## Sam F. Robinson Dies Thursday

Funeral services will be held this afternoon for Sam F. Robinson, a resident of Eastland County for the past 45 years, who was born in Leeville, Gonzales County on Aug. 11, 1870. Mr. Robinson passed away in a Ranger hospital Thursday.

Services will be held in the Eastland First Baptist Church with the Reverend James Simpson, pastor of the Morton Valley Harmony Baptist Church, officiating.

Mr. Robinson has been living in Ranger since May of this year. He formerly lived with a daughter in Eastland. Mrs. Kate Simpson was some eight years. The deceased was a retired farmer.

Survivors include the daughter living in Eastland; another daughter who resides in Graham, Mrs. Margaret Newell, and a third daughter, Mrs. Georgia Harpool Tipton of Breckenridge; one son survives, Homer Robinson of Ranger. Nine grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren survive.

The deceased had been a patient in the Ranger hospital for approximately one month prior to his death. His illness prior to entering the hospital had been about three and one-half years.

Morris Funeral Home of Ranger will be in charge of the arrangements.

## Dalhart Has First 1952 Case Of Polio

DALHART, Sept. 12 (UP)—Dalhart's first suspected polio patient has been hospitalized at Plainview and City Manager Marshall Bingham said Friday the town would be sprayed with DDT from a plane as soon as weather permits.

The suspected polio victim, Jodel Golden, 14, was one of three Dalhart boys who last year gained national attention when they found a 33-pound chunk of metallic uranium half buried in the dirt under a tree.

# Flood Waters Recede; Damage Runs In Millions

## 22.9 Inches Rain Reported In Places; Nine Believed Killed

NEW BRAUNFELS, Tex., Sept. 12 (UP)—Central Texas, gripped by drought only four days ago, counted "millions" of dollars in flood damage and possibly nine lives Friday as the area's cloudburst-flooded rivers roared toward the Gulf of Mexico.

Rampaging Cibola creek and the Guadalupe, Blanco, Comal, San Marcos and Pedernales rivers receded after reaching record-breaking crests and flooding some 74,000 acres.

tree, thrusting a limb through the plane's wing.

Two U. S. highways and nine state farm roads were closed in the flooded area, bounded by San Saba, Llano, Johnson City, Boerne, Kerrville, Fredericksburg and Brady.

### Worst Flood Since 1935

An estimated 700 families were evacuated from their homes in the New Braunfels area, cut by two of the rampaging rivers, and the city's semi-weekly newspaper, the Herald, said it was the worst flood since 1935.

Helicopters thrown into rescue work by San Marcos Air Force Base picked scores of persons from housetops and treetops in 50 separate missions Thursday.

Communications throughout the area were disrupted and power failed. Health authorities Friday warned against contamination of water and New Braunfels health officers appealed by radio for children to bring their own, previously-boiled water to school when it reopens.

All rail traffic north from San Antonio was halted by floods between there and Austin. The Katy Flyer, a swift Missouri-Kansas-Texas diesel-powered streamliner, was stalled by a washout three miles south of New Braunfels with 100 passengers aboard.

All of the passengers and crew of the train were removed in trucks to dry ground by nightfall.

Six ground rescue workers, including two Seguin firemen and four national guardsmen, were marooned atop a truck, when a sudden rise of water in the lowlands area around Seguin where they had helped a number of residents to safety sent them scurrying.

Helicopters picked the men off late Thursday night, but boats still were trying to reach three men marooned on a high tension power pole and another six men trapped in the Seguin filtering, pumping and electric light plant, completely surrounded by water. Helicopters dropped food to them.

Airmen Aid

Schools turned out throughout the area and San Marcos and Randolph Air Force Bases called personnel to flood duty. A schoolyard at New Braunfels was used as a landing field for helicopters and the Fourth Army at San Antonio sent cots and blankets to the area's homeless families spent the night.

Aureliano Castillo, one of four persons who scurried to the top of their automobile when swirling waters of the Comal rose around them, disappeared when they all tried to swim to a nearby tree. The others made it, Castillo did not.

Edgars Kneupper of Clear Springs, near New Braunfels, also was missing after the boat in which he and a friend, Helmut Salge, were riding capsized on Lake Dunlop. Salge swam to shore and said Kneupper clung to the boat, which later was found demolished.

## "Duke Of Duval" Denies Part In Youth's Killing

ALICE, Tex., Sept. 12 (UP)—George Parr, the "duke" of notorious Duval county, denied in a prepared statement Friday any connection with the political "murder by mistake" of a 22-year-old law student by a killer hired to assassinate the boy's father.

Parr, sheriff of Duval county and boss of the powerful political machine which produces voting so lopsided that Duval, Starr, Zapata and Jim Wells county elections have gained national attention, said he was making his statement because of "rumors" he was responsible for killing Jacob S. Buddy Floyd, Jr.

The dead youth's father long has been prominent in South Texas politics as an advisor to anti-Parr candidates and managed District Judge Sam G. Reams' unsuccessful campaign for re-election.

Reams was defeated in this summer's primary by a Parr candidate for judge.

Nazo Alaniz, law partner of the district attorney-elect, of Jim Wells, Duval, Starr and Zapata counties, has been charged with murdering young Floyd. He sought a writ of habeas corpus Friday for his release from county jail.

Texas Rangers and local authorities still sought another man charged in young Floyd's murder, a Mexican alien, who they indicated was the gunman who shot young Floyd twice in the driveway of the garage of his home.

Marion El Turko Sapate, a San Antonio tavern operator, also was charged with assault to murder.

Alaniz said Thursday that he was the informer who told political leader Jacob S. Floyd, Sr., Buddy Floyd's father, that he and Reams were to be assassinated by imported Mexican gunmen.

The elder Floyd had just sped away by taxi for a drive-in cafe rendezvous with the informant Monday night when his son was shot down in front of the garage at their home by a killer who obviously thought the youth was Floyd Sr.

Judge Reams agreed to hear Alaniz' petition for a habeas corpus writ and set a hearing for 9 a.m. Saturday.

## Two Light Planes Crash At Dallas

DALLAS, Sept. 12 (UP)—Two private planes crashed within 20 minutes of each other at Love Field municipal airport, but none of their occupants were hurt.

A twin-engined five-passenger Beechcraft ground-looped after taking off at 4:05 p.m. Thursday and crashed into a ditch. Twenty minutes later, an eight-place De Havilland Dove cracked up after a landing gear collapsed as it came in for a landing. Both planes were damaged.

## Steel Shop Official Found Shot In Automobile

HOUSTON, Sept. 12 (UP)—Clifton Breckenridge Hinton, 56, manager of the wire rope sales division of the Bethlehem Steel Corp. at Houston, was found shot to death in his automobile Thursday and Justice of the Peace Calder Ewing of LaPorte Friday returned a verdict of accidental death.

A son, Robert D. Hinton, 21, told Ewing his father frequently went to the small park near their home where the body was found to practice shooting. A .12 gauge shotgun in the back seat of the car apparently discharged, Ewing said.

DALLAS, Sept. 12 (UP)—Committee chairmen were appointed Thursday to complete arrangements for the 33rd annual meeting of the Texas Mid-Continental Oil & Gas association at Ft. Worth Oct. 14-15.

## Mrs. Jack Frost, Demo Leader Of 22nd District

Mrs. Jack Frost of Eastland has been named committeewoman of the twenty-second senatorial district. Fred Brown of Mineral Wells was appointed committeeman. Both are members of the new State Democratic executive committee selected Tuesday at the State Convention in Amarillo.

Committee members are selected at the state convention which meets every two years and there is a committeeman and a committeewoman from each of the 31 state senatorial districts.

This committee fixes the time and place of holding of the state convention and makes the arrangements for the convention. It also has duties provided by law in connection with canvassing the results of the Democratic primaries.

"Democrats of Eastland county who have been active and have worked hard in Democratic politics have brought about the circumstances that would permit the selection of a committeewoman from the county. I feel that such a selection is in recognition of their efforts and hard work," Mrs. Frost said today when contacted for a statement.

## Fine And Jail Sentence Given In Assault Case

HOUSTON, Sept. 12 (UP)—A motion for a new trial will be heard Sept. 26 in the assault case of Thomas H. Boyle, 48, who Thursday was handed the maximum penalty of \$1,000 fine and two years in jail for beating the divorced wife of a wealthy Fort Bend county rancher.

Victim of the beating was Mrs. Rita Ruth Booth, 45, who was unconscious for several months after the beating during a drinking party and who doctors said likely will never recover completely.

Mrs. Booth formerly was the wife of Tom Booth, a millionaire rancher.

Boyle, a balding pharmacist, told a six-man jury Thursday he had known Mrs. Booth for nearly a year when she asked him to the home of Mrs. Tressa Patterson, Oct. 15, 1951.

He said the three drank considerable whiskey and that Mrs. Booth struck him with a bottle when he refused to take her out for something to eat and that he picked up a lamp and hurled it at the divorcee.

## More Heads Fall In Cleanup Of Internal Revenue Bureau

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (UP)—The cleanup of the scandal-ridden Internal Revenue Bureau has left a trail of fallen heads and still more are expected to topple.

The purge started more than a year ago when a House Ways and Means subcommittee headed by Rep. Cecil R. King (D-Calif.) began investigating irregularities in tax collections.

Since then, the clean up has been pressed by the administration and Congress.

Congress passed legislation last spring taking politics out of the appointment of tax collectors. The administration has axed nearly 200 tax workers, including some top officials, and the Justice Department has moved to prosecute officials accused of tax irregularities by congressional investigators.

One of the big-name heads to roll was that of former Assistant Internal Revenue Commissioner Daniel A. Bolch, who was indicted Thursday by a federal grand jury in Brooklyn on five counts of tax evasion.

The Brooklyn grand jury is continuing its investigation, particularly into the affairs of former tax commissioner Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., and James B. E. Olson, once chief of the tax bureau's alcohol tax unit in New York City.

The House investigation showed that Bolch, Nunan and Olson had almost \$250,000 in unreported income from 1945 to 1950.

More indictments are expected to be handed down here by a federal grand jury which will start shortly an investigation of the alleged \$600,000 tax shakedown attempt against onetime Capone lawyer Abraham Teitelbaum. Teitelbaum has told congressional investigators that a "soft touch" clique tried to extort money from him to "fix" his tax case, claiming it had top tax officials in its "vest pocket."

The Washington grand jury will begin its inquiry when it can hear testimony from capital "mystery-man" Henry W. Grunewald, who was cited for contempt of Congress after he refused to tell House investigators anything about his shadowy activities.

Leading the list of ousted tax officials were nine tax collectors, who were presidential appointees and earned more than \$10,000 each annually.

## Korean Corporal Acclaimed Hero Of Capitol Hill

CAPITOL HILL, Korea, Sept. 12 (UP)—A skinny South Korean corporal, his shoulder ripped by grenade fragments, crawled back to friendly lines a hero.

The fame of Kim Yong Min has spread through the South Korean Capitol division. Infantrymen tell his story with the same pride Americans speak of Sergeant York.

The little South Korean shot dead eight Chinese with his rifle, and killed an estimated 10 more with grenades in a one-man assault Wednesday night against "Finger ridge," near Capitol Hill.

He spent the night in enemy territory surrounded by reinforced Chinese Communists and then worked his way back to safety Thursday. Kim was the first on the hill and the last to leave.

## Just Three Left

Kim and two friends led the first platoon in the attack against the hill, which he captured. Kim picked up three of the grenades tossed. One was blown up when Kim's bullet hit a grenade he was carrying.

Kim and his two buddies then charged the hill, shooting from the hip. During the charge, a Chinese grenade exploded 10 yards to Kim's right, riddling his shoulder. However, the Chinese backed off and Kim sent up flares to signify his conquest.

Kim started to chase the Communists up the ridge to the north. But at that moment, the Chinese counter-attacked from his left, pouring out of a communications trench two abreast and yelling.

## Grenades Killed Friends

Kim whirled, shot the first two Chinese leading the column. A half dozen Chinese grenades killed his two friends.

Kim went on alone, up the ridge toward the enemy, dropping grenades into Chinese bunkers as he moved north.

"I enjoyed very much killing the enemy," he said. "I was not crawling or hiding. I was just walking."

He spotted three Chinese carrying ammunition boxes and shot 2. The third dived for cover, but when a flare lit up the scene, Kim shot him where he lay.

The next day, a scarecrow of a figure staggered toward the front line of the South Korean "cavalry" regiment. Kim's clothes were ripped to shreds by wire and brush. His face was crisscrossed by scratches and his back was covered with blood from his shoulder wound.

## Rural Woman Badly Burned In Explosion

Mrs. Lewis Mitchell is in the West Texas Clinic a victim of burns received yesterday morning in an explosion that burned or demolished her home at Hohartz, about 12 miles northwest of Strawn.

The explosion was believed to have happened about 11:30 in the morning. Cause was undetermined. A theory offered was that an accumulation of butane gas used for cooking and heating purposes could have caused the blast and fire.

Mrs. Mitchell was critically burned, receiving third degree burns over a large part of her body, the back and arms, and the legs from the knees down being the most badly burned parts of the body. The hair was almost entirely gone. Dr. P. M. Kuykendall reported.

The hospital reported that Mrs. Mitchell rested as well as could be expected last night considering the condition of the patient.

## Chinese Soldier Deserts Reds For UN Prison Camp

PANMUNJOM, Sept. 12 (UP)—A Chinese soldier smashed through a Communist roadblock at the northern end of the Panmunjom neutral zone in a 2 1/2-ton truck Thursday night and escaped to Allied lines.

The soldier from Red China's "volunteer" army in Korea, clutching a burp gun in one hand raced through the middle of the truce village in a Russian-built truck.

An American soldier at the southern end of the neutral zone, Pfc. Roy L. Thompson of St. Louis, saw the Chinese was going to smash through the barrier. He raised it and let the speeding truck through.

The Chinese surrendered to U. S. Marines manning a roadblock farther south when he ran out of gas.

It was the second time in a week a Communist has surrendered to the UN from the neutral zone. Last Friday, a security officer assigned to the truce talk area surrendered to UN guards just outside the circle. Several months ago, two North Korean soldiers surrendered by running down the road from the conference area to the safety of U. S. Marine outposts.

The Chinese was disarmed and started back through channels to join 14,000 Chinese prisoners who have said they would rather die than return to communism. The truck was impounded.
