SUMMER IS FINALLY bearing down upon us with full force. At this time of year, shade trees and air conditioners are favorites for ye editor.

Most of the folks out on Maple Street know that we are not bothered by weeds. Didn't say that we don't have any...just that we are not bothered by them.

Anyway, we heard a few days ago that some people in Illinois are actually cultivating dandelions and selling them to restaurants for salad greens. If there is a market for them, we think there's a good cash crop right here in Friona.

A recent issue of the U. of Calif. "Wellness Letter" contained the following "Summer Survival Quiz." We'll share it with you here and perhaps there will be some tips to help you through these hot summer months.

Take the quiz below and see if you can sort out the myths from the solid advice.

1. True or false: It is a mistake to eat or drink anything just before swimming. Wait at least an hour after eating to prevent cramps.

2. True or false: If stung by a bee, the first thing you should do is pull out the stinger.

3. True or false: If you burn your hand at the barbecue pit, the best remedy is cold water.

4. A thunderstorm is raging and you are in a house without a lightning rod. Which of the following should you stay away from? (a) the bathtub, (b) the window, (c) the telephone.

5. More than half of all boating accidents involve: (a) collisions, (b) small boats, (c) alcohol.

6. True or false: An adult should take a salt tablet after strenuous exercise in the heat.

Answers

1. False. Swimming after a heavy meal does not sound appealing, but no scientific study has ever shown that swimming after eating will bring on cramps. As for drinking, you should drink water before and after swimming. Like any other vigorous exercise in hot weather, swimming tends to dehydrate you.

2. False. First, cut the stinger away from the skin with a knife, then remove it. The stinger's exposed end carries a sac that may produce more venom when squeezed.

3. True. Don't treat it with butter, no matter what anyone tells you. Any oily or greasy substance may seal in bacteria, causing infection.

4. All of the above. Don't stand by an open window, don't bathe, and don't make phone calls until the storm blows over. Your body may attract lightning through a window, and plumbing could also serve as a conductor. Though telephone equipment is designed to prevent electric surges, a bad thunderstorm can send them down the line. Painful jolts are not unusual, and electrocution is not unknown.

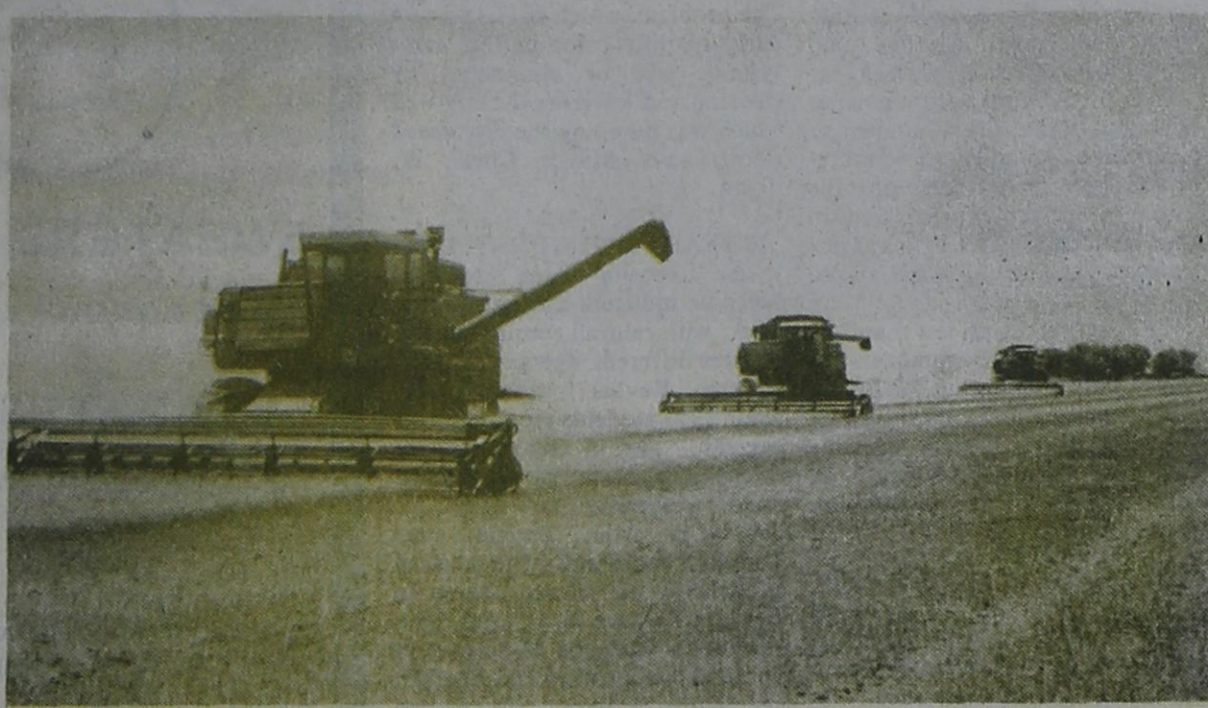
5. (b) and (c). Alcohol and boats can be a hazardous combination.

6. False. More water than salt is lost in sweating, with a resultant rise in salt concentration in the blood. A salt tablet may constitute an overdose. The replacement of fluid, not salt, is of key importance. Excessive sweating in the heat over very long periods may, however, deplete both fluid and salt and cause muscle cramps. In such cases, a little additional salt on food should be sufficient replacement.

Please do not dump grass in the alleys, as this creates a fire hazard, as well as a breeding place for mosquitoes.

Bills were paid and the council discussed two items of business.

It was decided that Richard Morris, engineer for Merriman and Barber Engineering Firm of Pampa, will be overseeing the specifications for the different contractors who will be paving city streets. He will be approving and checking to see that requirements are met for the amount of material used.

City Councilmen always welcome visitors to the meetings each month, but it has been decided that if you have a specific problem to discuss or an item that needs to be taken care of, please contact City Hall at least 72 hours prior to the meeting.

Councilmen and officers present at the June 10 meeting were Wayne Spears, city administrator; Mayor Dudley Hughes; and councilmen, T-Bone Treinen, John Dixon and Ruben Uriegas.

The next meeting will be held July 8.

Commissioners Seek New Vehicle Bids

Parmer County Commissioners, at their regular meeting June 9 voted to seek bids on a new vehicle for the sheriff's department.

Sheriff Morgan also reported that the inspector from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards visited the jail and the Parmer County Jail has been certified for the seventh consecutive year.

Judge Roberts asked permission to attend a Probate Judge's workshop in Amarillo on June 11-12-13. Motion was approved to send Judge Roberts to this workshop.

A bill was approved from the Panhandle Community Services for handling of commodities given by the county in April. The bill amount was \$145.00.

The court also approved payment of boarding care bills on foster children in the county, amounting to \$3,689. This amount will be reimbursed the county from the state.

Approval of a bill for testing a foster child at a speech and hearing center was granted. The amount of this bill was \$98.00.

The court approved soil work

requests in precinct one and four, six requests in all. The work will be performed when the machines are not otherwise in demand for work on the roads, and cost of the work is paid by those receiving it.

After a discussion of items of interest in the county, and there being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Harvest Underway Locally

Wheat and barley harvest is well underway in the Bovina area, according to Harry Johnson of Sherley Grain. This year's crops have been way below average. Last year's crops were probably the best in several years, according to Johnson.

Wayne Palla delivered the first load of 1986 wheat to Sherley Grain, Saturday, June 7. Palla had a yield of 33 bushels an acre on his dry land farm.

Test weight on the wheat was 14.70.

Kenneth Johnson delivered the first load of barley on June 12, to Sherley Grain in Bovina. His dry land yield was 28 bushels to the acre and it tested 11.70 moisture.

Harvest is about half over in the Bovina, Rhea and Pleasant Hill areas.

This year has been unusually dry for wheat farmers and hurt the yields considerably.

Johnson and Palla received \$50 bonuses for delivering the first loads of wheat and barley to Sherley Grain Elevator.

FmHA Sets Committee Election

Election of two Farmers Home Administration county committee members will take place on Monday, June 30, County Supervisor Weldon C. Rainey announced this week.

"This is a historic occasion, Mr. Rainey said. It is the first time that FmHA county committee members have been elected. Until now, they have been designated by the agency. The 1985 Farm Bill calls for two elected and one designated member on the committee."

The FmHA county committee assists the county office in determining the eligibility of applicants for certain types of FmHA loans.

Farmers who live in Parmer County, have their principal farming operation within the county or area for which the election is being held, and derive the principal of their income from farming are eligible to vote.

Nominees for the Parmer County FmHA county committee are Preston E. Cargile, Henry T. Fangman and Alfred Hicks.

"This time, we will elect two committee members," Mr. Rainey said. "One will serve for one year and the other will serve two years. In the future, all three members will serve three-year terms on a staggered basis, with one position to be filled each year."

Voting ballots are available from the FmHA county office at 207 Avenue D in Farwell. Marked ballots must be received at the FmHA office by June 30, 1986.

"Cub Cakes" will be sold at Bovina Supermarket on Saturday, June 21 from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m.

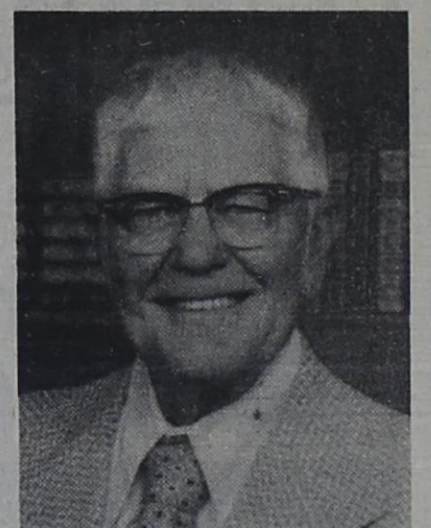
The "Cub Cakes" will be sold by the Bovina Cub Scouts for twenty-five cents each and proceeds will go to help with their funds.

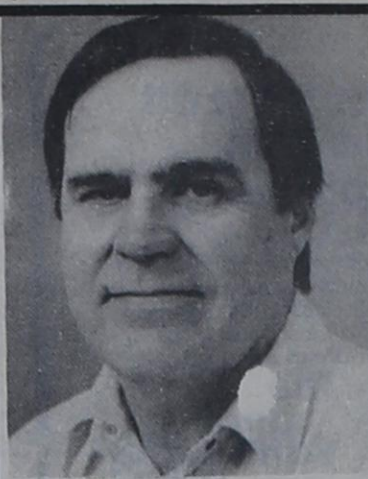
