

Excel Plants Cut Lost-Time Injuries

Officials of Excel Corporation this week told employees at its plant here and another in Plainview that they are pleased with the progress made on bringing the costs for lost-time accidents under control.

"We have seen major strides in our employees and management personnel working together to overcome a major problem," said Bill Fielding, president of Excel. "Friona and Plainview have shown major improvements in lost-time injuries as well as reducing lost-time days. We need to continue to make this type of dramatic progress in our safety program results," he added.

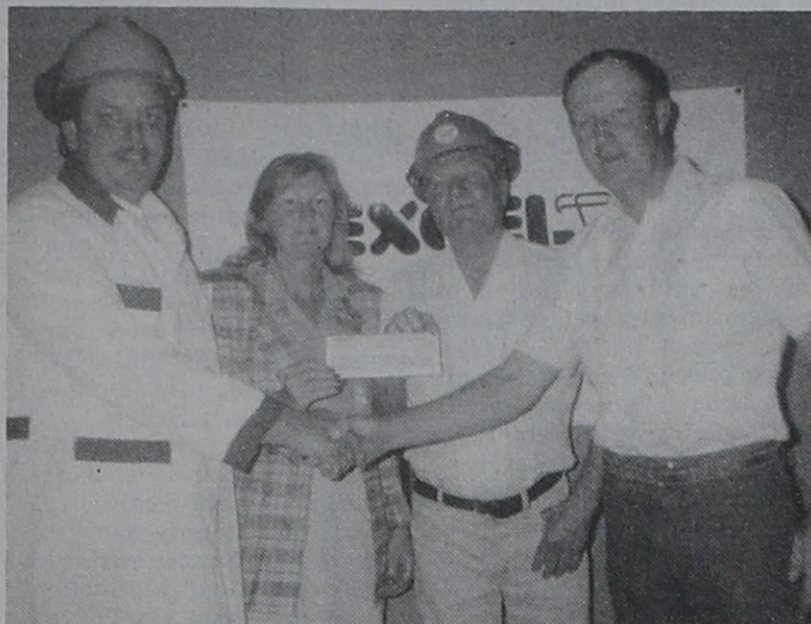
In April, Excel officials had indicated that the cost of workers' compensation claims in the two Texas plants threatened the economic viability of the operations. At that time, they challenged employees and managers to develop initiatives that would reduce workers' compensation costs in Texas, which they said were more than 4.5 times higher than for all of Excel's other major packing plants.

Company officials said Excel devoted more than \$13 million to workers' comp costs for the fiscal year ended May 31, 1989.

Since the April meetings with employees, the company sought employee and community involvement in helping eliminate false or excessive claims, notified the state workers' comp commission that it was withdrawing from the system effective June 11, and instituted a new occupational temporary-disability plan for employees that is funded by the company.

Fielding this week thanked all employees for their commitment to working to make both operations successful and said the company will continue to monitor progress being made.

"It is our intent and desire to remain competitive in all areas of operations. We are optimistic in regards to the results and improvements that we have seen and expect to see continued improvements in all areas of operations," he concluded.

Stormes Attends Jr. Olympics Camp

Andy Stormes, 16-year-old son of Sam and Ella Jo Stormes, attended the Junior Olympic Shooting Camp for an International Skeet July 15-20 at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas.

This was Andy's first try to shoot in an International Skeet Shoot. An International Skeet Shoot is where the shooters fire 25 shots at clay targets which are thrown by mechanical traps a minimum distance of 65 meters, which travel at 110 miles per hour.

There are two small buildings on either side of the skeet field (36.8 m. apart) which house the traps. On the left is the "high" house and on the right is the "low" house.

The shooters fire from eight stations placed in a semi-circle facing a line between the two houses.

The International style event uses a 12 gauge shotgun that must be held at waist level until the clay target emerges from the house. When the target emerges, the gun is mounted to the shoulder and the target is shot. The throwing mechanism incorporates a built-in variable delay of up to three seconds.

In order to enter, Andy had to fill out an application and send it in because the camp was limited to only 24 youngsters in the state of Texas.

The group attended camp during the week and Friday they had a camp tournament. Andy received a second place medal and at the Awards Banquet held that night, he received two certificates and a patch for the Most Improved Shooter.

After only one week at camp, he was classified at the level of "advanced."

Saturday, he attended the 1990 Texas State Junior Olympic Shooting Program International Skeet and International Trap Championships and PTO. There he placed fourth.

This was a National Rifle Association (NRA) Registered Shoot and Andy is now waiting to see if he will receive an invitation to the National Olympic Junior Shoot which will be held August 25-September 2 in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

He has been participating in 4-H shooting sports since he was nine years old. All of his coaching has come from his dad, Sam Stormes.

If Andy gets a preliminary tryout (PTO) score of 160 out of 200 before May of 1991, he will earn an invitation to try out for the United States Junior Olympic team. He came very close this past weekend when he shot a 155 in his first time to shoot in an International Skeet Shoot.

The class of 1940 will hold a 50th class reunion on August 4 at the First Bank of Bovina.

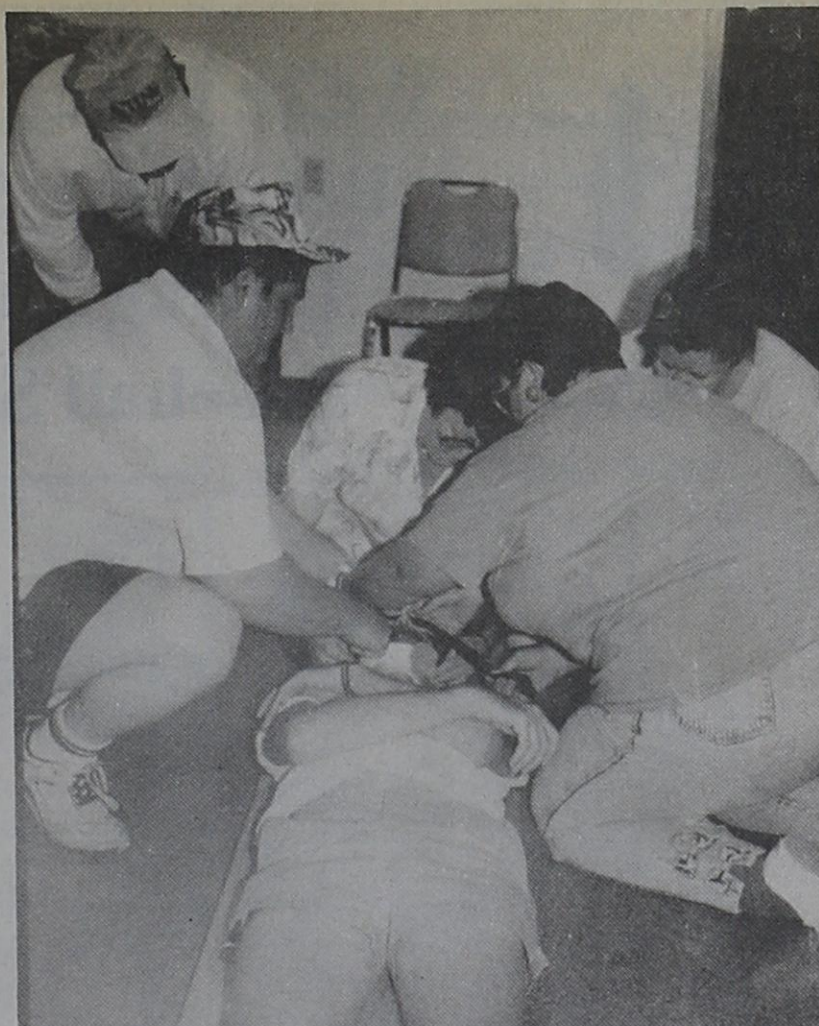
BHS Grad Selected For Award

Homero Renteria, a junior pre-medicine major from Bovina, was among fifty-nine West Texas State University students who have been selected to receive Mesa Scholarships for academic excellence.

The awards, effective for the 1990-91 school year, total \$35,750 and will be made in increments of \$250, \$500 or \$1,000.

Established from funds provided by Mesa Limited Partnership, the scholarships were first awarded in 1987 and are intended to reward and recognize freshmen and continuing undergraduate students who promote and exemplify high academic standards.

A composite score of 23 or higher on the ACT or a combined verbal and math score of 950 or higher on the SAT and a top-quarter class ranking was required of all entering freshmen selected for the scholarships. A minimum grade point average of 3.40 on all college work attempted was required for continuing students.

Angler's Corner

The largemouth bass ranks as one of the most sought after species in North America. Of all the methods employed for enticing the bass to strike, soft plastic worms offer the most flexibility in terms of different types of water, forage imitation, fishing open water or heavy cover and natural appearance.

The first rubber worm was patented in 1860 but was not popular until the basic material was changed to polyvinyl chloride resin in 1949. Since that time everything from crayfish to grubs have been imitated in one form or another. These baits are economical to use and when properly rigged, can be fished through the thickest of cover.

Of the various types of soft plastics available, the worm remains as the most consistent producer when properly presented. This lure can also be the hardest to use. Concentration, presentation and experience are key factors since an improperly utilized plastic worm will yield few results.

Concentration and experience are important in all facets of fishing, but never more so than when fishing a finesse lure like soft plastics. When the worm is in motion you should stay in contact with the bait by monitoring the line visually and mentally.

The line is like a two-way communication hook-up, you cannot see the lure, but you direct it through the line with your rod, and it responds with the different vibrations and bumps. Interpreting these responses properly will tell you when you bump into an object or get a strike. The bumping against cover will definitely feel different than the tap-tap-tap of a bluegill hitting at the bait. Only experience will tell you the difference. Until you gain that experience, you might set the hook on everything you feel, this will cost you a few lures though.

A weedless rigged worm (Texas Rig) has a hook tied behind a sliding bullet weight. Push the hook through the top 1/8" or less of the worm. Turn the hook around and impale it in the belly of

the worm while making sure the worm hangs as straight as possible. This method can be fished through the heaviest of cover.

The Carolina Rig involves the placement of a sliding weight in front of a swivel anywhere from 8 inches to 2 feet in front of the worm hook. This allows the weight to drag the bottom stirring up debris while the worm floats off the bottom behind it. The swivel keeps the weight from sliding down to the hook.

Both of these methods require extremely slow presentations. One rule of thumb is, if you think you're fishing slow, slow down some more.

Cast the worm out and keep your line as tight as possible or you will miss the feel of the lure. Bass will tend to strike the worm as it falls. When the lure strikes bottom let it sit there a few seconds then lower your rod, reel in several times and lift your rod tip up to raise the worm off the bottom and concentrate on the falling motion until you feel the bottom or cover again. Repeat this process back to the boat. Cover as much of the area as possible before moving on.

Setting the hook on the plastic worm is more difficult than most other lures. Since the strike usually occurs on the fall, there is more slack in the line than on a cast and retrieve lure. The pros recommend reeling in at least 2-3 turns before setting the hook, of course you have to feel the fish and act swiftly to accomplish this. Until you are more familiar with the lure, I would recommend a simple snap upwards of the wrist upon feeling any type of contact. If there is too much slack, you will get a mushy feeling, reel in a couple of turns and set the hook again. This is another facet of angling that everyone must develop for themselves.

Line size is another critical factor with finesse baits. The heavier the line, the less you will feel. If you start with 6 or 8 pound test, the feel of the bait will be far greater than with 10 pound or up. Compared to 8 pound test, 14 pound test feels like steel cable. You will lose more fish with

lighter line but at the same time learn more about feeling the bait. After getting familiar with lighter line, switch to the heavier line.

Since we are surrounded by clear, deep lakes, a plastic worm is your best bet particularly when fishing below 10 feet. The heat will drive the fish to cooler water around some type of cover such as brush, trees, rocks, ravines, humps, points and creek channels. While you can be sure the water near the shore has been pounded with all type of lures and bait, the worm can still get results. If you do not like to fish the water behind another boat, you will have to back off from the shore and locate deeper habitat. This is where the worm excels.

A good stout medium to heavy action rod combined with a bait-casting reel is recommended with a length of at least 5'6". One piece through the handle construction offers more sensitivity.

Volumes have been written on fishing with the plastic worm and different effective presentations always seem to be popping up. All else withstanding, the plastic worm works in more ways in all mixes of water under varied weather conditions. Once you have mastered this lure, other lures seem tame when compared to pulling from the depths a 3-4 pound bass that never seems to give up.

I'll just bet the fish are biting around here somewhere this week. Keep that line tight and good luck.

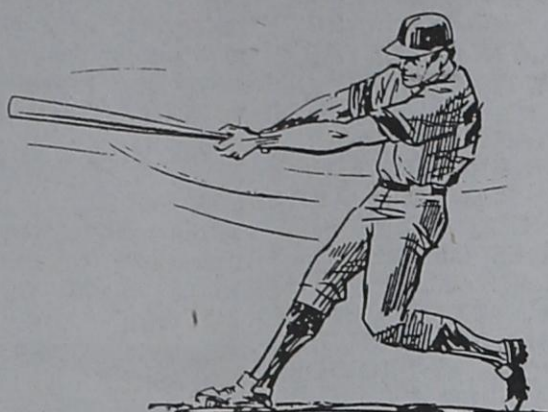
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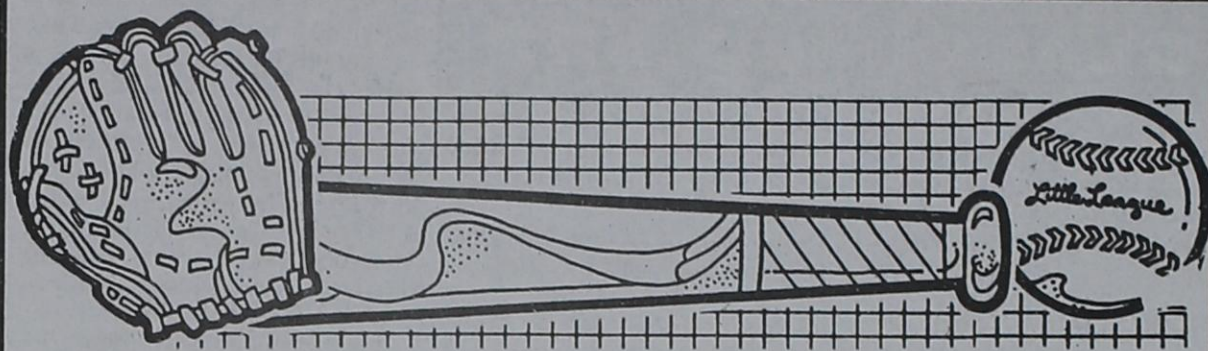

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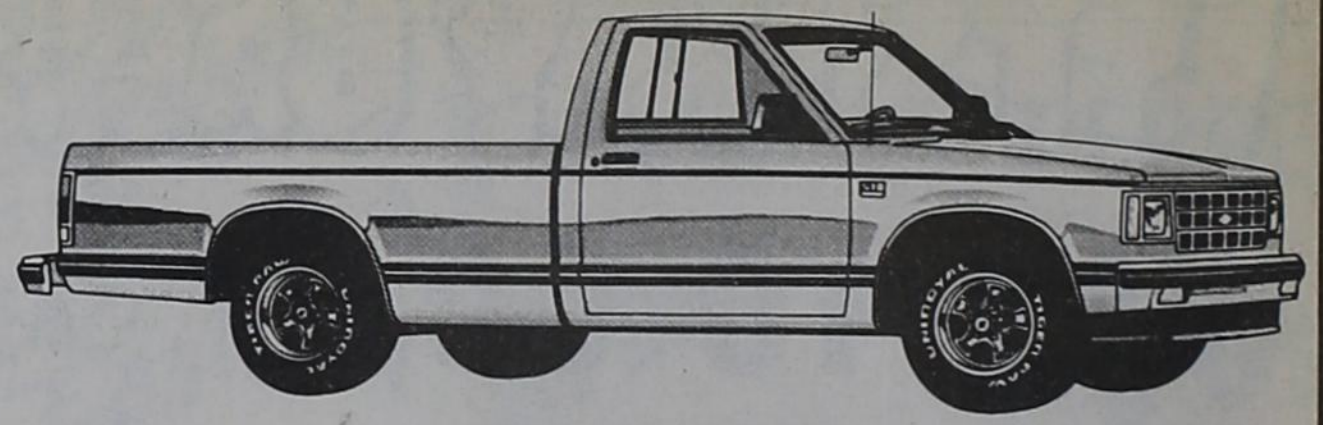
