler reported to the marine operator at Galveston Wednesday it had picked up three men from a raft 280 miles east of Galveston, in the general area given by the ship in distress.

The trawler was believed enroute to Brownsville, but attempts to contact it later proved futile.

Two Houston fishermen were picked up from another raft after spending some 12 hours adrift.

Were in Good Shape

The two, J. L. Taylor, master of the vessel, and Daniel Cronin, were returning to Houston by bus Thursday and Chief Boatswain J. P. Beatty, in charge of the Coast Guard station here, said they were in excellent shape.

Beatty said they were aboard the 104-foot converted rescue boat "Roanoke" when it began to take water through a damaged propeller shaft faster than pumps could discharge it.

They took to life rafts about midnight Tuesday night and the fishing boat M. Goslyn picked them up before noon Wednesday.

But Beatty said he had received no further word from the Gulf trawler which reported Wednesday it had picked three men off a life raft some 280 miles east of Galveston.

Didn't Send Signal

Four Coast Guard cutters and at least two aircraft were sent to the scene Wednesday after the marine operator at New Orleans received a distress signal from an unnamed ship which said it was sinking 190 miles south of New Orleans. The ship reported the crew was abandoning the vessel.

Beatty said that Taylor's vessel could not have sent the distress signal as it was not equipped with radio apparatus. Also, the Roanoke was only 10 to 15 miles off shore at the time.

WASHINGTON, July 24 (UP)—It apparently costs more to survey "body dimensions" of women than men.

A Commerce Department report of "fundamental data on how body dimension vary among Army men" contains 63 measurements of each of 85,000 soldiers. The report costs \$6.50 on microfilm. Copies of a recent similar study of Army women cost \$9.

Tremors Taper Off From Quake At Tehachapi

TEHACHAPI, Calif., July 24—The earth continued its angry trembling in Southern California but scientists cheered jittery residents Thursday with news that after-shocks from Monday's "killer" earthquake were tapering off sharply.

L. Hugo Benioff of California Institute of Technology in Pasadena said seismograph readings indicated that settling joints from the quake that took 11 lives here and one in nearby Arvin were following the "usual pattern."

"After-shocks are tapering off rather strongly, with the intervals getting longer between shakes," he said.

He warned, however, that the after-shocks would continue for "some time yet" and said they appeared to be increasing slightly in intensity.

Dr. Benioff said that although some of the later after-shocks might be slightly stronger than earlier ones, the difference in intensity would be almost imperceptible.

At least 20 settling shocks made the earth quiver Wednesday, and Caltech scientists said more than 100 have been recorded since the initial tremor almost demolished

the business section of this little hill town.

There of the shocks jarred most of Southern California, and Salt Lake City was rocked slightly by a quake shortly after noon.

Dr. Beno Gutenberg, director of the Caltech laboratory, said evidence gathered by research teams indicated Bear Mountain moved about three feet upward and northward at its western end during the quake.

"But which side actually moved still is unknown," he said.

Pierre St. Armand, a Caltech graduate student in geophysics, discovered the first visible signs that the Bear Mountain fault was responsible for the shake-up. He said he traced three fresh furrows in the soil northward for 20 miles from Bear Mountain. The series of after-shocks rocking Southern California are originating at various points along the 20-mile zone discovered by St. Armand, Dr. Gutenberg explained.

The original shock released strains at some points along the fault but created new strains at other points, he said. The after-shock release the new strains but create others.

Youngster Admits He Was Drinking In Auto

DALLAS, July 24 (UP)—A 14-year-old driver admitted Wednesday he had been drinking when his automobile swerved into the wrong side of a country road and crashed into a sheriff's patrol car.

"I was drinking a bottle of soda pop and wasn't watching where I was going," the boy said in a written confession.
