Ordinance To Clean Up Bovina

Tuesday, October 8 the Bovina City aldermen passed an amendment to the city's mobile home ordinance that was last amended October 2, 1994.

This new amendment states that all mobile homes and manufactured homes should have the front door facing the street frontage lengthwise.

Lately mobile homes have been showing up more frequently around Bovina. Mayor Galen Hromas said that this amendment to the ordinance and others that the council are considering are because of this new trend.

"It's something we needed to look into to ensure everyone is treated fairly. We need to apply these ordinances to make Bovina a nicer place to live," Hromas added.

Other changes that are being considered include, rezoning parts of town to restrict the placing of mobile homes, the size of lots for homes and closeness to adjoining properties.

Hromas said he will be checking with the city attorney, Kathryn Gurley and the Texas Municipal League to make sure the council can make these new requests legally and fairly.

Currently the ordinances on mobile homes are basic. First, homes must be at least a 1976 model or newer. No more than one mobile home is permitted upon any platted lot and shall contain not less than 5000 square feet.

Also, no mobile home is to be closer than 15 and 10 feet to any property line nor closer than 25 feet to the property line adjoining a public street.

The minimum distance between the mobile home at any point and any other structure, such as a residence or business, should be 15 feet.

Mobile home owners are also required to maintain their mobile home space, its facilities and equipment in good repair and in a clean condition.

They are also responsible for placing a fire resistant skirting with necessary vents and screens. All skirtings, porches, awnings and other additions, when installed are to be maintained and in good repair.

As stated in Bovina City Ordinance number 10-2-94, Any person violating any provisions...shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined an amount not exceeding two hundred dollars. Each day constitutes a separate offense.

Mobile home owners, renters or those considering a mobile or manufactured home should be aware that these ordinances are being enforced.

Oct. City Sales Taxes Received

The State Comptroller of Public Accounts has released the October 1996 City Sales and Use Tax payments.

For this period, the tax total of \$19,282.35 was distributed as follows: Bovina, \$1,466.28, Farwell, \$3,820.58, and Friona, \$13,995.49.

Compared to the same period last year, total revenue was up 27.23%. Broken down by town, Bovina had a 13.26% decrease, Farwell increased 21.90% and Friona was up by 35.48%.

Year-to-date, Bovina's tax revenue is down 10.17%, Farwell up by 10.03%, and Friona up by 71.86%.

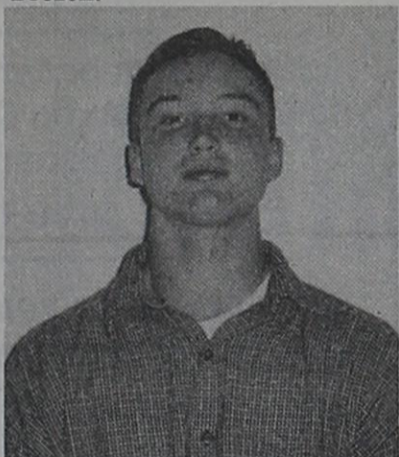
Total sales tax dollars received so far in 1996 are Bovina, \$20,836.30, Farwell, \$39,803.10, and Friona, \$187,386.08.

TONY BEAUCHAMP was selected for offensive player-of-the-week for his 120 rushing yards and two touchdowns in the win over Hale Center.



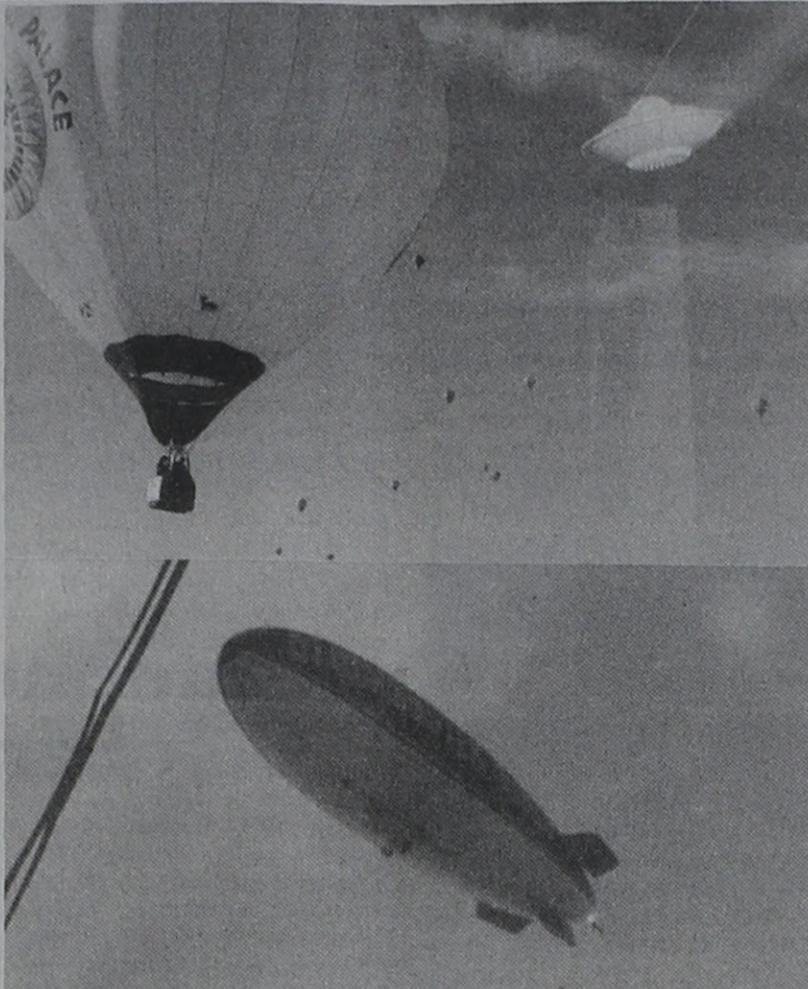
ALBERT LARREA A. Larrea is Student of the Week

Mustangs Outlast Hale Center-Head For Lockney Showdown

In their first District 3-2A game, the surprising 1996 Bovina Mustangs battled defending district champs, Hale Center, to a hard-fought 42-36 victory last Friday night at Mustang Field.

The see-saw offensive battle saw the two teams almost even-up in total offensive statistics.

Total offense favored Hale Center 355-345. Hale Center won the first down competition 21-19 and had 82 passing yards to only 17 for the Mustangs.

But Bovina's ground game hammered the Hale Center defense for 328 yards and five touchdowns, two each by quarterback Tony Beauchamp and Joe Villarreal.

Robert Perez added a 10-yard touchdown run and defensive back Martin Reyna returned an interception for a 50-yard touchdown.

Lupe Rivera and Robert Perez shared extra-point duties as the Mustangs were a perfect 6 for 6 on conversions. Rivera converted four times and Perez two.

Individual stats showed Beauchamp with 120 yards on 8 carries. Team leader Villarreal managed 74 yards on 16 carries. Robert Perez had 80 yards on three carries, Albert Larrea had 6 for 23, and Reyna pitched in 8 yards on 3 carries.

The Mustang defense has allowed only 94 points this season through six games, 70 of them in the past two games.

In preparing for this week's game, Coach Bobby Ortiz says that he will drill the Mustangs on avoiding turnovers and penalties. The Mustangs were penalized nine times for 85 yards against Hale Center, but did not fumble in the game. Bovina punted four times for an average of 32 yards.

And so the Mustangs, with a scoring average of 34.8 per game through six games, head to a showdown

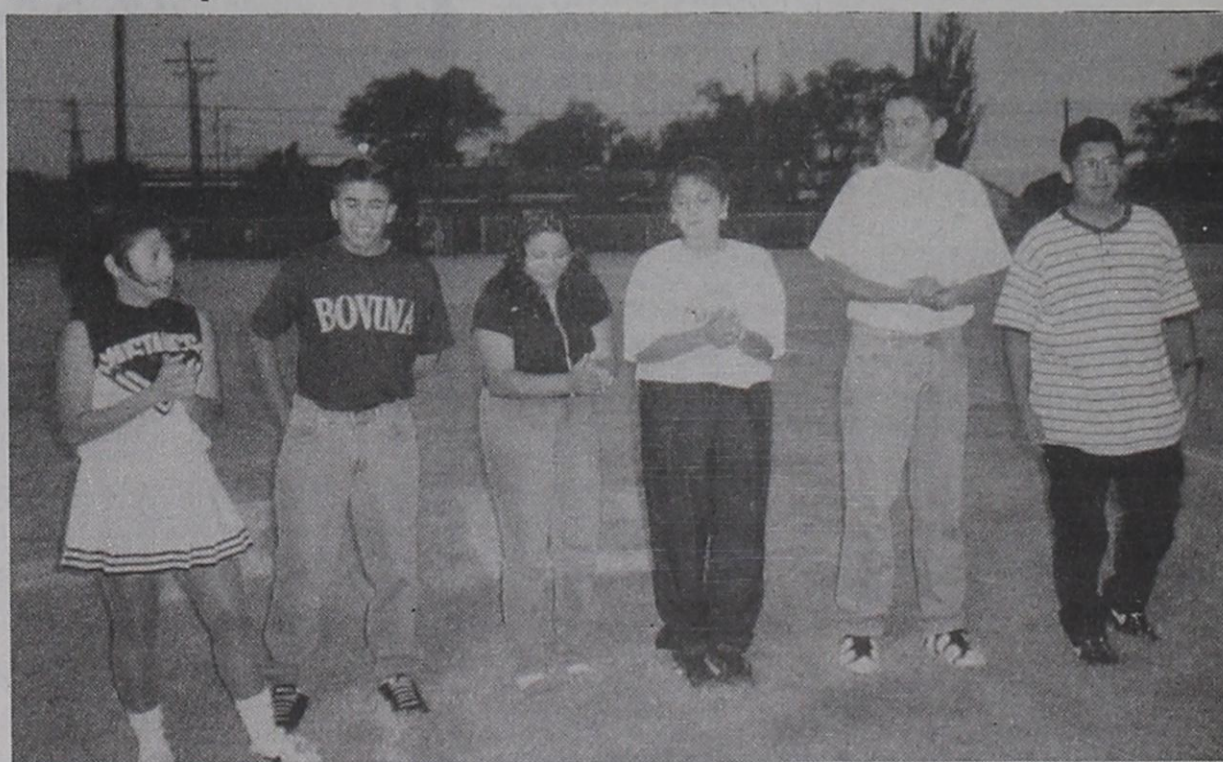

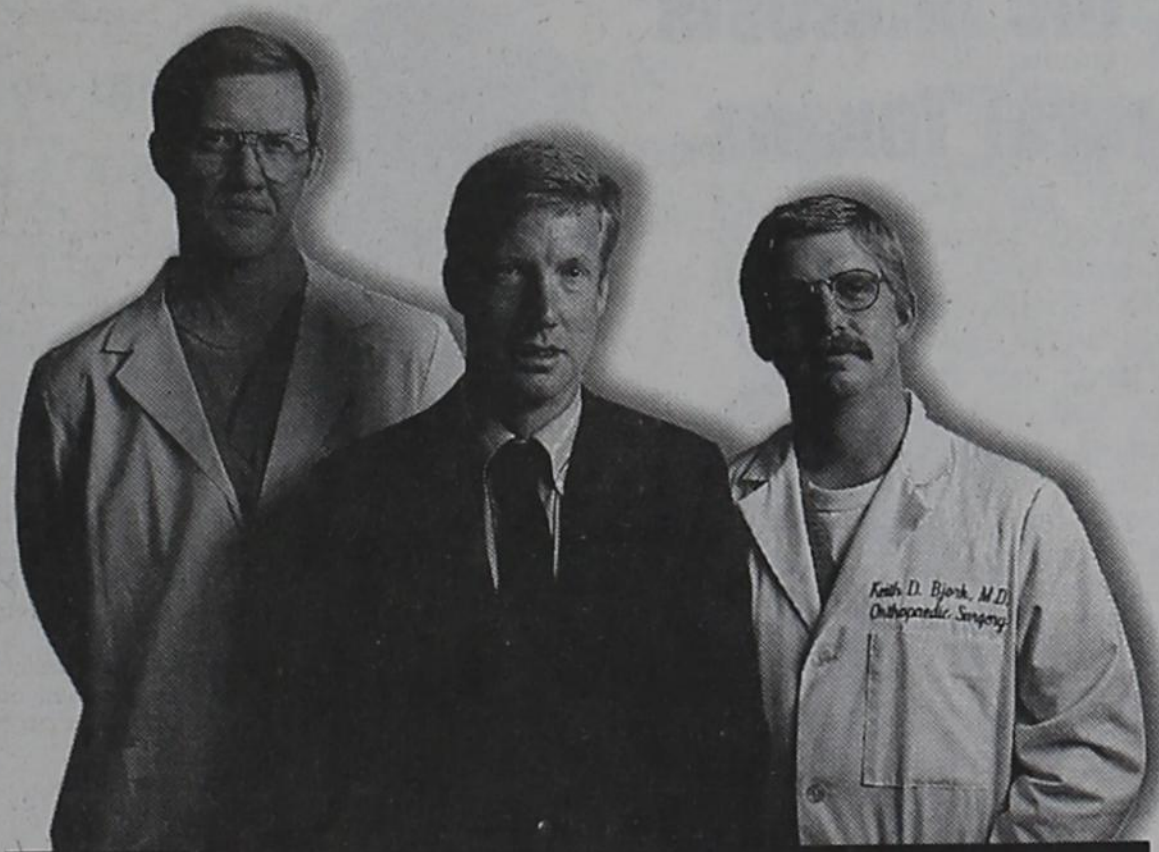

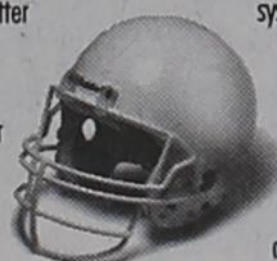

First Freeze Threatens Local Area

Having boasted ten days out of 11 where the temperature hit the 80s (through Wednesday), our area was primed for at least a light freeze on Friday morning.

Almost perfect weather during the past month has allowed one of the most orderly grain harvests ever seen. Corn yields also exceeded many early expectations, as did the ensilage.

Beet harvest was begun this week, and the cotton harvest is expected to begin very shortly. Some farmers have sprayed their cotton with "Prep," which will kill the leaves whether the freeze does or not. The warm dry weather of October should have aided the crop.

Are Your Eyes Middle Aged?



Exercise and a good diet may help you look and feel younger than your parents did at your age, but, as you approach the 40s, you still may have difficulty reading the small print. This condition has a name—presbyopia—and almost everyone gets it.

Key to the problem is the small lens within the eye that changes shape automatically as we focus on objects near and far. The lens is soft and flexible at first, but it hardens with age; in time, it's not flexible enough to focus on small-print matter held at the usual distance. That's when the reader starts holding the newspaper or book further and further away until—the old joke goes—"the eyes are fine, but the arms are too short."

Presbyopia is a normal and expected condition at middle age. Ignoring it usually results in headaches, blurring vision or tiredness when you try to read. Better: see the optometrist for reading glasses prescribed for your vision needs.

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New Building Set For "Blackwater"

A new building is being constructed as part of a conservation project for Eastern New Mexico University's Blackwater Draw Site.

The funding and architectural designs for the project are being provided through ENMU, the El Llano Estacado RC&D area, the State Historic Preservation Office and the Highway and Transportation Environmental Division. The building will make it easier for visitors to view the site and will help archaeologists by protecting the excavation from nature's elements.

Blackwater Draw Site was discovered in 1932 and has been excavated off and on for the last 63 years. The site exhibits a bone bed that is important in classic Paleolithic stratigraphy and has been accepted as the earliest culture in North America, which makes this site known world-wide. The Blackwater Draw Clovis Type Site (oldest) is followed by Folsom, Portales and Archaic

cultures which date back from 11,300 to 5,000 years ago.

The Blackwater Draw Site was privately owned until 1978 when it was purchased by ENMU. In 1991 it was opened to the public and visitors can take a 1/4 mile self-guided tour through a trail with information signs.

Curator and archaeologist of the site, Joanne Dickenson, said, "Our hope for the site is that we can create a place that people can feel is a walk through that time period."

Many of the artifacts from the site are now housed in the Blackwater Draw Site Museum, but eventually they hope to move the museum out to the actual site. It will be valuable for visitors to see not only what has been found, but also the archaeological digging and a tour of the site in the same area.

The completion of the building on the Blackwater Draw Site is set for March of 1997.

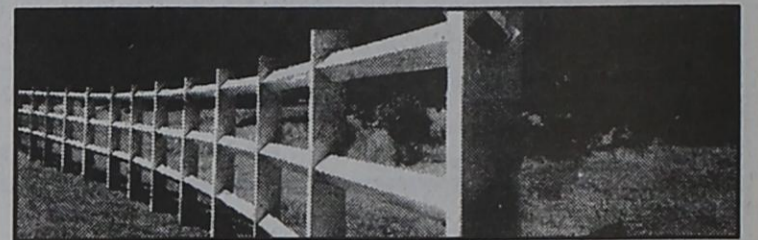
The exhibit is a portion of the collection amassed over a period of nine decades by the Santa Fe Railway Company.
