

Mustangs Are Second In Meet

The Bovina High School Mustangs had to settle for the runnerup trophy in the Farwell Invitational Tournament last weekend, losing to the host Steers in the tourney finals, 79-68.

The Mustangs scored wins over Muleshoe and Olton to reach the finals, but the Steers scored their second win of the season over the Mustangs to snare the top trophy in their own tournament.

Bovina scored a 93-73 win over the Muleshoe Mules in Thursday's opening round. Scott Sudderth scored eight points in the first quarter as Bovina took a 23-16 lead.

Scott Scaff got hot in the second quarter, hitting six field goals, one from three-point range. Sudderth kept it up with nine more points, including another three-point shot, and Bovina took a 53-34 lead to intermission.

Muleshoe played a good third quarter, and pulled back into the game, outscoring the Mustangs, 18-9.

But Scaff hit four field goals and was five of five from the line as the Mustangs pulled away for the win. Scaff had 28 points, Sudderth 22 and Manuel Porras 18 to pace the scoring.

On Friday, the Ponies scored a hard-fought win over Olton, 75-68. Olton matched Bovina in the first quarter, and held a 17-16 lead at the buzzer.

Scaff warmed up with four baskets and two from the line, as the Mustangs claimed a 42-37 halftime lead.

Olton came back to outscore the Mustangs 16-11 in the third quarter, to force a tie after three quarters, 53-41.

Scaff came up with a ten-point quarter, and Sudderth added six, as the Mustangs salted away their sixth win in a row. Scaff scored 26, Riddle 15, Porras 13 and Sudderth 12.

In Saturday's finals, Scaff had a ten-point first quarter, but the Steers held a 25-19 lead at the end of the period.

Scaff kept it up with a pair of baskets and four for four at the line, and Porras chipped in two from the field, as the Mustangs

pulled to within three points, 39-36, at the half.

The Mustangs got a balanced scoring attack from Scaff, Riddle, Porras and Corey Kirkpatrick in the third quarter, as the team took a 60-58 lead into the final eight minutes.

Suddenly Bovina couldn't get their shots to fall, as Farwell outscored them 21-8 in the final quarter for the win. Scaff scored 28, Riddle 12, Kirkpatrick and Porras ten each for the Mustangs.

Boys Win, Girls Lose At Friona

The Mustangs and Fillies split a pair of games at Friona last Tuesday night. The Fillies dropped a 53-14 game to the Squaws, but the Mustangs took a 91-68 win over the Chieftains.

The Mustangs trailed only briefly at 2-0 in their game. Denver Riddle, Scott Sudderth and Scott Scaff hit three quick layups, giving Bovina a 6-2 lead at the 6:00 mark in the opening quarter.

Riddle had a hot hand. His pair of jump shots gave Bovina a 10-4 lead with 3:50 left in the quarter.

Scaff and Sudderth each sank a pair of free throws early in the second quarter to stretch Bovina's lead to 23-14, and after Friona hit a three-pointer for a 23-17 score, Sudderth and Riddle rang the bell

with jump shots. Riddle's layup at the 4:14 mark gave the Mustangs a 31-19 lead.

Sudderth's three-point basket with 40 seconds left in the second quarter, gave the Mustangs their longest lead of the first half, 47-27.

Sudderth and Riddle picked up where they left off in the third quarter, forging a 53-32 lead, and after a brief Friona rally, Corey Kirkpatrick made a pair of free throws for a 65-43 lead with 2:30 left in the third.

The Chieftains again cut the margin to 15, but baskets by Sudderth (two) and Scaff reclaimed a 79-58 lead with 4:44 to play. The Mustangs outscored the Chiefs, 12-10 the rest of the way for the final margin.

Riddle led the way with 25 points, with Sudderth scoring 19 and Scaff 17.

In the girls' game, the Squaws jumped out to a 16-0 first quarter lead. Bovina was able to come close to Friona's score in the second quarter, 11-10, but the Squaws held a 26-4 edge in the second half.

Donna Griggs scored six points for the Fillies and four other players each had two.

Pheasants Available

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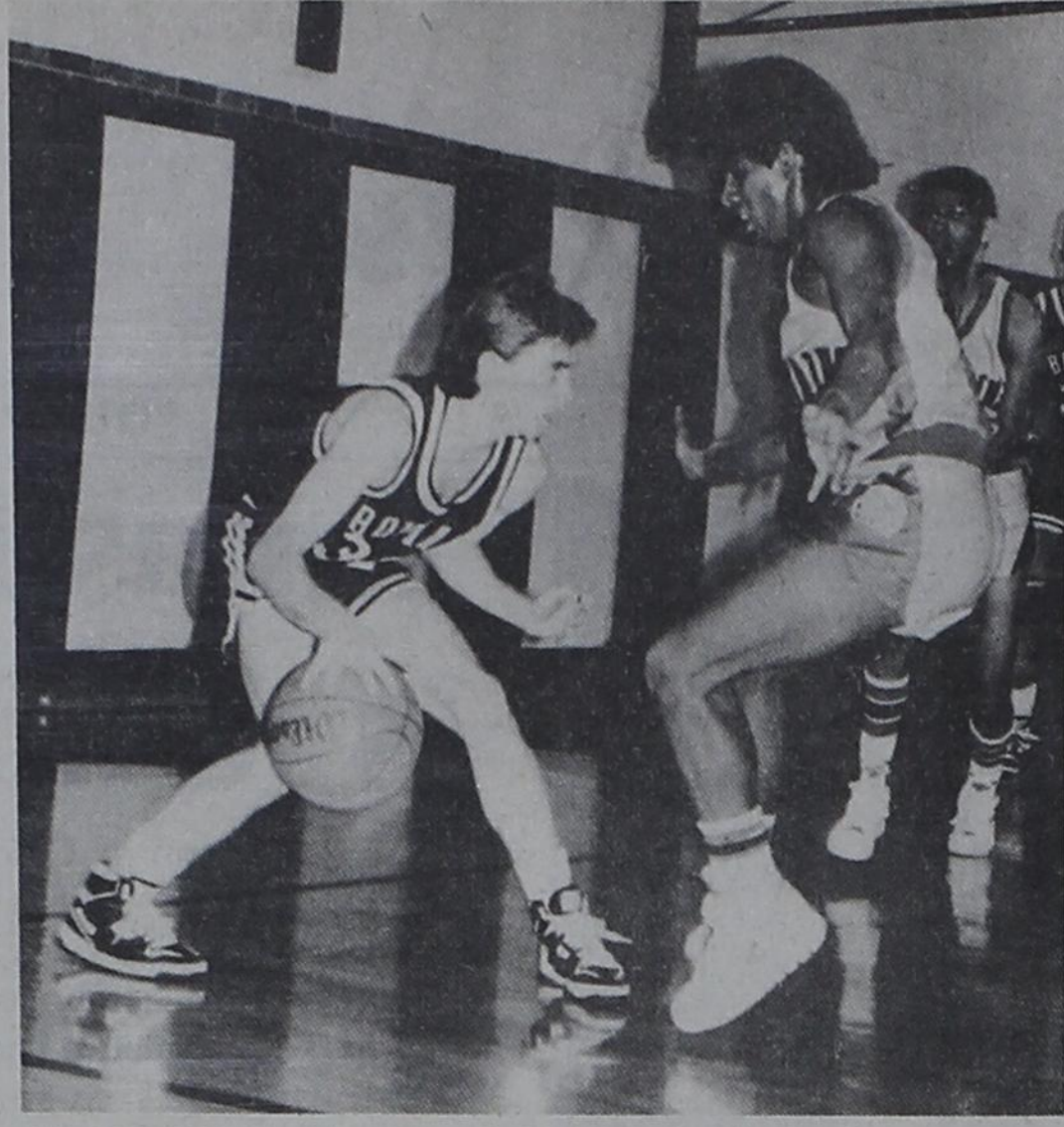

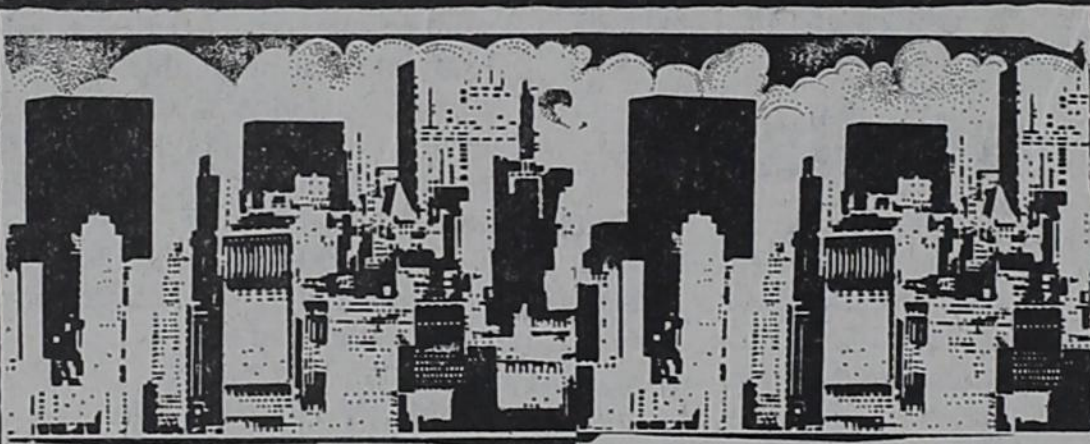

S. Pinkston Wins 'Teen Talk' Contest

Shaun Pinkston, a junior student in Bovina High School, is first place winner in the "Teen Talk" contest sponsored by the Panhandle Planned Parenthood organization.

The purpose of this contest is to get teens talking to teens about the risks, consequences and prevention of unplanned teen pregnancy.

The girl who is an unwed mother at age sixteen suddenly has ninety per cent of her life's script written for her. She will probably drop out of school, even if someone in her family helps to take care of the baby.

She will probably not be able to find a steady job that pays enough to provide for herself and her child; she may feel impelled to marry someone she might not otherwise have chosen. Her life choices are few, and most are negative. Had she been able to delay the first child, her prospects might have been quite different.

Although mothers bear children physically, fathers are equally responsible for the child. What are the consequences for the teenage father? Fathers who do accept responsibility, often are forced to interrupt or forego their education. If they marry, they face a higher probability of divorce. Whether married or not, the father still has a legal responsibility to support his child. The consequences of teenage pregnancy can be disastrous for the father's lifetime goals or

ambitions. Shaun is the son of Allen Pinkston of Bovina and his winning entry is as follows:

Scene 1: The focus is on a girl of about 15-17 years of age. In her arms she is holding a crying baby. The girl's face is expressionless. Her hair is pulled back and she has a dirty look about her. She is standing in front of a screen door staring off into the distance.

Scene 2: The girl has now flashed back to a time before she had her baby. She is sitting in a school cafeteria laughing with a group of her friends.

Scene 3: The focus is now on the girl again. A look of distress has come over her. The baby continues to cry.

Scene 4: In this flashback the girl remembers a teacher handing her a report card (a voice faint but coherent can be heard), "If you keep this up, you'll have a very bright future ahead of you."

Scene 5: Now the camera has again flashed back to the girl. Her face now has a distressed look about it. The baby is still crying.

Scene 6: In this flashback the girl is watching her friends graduate from high school. One of her friends is receiving her diploma. In the background a sign reads "Tomorrow's Future."

Scene 7: The camera is now back on the girl. A tear rolls down her face. The baby continues to cry in the background.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.
