Hugh and Robert Abel visited in Alexander with their mother and grandmother, Mrs. R. R. Abel.

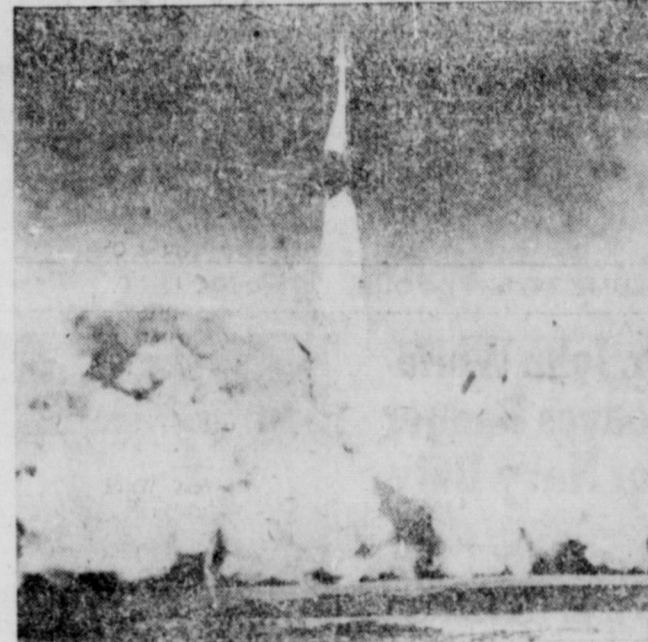
H. H. Williams has accepted a maintenance job in Blum.
