

A spot check by United Pres showed that barbershops in many large cities now charge \$1.50 for a haircut and \$1.00 for a shave.

In medium-sized cities, cuts generally run about \$1.25 and in smaller towns \$1.00 or less A few scattered shops still charge the 50 cents that was the pre-valent haircut price before World War II, but they are hard to

The only "two-bit" barber uncovered in the survey was 84-year-old Daniel Byers of Woodbury, Pa., a farming community of about 225 inhabitants.
