Bank Robbery, Convicted of Two Murders, Taken from Eastland Jail and Hanged.

Eastland, Nov. 21-Furious over his attempted jailbreak in which he fatally wounded Peace Officer Tom Jones a mob of 200 Eastland men Tuesday night lynched Marshal Ratliff, "Santa Claus" bandit of the Cisco bank

Ratliff was hanged from a telephone pole cable after the jailer had been captured and his keys taken. His naked body was strung up by a new grass rope, as between 1200 and 1500 people looked on.

There is much truth in this picture, home demonstration authorities declare, for an extensive survey of form kitchens a few years ago disclosed conditions that mark the average farm kitchen as a center of drudgery little improved over those of our grandmothers. Farm depression may account for some of this, it is said, but not all, for the survey, which was national in scope, showed that it just hasn't occurred to a majority of men and women on farms that there is kitchen. Most of the changes that are needed to make kitchens efficient and cheerful workshops cost so little that almost every farm family in Texas can afford to make improvement in this line, these authorities claim. Less than \$25 in cash expenditures transformed hundreds of farm kitchens in Texas in the improvement contests conducted by the Extension Service a few years ago, the effects of which are still noted all over the state in a steady addition of labor saving devices to kitchen equipment each year.

Piping water to a sink, letting in more light, putting tables and working surfaces at the correct height, adding a high stool, and getting an efficient stove are listed as the more important first considerations in a

Sharp Gain Texas Fruit Shipments

Austin, Texas, Nov. 21.-Shipments of fruits and vegetables from Texas during October showed a sharp gain over those in September, according to Bervard Nichols, editor of the Texas Business Review, issued monthly by the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas.

"Moreover, loadings should continue the increase during the next few months and reach a peak in April or May," Mr. Nichols said. "The showing in October is exceptionally good in comparison to the poor month of September and is much better than the record of last October.

"During the month, 696 cars of fruits and vegetables were shipped from Texas farms against 90 cars in September and 225 cars in October, Bleeding Gums Healed 1928. 





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POULTRY BREEDS AND HOW CLASSED

Chickens are divided into classes, breeds and varieties. Birds with the same general characteristics are placed in one class. Classes are then divided into breeds. Each breed of poultry is distinguished from other breeds by differences in type. Breeds are separated into varieties. The different varieties of the same breed are de ignated by differences in comb or color. All varieties of the same breed should have the same general type

There are four general classes of chickens that are common and other classes less common.

The American class consists of blids that are of the general purpose type. They have yellow skin and los, red ear lobes and legs free from

The breeds that make up this class rre: Plymouth Rock, Wyandotte, Java, Dominique, Rhode Island Red, Rhode Island White, Buckeye, Jersey Black Clents and Chanticleer.

The Mediterranean class are smaller than the American class and are of an known as the egg breeders. Tiey are nervous in disposition, very se ive, compactly built, have white ear lobes and clean legs. The breeds that make up this class, are: Leghorn, linorca, Spanish, Andalusian and

Fowls that make up the Asiatic class are large and clumsy, have red ear lobes and feathers on their legs. They are often referred to as the meat breeds. Brahmas, Cochins and Longshans make up the breeds in this

The English class, while not as common as the other three already referred to, probably rank fourth in popularity. These birds are medium in size, have red ear lobes, clean legs that are pink in the buff and white varieties and black in the black varicties. The breeds making up this class are Orpingtons, Dorkings, Red Caps, Sussex and Cornish.

Selling Squab Broilers

During Winter Months Quite a number of the broiler plants

nake a specialty of squab broilers, which sell best during January and February. They are grown in about eight to ten weeks, the hatches coming out in November and December, and are successfully raised without any outdoor exercise.

The greatest demand for squab brotlers is in spring, when game birds ara scarce, and a small bird is in demend in restaurants. They should weigh from three-fourths to one round, and must be plump. Many who ship squab broilers make a great mistake in sending bony, poor ones. Good returns cannot be expected from peor, scraggy birds, half dressed.

formatiow them rapidly. To grow good broilers there should be dry quarters provided, thoroughly cooked food, comfortable heat (not too high nor too low), regularity in feeding, cleanliness and good light. The chicks must be induced to take plenty of exercise.

Moving Pullet Flock

When there are many pullets to be moved it often pays to leave them in the crates over night and move the crates to the laying houses in the morning. Then the poultryman has a better light and can do a better job of culling and treating the birds for lice. As each pullet is taken from the crate, it can be inspected for weight, neral health and vigor, and prospecive laying ability. All birds that are oor prospects for winter profits can be isolated for future observation.

Improve Egg Quality

Much can be done to improve the quality of eggs produced by careful selection of eggs used for hatching purposes. All undersized, misshapen, off-color, and defective shelled eggs should be eliminated from the incubator. By fellowing such a practice or a few years the quality of eggs ild by a flock should be materially oved. Egg dealers are willing now pay a premium for high quality

egs. It is well to assort them acording to size and color.

Feed to Help Pullets

If pullets must search for their feed n free range they will probably find ficient food for body maintenance, growth will be slow and egg protion will be impossible until late er or early spring. Liberal feedof grain and mash containing 20 cent of high-grade tankage, or in lace of tankage all the milk the pulets can drink, will not only reduce the amount of exercise but will hasten growth and stimulate fall egg produc-

HEN COMFORT IS MOST PROFITABLE

When the rough days of autumn and winter arrive, the hens begin to from winter winds and snow. If the poultry house is cold, dark, and uninviting, it is very unprofitable to the owner. It not only shortens up the egg supply, but next spring the hens go to work with a handicap because they have been poorly wintered.

If we give the hens one-half the attention that we do our other stock they start making things count, says a writer in an exchange. Our poultry house is built for economy and comfort for the hens. We are strong believers in the scratching department, making the hen work a lot. To do this we have all the floor space in the building arranged for bad days, for that is when they must work inside. We put up a gunny-sack curtain in front of the perches, which serves for two purposes. It keeps the nens warm when on the perches at night, and keeps them off the perches

in the daytime. Then we partition off the inside with this cheap burlap which breaks possible drafts, and also divides the dock in their work for the day. We also open the windows, and drop down a burlap curtain on bad days to keep out cold air, storms and beating winds. This burlap is almost indispensable in our poultry equipment, and we use much of it. Our front curtain to the main building is made from it, tacked upon frames so it can be raised or lowered as needed.

On snowy, rough days the hens work happily away, more contented than if outside. It has always been our custom to set up a windbreak of cornstalks against the lee sides of the fences and the west and north of the houses, and it is wonderful how the heus will take refuge behind this fodder barrage many winter days when the snow is off.

Consistent Layer Will

Molt Late in Season

Most hens stop laying when they egin to molt. It is a fact no longer disputed that a hen, in order to make a high yearly record, must be a consistent la er. The early molting hen is not a consistent layer. She takes all the fall months as a vacation for changing her plumage. The consistent layer molts late and grows her new plumage rapidly.

The hen that under normal conditions molts early, will not lay as many winter eggs as the hen that molts duction earlier in the spring. No definite date can be set as to early moltng. As a general rule, however, the first hens in the flock to molt should he sold, and the last to molt should be kept for breeding purposes.

Molt from any of range should be avoided, as it roduction. If the pullets are hatched arly, they will be laying in the fall and thus the egg production kept up at all seasons.

Sodium fluoride, used at the rate of an ounce to a gallon of water, is recommended by specialists for destroying parasites. This should be used on a warm day as a dip, and the birds should be completely immersed

Hens should be as well fed when molting as when laying. Growing their new feathers is, if anything, harder on them than producing eggs.

Preventing the parasites by keeping the poultry house clean and by the regular use of dips is much more satisfactory than eradicating them once they have infested the flock. To control mites, the roosts and nests should be painted with carbolineum or some equally effective wood preservative. One treatment each year is usually sufficient.

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


