It is not our intention to bring It is not our intention to bring any subject that might cause alarm, yet there are times when warnings should be given. The weather bureau recently mailed us a bit of information on "cyclones" and after reading it we have decided to pass the information on to our readers who may encounter one of these twisters later on.

Eastland is not noted for cyclones, but they do occur, and we never know just when. Fact is cyclones occur most every place in the United States, with heavy accent placed on the midwestern. ern and central states. As a rule they strike in the months of March on through September, but have been known to occur every month in the year.

Records show that cyclones oc-cur on the average of about 12 per year in Kansas to as low as one in 36 years in Nevada. The national average is 153 tornadoes

Hot, sticky weather with south-Hot, sticky weather with southerly winds seems to breed cyclones, though we have many days of this kind when there are no cyclones. Usually you will observe a roar of several hundred airplanes. funnel-shaped cloud, and it has a Familiar thunder-storm clouds are present, and an hour or two before a tornade soney-turys

before a tornado, topsy-turvy clouds appear, sometimes bulging down instead of up. Clouds will have greenish-black color. Rain and sometimes hall preceding the tornado, and a heavy down-pour after the storm has passed.

Tornadoes may occur at any hour though most of them come between 3 and 8 p.m. Usually they move from southeast to north-

Length of their path is usually 10 to 40 miles, but they may move for 300 miles.

To know what to do may prove worthwhile. If you are in open company, move to right angles to proado's path. If in a city inside shelter, preferably in a steel or reinforced building. Stay

If at home stay in the south-west corner on the first floor or in the basement. At school re-main near an inside wall on the lower floor. In rural district teach-ers and children should move to ravine or dich of no other storm shelter is available.

Keep cool and hope for the best.
