PAY YOUR TAXES **OR FINES AT ONCE**

Mayor Stallings wishes to be understood in his position a little more clearly by some lenient tax payers and others who owe the city.

During the past there has been some property in Merkel on which the taxes have not been paid for some time and the owners of said property are hereby notified that if ihese back taxes are not paid before Februarv 1st that they will be placed in the hands of an attorney for collection and suit instituted at once.

There are some other offenders of our city laws who are also coming in with their dues to the city. These are people who have been fined for some reason or other and who have been allowed the fines to remain unpaid. Mayor Stallings gives these people the same length of time as are allowed to delinquent tax payers. If these past due fines are not paid by February 1st, and the city is holding one against you, you had better pay it and save them the trouble of collecting same. This is a matter of law and our Mayor is a man who is going to enforce it to the best of his ability. 
GENERAL AVERAGE OF ALL CONTESTANTS



Reports have b. n current for son time concerning the safety of the Leaving Tower of Pisa, and the Italian papers announce a similar state of things with the Garlsenda of Bologna and the Ghirlandina of Modena. The former dates from 1110, and the latter from 1224 to 1319. The Tower of Pisa, which is about 177 feet in height, is 14 feet 6 inches beyond the perpendicular. It is accentuated from the base, but diminishes half way up and onward. The inclination is said to be greater today than it was in 1817. This has been marked in later years. But there are other disquieting signs. Some of the stonework of the windows is giving wsy, and the steps are said be cracking. The soll upon which Pisa's Tower was ammed you have a rumbling sound or raised, a Paris contemporary points out, is "permeable and friable," and subsoil water is believed to be penetrating beyond the masonry. Architects and other experts are now engaged in a close observation. They fear that below the foundations there are some considerable voids, and they are of opinion that the inclination of the tower has increased since 1859. The commission appointed to deal with the matter concludes that there is no immediate danger, yet there must be no delay in remedying matters. The Garisenda is about 161 feet feet in height, with an inclination of just 14 feet. The Ghirlandina is said to be the highest of the towers, be ing 331 feet. It is slightly inclined toward the Cathedral, which itself is in a feeble state.
