terwards, I felt great relief and peace. I have also been able to express my grief in writing because when I write I can say what I really feel and experience. This past
summer, after I had visited our famsummer, after I had visited our fam-
ily farm one day in June, I was able ily farm one day in June, I was able
to sit and write a "Tribute to Dad" which helped me to say some things about him and to him that I wanted him to know. It was a very
therapuetic time for me to reflect therapuetic time for me to reflect
upon my childhood and adolescent years in light of my relationship with him. And then, this past December, right after Christmas, I visited Dad's grave again. Mother had been wanting me to go by and see
the new marker that had recently the new marker that had recently
been placed there. Although it was a cold day, and Velma stayed in the van, I took time to quickly say a prayer for all my family, asking God's blessings on them for the
coming year. That prayer also had coming year. That prayer also had
a very healing affect on me, sort of a very healing affect on me, sort of hurt and pain of loss. I now feel that I can let go of some of the sorrow and embrace more fully the joy of my Dad's life and love.

more fully the grieving process, and the importance of helping others to find ways to grieve that are appropriate and bring healing. For one
