#### CRITICISM THE MOTHER OF PROGRESS.

In this day and age, progress is out of the question without criticism. But there are two kinds of criticism-one good and one bad.

Constructive criticism is good, for it is caused by honest doubt. It seeks to study with care, and learn better ways. It builds, makes and changes for the better and, therefore, is responsible for many blessings.

Destructive criticism is bad. It tears down, destroys. One of its forms is ridicule. There are three kinds of people who ever ridicule anything-the human ass, the out-and-out destructionist, and the man who, because he has never heard of it nor has ever done it, poch-pochs the idea that there s such a thing or that it can be done.

Constructive criticism of Merkel is boosting, for a fault known and acknowledged is half cured. Ridicule of Merkel is knocking.

As hot-air is the greatest enemy of common sense, the satisfied-withthings-as-they-are attitude is one of the greatest enemies to community progress; for satisfied people never crave anything other than that which they have. They are those who say, "it is good enough for me," and that offers scant opportunity for making anything better.

Dissatisfaction tends to the improvement of a thing, and causes thinking people to say, "it is good, but it can be made better." That is goodfor thinking and saying a thing can be made better leads to its being

However, do not confuse dissatisfaction with discontent. Much less than is needed may satisfy; less than enough might content one. If we had been satisfied with 1900 model automobiles there would never have been any better ones; satisfied with the broom there never would have been a vacuum sweeper.

The man who is satisfied is want-less. He preaches the gospel of "letwell-enough-alone." He is one of those easy-going individuals lacking ambition. If you should take him to dine and ask his pleasure as to food he would reply, "oh, I am not particular."

It is not an old saying that "man should be content, but never satisfied" -content and thankful for that which he has, happy in having it, comfortably enjoying it; but always seeking, striving for better, that he may

be more thankful, more happy and more comfortable. An individual who is satisfied with his town is a liability to the community and every one in it. Show me a town where the majority of the people are satisfied, and I will show you a community that is not standing the gaff of modern community competition. A man who wants to

live in a satisfied community should go to China. People must be dissatisfied if their community is to be kept alive, if new people and new industries are to be attracted.

That does not mean that every one should be a grumbler, a grouch, a hardhead, or chronic fault-finder; neither does it mean to pick the other fellow to pieces and forget to look in the mirror yourself.

It does mean to keep out of the rut, to avoid becoming so accusto to Merkel that you fail to recognize the things that hold it back, or its advantages on which you could capitalize,

More than 500 persons were present at the opening of the sale, with Earl Garten, Decatur, Ill., acting as auctioneer. W. L. Stangel, Texas Tech animal husbandryman, was the judge of the animals in the show.

G. E. Bradford's bull, Superior Diamond, Jr., out of Gwendoline 30th and sired by Superior Diamond, brought the top price in the male class. This animal was sold to G. P. Hodges, Sweetwater ranchman, for \$1,125.

Vignette 35th, out of Vignette 33rd and sired by Anxious Domino, topped the cow list. It brought its owners, J. D. Dulaney & Sons, J. D., Jr., and J. N., \$450. The animal was sold to C. M. Largent & Son, Merkel breeders.

#### Clyde Horticulturist Announces for Place State Commissioner

Clyde, March 6 .- J. H. Burkett, pioneer horticulturist and creator of the famous Burkett papershell pecan, formally announced his candidacy Saturday for commissioner of agriculture.

Burkett was connected with the state agricultural department for ten years, serving under commisioners Fred W. Davis and Geo. B. Terrell, the incumbent, and for a quarter-century has borne the title of "Burkett of Texas." His farm on the outskirts of Clyde contains about 60,000 specimens of nursery stock in various stages of propagation and including pecans of many varieties, English walnuts which he is Americanizing, and a group of coniferous plants-notably the pinon pine-which he is acclimating to semi-arid conditions.

He has been conducting notable experiments since 1887. The Burkett pecan, now widely known from coast to coast, was not introduced commercially until a few years ago, after Burkett had thoroughly satisfied himself of its possibilities.

#### Farmer Developing Own Power Has Low Cost.

If a farmer ever intends to raise a olt, now is a good time to do so, acording to A. O. Rhoad of the New York State College of Agriculture. If the farmer raises colts now he will save money in a few years when he puts them to work in place of the horses he now has on his farm.

The farmer who grows his own power, says Mr. Rhoad, buys his own power at the lowest cost and pays for it on the instalment plan without interest. With the possible exception of a fee for stallion service the farmer does not have to take much money out of his pocket at present to produce his farm power. The farmer who breeds his mare to foal next spring and feeds the colt well will have a work horse that will cost him far less than one purchased on the market.

According to a recent survey made by C. E. Ladd of the college, 57 per cent of horses in New York state are more than twelve years old. The price of horses is increasing. Doctor Ladd also states that from two-thirds to three-fourths of the horses in New York state will be replaced during the next ten years, and that it is probable that they will be replaced at a time when it will cost New York farmers several millions more than it would today. #### Immunize Pigs

Baby pigs one month of age may be successfully immunized against cholera, according to the work of Graham. Thorpe and Hectorne at the University of Illinois. Such practice is not generally recommended by veterinarians working under general farm conditions. The studies quoted indicate that other diseases constitute a complicating factor of growing importance in outbreaks of hog cholera. There is a saving of time and serum worth considering when pigs are vaccinated

#### Selecting a Sire

Thorough investigation should be made to measure the true worth of a bull in selecting a proved sire. The fact that a sire has a number of tested daughters is not adequate and may be no reliable measure of his worth.

A proved sire is considered to be one with five or six unselected daughters with records, preferably for one year. Tests show that a sire mated with a given type of cow will continue to produce similar daughters. If six of the daughters are good, the sire should be saved.

#### FEED REQUIRED FOR CHICKENS

From time to time we receive inquiries asking how much feed is required for producing chickens, says the Iowa Homestead. These people appreciate that the feed cost is one of the important considerations in raising poultry. Too often people believe that it is the whole cost, for some do not make allowance for other costs, such as mortality, depreciation on buildings, labor, etc.

The Connecticut experiment station determined the amount of feed which was required to grow White Leghorn and Rhode Island Red chicks till they were 24 weeks of age. At that age Leghorns had consumed 22.13 pounds per bird and the Red 25.77 pounds. The Leghorns weighed 3.28 pounds and the Reds 4.3 pounds per bird.

The Indiana station reports that it took approximately 30 pounds of feed to raise White Rock pullets to 28 weeks of age. From these two reports it would seem likely that average amounts of feed needed to reach maturity would be approximately 25 pounds for Leghorns and from 30 to 35 pounds for the heavy breeds.

Some figures are also available on the amount of feed that will be consumed by hens in a year. The smaller breeds require less than the larger breeds and hens that do not lay heavily will consume less than those that are heavy layers. Heavy laying Leghorns will consume approximately 75 pounds of feed yearly per hen, while the heavier breeds will need about 85 pounds.

#### Skim Milk Recognized

### Feed for All Poultry

Skim milk is a recognized feed for poultry from the baby chick on up to the laying pullet, and as a supplement to either home-grown feeds or the commercial product, it is recommended by successful poultrymen and specialists the world over.

Those engaged in the poultry business must necessarily have high production. Unless they have an abundance and a variety of feeds and know how properly to mix them, the commercial feed must be used. This is also the case with every farmer who

seeks high production. Commercial poultry feeds, in most cases, are the result of scientific research. Their efficiency has been demonstrated so many times that there is no room for argument, but no farmer will make a mistake if he seeks to lower the cost of production by producing his own grains and by utilizing all the skim milk available.

#### Preventing Egg Losses

#### Is Not Difficult Task

The season is near at hand for converting feed crops into eggs. No one wants to put labor into the production of feeds and then lose their value. It is estimated that about 17 per cent of the eggs shipped to wholesale markets have no commercial value because of their being dirty, broken, or having chick development, or being shrunken, rotten or moldy. The following conditions will almost entirely eliminate losses from these sources: Eggs for market should weigh from one and one-half to two pounds per dozen; be uniform in size; be free from dirt, but not washed; be strong shelled, fresh and infertile. They should be laid in clean nests, gathered often, never taken from an incubator nor from stolen nests; they should be kept in a cool, dry place until delivered at the market.

#### No Difficulty Is Met

in Picking Out Layers No diliculty should be met in picking out the best-laying or the poorestlaying hens in the farm flock. With some birds, however, the distinguishing marks are not so distinct and may sometimes be rather contradictory. Thus one hen may be an early molter and yet show good body opth. Another bird may molt late and at the same time show poor quality. Birds of this type are usually medium producers, and the owner must decide

#### Affects Egg Size

whether they should be kept or sold.

It is possible in forcing feeding when the hen lays day after day for a week or two that the egg will gradually lose in size, depending on the hen and the kind of food eaten. If the hen has inherited capacity to lay many eggs, and she gets the right kind of foods. she will lay normal-sized eggs even though laying heavily. To lay many normal eggs the hen must be fed plenty of protein foods, such as are found in the mash, especially during

#### Avoid All Drafts

There should be no drafts in the poultry house in fall and winter. The sides of the house should be as nearly g a larger percentage of pigs and air-tight as it is possible to make them. This applies also to the roof. This is one reason why shingle roofs are not satisfactory. The air sifts through and considerable heat is allowed to escape. Drafts are respon-sible for the birds contracting colds Cracks should be completely closed so that comfort will be afforded to the taying flock.
