Horrible Accident at Abilene.

News reached here Tuesday night of a horrible accident occurring at Lytle Lake, in which J. H. O'Connor, supervising architect of the asylum building, lost his life.

the garden was almost hidden by the mass of vegetation. Down a lane that crossed a deep valley the trees on each side nearly meet overhead, making an arch of foliage. Great vine, or lianos, with stems nearly an inch thick, large leaves and large cream colored flowers, climb up the trunks of the trees and from one tree to another. At each joint of the stem strong roots are fastened to the tree, so they can only be dislodged by strong force. Under the trees was a perfect jungle of undergrowth of vines, ferns and brambles, so thick that one could not go far without cutting a road. Back from the road in the deep shade we could see the Indian reed huts. The vegetation here is new to us and we gather specimens of rare plants until we can carry no more. In the short distance of about 200 vards we cross three good sized streams and ditches of running water.

After leaving this "deep tangled wildwood" our way leads through more gardens and orchards, with more fruit and flowers. Some of the trees leaned over the street, and boys were clubbing the fruit without any remonstrance from the owners. There seemed to be so much of it that it had no value. The people were courteous and kind, and when we would ask the name of some strange plant or tree would tell us and give us some plants and fruit. Pretty soon we had to hire a boy to carry them for us, and by the time we reached the hotel we had quite a collection. Nowhere have we seen such a variety and profusion of fruits, plants and flowers. TEXAS AND PACIFIC WRECK.

Four Cars Ditched, But Only **One Person Seriously** Injured as a Result.

Friday morning at 3:30 west bound passenger train No. 5 was wrecked three miles this side of Abilene, causing considerable damage to engine, baggage, and mail cars. Fireman Wheeling was injured internally and it was thought at first, fatally, but is improving so far. Baggage Man Nash and Mail Clerk Roberts were both consideraby shaken up and bruised, but not seriously. T. G. Moore, the cotton buyer, was also injured, sustaining a slight sprain of the back, but with the exception of a few scratches, other passengers and members of the train crew came came out whole.






