

Men of healthy minds and healthy bodies it is true sometimes commit crime. They are not criminals at heart. The best balanced man in the white heat of passion may kill. It is never, or very rarely, a premeditated murder that is committed. It is the result of a temporarily deranged mind the result of some great mental shock.

The doctor does not intend to imply that all prisoners and all criminals are degenerates, weak mentally and physically. His diagnosis applies to the veterans in vice, the habitual offender. The work of treating such subjects must begin naturally with the removal of the disease with which they suffer. Get at the correct source of the evil. More imprisonment does not relieve the cause of crime. The sensible doctor in treating a patient makes his diagnosis, finds the direct cause of the trouble and proceeds to start at the foundation of the sickness.

Dr. Bowers is undoubtedly right. If disease is the responsible cause of habitual criminality the cause should be treated and removed. After the physical defects have been corrected the patients should be put through a course of mental training to wean him from old habits. They

must be held in a correct environment until their character is reformed.



SAN ANGELO GETS

National Guard Recruiting Headquarters Moved From Sweetwater This Week

OFFICERS MONDAY

Colonel Hoover, in Charge of Recruiting for Several States, and Captain Cash Were Here on Business

Abilene, Aug. 28.-Lieut.-Col. John S. Hoover, in charge of National Guard recruiting work in the states of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona, and Captain W. Auda Vee Cash, recruiting office in charge of this district were in Abilene Monday on official busi-

Col. Hoover announced the removal of district headquarters from Sweetwater to San Angelo, and although he would not comment on the matter it is understood that Tweetwater was an unsatisfactory location as the center of the district, and recruiting has been very slow.

Captain Cash will be located henceforth at San Angelo, and will place men at Abilene and Stamford this week. The fact that San Angelo had a more direct rail communication with Fort Sam Huston was the principal reason the headquarters was moved there instead of to Abi-

Col. Hoover has complete control of recruiting in the states above named, and is one of the highest ranking officers in the National Guard. Seen by a reporter at Hotel Grace, Monday noon, he explained the workings of his department and took oceasion to compliment the Texas guards. His home is at Houston and he is ordinarlly assigned to the Third Texas Infantry but was chosen to handle the recruiting work on account of his peculiar fitness for the place.

"We've got to have men," was the emphatic statement of Colonel Hoover, "The Texas guard has 5,500 men now on duty, and we need 1,400 more to bring it up to full war strength. This district will have stations at Abilene, Sweeewater, San Angelo, Brownwood, Stamford and Ballinger. Anyone who wishes to enlist will have his trans portation paid to San Angelo, where his application will be passed upon. If he is accepted he will be sent to the rendevouz at Fort Sam Houston. In the event he is rejected, his fare will be paid back to his home station, and his board and lodging will also be paid or the time be loses. Thus it will be seen that the prospective recruit loses nothing. Anyone who desires to enlist can notify Captain Cash at San Angelo, and transportation will be sent him at once."

Kaptain Hoover stated that the sick rate in the Texas Guard for July was only 1.14 percent. which is considered remarkable. The subsistence department of the Guard is perfect, he said, and only the chronic kickers object to the fare. He has been designated the officer in charge of mustering out men under the dependent families and student acts. and declared that only 14 men out of 5,500 in the Texas Guard had asked to be relieved from duty. There has not been a death from natural causes in the Texas Guard since it was sent to



SAN ANGELO GETS

National Guard Recruiting Headquarters Moved From Sweetwater This Week

OFFICERS

Colonel Hoover, in Charge of Recruiting for Several States, and Captain Cash Were Here on Business

Abilene, Aug. 28.-Lieut.-Col. John S. Hoover, in charge of National Guard recruiting work in the states of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona, and Captain W. Auda Vee Cash, recruiting office in charge of this district were in Abilene Monday on official busi-

Col. Hoover announced the removal of district headquarters from Sweetwater to San Angelo, and although he would not comment on the matter it is understood that Tweetwater was an unsatisfactory location as the center of the district, and recruiting has been very slow.

Captain Cash will be located henceforth at San Angelo, and will place men at Abilene and Stamford this week. The fact that San Angelo had a more direct rail communication with Fort Sam Huston was the principal reason the headquarters was moved there instead of to Abi-

Col. Hoover has complete control of recruiting in the states above named, and is one of the highest ranking officers in the National Guard. Seen by a reporter at Hotel Grace, Monday noon, he explained the workings of his department and took oceasion to compliment the Texas guards. His home is at Houston and he is ordinarlly assigned to the Third Texas Infantry but was chosen to handle the recruiting work on account of his peculiar fitness for the place.

"We've got to have men,"

was the emphatic statement of Colonel Hoover, "The Texas guard has 5,500 men now on duty, and we need 1,400 more to bring it up to full war strength. This district will have stations at Abilene, Sweeewater, San Angelo, Brownwood, Stamford and Ballinger. Anyone who wishes to enlist will have his trans portation paid to San Angelo, where his application will be passed upon. If he is accepted he will be sent to the rendevouz at Fort Sam Houston. In the event he is rejected, his fare will be paid back to his home station, and his board and lodging will also be paid for the time he loses. Thus it will be seen that the prospective recruit loses nothing. Anyone who desires to enlist can notify Captain Cash at San Angelo, and transportation will be sent him at once."

Kaptain Hoover stated that the sick rate in the Texas Guard for July was only 1.14 percent, which is considered remarkable. The subsistence department of the Guard is perfect, he said, and only the chronic kickers object to the fare. He has been designated the officer in charge of mustering out men under the dependent families and student acts. and declared that only 14 men out of 5,500 in the Texas Guard had asked to be relieved from the border.

Col. Hoover explained that under the new law guardsmen must serve six years, three with the · colors and three in reserve. They get one-fourth pay while in


