Accident On Third Monday

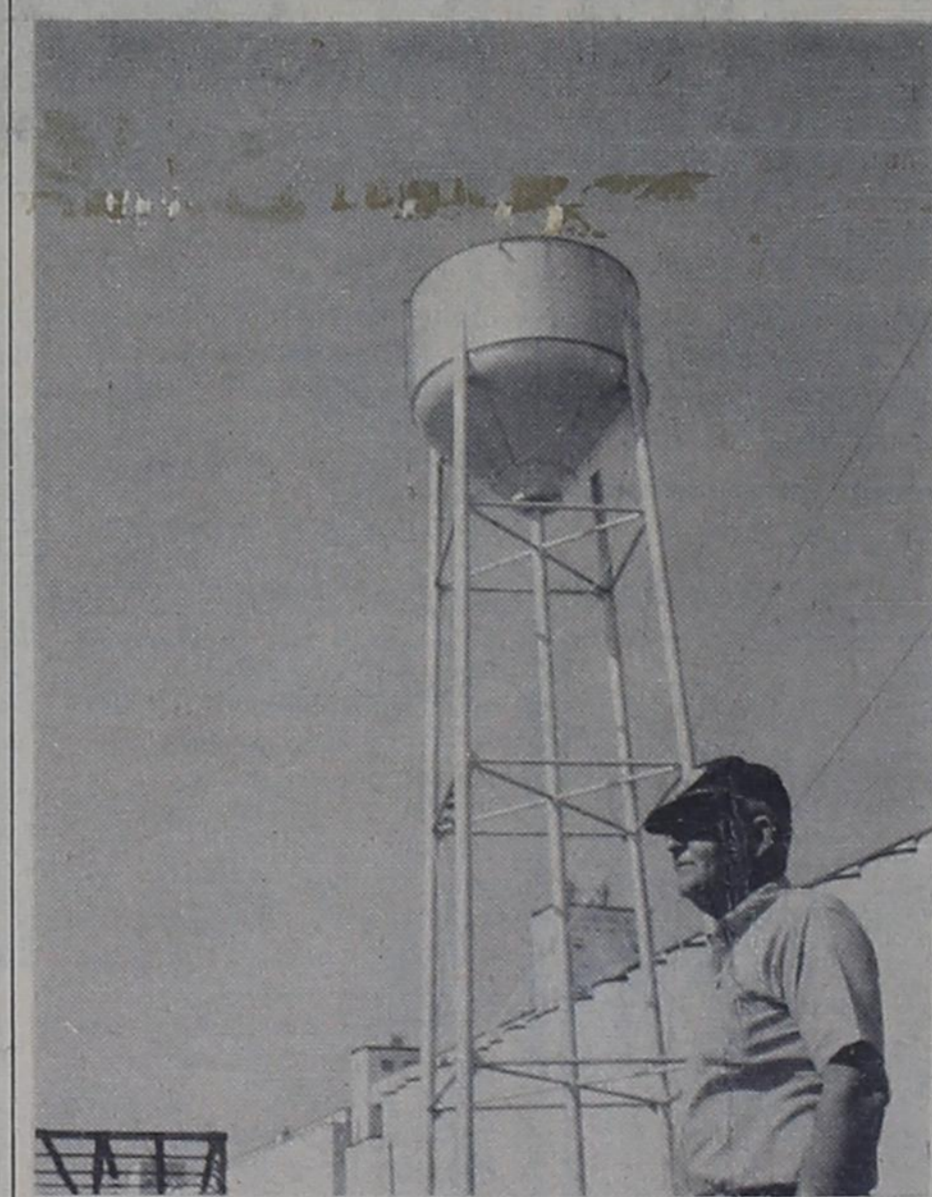

Quarterback Club Meet Set Tuesday

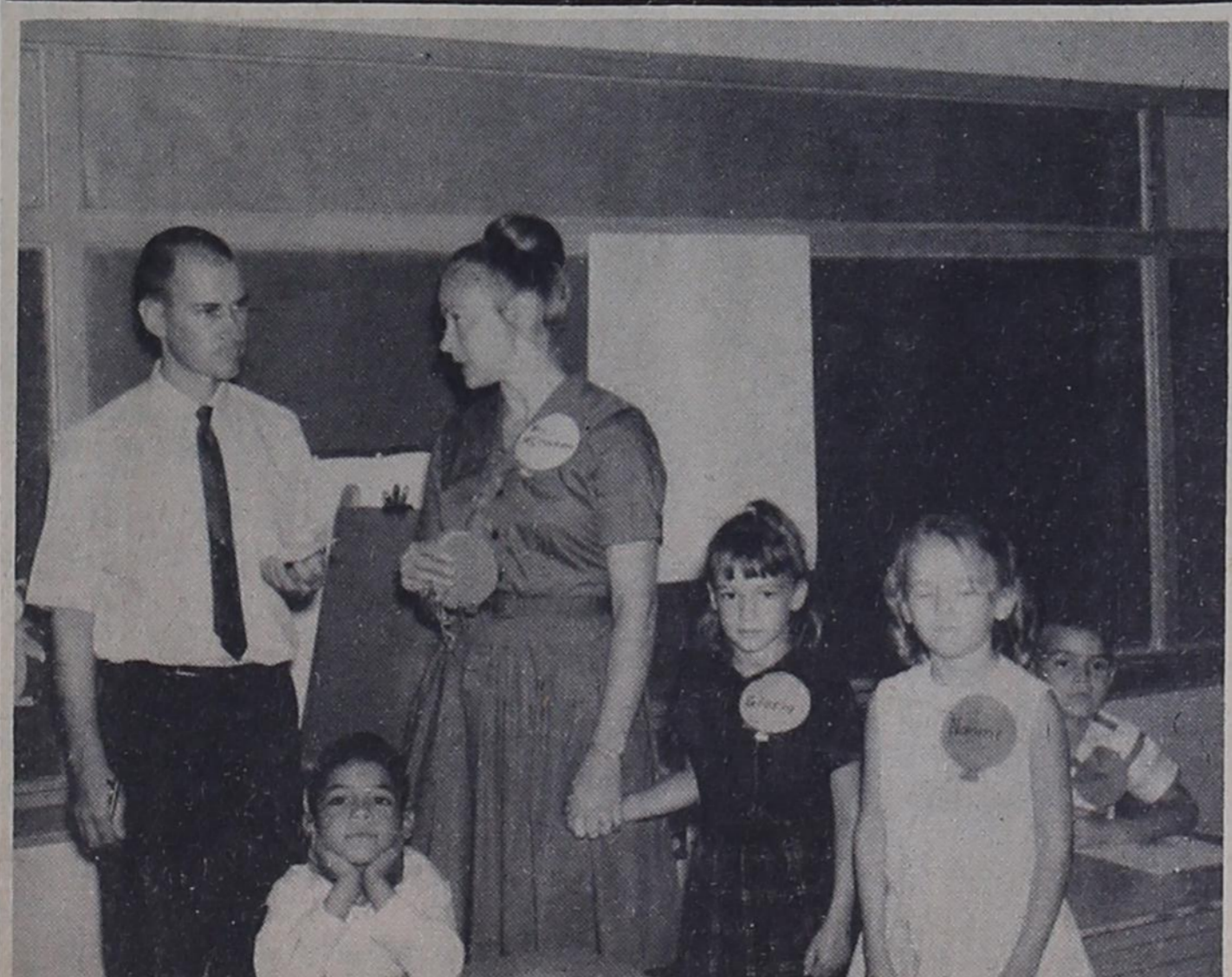
First meeting of the 1966 school year for Bovina Mustang Quarterback Club has been called.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

ADDING FLOATATION—Building a small boat for use on stock tanks? If so, glue styrofoam strips under the seats to make the boat unsinkable.

CORK FLOAT SOLVES PROBLEM—When that extra-live minnow on your hook keeps on diving deep into vegetation where fish can't find it, try this. Attach a small cork just above the shank of the hook. Cork should be small enough that the fish can carry it down. But it should be large enough to prevent the minnow from getting too deep.

EYEGLASS INSURANCE—If you wear eyeglasses while you ski, attach a fishing bobber to each arm of the glasses. Then if they fall off they'll float and can easily be recovered.

TRANSPORTING LIVE BAIT—Those cardboard or plastic milk cartons, especially the larger sizes, make handy one-trip bait carriers for minnows, worms, etc.

LOCATING LEAKS—Fishing boots leaking lately? To locate the trouble spot, fill your bathtub about half full of water and put the leaky boot in with the top out. Then insert a vacuum cleaner hose in the boot and start the blower. A stream of bubbles will mark the hole, tiny though it may be.

DRYING MATCHES—Wet matches can be dried by turning them over and over in your hair. It seems that the combination of oil and static electricity often recharges flapping igniter chemicals. Of course you could end up with phosphorus in your hair.

HOOK SHARPENING—A quick way to sharpen small fishing hooks is to run them through a piece of fine sandpaper several times.

SANDING THE GUN STOCK—Getting a velvet finish on a gun stock depends primarily on the sanding. And it's the last 10 per cent of the sanding that really counts. Trick is to wet the wood and sand it with the finest sandpaper you can buy. Another trick is to use extremely fine wet sandpaper.

POT BOILETH OVER?—There is a tendency for the coffee pot to boil over while you're cooking over a campfire. Eliminate this by putting a small green stick on top of the pot. Keeps everything inside.

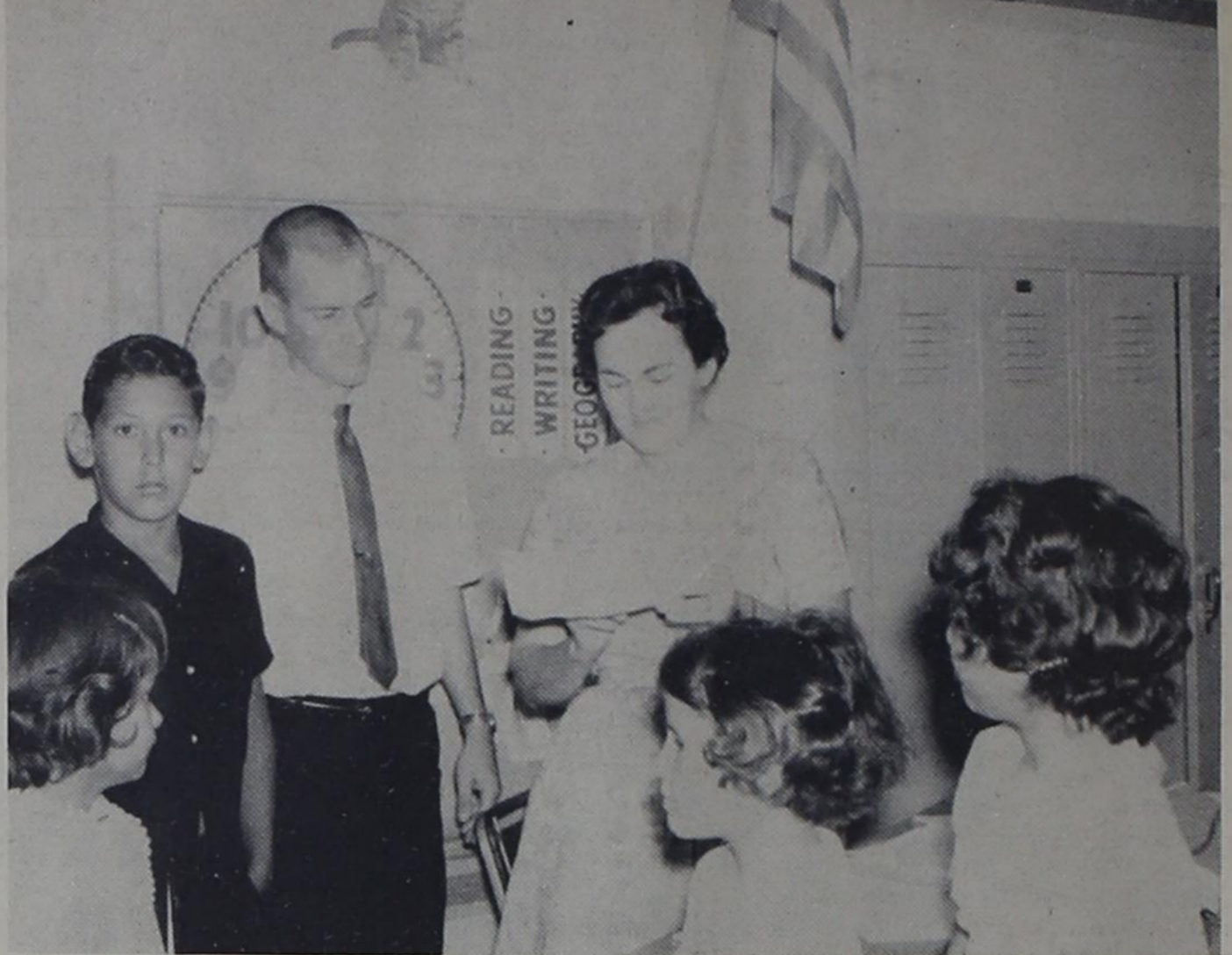

Know The Truth

Jesus said, "My kingdom is not of this world", John 18:36. Perhaps many religious people do not understand this; however, it is no surprise because even the Apostles did not realize that Jesus came to establish a spiritual kingdom. In Matt. 20:20-22, James and John, with their mother, came to Jesus to ask that the two brothers sit on the left hand and on the right hand of Jesus in His kingdom—thinking that His kingdom was a kingdom of this world. In Acts 1:6, the Apostles asked Jesus if He was going to "restore" the kingdom of Israel. He came to establish a "new" kingdom, and not revamp the old Jewish one. There are many people in this day that think Jesus came to set up His kingdom on earth, but was rejected by the Jews and so had to postpone what He came to do. Jesus intended to establish the kingdom during the lifetime of the Apostles or else He would not have told Peter that he would receive the "keys" to the kingdom, Matt. 16:18-19. The two terms "Kingdom" and "Church" point to the same institution; the different words are used to emphasize different things about God's people. That the kingdom or church was set up during the lifetime of the Apostles there is no doubt because it says in Acts 2: that the saved were added to the church. Our Lord became King when He went to heaven and took His place at God's right hand, I Peter 3:22. The prophet Daniel saw in a vision (Daniel 7:13-14) one like the son of man (Jesus) come to the Ancient days (God, the Father) and there was given to him a kingdom that all nations should serve Him. A clue in the vision of Daniel was that this one would come with the clouds, and in this way our Lord went back to God, Acts 1:9. Jesus teaches in Luke 19:11-12, that He had to go to a far country (heaven) to receive the kingdom. Is He your King?

Church Plans Revival Here

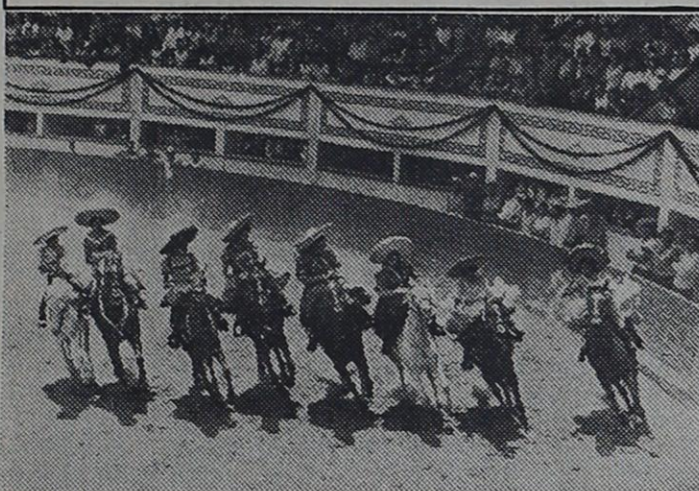
Revival services will begin Sunday night at 8 at the Friendship Baptist Church of Bovina.

Each year about 30 children, most of them under 6, get trapped in refrigerators and suffocate, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. A refrigerator that is temporarily out of use should be encircled with strong filament tape or a chain with a padlock. The doors of a refrigerator that is to be junked, discarded or abandoned should be removed.

David's Question And Answer

The question, in parallel form, is: "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in His holy place?" When this passage was written it referred primarily to them who would minister in the temple because God dwelt there, but now God dwells in His spiritual temple, the church, Ephesians 2:21, 22. As Adam Clarke's Commentary suggests there are three things involved in David's answer; the hands, the heart, and the tongue. The hands are a symbol of activity. Clean hands would represent honesty and purity in business, occupation, and pleasure. We must not defile our hands by unjust gain, or by withholding what belongs to another. Too, we must remember to extend our hands to the poor. However, the practice of the hands will not be holy unless the heart is holy because our Lord said the heart is the source of man's conduct, Matthew 15:19, 20. In addition to the heart and the hands being holy, the tongue must be used properly. A New Testament writer, James, says the tongue must be used to praise God rather than to curse men. Read this twenty-fourth Psalm and be blessed thereby.

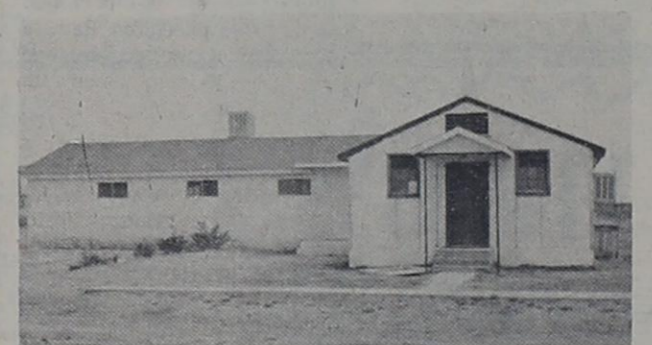

He was the father of Mrs. Monty Barrett.

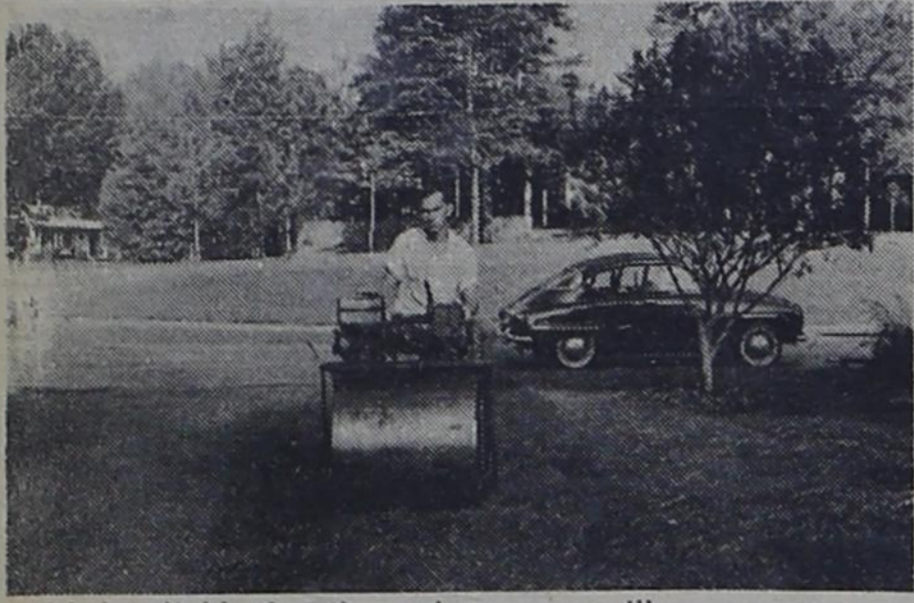
Mr. Harrison, who was a retired farmer, had visited in Bovina many times and was well acquainted with many people here.

Sod = Instant Lawn



It's inevitable that the spring season will come every year, but not so sure is whether your lawn will "rise" to the occasion. If yours looks brown, barren and has failed to turn velvety green, the best solution is to seed or sod with Merion Kentucky Blue Grass. If it's too late in the season to reseed your barren spots, and you can't find a professional to do the sodding job for you, here is the do-it-yourself procedure:

Begin by leveling off the site soil, tilling to a one-inch depth, and raking out the trash and stones. Rake a well-balanced inorganic fertilizer into the ground to correctly balance any soil deficiency.

Next thing needed is the sod. The best type is produced by reputable nurseries where soil is rich and land is weed-free. The latest percentage of sod sold in the northern United States is Merion Kentucky Bluegrass. Its resistance to leafspot disease and the uniform, dark green, thick turf it produces are some of the reasons for its preference.

After preparing the ground, installation should take place as soon as the sod is delivered. It's usually purchased by the yard in foot-wide strips nine feet

long. To install the first row, work along the guide of a straight line. Smooth the area immediately ahead with a rake. The sod strips must be placed butt to butt with no overlapping. It's best to roll the area immediately to press roots into the earth.



Newly laid Merion sod should be watered three hours on installation day. After this keep the sod layer moist until you can't pick it up. Then it's rooted and you're on the way to a lovelier lawn.

Waste Water Illegal

By Milton Meade

Irrigation water is the life line to farmers here on the High Plains and the waste of this valuable resource cannot be justified in this modern age of farming.

Farmers have technical assistance available to them through their local Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the Soil Conservation Service to help them with their water problems. How many farmers take advantage of this valuable service is difficult to say. The majority are not concerned until the well begins to run dry. Then they seek methods

of conserving their precious water.

Often farmers are aware they are wasting water, but they are reluctant to do anything about it. Why? Primarily because it requires an additional investment in these farming operations. They do not stop and consider that in establishing needed conservation practices that will conserve water, they are providing an insurance policy for their farming operations. How did they acquire this investment in equipment? Primarily through the commodities they produce from the soil that they till.

Farmers say they cannot justify an additional investment in

their land even though this is their source of livelihood.

The depletion of water is a gradual thing; the same can be said of the soil. We have learned to offset a part of the depletion of soil fertility by using fertilizers, BUT - we are still willing to waste our precious water, because we are unwilling to face or accept the fact that an additional investment is required. An investment that doesn't require replacement parts, as a tractor does, an investment that doesn't require an additional hired hand. It is an investment that increases the valuation of the farm and in all probability give you a greater return per dollar invested than that new combine or tractor you just purchased.

What are some of the needed water conservation practices that will help you reduce waste of water?

1. A properly designed irrigation system that takes in consideration soil type, the crop to be grown, the amount of water that is needed for the crop, the total amount of water, and the time normally required to apply water.

2. It may be some type of land preparation such as land leveling for uniform water application.

This is just a few of the things that can be done to help conserve water.

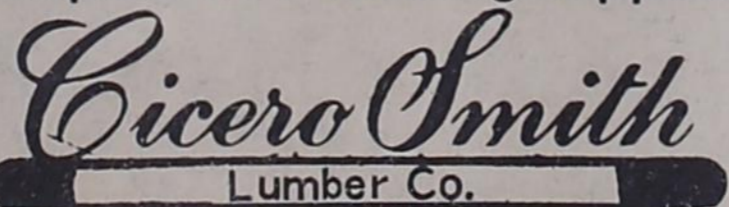

New Football Era Beginning For Bovina Ponies Play Pirates Here

The curtain goes up on a new era of Bovina High Football Friday night. The Mustangs, beginning their first season in Class A, will meet the Cooper Pirates here in a non-district contest.

This will be the first of 10 consecutive Friday night tilts for Coach Roy Stone's Ponies. They do not have an open date this year.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. at Mustang Field.

The Cooper Pirates are considered to be one of the top three teams in their Class B district which includes Sundown, the team the Mustangs played in bi-district competition last year.

The Pirates are led "by a real good boy named Hickman, who weighs 195 and plays tailback," according to Stone. Their offense is expected to operate from an I formation.

"We think it will be a pretty tough football game, but we figure we have an even chance of winning it," Stone says. "We're ready for the season to start. We've been practicing since August 15 and we're eager now for game action."

CENTER -- Galen Hromas, junior, 144;

QUARTERBACK -- Randy Jones, senior, 136; or Daryl Kirkpatrick, junior, 125;

FULLBACK -- Carl Harris, junior, 161;

HALFBACKS -- Dean Stanberry, senior, 144; and Lynn Murphy, junior, 151.

On defense, the lineup will remain the same except that Rex Cumpton, 185-pound junior, will replace Hromas in the line.

Also expected to see quite a bit of action as linemen are Ronnie Dyer, a 141-pound sophomore, and Tommy Spears, a 175-pound sophomore.

Coach Stone says he expects the Mustangs and the Cooper team to be about equal from a weight standpoint.

The Mustangs "did well" in a scrimmage session with Dimmitt here Thursday night.

The head coach was especially pleased with the performance of Alfred Stanberry, who plays guard on defense. "He made tackles all over the field and we thought he did an outstanding job," Stone commented. "All the backs ran well and Kirkpatrick did a good job of moving the team when he was at quarterback."

Dimmitt is Class AA and the Bovina fans on hand for the scrimmage seemed to be pleased that their team was able to battle the visitors on near-equal terms.

A total of 31 boys are still listed on the squad after the total earlier in the practice sessions was 41. Coach Stone says he expects a few more boys to come out for football this week now that school has started.

A capacity crowd is expected to be on hand here for the opener of the 1966 campaign. The Mustangs had back-to-back district championships in their final two years in Class B competition and their fans are eager to see them as they move up a notch classificationwise.

The Cooper game is one of two on the 10-game slate against Class B teams. The other Class B game is next week, Sept. 16, with the Happy Cowboys, a former district rival, there.

The season schedule appears in an advertisement in this issue of The Blade.

Admission charges for home games this season will be \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Some of the general policies, which have not been greatly changed from former years, are explained in the handbook. However, to avoid misunderstanding later all parents are urged to study the rules and regulations, Jacobs said.

Policies concerning eligibility, modes of dress, conduct, buses, textbooks, use of telephones, assembly attendance, withdrawals, leaving the school grounds, use of automobiles, disciplinary actions, student strikes, hazing, boy-girl relations, etc. are discussed in the book.

It has been designed to aid students, parents and the faculty in enjoying the school year and to act as a guide in understanding the traditions and policies.

Also included is the examination schedule for six weeks, mid-term and final examination.

Academic regulations pertaining to book reports, term papers, memory work, home-making, agriculture, reporting,

writing form and late work appear in the publication.

Requirements of the state and school for graduation, absences and tardiness and other such information is also included.

In the back of the handbook appears sheets for entering the football and basketball schedules and a section for entering grades earned for credit toward graduation so that such is always available.

Students are urged to take care of these handbooks for reference at any time the need arises.
