THE ANNOUNCEMENT last week by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation that right-of-way money is to be made available for the eventual widening of Highway 60 through Parmer County is almost anti-climactic for some of us who have been pushing for the four-lane project for over two decades.

The first year that ye editor lived in Parmer County, it seemed like every other emergency that we checked out involved a fatal or otherwise bad automobile wreck on Highway 60.

The highway immediately became one of our pet projects, and we have written any number of editorials, commented in our columns, and had countless news articles dealing with the situation as pertained to the highway.

Most of the news stories seemed to contain reasons or explanations as to why the highway did not at the certain time qualify for state assistance, and we'd just have to wait for the next fiscal year, or something to that effect.

At one time, the State Highway people backed off the project completely because they had been given the indication that Highway 60 might be included in an interstate program. There was a movement to get a four-lane divided highway from Amarillo to Las Cruces, N.M.

About all this accomplished was to place the situation on "hold" for an eight or ten-year period, when absolutely nothing at all was done.

At one time (when I was younger and perhaps a "crusading editor") I had said to myself that I was going to have something in the paper, either an editorial or a news article, concerning Highway 60, until the Highway Department would "have to do something."

I am sure that Rhea Bradley, highway resident engineer who lives in Littlefield, will recall that for years when I talked to him about highway matters, I eventually asked "Is there anything new about Highway 60?" (And there most likely wasn't.) At any rate, we had about decided that it was a lost cause, and that if it ever got to the point that all highways had to be four-lane divided facilities, perhaps our highway would at last get its just due.

But late last year, a group of local leaders, armed with the news of a new local industry (which would increase the already heavy load of truck traffic on the highway), began a push, and met with the Highway Commission. A.L. Black served as spokesman for the local delegation.

At the time, the commission gave no promises, but left it as "we'll see what we can do..." virtually the same thing we had heard for the past 20 years.

But lo and behold, the announcement of March 20, 1985, indicating the project at last has been noticed.

State representative Pete Laney has been credited with a big assist in getting the project "off center." For whatever the reason, we applaud those who had anything to do with re-opening the road project.

Some day we may actually see the four-lane divided highway become a reality.

This ceremony is well-known throughout the Panhandle and South Plains area.

As this tradition proceeded on March 22 at 6:58 a.m., only Crim's wife and daughter were present. It was performed at Crim's home near Lazbuddie.

Women's Defensive Class Is Offered

Defensive training for women by the SPAG will be available in Bovina if enough women are interested.

Self-defense classes for women, with the accent on thwarting rapists, will be taught in Bovina if as many as fifteen women are interested in taking the four hour course. It will cost \$20 a person.

Bob Watson, Director of Enforcement Training, will be teaching the defense course. During that time each one will receive a manual and a qubotan and will be taught how to use the weapon.

The demand is overwhelming all over the country for the need by

women to learn how to defend themselves.

Watson will be conducting the classes and will demonstrate safety practices.

The classes will be organized as soon as it is known if there are enough women who would like to learn the techniques. Call the City Hall and let them know if you would like to take the four hour class.

In Texas alone, there were 3,418 cases of rape reported in 1984, and it is estimated that four out of every 20, are not reported.

Women are urged to take lessons in defending themselves with what they may have at hand.

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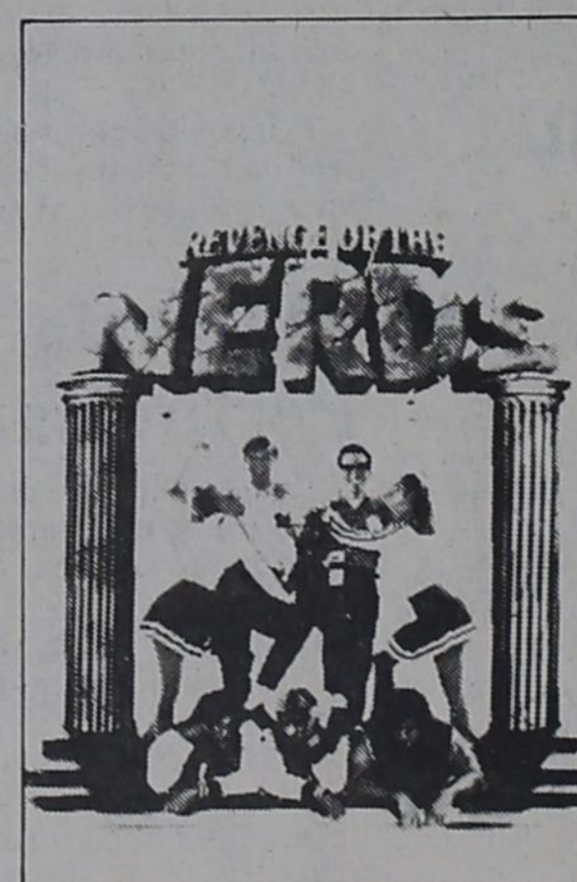

Moseley Does Well After Heart Surgery

Hugh Moseley, Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector, underwent a four-bypass, open heart surgery last year.

On July 24, Moseley was in Friona on business when he began to feel ill after lunch. He drove to Reeve Chevrolet-Olds for a soft drink but didn't feel better.

So Glen Reeve, Jr. took him to Parmer County Community Hospital. Moseley walked in but began feeling faint. Within a few minutes, he had a doctor and four nurses caring for him. He was given an i.v., oxygen and medication for pain.

Moseley was having a heart attack.

"It felt like an 18-wheeler had run over my chest," he recalled.

After two days, he was transferred by ambulance to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. While there, he was in the care of Dr. Joel Osborn, who Moseley had known since the physician was an infant.

On August 21, Dr. Osborn ran an angiogram, and three days later Moseley underwent open heart surgery. Four veins were transplanted from his leg to his heart.

After the surgery, he was placed in the coronary care unit for two days, then transferred to a regular room. He was discharged and returned home August 29--only five days after the operation.

On October 10, Moseley returned to work on a part-time basis, gradually working up to full-time.

Now, Moseley says he feels just fine, and has ever since the surgery.

Moseley has lived in this area all his life. He was born January 22, 1927 on the family farm south of Friona. Moseley grew up on the farm, and attended school in Friona. When World War II was still in progress, Moseley and a

friend, David Johnson, decided one day that they wanted to join the Navy. They were still in high school, and Moseley was 17 years old.

When they got to Dallas to enlist in the Navy, the recruiter told them that they were full up that week, but to come back next week. Moseley said, "Well, you just didn't make a trip to Dallas every week."

When they walked out of the Navy recruiter's office, right across the way was a sign advertising the Merchant Marines--so they signed up with them. They went back home for the holidays, and were in St. Petersburg, Florida on January 3, 1945, to leave on their first Merchant Marine "adventure."

During the two years Moseley was in the Merchant Marines, he went around the world three times, carrying supplies from port to port.

After the war ended, when he was coming into port at San Francisco, he decided to come home to see his folks. His dad, David Moseley, wanted him to stay home and finish high school, so that he and his brother, Jack, could graduate in the same class. He did, and he and his brother graduated in May 1947.

His friend, David Johnson, was struck by lightning and killed on Easter Sunday, 1949.

Edith Johnson of Friona is Moseley's sister.

After graduating from high school, Moseley attended Texas Tech in Lubbock, majoring in agriculture. He graduated with a Smith-Hughes Degree, which qualified him to teach vocational agriculture, in 1953.

He decided that teaching wasn't really what he wanted for a life's career, and came back to Friona and farmed with his dad in 1954. Also in 1954, he ran for the office

of Parmer County and District Clerk. He was elected and took office in 1955. He served in that position for eight years.

Beginning in January 1963, Moseley drove back and forth from Farwell to Friona Feed Yard, where he worked on the construction of the feed yard for nine months.

Friona Feed Yard was the "pioneer" of the big, modernized feed yards to be built in Parmer County.

In September 1963, Lee Thompson resigned the position of

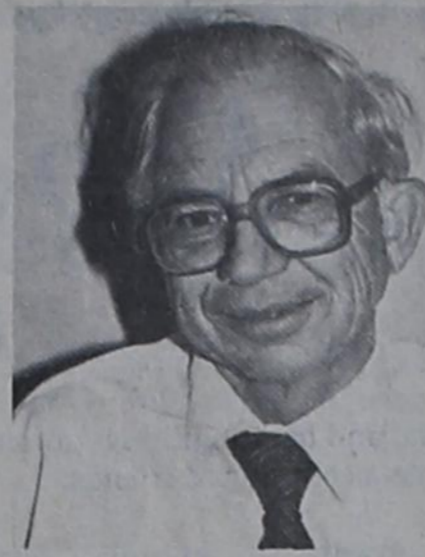
Burial was in the Rhea Lutheran Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Larger bolls, more glabrous (less hairy) than GP 3774. In some areas, generally the lighter sandy soils may out produce 74. Plant and compare. It may be the cotton for you.

GP 5479

"THE FAST ONE"—Very early, excellent seedling disease resistance and very good seedling vigor. Compared to GP 3774 and GP 3755, it is more compact with a shorter stalk. Added storm resistance is another plus. GP 5479 is well adapted to irrigated and dryland production.

GP 1005

Early, semi-determinate with maturity comparable to GP 3774. It has a shorter stalk, larger bolls, and added storm resistance. Lint percentage turnouts have been excellent. This variety has shined the brightest when temperatures were high and rainfall was short.




It's just good household management to periodically take inventory of your valuable papers. It will help you locate the papers when they are needed, direct someone else to them in case of emergency and evaluate your financial affairs on a routine basis.

Prepare an inventory of valuable documents on paper or your home computer. Review it at least once a year and update it whenever important changes occur.

an inventory for an older relative, since you could be the person who needs to locate his or her important papers.

An inventory could include the following categories:

*A family record listing names, birthdates and where the birth is recorded for each family member.

*The name, address and telephone number of persons who would be notified in case of serious emergency.

*The name, address and telephone number of a person to whom you have given power of attorney.

*The names, addresses and telephone numbers of your family advisors. These may include an accountant, banker, broker, financial planner, insurance agent, doctor, clergy and attorney.

*The location of your valuable papers including wills and instructions, personal papers, property papers and real estate papers.

*A list of all financial accounts, including the name and address of the firm, the identification or account number and in whose name the account is carried. This may include accounts with banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions.

*A list of real estate and business interests you own, including mortgages. Basic information for each property would include the kind of

property, location, ownership situation, the date acquired and purchase price.

*A list of your stocks, bonds, securities, mutual funds, property insurance, life insurance and annuities; accident, disability and hospital insurance; and other personal property you own, such as household furnishings and automobiles.

*Information concerning social security, retirement, pension and profit sharing plans. Dates of employment and employers are frequently needed for filing applications and settling estates.

*A list of money owed, and owed to you, size of debt and terms of payment. Making an inventory of valuable papers is a major task. Once you set up a system, however, updating as changes occur is not as formidable.

A variety of forms and computer software programs for financial inventories are available from commercial outlets. Your county Extension home economics agent has detailed papers to get you started on a financial inventory. The following list is some of the information available at your county Extension office, phone 481-3619 or come by the office on the second floor of the courthouse in Farwell: B-1406, Keeping Household Records, B-1330, Setting Your Household in Order, and L-1375, Seniors Organize Valuable Family Papers.

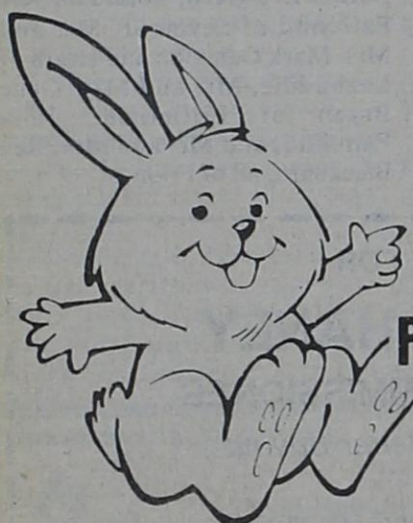
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
