

"A Ranch Home for Girls" is the newest venture in this section of the state, and right here we wish to say we like the idea very much. We have our "Boys Ranch"—several of them, but girls have never attracted enough attention to capture such an institution. Why not?

In the first place the public has figured the boys were more in need of help, but we doubt that. Next, people who would be interested in such a home, have an idea that girls are more difficult, and harder to raise. We also doubt this.

Last week we had occasion to visit the "Girls Christian Academy"—a ranch style home, where girls are to be given a home and education and at the same time be brought up under a Christian environment.

Rev. Claude H. Harris and his wonderful wife are in charge. In fact Mr. Harris' donation of a section of good land made this possible. This involves a gift amounting to many thousands of dollars, and it was given freely. Now that actual building is well underway, Mr. Harris could use and would appreciate additional gifts whether large or small. All these gifts will go toward the erection of dormitories and other equipment so badly needed. So if you have a little spare cash, and a love for young girls and their welfare, just mail Rev. Harris a check. He gets his mail on Route 2, Breckenridge.

This home is located just east of the Eastland-Breckenridge highway, and about the same distance from the two cities. To get there go to Morton Valley, turn east for a mile or so, when you will see a sign reading "Girls Christian Academy". Turn north to the home.

This is not a home for "outlaws" or for un-wed mothers, but rather a home for neglected girls, coming largely from broken homes. Here they are given a home, a good one, and are educated, while growing up in a proper home-life environment. When they reach maturity they may go out into the world with a background of which they will never be ashamed.

We came near getting a rain Wednesday, and in fact did get .22 of an inch of a combination of rain, sleet and snow. We are very thankful for this, and it gives us a kind of re-newed hope, that before many days pass we will have all we need for a good crop this year. In fact should we get a good general down-pour in the next 30 days, we would be alright. We have a medium good top season at this time, but unless of "bottom season" it will not last very long.

It seems that March, April and May are months we can expect good rains. If this is true, maybe we have been worrying when we should have been smiling and planning.

Right now we feel that most farmers and stockmen have an ample supply of water for their stock. Tanks and lakes are about full, and even the city, with its short water supply, can begin seeing brighter days.

Let's cheer up, trust in the Lord and go to work. It may not be as bad as you may think. And even if it is, worry will avail you nothing. It will make you miserable, shorten your life and make your friends despise you.

Olden Wins One Drops One; Will Play Desdemona

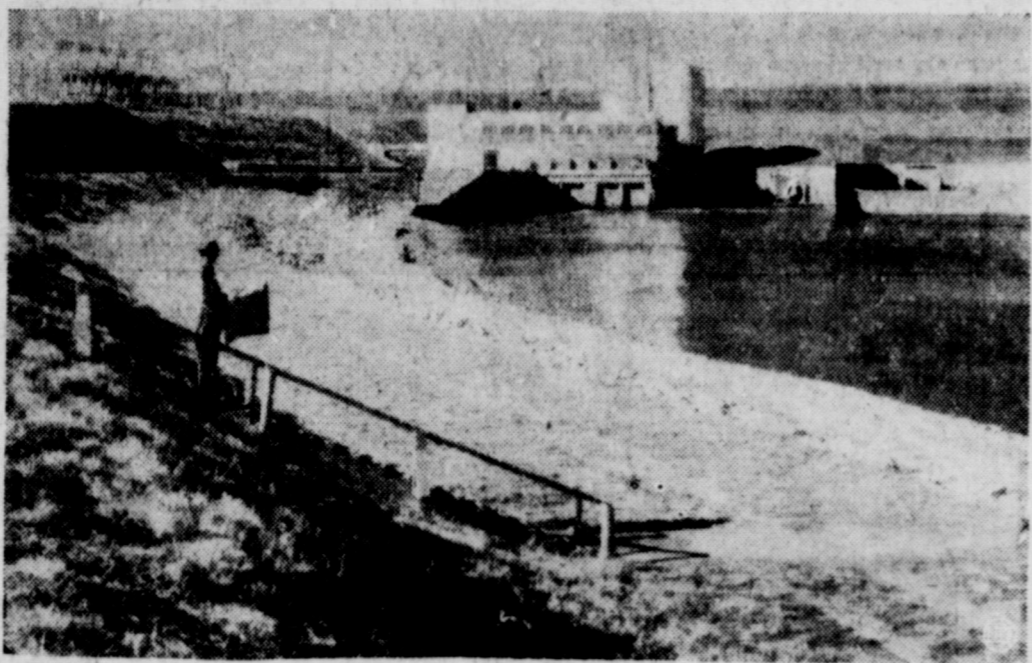
Olden Hornets went to Gorman Tuesday night and took on the Panthers in the Gorman gym.

**Red Prison Is Described By Missionary**

Dr. Olin Stockwell, a return Methodist missionary from China, spoke in Fort Worth last night on his experiences in Communist prison camps. His address at the First Methodist Church was the climax of an all day meeting of Methodist leaders studying the missionary program of the church and the expansion program of Glen Lake Methodist Camp located at Glen Rose.

Rev. I. Morris Bailey, pastor of the local Methodist church, and Mrs. Bailey attended the missionary conference. Rev. Mr. Bailey reported that a packed house of listeners sat with awe and reverence as Dr. Stockwell, who physically shows the signs of malnutrition and suffering, related his experiences and his thoughts during 23 and one-half months as a prisoner of the Chinese Communists.

Dr. Stockwell stated that upon his release he telegraphed his wife, "I have completed life's most difficult and rewarding experience." He told that during his first fourteen months of imprisonment he was kept in solitary confinement in a Chinking prison. The charges against him focused most on the point that as a teacher of Christ and freedom of education he had committed crimes against the Communists.

His sanity and ability to come through the nearly two years of such experience were, he said, "The New Testament, the grace of God, and a sense of humor." He related how that in that post-midnight arrest when the communists came for him while asleep with his family his wife handed him a tattered, ragged, taped copy of the New Testament. The communists took away his pocket knife, but failed to recognize what his New Testament was. Later, when Dr. Stockwell asked for a complete Bible, he was told he could not be permitted to read the Bible.

Plans at the meeting included emphasis upon the need of \$75,000 for improvement and new buildings for the Methodist Camp at Glen Rose. Eastland Methodists will share in this great work at the camp.

**Thousands of Dollars Short—**

At that time, the county chairman reported, contributions of Eastland Countians totaled only \$3,695.46.

A number of changes will be made, including new improvements. When it is re-opened Monday he feels the management will be able to render a superior service to any that may have had in the past.

In his statement to the press, Mr. Burkett stated that House Bill 269 was a "local bill." We understand that a "local bill" is one that affects the District of one Representative only. Therefore, this is not a "local bill" and many other people beside the citizens of Eastland County are interested in the matter.

We are reliably informed that the voters and attorneys of Stephens County are opposed to House Bill 269.

In his statement to the press, Mr. Burkett stated that he had submitted House Bill 269 "after talking with almost three hundred Eastland County people, including many lawyers, who were for the proposal." We do not know of a single, solitary attorney in Eastland County who favors House Bill 269. The Bar Association of Eastland County recently had an open, public meeting, presided over by Judge Earl Conner, Sr., as president. This meeting UNANIMOUSLY voted as being opposed to Eastland County being put in the District with Stephens and Young Counties. At the same time, each lawyer in Eastland County was appointed on a special committee to urge our Representative and Senator to oppose Eastland County being placed in the District with Stephens and Young Counties.

Within the last few days a petition has been circulated among the attorneys reading as follows: "We the undersigned attorneys of Eastland County, strongly oppose the abolishment of the 91st District Court. We respectfully request Honorable Omar Burkett, our Representative in the Legislature, and Honorable W. A. Y. Waggoner, our Senator, to work to keep our Court, to cooperate with the Representatives and Senators of Districts adjoining us to this end, and to oppose any bill that will destroy our 91st District Court."

This petition is signed by thirty-two Eastland County attorneys. Who are the attorneys in Eastland County that Mr. Burkett says favors his House Bill 269?

Finally, who are the three hundred people in Eastland County who favor the abolishment of the 91st District Court? Petitions are now being circulated over Eastland County to be signed by VOTERS only. We understand that several hundred voters have signed this petition asking our Representative and our Senator to oppose the abolishment of our 91st District Court.

**U. S. Casualties In Korea Mount To 129,819 Total**

The Defense Department reported today 395 American casualties in Korea last week, bringing the total since the start of the war to 129,819.

The latest report compares with 271 casualties for the previous seven days. It includes 68 American dead and 335 wounded, but the number of missing was reduced by eight.

The new total includes 22,899 dead; 94,123 wounded, of whom about 85 per cent have recovered, and 11,111 missing. In addition, 1,395 men who were missing for extended periods have now returned to duty.

There are 44 dead, wounded, missing and "returned to duty" totals by services:

- Army—18,785; 71,393; 9,992; and 1,327.
- Navy—364; 1,249; 86; and 4.
- Marine Corps—3,242; 21,349; 501; and 20.
- Air Force—499; 42; 832; and 44.

The department said the change in the number of missing was a statistical revision rather than recovery of lost men.

**Polio Drive Lags; Totals \$3,695.46**

And, points out Mrs. Bates, the funds collected thus far are dwarfed terrifically by the \$10,400 debt, yet unpaid for past operation of the county infantile paralysis group during 1952, worst polio year in history. The funds were expended for the treatment and care of 13 county victims of the dread crippler. Most of those struck by polio in this area were children and some are still continuing to receive care and treatment financed by the county group of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Two loans were made to the county until last year—one for \$2,200 and another grant of \$5,200. In addition, the county group has \$3,000 in due bills which are yet unpaid.

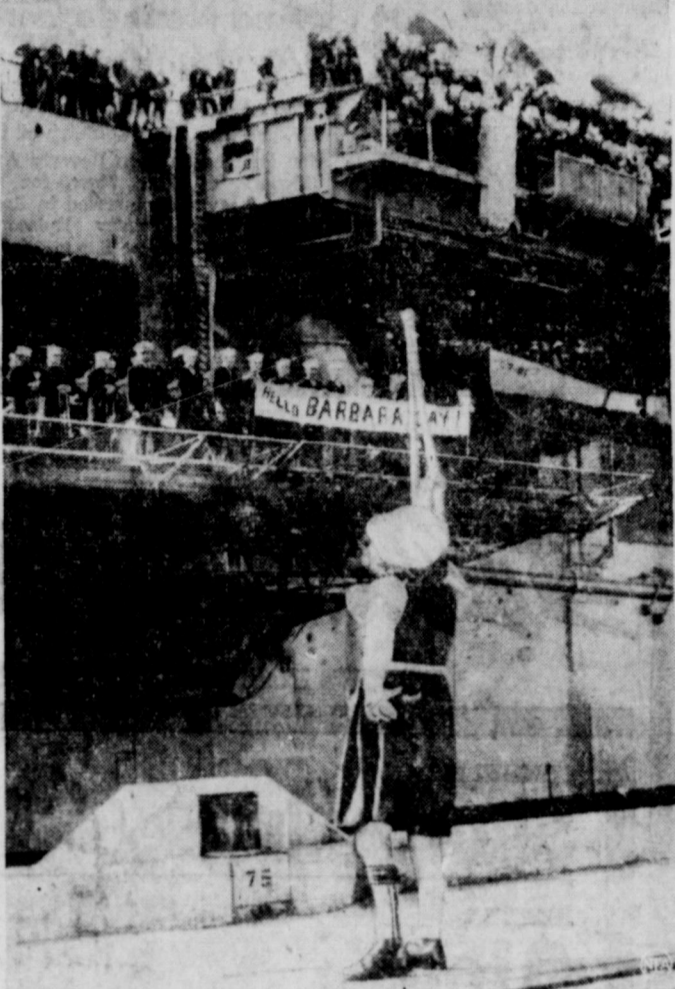

**Other States Find Small Loan Laws Work Well**

Small loan laws have worked well in other states, a survey made but the anti-usury committee of the Junior Bar of Texas discloses.

Inquiries to officials in charge of the administration of small loan laws brought such typical replies as:

Wisconsin, "has worked out very successfully"; Indiana, "practically eliminates the abuses against borrowers"; Nebraska, "has been most satisfactory" and New Jersey "We have not had a serious complaint against a small loan company since 1942."

Junior Bar committee members point out that these and replies from the 30 states which have a small loan law mean that Texas would not be making an experiment but would be adopting legislation that has been tested and found to be practical.

A model statute has been drafted by a committee of the State Bar of Texas with provisions for licensing and regulating companies making small loans and providing for charges that will be fair alike to borrower and lender.

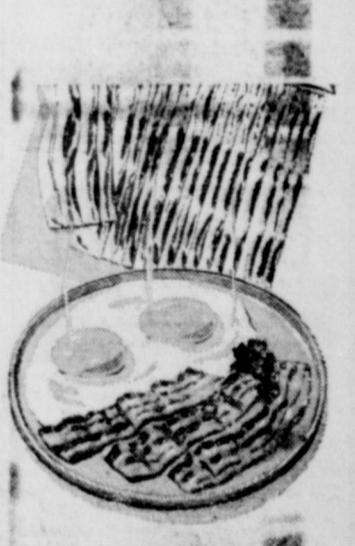



1/2 cup cold water  
2 eggs, separated  
1/3 cup molasses  
1/3 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup hot, strong Clover Farm Coffee
