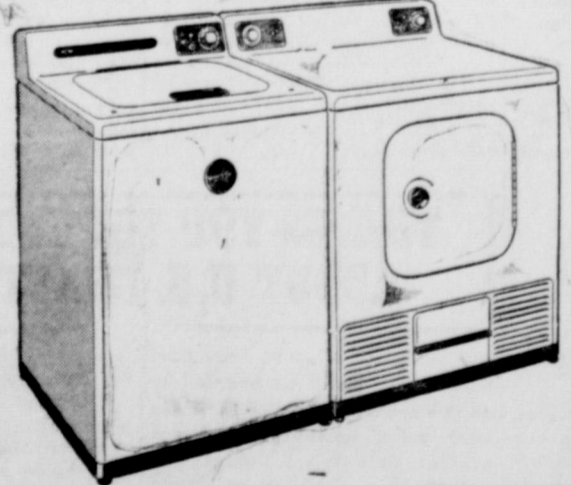

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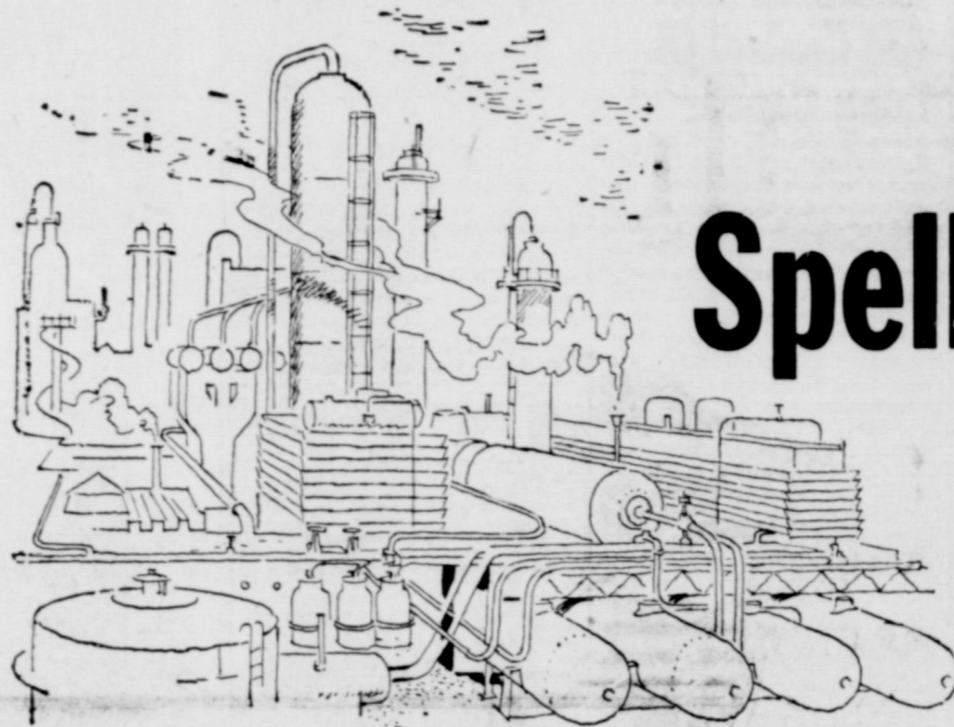

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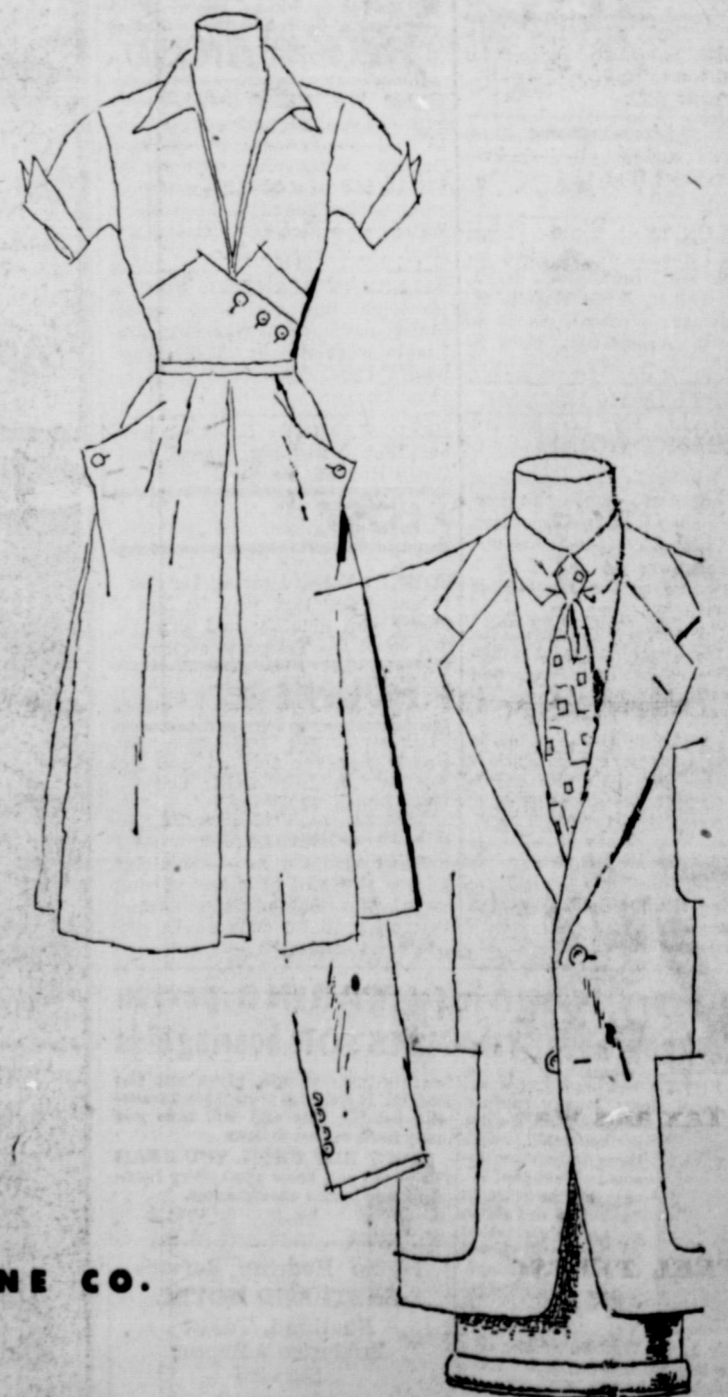

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### Feeding Hungry Travelers Big Job



When this housewife visited the Pullman commissary at Chicago, she learned quickly that it takes a lot of food and beverage to satisfy the needs of travelers. Mrs. Amilee Thompson pushes a truckload of supplies consigned to one of 400 buffet, restaurant and lounge cars.

If you think your family grocery shopping is a chore, consider the problem of serving food and beverages each year to millions of persons who are on the move in practically every state of the union. Although Pullman has long taken this job in stride, few travelers are aware of the gigantic "supermarket" that functions behind the scenes to provide for their needs.

Rightfully termed the Pullman commissary, this combination grocery and department store would please the most discerning housewife. On its shelves, she would find a wide variety of items, ranging from eggs and milk to sardines caught off the coast of Portugal, from electric kettles and coffee urns to fine silverware and china. Based on experience and the traffic usually borne by each of its cars, the commissary estimates the supplies that will be required for each run. Attendants and bus boys utilize every inch of space in the compact kitchens or snack bars for the storage of food and beverage. Pullman renders commissary service daily to approximately 12,000 men, women and children. A letter from Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower, commending the food service and courteous attention accorded her and her husband in their private car during the political campaign last fall, is typical of many received by the company. It might be pointed out, however, that Pullman goes the modern supermarket one better in that it even places the food on the plates of its customers.

Having no centralized control, no hierarchy and no single, official creed, the Baptists do not regard themselves as a "church," but as a denomination. ### Cancer Check Urged To Curb Fatal Disease

Many people put off seeing their physician, when they suspect cancer, because they are afraid. And yet, this fear, resulting in delay, causes many deaths from cancer. One-half of the lives now being lost to cancer could be saved if sufferers would see their doctors in time, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The sooner cancer is found, the less likely it is to have spread to other parts of the body, making cure impossible.

Most persons are familiar with the danger signs, such as a small sore on the skin, lip, or tongue that does not heal quickly, a mole, wart, or birthmark that suddenly changes in appearance; a painless lump or thickening, especially in the breasts, lip, or tongue; persistent indigestion; or radical changes in normal bowel habits; any unusual bodily discharge or bleeding; and persistent hoarseness lasting more than a few weeks. When any or these symptoms show up between physical

check-ups, go quickly to see your doctor. They are common indications that cancer may be starting. You cannot tell if you have cancer without seeing a doctor. A regular thorough physical check-up by your family physician is your best guard against cancer, plus an examination when one of the danger signals, or warnings appear. The first symptoms of cancer are scarcely noticeable. You may notice just a slight change from the normal. But do not wait until you feel pain to see your doctor. It is characteristic of cancer that there

is no pain in the first stages. Pain is usually a late symptom and when it comes, the growth is often far advanced.

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#### Any Way You Look At It—

... there seems to be no way of escaping the onrushing tide of automobile accidents. Statistics now available show a new high score for 1952, and locally the situation is no better so far for 1953. Apparently more steam must be applied to traffic education even though many individuals and organizations are hard at work trying to solve our problems. 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### COMPLETE RELIGIOUS FREEDOM IS CHIEF TENET OF BAPTISTS

An indomitable belief in religious liberty is one of the most distinctive features of the Baptist faith, according to Dr. William Lipphard, prominent Baptist writer and editor.

In an article, "What Is a Baptist?" appearing in the issue of Look magazine out today, Dr.

Lipphard states that, throughout their history, Baptists have contended for full, complete, unrestricted religious freedom. This freedom applies not only to themselves, but to all other religions, whether Catholic, Moslem, Hindu, Jewish or pagan. Atheists also are entitled to their views, and to persuade others to accept them, provided their convictions do not interfere with the right of others to do likewise, according to the Baptist belief.

"The Baptist contention is not for mere 'tolerance' but for absolute liberty," Dr. Lipphard continues. "Tolerance means concession and expediency; liberty means inalienable right."

He adds that Baptists do not believe that legislation, force or persecution, whether by church or state, can ever suppress religious error.

## Churches Plan Observance Of 'Soil Sunday'

In hundreds of churches in the South and Southwest May 10, will be observed as Soil Stewardship Sunday. Pastors will emphasize in special sermons the responsibilities of their flocks as protectors and rebuilders of the soil.

Farm and Ranch, cooperating with ministers and soil conservation district supervisors originated the observance eight years ago. Last year, 17,000 sermon kits were distributed to the clergy and conservation personnel, and thousands of churchgoers in 15 states heard sermons based on these helps. A more widespread observance had been planned this year. Kits may be obtained from the Editorial Department, Farm and Ranch, 318 Murfreesboro Road, Nashville 10, Tenn.

Forbes McKay, President and General Manager of the magazine, noted in announcing the program that "thousands of acres of worn-out farm land has been reclaimed and made to produce abundantly again" through work of the Soil Conservation Service.

"Good soil produces good crops to feed a healthy, prosperous people," he said, "it is every person's duty to encourage soil conservation because our country's future depends on it."

Supporting the Farm and Ranch plan, Walter S. Davis, Jr., President of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts, said in part:

"The American people, in recent years, have poured great amounts of time, energy, and money into the task of conserving and improving the soil of our country. The result has been a near-revolution in agriculture . . . Evidence of soil conservation is now visible in almost every farming community . . . I can think of no finer way that Farm and Ranch can serve agriculture than by furnishing these kits of factual reference materials to help those in the pulpit

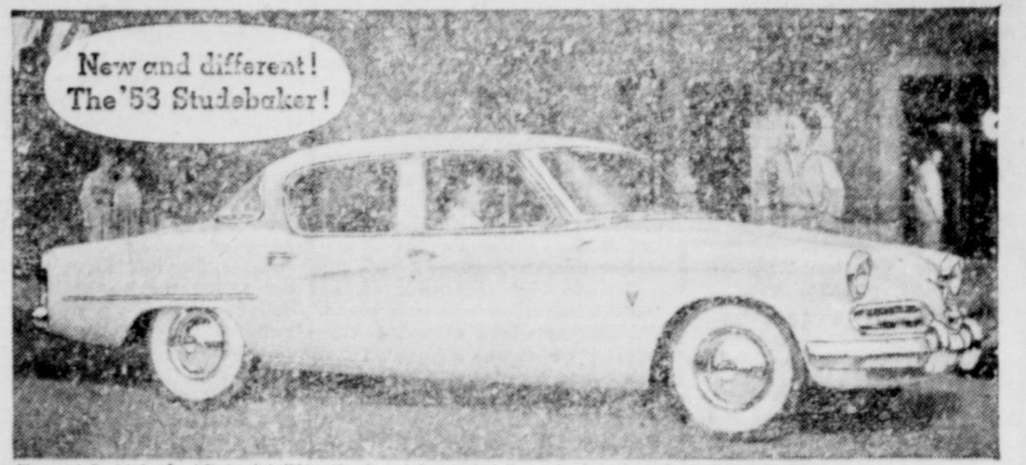
## Musician Fears 'Dishpan Hands'

## White Wings Arrive Soon

The Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said substantial numbers of whitewing doves are expected in the Rio Grande Valley any day now.

He said the swift, game birds which usually are hunted during a special September season ordinarily appear en masse about mid-April but that the migration trend this spring may bring them in ahead of schedule. Whitewings winter in distant parts of Mexico.

The Assistant Director said reports from field men on the Valley where the distinctive game birds

most are that housing facilities for them may be improved this year. Whitewings have been short of nesting areas since the severe freeze of January 1951 which killed so many citrus trees.

The Assistant Director pointed out that the whitewings have been constantly harassed for nesting grounds since the citrus and farming operations depleted Valley wilderness area. Then, after the birds had readjusted themselves to citrus cover, the crisis became more acute when the freeze decimated the orchards. This caused the birds to drop from a peak of about 500,000 in 1950 to an estimated 150,000 last year.

Game Warden Supervisor Chas. Jones of Weslaco said general nesting facilities seemed improved this spring and were particular-

No. 1 problem until returned to grass. Another 1,426,600 acres are so easily damaged they should not be cultivated every year. However, a total of 750,100 acres of cropland unsuited to cultivation has been planted to productive, wind-defying grass.

Regional Director Merrill said that two-fifths of the progress in treatment of hazardous lands in the wind erosion belt has been made in the last three years. In this period the equivalent of 5-763,874 acres has been given the treatment needed for protection and continuing production. In the 28,562 agreements into which owners have entered with soil conservation districts in the three years cover 14,490,865 acres.

"We set out 18 years ago, not knowing the size of the job or what measures would work, to bring wind erosion under control," Merrill said. "With the landowner, the soil conservation district and the Soil Conservation Service forming a most effective front line team, and with a lot of other agencies and organizations giving strong support, we have made what amounts to astonishing advances toward our goal. At the present rate of planning and application, we are beginning to see daylight now."

The SCS regional head pointed out that stabilization and continuing production from the land are not the only benefits coming from the landowner's participation in the program.

"Our studies show that the use of soil conservation measures in these areas result in increased production averaging 26 per cent in Texas, 33 per cent in Oklahoma and 49 per cent in the part of Arkansas involved," Merrill said. "Those men who are practicing conservation farming and ranching are responsible in large measure for the rapid widening of interest."

### Atom Scientist Now Developing Bumpless Bump

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — Chancellor Arthur H. Compton of Washington University, who is better known as an atomic physicist, has applied his talent to developing a bumpless bump.

The physicist, who helped develop America's first atom bomb, turned his efforts to designing a "smooth" bump when student drivers complained that bumps in campus roads—placed there to retard speeders—caused too much of a jolt even at slow speeds.

Compton went to work at his drawing board and came up with a bump which will still slow down speeders while being easier on moderate drivers.

The bumps will still be seven inches high but will be graded more smoothly and placed in pairs.

### Test Helps Poultrymen

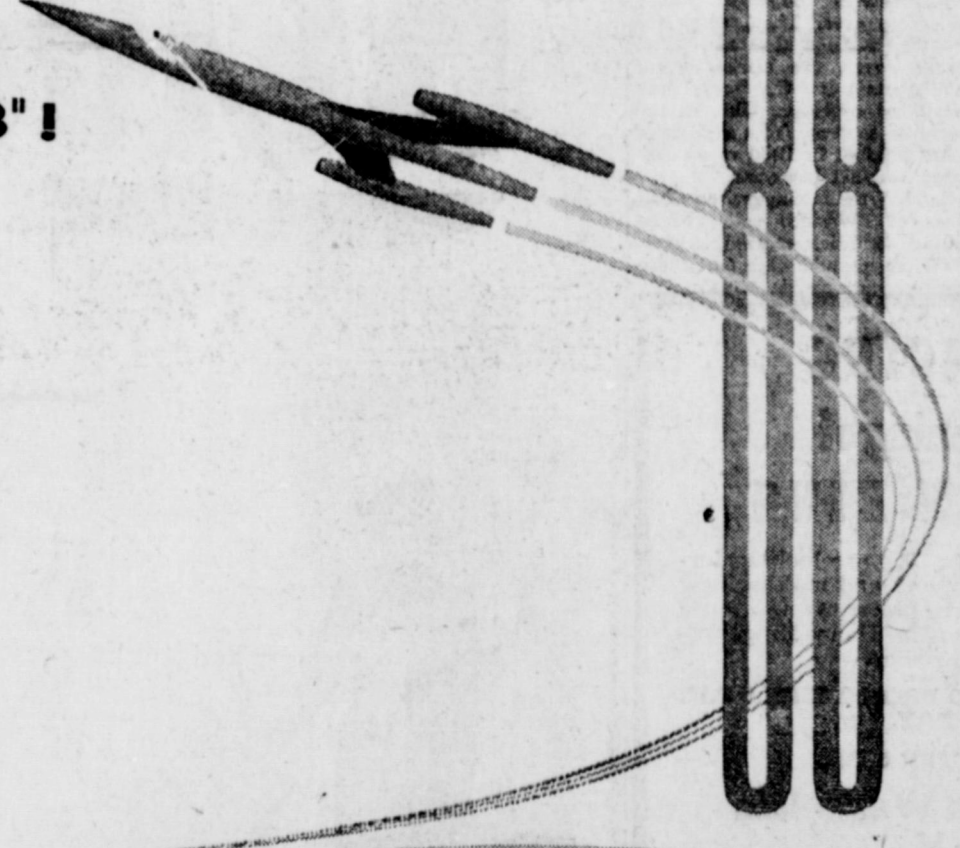

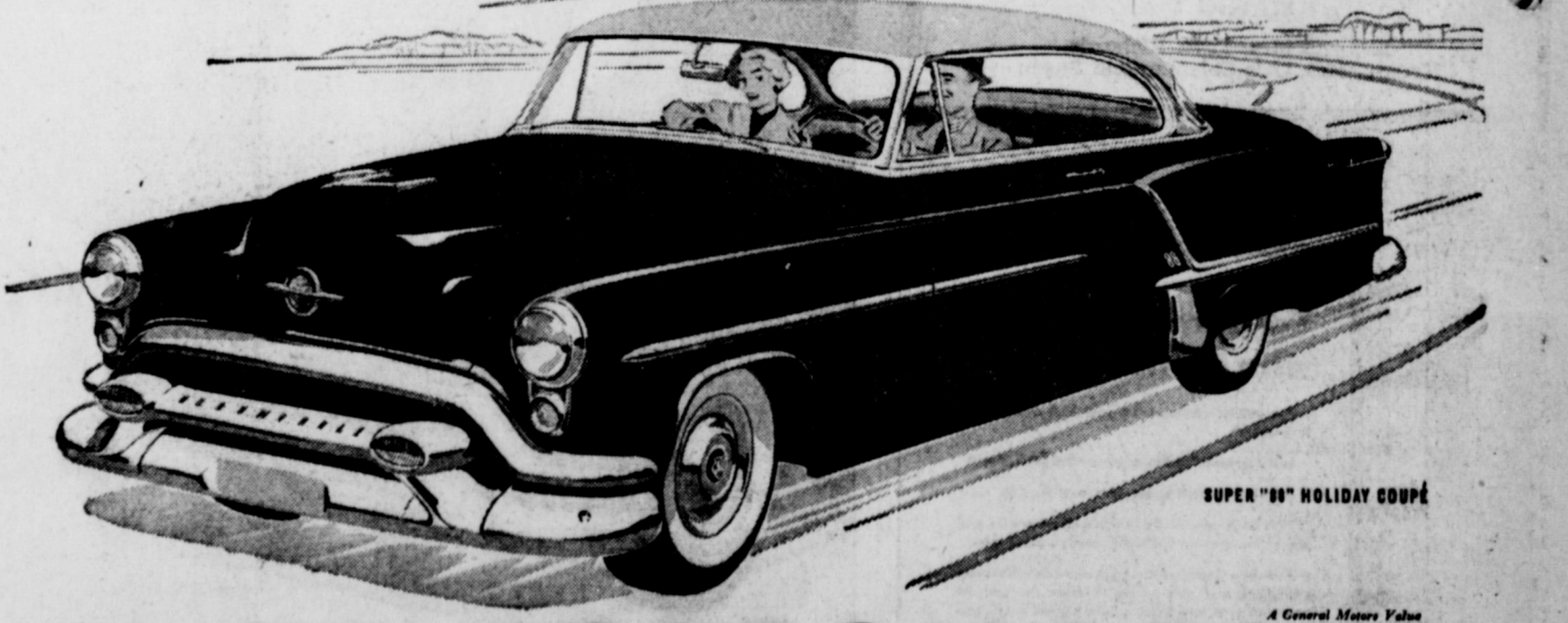
