**CONGRATULATIONS ARE** in order to the Texas Tech Lady Raiders, who have won their first-ever Southwest Conference basketball championship. The Lady Raiders won the regular-season title, then capped that off by winning the SWC post-season tournament last weekend.

The University of Texas had won the women's SWC championship the first eight years that competition was held. The University of Arkansas, in its last year of membership, won the title in 1991, and Texas Tech took it this year.

In some respects, particularly now that Arkansas has "defected" from the SWC, winning the conference title is much akin to a high school team that wins state. In that regard, it is surprising that Texas Tech, located in the hotbed of girls basketball in the state, had not won the title earlier. We predict that this will not be the Techs' last hurrah, either.

Scanning the roster of the 1991-92 Lady Raiders' team gives you a hint of how the South Plains aggregation built their championship team, and brings back memories of how the Raider men used to field equally as competitive teams.

Starting at the coaching position: Marsha Sharp, in her tenth year as head coach of the Texas Tech women's team, is a native of Tulia. She is a former star for the Lady Hornets, and you're probably aware that Tulia, home of the 1991 class 3A state champions, has for generations gone in for top-notch girls' basketball.

The star of the 1991-92 Lady Raiders has been Sheryl Swoopes, a six-foot guard from Brownfield. Friona basketball fans should remember Sheryl as the main cog in the Brownfield team that downed their Squaws in the area round in 1987, after they had won bi-district.

Miss Swoopes led the Lady Raiders in scoring with 21.3 points per game, in rebounds with 8.8 per game, and had 130 assists. Sheryl started out at the University of Texas, but after three days was lost and homesick on the giant UT campus, and came back home to the South Plains. Texas Tech is very happy about that home-sickness.

When Friona faced off against Miss Swoopes at Brownfield, the Squaws were led by the likes of Ronda Ratcliff and Lacey Osborn. Miss Ratcliff went on to a scholarship and a career at Southwest Texas University.

That was also the year that Bovina's starters included Mindy Neal and Marie Pesch, both of whom gained scholarships to Southwest Conference teams. There was some pretty salty talent in girls basketball in Friona-Bovina for those years.

Back to the Tech roster: Starter Krista Kirkland hails from Spearman, another hotbed of outstanding girls basketball. Miss Kirkland scored 64 three-point baskets for the Lady Raiders.

Noel Johnson, a freshman, is Tech's number one backup point-guard. She is from Nazareth. You've heard of Nazareth, probably? They won something like seven or eight straight state titles. If they don't make it to Austin they feel like they've had a bad year.

Junior Tami Wilson, the team's second-leading scorer at 11.7 and 7.2 rebounds, is from Seagraves. Kim Pruitt, a sophomore forward reserve, is from Idalou. Junior guard Diana Kersey, who saw some starting duty as a freshman, is from Lubbock, as is freshman guard Patrice Conwright and sophomore reserve forward Janice Farris. Nikki Heath is from Sweetwater.

Getting the picture? This year's aggregation of Lady Raiders are basically a home-grown outfit, hailing mainly from the Panhandle-South Plains.

The main starter not from this area is senior center Jennifer Buck, who is from Conroe. Miss Buck averaged 11.4 points, and had a tremendous basket in Tech's 76-74 win over UT last Saturday in the SWC tournament finals.

The election will be held on May 2.

## School's Operating Expenses Are Charted

In 1990-91 school trustees budgeted 30 percent more for operating high schools than for elementary sites. Statewide an average of \$3,280 per student was budgeted for high schools, \$2,645 for the 1,073 middle schools, and \$2,543 per child for the 3,594 elementary schools in Texas. In addition, \$1,014 per student was budgeted for the central office.

For the Bovina ISD the figures were \$3552 for high schools, and \$2432 for the elementary campuses while \$1291 per student was budgeted for the central office.

The figures come from a new report *Tidemarks 1990-91 School Campus Budgets in Texas*, a publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

The report also lists the amounts for direct classroom instruction. The statewide averages were \$2,366 per student for high schools, \$1,965 for middle schools, and \$2,030 for elementary campuses. For the Bovina ISD the comparable figures were \$2973 for high schools, and \$2250 for elementary grades.

The report is designed to pro-

vide reference points for site-based committees and the taxpaying public to evaluate future school budgets by types of campuses and for individual high school sites.

Excluding small single-campus schools, there are 1,059 high schools in Texas ranging in size from 83 schools with less than 100 students to seven campuses with more than 3,000 students. For these high schools, \$2,328 was budgeted per student for classroom instruction, or 72.3 percent of the \$3,221 per student for total operating expenses. Locally, Bovina High School had \$279 per student for school administration.

The legislature provided in HB 2885 for site-based decisions relating to goal setting, curriculum, budgeting, staffing patterns, and school organization. Proponents contend that school boards and superintendents should grant greater latitude to campus level educators in exchange for an initial promise of more productive educational services for the students.

While there is little evidence to indicate that by itself school-based management will improve student achievement, as a management tool in the right hands, the report concludes that it may be helpful.

The Mustang track and field team scored 56 points at the Plains Invitational Meet last Saturday, placing fifth overall.

Cain Neal placed first in the shot put at 46-10-1/4. He also placed third in the discus with a toss of 121-11.

Corey Kirkpatrick placed first in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 40.95.

The 1600-meter relay team placed third with a time of 3:38.93. This foursome was made up of Jerry Reyna, Hector Guevara, Kory Mitchell and Kirkpatrick.

The 400-meter relay team placed fourth in 45.9. This group was composed of Mitchell, Reyna, Isabel Marrufo and Kirkpatrick.

The 3200-meter relay team placed fourth with a time of 9:41.16. They were Lionel Salazar, Simon Salazar, Melicio Marrufo and Andy Espinoza.

"We did extremely well as a team, and improved on our times for the most part," said Mustang coach Bobby Ventura.

## Mustangs' Baseball --First Since 1978

Bovina High School is fielding a baseball team for the first time in 14 years this spring, and Coach Rock Stanley has accepted the challenge of getting a Mustang team together that will be competitive.

Although a number of Panhandle-area schools have added baseball in the last couple of years, few in class A have done so, and therein lies a part of the problem.

Bovina will compete in a district that stretches from the Mustangs' home in the Western Panhandle, to Hedley, Paducah and Samnorwood on the Eastern edge of the Panhandle, to Wilson, which is south of Lubbock.

"Most of the kids haven't played baseball in the last four to six years. The question is: can we re-learn, or re-teach the kids well enough that we'll be a good team in terms of skills?" Stanley said.

Realistically, the Mustang coach admits, it could take a couple of years for the players to re-learn the game, since it has been so long since they played the game.

As far as their district goes, most of the teams are in the same shape as Bovina--resuming a program or starting from scratch. Stanley, knowing that Paducah has a great group of athletes, figures they will be the toughest team in that group, but that Bovina should be fairly even with everyone else.

Travel-wise, the district schedule will remind fans of the two years Bovina competed in six-man football. Their closest district opponent is Wilson, located south of Lubbock, about 120 miles away. Hedley is about 150 miles away, Paducah and Samnorwood about 170 miles each.

## Capital Credits Returned

Capital credit checks totaling \$91,184.94 are being mailed this month (March) to West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative members who received service during 1969.

The total amount to be refunded to customers represents 100 percent of the capital credits allocated for 1969.

Patronage Capital Credit checks represent profits returned to WTRT members. They are based upon the amount of money paid by members for their local phone service, including equipment, access lines and long distance calls.

Members are paid back a percentage of their annual billing totals in the form of Patronage Capital Credits.

The \$10 fee which individuals pay upon application for telephone service from the cooperative entitles WTRT customers to a membership. Members then become part-owners of the cooperative. According to cooperative bylaws, profits earned by WTRT are to be returned to its members.

These returned profits are known as Patronage Capital Credits. Members receive a payback of a percentage of annual billing totals in the form of the Patronage Capital Credits.

## City Gets Candidates

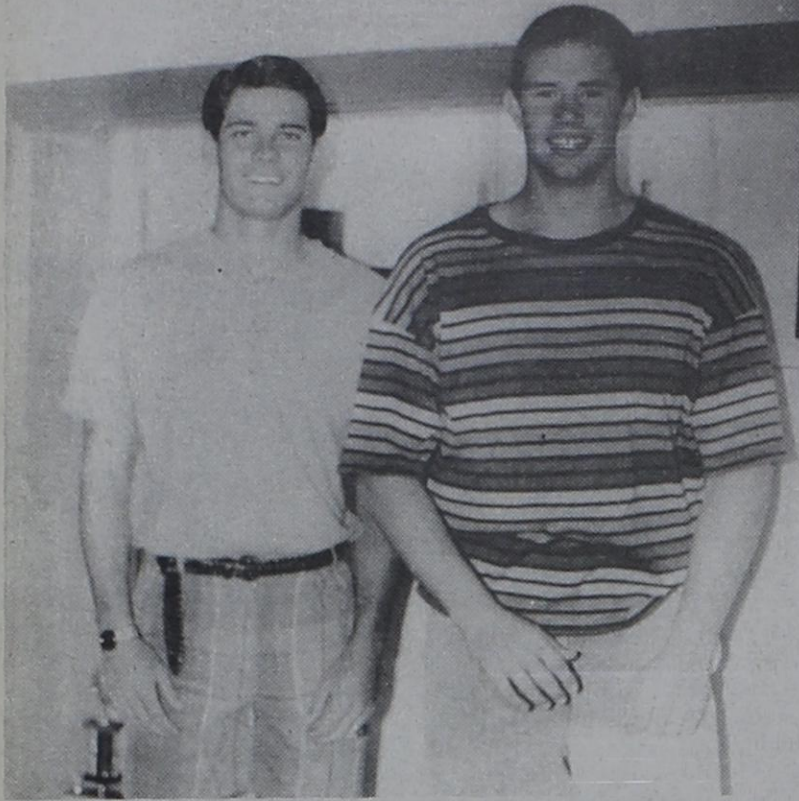
Seven candidates had filed for three positions on the City Council, as of the filing deadline Wednesday.

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# Soil Moisture Survey Indicates Good Conditions

Soil moisture conditions are better than they have been in many years for Parmer County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

No pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity for the 1992 growing season.

"The top three feet of the five-foot soil profile are near field capacity, with small soil moisture deficits occurring at the four and five foot levels. This is the opposite of recent years where the deficits were in the top three feet of the soil," said Wilfred E. "Willie"

Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

Two to four inches of water will be needed to wet the top five feet of soil to field capacity over most of Parmer County, according to data collected during the annual joint pre-plant soil moisture survey conducted by the High Plains Water District and the United States Department of Agriculture-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS). The cities of Farwell, Bovina and Friona are included in this area.

An area requiring zero to two inches of soil moisture is found in southeastern Parmer County. This

band begins near the intersection of FM 1172 and 86, then continues southeast along Running Water Draw to the Parmer/Castro County line.

Two areas requiring four to six inches of moisture are found in Parmer County. One area begins at the Parmer/Deaf Smith County line and heads south along FM 1412 to a point just north of Friona. The other area starts at the Parmer/Bailey County line and extends northeast through the Lariat Community, just south of the Oklahoma Lane Community and ends west of Clay's Corner.

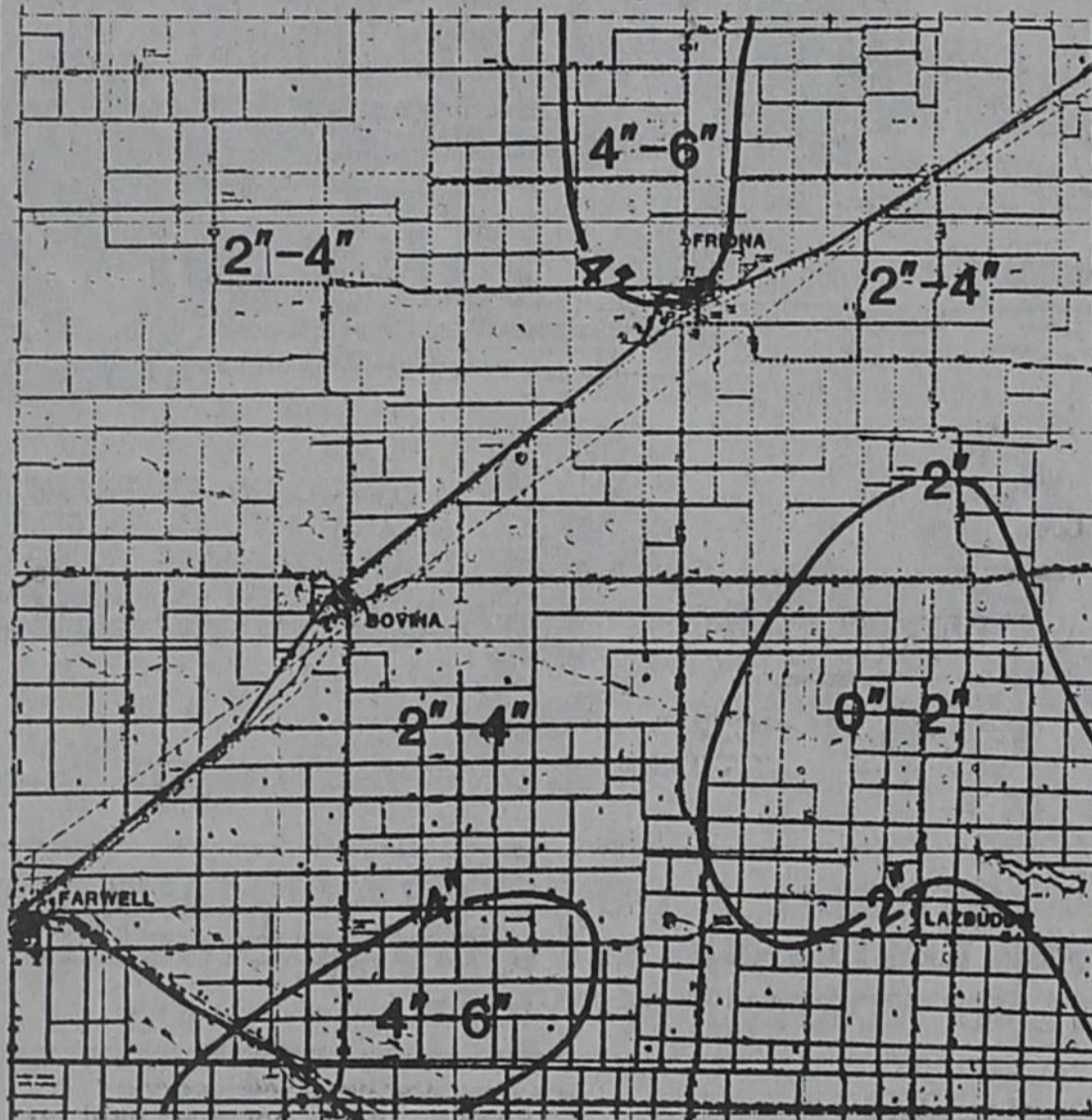
Crenwelge suggests that producers let normal rainfall replenish the deeper soil moisture, since the probability is good that enough precipitation will fall between now and the growing season to fill the deficits.

Soil moisture conditions were surveyed from November 13, 1991, through January 23, 1992, at 270 soil moisture monitoring sites within the 15-county District service area.

However, some sites received additional precipitation after the measurements had been made. In order to provide the most accurate soil moisture information possible to District residents, personnel re-read rain gauges from those soil moisture sites measured from November 14, 1991, through December 16, 1991. They found that additional rainfall had been received at these sites. A second set of soil moisture readings were made at selected sites, and the data was adjusted to reflect these findings.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube. Soil density data and rain gauge readings are also recorded during the survey.

# Looking Up!

My heart really goes out to today's youth! As both a parent (who has two teenage sons and a nine-year-old daughter) and a minister who loves young people, I have a great desire to see our youth succeed in life and excel with their God given abilities.

But it seems that our youth face greater pressures and struggle against more problems than ever before. Here are some examples:

**Substance Abuse:**  
--89% of the senior class of 1990 reported that they had used alcohol at least once.

--Approximately 25% of eighth graders and 35% of tenth graders report a "binge" of five or more drinks in a row within the past two weeks.

--30% of Texas high school juniors and seniors report using marijuana regularly.

--40% of tenth graders had ridden with a driver who had used drugs or alcohol.

**Suicide:**  
--60% of the teenagers know of a peer who attempted suicide.

--15% of teenagers actually know personally a youth who had taken his/her life.

--Adolescent suicide is now the third leading cause of death among 15-24 year olds.

**Sexuality:**  
Teenagers who say "they had sex":

--40% of ninth graders

--48% of tenth graders

--57% of eleventh graders

--72% of twelfth graders

Every day in the USA:

--1,140 teenagers have an abortion.

--1,336 teenagers give birth.

--29 babies are born to teens under 15.

Yes, our youth do face difficult times! I believe these social and moral problems stem from three basic things: a shortage of good role models, a lack of true meaning in life, and the absence of an absolute value system.

First, there is a shortage of good, wholesome role models for kids to emulate. Many youth are patterning their life after the skewed characters they have seen on television or in the movies. Others look

to materialistic and immoral sports heroes or less than responsible rock stars.

In the meantime, mom and dad are more inaccessible than ever before due to two-career families, divorced and/or dysfunctional parents, single-parent homes, etc. What are youth to do? Kids are looking for worthy role models.

The second factor, I believe, that causes confusion for youth is a lack of true meaning in life. It appears that many of the young people today have no understanding of past history and no worthy ambitions or aspirations for the future. They just live for the moment.

This lack of motivation and direction derives from the fact that they see no hope. They have been raised on and bombarded with the negative, cynical messages of materialism and hedonism. Too many youth have never been challenged to make this world a better place. Some have such low self-esteem that they see no reason to do better.

Finally, multitudes of youth have been taught a situational value system that is bankrupt of any moral absolutes or lasting standards. The Judeo-Christian ethic has been "pooh-poohed" (it's in the dictionary) and replaced to a great extent in our government and educational systems by relativistic humanism. Kids are confused because they no longer know what is right or wrong.

Well, I have painted a rather dark picture of our youth with some very broad brush strokes! But, I am not really down on our youth. I do not mean to insinuate that all our young people are mixed-up and irresponsible. In fact, I know some really good teenagers right here in Bovina, Texas, and I'm sure you do, too!

But I write all of the above to suggest to my fellow adults that we must be good role models of integrity and morality for our children, worthy of their respect and admiration. We need to let our kids know that life is worthwhile. They need the assurance that both we and God love them. And we must teach youth the religious and moral values that produce stability and true success. Yes, our youth need us! So, keep looking up!
