# Homecoming Activities Planned Here Friday

A parade at 2 p.m. Friday will travel through downtown Bovina, down Third Street and to Bovina Schools. Theme of the parade this year is "Great Events in World History."

Coronation ceremonies of Football Queen and Football Hero are scheduled for half-time of the Bovina-Frenship football game on Mustang Field. The annual event is sponsored by the Student Council.

All events of Homecoming are in the form of contests. The spirit stick will be awarded the class having the largest bonfire; cash prizes will be awarded the winning floats; winners of the royalty selections will be announced; and the highlight will be the clash of Mustangs and Tigers.

Candidates for Football Queen were chosen by members of the Letterman's Club, include Pam Grissom, Nancy

Mitchell, Suzanne Wilson and Candy Wilson, all seniors. Football Hero candidates were selected by the Pep Club,

Randy Barrett, Jackie Hall, Stuart McMeans, seniors, and Mike Beauchamp, junior. Identity of the winners will

Classes winning the float contest in the parade will receive \$25 for first; \$15, second; and \$10, third. A plaque will be awarded the best entry outside the school, according to Stuart McMeans, president of the Student Council.

Deadline for bringing wood for the bonfire will be at 8:30 a.m. Thursday.

# First Freeze Deadline Near

Next Wednesday, Oct. 15, is the deadline for entering the First Freeze Contest.

Forty-three entries have been received so far in the fifth annual event, sponsored jointly by the Bovina Blade and W. E. Williams.

Unless a killing freeze occurs before the week following the deadline (Oct. 22) a complete list of entries and their predictions will be published.

# Council Okays Line Extension

City Council met in regular session Thursday night in City Hall with Mayor Bedford Caldwell, Vernon Estes, Lloyd Guber and Billie Sudderth attending.

Also attending were city employees, Darrell Read, Ronald Mitchell and Mary Ruth Martin.

Council members agreed to install water and sewer lines for FHA houses on the west side of town as need arises. This is the area north of Ridgelea Elementary School under development.

Read submitted to the council the need for street signs and the need for additional dumpground space.

Tabled until more members of the council are present was a request from Marie Venable to reconsider a trailer park. She stated she is still interested in installing one here. A permit had previously been declined because of a zoning regulation.

The meeting Thursday night was delayed more than an hour because of lack of a quorum.

## 1970 Elections --

# Voter Registration Opens For Citizens

It is time to register for 1970 elections.

Registration for voting opened Oct. 1 and continues until the deadline on Jan. 31, 1970, County Tax Assessor Collector Hugh Moseley announces.

Residents of Parmer County are urged to register early this year instead of waiting until the deadline nears, Moseley said. Those who register within the Oct. 1 through Jan. 31 period will be eligible to vote in elections held from March 1, 1970 until Feb. 28, 1971.

No one can vote without having registered. There is only one exemption this year -- for persons who are absent from their county of residence inactive military service. There is no longer an exemption for persons over 60 years of age.

Requirements for voting, according to Elections Division, State of Texas, are: 1. Citizen of the United States; 2. Over 21 years old on the day of the election; 3. Resident of the State for at least one year immediately preceding election day; 4. Resident of the county for

at least six months immediately preceding election day for county and city elections.

The election law also states that persons convicted of a felony who have not had their right of suffrage restored and persons who are under an adjudgment of mental incompetency cannot vote.

Registration blanks may be obtained from Moseley's office in the Parmer County court house, Farwell. They may be mailed in, or may be presented in person. Only the husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter may act as the voter's agent in applying for registration if voter cannot apply himself.

Those who will be 21 years of age before Jan. 31 must register

A scoreboard in the Blade office is on display for anyone wishing to check the running scores.


## Donaldson Burned By Ammonia

Wet Grain Feeding Method Opens West Texas Doors

By Pat Jacobs Construction of another area feedlot is progressing satisfactorily four miles east of the Oklahoma Lane crossroads.

It may be just "another feedlot," but its feeding method is expected to be revolutionary to Parmer County grain and corn producers. Using the "wet grain" method is nothing new--but is new to the West Texas area. It has been used successfully in Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas.

Bovina Feeders, Inc. is building for a 20,000 head capacity,

with plenty of room for expansion, manager Redge Priest says. The company now employs 20 people and expects to add at least five more when in full operation. Dick Martin is office manager.

The \$2.5 million dollar enterprise is owned by Parmer County people.

Three pits, with concrete bottoms and plastic-lined sides, are now being filled with grain sorghum and corn and another pit contains ensilage.

The difference in Bovina Feeders, Inc. and other feedlots is the moisture content of the grain and corn used and the way the grain is prepared. The company is taking feed from 33 moisture, down, Priest says.

The grain is ground by portable grinders, pulled by trucks or tractors, in the pits and stored with moisture content of from 30 to 32. If the grain or corn has a lower moisture content, water is added.

This method allows farmers to cut grain early, before it is dry enough for ordinary storage, and to have a market for the crops. The advantage to farmers is elimination of about a two-weeks' hazard period from insect damage, hail, falling down, etc.

After the grain and corn is ground, the feed looks like wet sand. It is then covered with sheets of plastic and weighted down with used tires.

"Our biggest problem right now," Priest says, "is grinding as fast as the feed arrives." The three pits now being filled will feed from 10 to 12 thousand head of cattle a year. Bovina Feeders, Inc. will expand its number of pits each

year, as the number of cattle increase.

The new feeding method will probably increase corn production in this area, the manager feels. He is more than excited with the results of the corn received so far at Bovina Feeders, Inc., stating that most has a moisture content of 25 to 28 per cent.

The feedlot now has from 15 to 16 million pounds of corn in the pit and about 28 million pounds of milo. The pits, which will

be concreted on the sides eventually, measure 80 by 400 feet with a grain depth of 16 feet.


Other than the feeding method, Bovina Feeders, Inc. is much like other feedlots in the area. Pens are being constructed for the cattle, along with fence line troughs and feed bunks.

The office, of brick construction, for Bovina Feeders, Inc. is virtually completed. It contains a lobby, scale room, bookkeeping office, buyer's office,

manager's office and rest rooms.

Eventually a mill will be constructed where the wet grain will be mixed with roughage and concentrates. However, the mill is not essential in that the mixing can also be done in trucks by an auger. This will be the practice until the mill is constructed.

The new feedlot will up the total feeding capacity in Parmer County to near the 150,000 or more mark.



# Sgt. Barraza Earns Medal

The Bronze Star Medal was presented to Sgt. Paul A. Barraza on Aug. 25 for "heroism in ground combat in the Republic of Vietnam on 2 March 1969."

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Barraza of Bovina, Paul has since returned home with his discharge from the U. S. Army after 14 months service in Vietnam.

The citation accompanying the medal presented the Farwell High School ex-student read "for heroism not involving participation in an aerial flight, in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam: On this date, Sergeant Barraza, then specialist four, was serving as a machinegunner with his unit at an ambush site 10 miles west of Ben Cat. At approximately 1630 hours, he observed six enemy soldiers enter his element's killing zone and he placed devastating fire on the insurgents when they were within 40 meters of his position. During the ensuing firefight, the aggressors employed automatic weapons and rocket-propelled grenades which wounded Sergeant Barraza in the head. Although

bleeding profusely and in great pain, he disregarded his personal safety as he braved the hall of hostile rounds and continued to put forth suppressive machinegun barrages until his companions encaptured and eliminated the aggressors. His courageous initiative and determined professionalism significantly contributed to the successful accomplishment of his unit's mission. Sergeant Barraza's outstanding display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty, and personal bravery is in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, the 1st Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

Barraza's Bronze Star Medal certificate is signed by A. E. Milloy, Major General, U. S. A. and Stanley R. Resor, secretary of the Army.

Pancake supper, held Friday night by Band Parents, netted approximately \$85, according to Mrs. Leon Ware, finance chairman.


Proceeds will be used for the band trip to Enid, Okla. this spring.





William Howard of Albemarle county, Virginia left his wife, Elizabeth, his land and other property. (How much is not stated). His son, William, inherited one cow and calf and two sheep. Fanny, apparently his favorite, received one bedstead and furniture, one cow and calf, two sheep and \$250. To his son, Eli, great-grandfather left one bed and furniture, one cow and calf, two sheep, a Comet colt and all the crop on the land at his mother's death. David, another son, received one bed and furniture, one cow and calf and two sheep. There were other children not mentioned here. William Howard stated he wished the land and remainder of property be sold after death of his wife and equally divided among his children: Mary Wells, Mildred Dorsey, John Howard, William Howard, Frances Howard, Richard Howard, Eli Howard and David Howard. The will was executed Feb. 5, 1844.

# Mustangs Race By Swifts, 75-20, For An Easy Win

The Bovina Mustangs raced to an easy, 75-20 win over the Nazareth Swifts here Friday night in a non-district football game.

The tilt was the fourth win of the season for the Mustangs of Coach Gib Hough. They have not been defeated.

The Class B Swifts, while game enough, offered little opposition to the Mustangs who used a line-up liberally sprinkled with reserves at times.

While running up their highest point total possibly in history, and certainly the largest this year, the Mustangs scored 20 points in the first quarter, 13 in the second, 25 in the third and 18 in the fourth for the basketball-like total of 75.

Halftime score was 33-14. Bovina scored on its first play from scrimmage on a 49-yard jaunt by Jimmy Harris and from there on there was no question as to the game's outcome.

Nazareth managed for three touchdowns of their own and two extra points and this point total by the visitors was probably the biggest surprise the game had to offer.

During the lengthy game, the Mustangs rambled for 11 touchdowns, Harris kicked five extra points out of eight attempts. He also ran a pair of extras as did Randy Chisum, who is a defensive end by "trade" but saw a little backfield duty in the one-sided affair.

The Bovina team racked up a total of 622 yards offensively and the Swifts put together 367 of their own. Quarterback Roy Ramirez completed two of three passes, both long ones, for a total of 103 yards.

The visitors completed 10 of 27 passes for total yardage in the air of 153.

Following Bovina's first tee-de, the Swifts bounced back for one of their own and added a two point conversion to take a brief lead with 7:53 left in the opening period, but even at that, the Mustangs appeared to be in complete control of the game.

Less than a minute later, they scored again on a 48-yard pass

play from Ramirez to Mike Beauchamp and breezed on to the lopsided win from there.

Just before the end of the first period, Bovina's third touchdown came on a freakish-type pass play which covered 55 yards and turned into an easy score. Ramirez threw a pass intended for Harris. Harris wasn't able to hold onto the ball but batted it into their endzone.

Beauchamp was Johnny-on-the-spot and grabbed the ball and sailed into the endzone untouched for the counter. Harris missed his first of three kicks for the extra point and the Ponies led, 20-8.

Just before the opening stanza ended, the Mustangs were at touchdown's door again as a result of a pass interception and return to the six yard line by Carroll Foster. Fullback Royce Sisk batted out five to the one and Reserve Tailback Steve Wiseman put it across the goal line from there to boost the score to 26-8. Harris' kick this time was partially blocked to leave the score unchanged.

Following the kickoff, the Bovina team got possession of the ball on downs at their own 37. Wiseman then set up the next six-pointer on a 41-yard dash

from there--to the Nazareth 22. A five-yard penalty against the Swifts and a two yard gain by Beauchamp put the ball on the 15 and from there, Regular Tailback Stuart McMeans, who saw only limited duty during the game, danced in for the score. Harris got his toe back on the mark to make the score 33-8.

The Swifts got their second touchdown with 3:08 remaining before the half on an eight-yard run by Quarterback Gene Schmuher. A pass play for the extras failed.

The third period belonged entirely to the Mustangs as they put 26 points on the scoreboard. McMeans scored on the first play following the halftime rest period on a 55-yard run and went on to add two more touchdowns on runs of eight and 88 yards and Beauchamp did some fancy open field running for an 81-yard score. Harris kicked the extra points after two of the four touchdowns and the score was 59-14 going into the final 12 minutes.

Chisum scored in the fourth period on a three-yard run and then blasted through the center of the line for the extra points. For the final score on Bovina's side of the ledger, Harris ran

14 yards and then tacked on the two extra points with 3:12 remaining in the no-contest game.

The Swifts got their third and final touchdown in the fading seconds of the game on a 16-yard pass from Schmuher to End Billy Ed Holeting.

McMeans was Bovina's leading ballcarrier with 196 yards in nine trips. Beauchamp carried six times for 110 yards. Harris made 104 yards in six tries. Wiseman was eight for 98. David Dixon earned seven yards in three attempts, Chisum netted five in two tries and Greg Bell broke even as he carried twice, gaining two yards and then losing the same amount.

# Frenship Tigers Next Opponent

## Contest Here Friday Night

The picnic portion of the Bovina Mustangs 1969 football season is over.

The competition is expected to be considerably better in the remaining six games than it has been in the first four, all of which have been won by Coach Gib Hough's crew.

Starting off the "tough" part of the schedule are the Frenship Tigers, a Class AA outfit from Wolforth, near Lubbock. The Tigers are rated one of the top Class AA schools in the Lubbock area and are co-favorites with Denver City to win the 4-AA crown.

Frenship, like the Mustangs, is undefeated in four games this year. The Tigers have defeated Boys Ranch, New Deal, Lorenzo and Cooper.

Last season, Frenship had an 8-1-1 record and one of those eight wins was at the expense of the Mustangs, 18-7.

Long suit of this week's opponent will be speedy back, led by halfback Johnny Carrizales and fullback Waddell Smith. Both Carrizales and Smith had long scoring runs against the Ponies in last year's game.

Commenting on scouting reports in regard to the Tigers, Coach Hough says they depend on a running game, especially to the outside. They are not considered a strong passing team, but they will throw some.

Frenship is rated "a good defensive team," and has the reputation of being hard-hitting.

Following Sudan, the Mustangs meet Springlake-Earth, Kress, Farwell, and Vega on successive Friday nights.
