New business coming before the body. M. D. Angus was allowed to instal an underground gasoline tank at some point on Front St. Said tank to be removed when city deemed it advisable. The Mayor was instructed to ask the Texas \& Pacifio Ry. Co., to compensate Nightwatchman King for services ore rendered in the future in keeping order sbout the depot and looking after, other matters r the railway company.
The late graveling work about he town was brought to diseuseion and the Marshall was instructed to continue the work and in addition to the general street and sidewalk work Mayor Stallinge appointed Alderman Hamilton to personally look after eonstruction of graveled walks in the neighborhood of the south ward sohool building. He was further instructed to have the work done as early as possible for the convenience of the school children in muddy weathr.

The matter of the Marshall using extreme care in the street work that is now being done was discussed for some time but at lengtb was dispesed of without action further than it be continued under supervision of the street committee.
J. H. Witoher was re-appointed as city soavenger for the town at the salary of $\$ 50.00$ per month so long as his servioes contidued to prove satisfactory. The only new appointment made was that of W. A. Armetrong as city pound keeper, with $\$ 1$ allowed on each animal taken up. The city ordinance regulating the care of the city pound says that a fee of $\$ 1$ shall be oharged but that the keeper shall receive fifty oente and the oity fifty cents of the ine.
