

## Youth Center Meeting Will Be Thursday

The Saturday Evening Post recently carried an editorial on the cattle situation, which said: "It is heartening that in face of the still continuing drops in price for their one cash crop, the beef growers not only failed to shriek for the government to bail them out, but have openly declared their intention to stake their future on the operation of a free market."

It was also pointed out that, historically, the cattlemen have always been opposed to government interference—even in the grim 30s when prime steers sold for four cents a pound, they did not seek government support. They reason that along with federal supports they would lose control of their industry.

The only government interest they have sought is help in developing wider markets, such as the encouragement of the use of beef in the school lunch program. They have also inaugurated a positive program for selling more beef to customers on its merits as an essential food.

Stockmen are geared to high-level production, and a fundamental part of their faith in expanding markets in a growing free market.

This example should be pondered by all individuals and groups which have grown accustomed on looking to the government as a source of endless hand-outs.

Too many of us spend too much time with the frivolous things of life. We think more of having a good time than any other thing. Now we are not opposed to having a good time—fun is alright, and we are for it, but horse-sense is also o.k. We need both of them, but so far as we are concerned we have been detouring the horse-sense route.

Right now is the time to use some of this horse-sense. You may be wondering why, in spite of staggering taxes, the deficit and national debt keep going up and up.

If so, you might consider a book which is being advertised by a leading publisher. It is entitled, "How to Get It from the Government." According to the advertisements, it "tells all about the hundreds of benefits and services provided by your government. You never dreamed you could get so much help from your government in so many ways. All kinds of benefits and services are yours for the asking. Are you getting your share of these billions of dollars?"

No criticism is implied to the publisher of this book, who has a perfect right to sell just as many copies as he can. But the fact that such a work is possible shows how sickeningly far we have strayed from the ideals which built America, and which made America's independence and freedom possible.

Nor do we take time to find that while we are spending like drunken Indians, and are grabbing for everything that is loose, government aid included, that there is to be a pay day. All this will of necessity have to be paid back, and pay day will likely come when we are financially embarrassed. You just don't get something for nothing. There is always a string attached, and we will pay and pay dearly.

Anything that is not right is bound to be wrong. If we could only accept this truth, how much better our condition as a nation would be.

## AFL Boosts Membership Of 10 Million

The American Federation of Labor is now privately counting its strength at well over 10 million members, and expects to announce so officially in a few months.

This means the labor union federation is probably the largest lay organization of any kind in the country, outside of the Republican and Democratic parties.

The AFL's claimed new membership figure, at 10,600,000, represents some modest actual gain in worker numbers. But mostly it reflects a drive to get AFL unions to give an accurate count of what members they already have.

It's been an open secret in labor circles for many years that many AFL union, large and small, considerably understate their membership. This saves them money in paying per capita dues to the parent AFL.

Thus, while the AFL has been officially saying its membership is just over eight million, the Labor Department directory of unions published a few weeks ago estimated the AFL actually had 9½ million members.

The rival CIO's unions, on the other hand, are reported in some cases to be overstating their memberships.

The AFL took the bull by the horns this summer at the AFL Executive Council's may meeting it was decided that henceforth all unions would report regularly on actual membership and keep the figures up to date.

## Completion Announced—2 New Tests For County

Two new locations and a completion for Eastland County high-lit area oil news today. Three miles northwest of Ranger in the regular field, Eugene Larlick (formerly Field & White) has completed his No. 1 W. O. Cantrell in the J. P. Robus Survey. Daily potential was 28 barrels of oil, flowing through a 28-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing.

Production is from 24 perforations at 3,311-25 feet, treated with 250 gallons of acid. Den Caraway, Rising Star, spotted No. 1 J. J. Barron as a wildcat three miles northwest of Carbone in Eastland County. Location is 150 feet from the south and 1,088 feet from the west lines of the Barron 60 acre tract in Section 44, Block 2, H&TC Survey. It has a contract depth of 1,500 feet with rotary. Another Eastland County wildcat was spotted one mile south of Rising Star as O. M. Evans Drilling Co., Fort Worth, No. 1 Della Bender. Site for the 1,100-foot rotary test is 660 feet from the north and east lines of the west half in Section 27, Block 3, BBB&C Survey. Over in neighboring Palo Pinto County eight miles west of Graham in the Loyd-Dalton Field, Ekco Drilling Corp., et al of Graham No. 2 Laura E. Hinkson was spotted. Drillsite is 1,710 feet from the southwest and 150 feet from the southeast lines of the northwest quarter in Peter Miller Survey, A-312.

## TORRID HEAT WAVE CONTINUES

Skies were clear and the sun's torrid rays were scorching area today as Eastland County vicinity residents hoped for rain and relief from a new mid-summer heat wave.

Partly cloudy and hot — with widely scattered thundershowers — was forecast for the Eastland area for today and Thursday. The U. S. Weather Bureau predicted the rain for the afternoon periods of both days. The maximum mercury reading this afternoon will probably be between 95 and 100 degrees.

And it'll be about the same Thursday afternoon. Tonight's low, according to weather men, will be around 75 degrees.

## Learn To Spot Poison Ivy And To Control It

If you are a gardener, you should learn to spot poison ivy. It's easy to do. Poison ivy has three-part leaves which grow in a bushy, shrubby or climbing manner, reports the August issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine.

All parts of a poison ivy plant are poisonous, including roots and stems. You should keep your distance from poison ivy. The plant can be killed with ammonium sulfate or a combination of 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T brush-killer spray. You should label the sprayer after using it to combat poison ivy. A sprayer which has been used to kill poison ivy can also kill the garden plants.
