THE ENTIRE NATION has watched spellbound this week as the television networks have reported on the devastating earthquake that struck the Bay Area of California.

It has been of particular interest to those of us who had lived in that area. Carol and I lived for a couple of years in the San Francisco area shortly after we were married.

Many of the scenes that we have watched this week on the TV reports have been very familiar.

Ye editor began his newspaper career as a sports reporter for the San Mateo Times. San Mateo is the city and county just to the south of San Francisco, on the Peninsula.

As a young reporter, one of my volunteered tasks was attending the games of the San Francisco Giants, the 49ers, and the (then brand new) Oakland Raiders. It was a tough assignment, but someone had to do it.

We made the comment this week that if we had remained in Northern California, and had not become homesick for our area of Texas (which we did), then ye editor would most likely have been among those in the press box on Tuesday evening at Candlestick Park, awaiting the third game of the World Series.

We had had the opportunity of seeing a number of the Giants' games at Candlestick Park in 1960 and 1961. The summer of 1960 was the park's first year to be open for baseball, so we recall it as a brand new facility.

In fact, this old country boy covered the 1961 Major League All-Star Game for his newspaper, and watched the likes of Willie Mays, Stan Musial, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris perform on a windy day at "The Stick."

A lot has been written and said about Candlestick Park in the years since it opened. Most critics assail the fact that its location is bad because of the winds which often blow in from the ocean. At the 1961 all-star game, for example, Giants' pitcher Stu Miller, a small player, was blown off the mound by a gust of wind. This may sound strange, but it's recorded in the game story, and this reporter was a witness.

It is very sad that some of the old Victorian homes, and other buildings which had survived the San Francisco Earthquake of 1906 were destroyed in last week's earthquake.

But it also is quite a testimony to the planning by the city that the new buildings, which have been constructed since the Ellises lived in the Bay area, stood the test.

Can you imagine how frightening it must have been, especially for those folks from Oakland, who had to find an alternate route back to their homes Tuesday, after the Bay Bridge had to be closed due to the damage?

To have had their main route already damaged, and travelling in the dark on an alternate route must have been a terrifying experience. I think most of those people used the Golden Gate Bridge, which turned out not to be hurt by the earthquake.

We had been across the Bay Bridge on a number of occasions, and just crossing one of those bridges on normal occasions was enough excitement for a flatlander from the Panhandle of Texas.

Going into San Francisco from San Mateo, you had to watch carefully for the right exit, and if you missed the last one, you would find yourself on the bridge to Oakland. This happened to ye editor on one occasion. Nothing to do but cross the bridge, find a place to turn around, pay your toll, and come back across. One time, and you learn your lesson!

We're glad for our memories that we have of the Bay Area, and are heartened by the attitudes of those who live there, who vow to overcome this latest tragedy, and we know they will.

## Bovina Observes Red Ribbon Week

People in Bovina are aware of the drug problem in our town and across our country but this week, "Red Ribbon Week" focuses attention on the problem.

It is a real good promotion for our town and many have been involved in putting red ribbons on all the businesses, wearing ribbons to let people know that "My Choice...Drug Free," as the slogan printed on the ribbons reads.

Schools will be emphasizing anti-drug messages all week and some students will have classroom programs and special events to go with the Red Ribbon theme.

On Wednesday of this week, everyone is asked to wear red but all week long, red will be stylish, as this week the whole nation will be in a campaign to end drug abuse.

The schedule of activities this

## Substitute Q.B. Leads Bovina Over Eagles

The Bovina High School Mustangs rolled to a 47-0 win over the Ropes Eagles in Bovina's Homecoming Game last Friday. The game was called in the third quarter when Bovina scored their seventh touchdown, due to the 45-point rule for six-man football.

Sophomore quarterback Hector Guevara played the entire game as signal-caller for Bovina, stepping in after regular starter Juan Reyna re-hurt an ankle Thursday night.

"Guevara did a great job on short notice. He has been serving as quarterback for our 'scout team' in workouts, and has been doing a great job. We wanted to give Juan the week off to try to let his ankle heal," said Coach Terry Bean.

The Mustangs took the lead in the first quarter when Guevara hit Rey DeLaRosa on a 28-yard pass play good for a touchdown. The same combination worked for the PAT, as Bovina took a 7-0 lead.

Later in the opening period, Manuel Porras ran 20 yards for a touchdown. The kick attempt failed, so Bovina's lead was 13-0.

In the second quarter, Ropesville's woes continued, when Andy

Stormes recovered an Eagle fumble in the end zone for six points. Robert Guevara kicked for two PATs, and the Mustangs had a 21-0 lead.

Before the half ended, Hector Guevara hooked up with Jimmy Don Gilbreath on an eight-yard scoring pass. The kick failed following the touchdown, but Bovina took a 27-0 lead to the dressing room.

In the third quarter, the Mustangs picked up right where they left off before halftime. Rusty Venable hauled in a 16-yard pass from Manuel Porras for a touchdown as the lead became 33-0. A kick for PATs was no good.

Then Porras broke loose on a 21-yard scoring play for his second touchdown. Hector Guevara made the kick good for two points, and Bovina's lead was stretched to 41-0.

Robert Guevara got in on the touchdown parade by running 49 yards to paydirt for the score that made Bovina's lead 47-0.

Since the touchdown passed the 45-0 six-man scoring limit, no PAT was attempted following Bovina's last touchdown.

Guevara completed seven of nine passes for 104 yards and two touchdowns.

The Mustangs rolled up 288

yards rushing and 408 total yards in the abbreviated game. Bovina led in first downs, 12-4.

Helping the Mustangs' cause were five turnovers committed by the Eagles, four fumbles and one pass interception.

Coach Bean singled out Hector Guevara for offensive honors in the game, coming in on short notice to do the quarterbacking, and doing a good job.

Defensively, he credited defensive tackles Jimmy Don Gilbreath and Manuel Porras, both seniors, for outstanding performances.

In halftime ceremonies, Donna Griggs was crowned "Homecoming Queen" and Manuel Porras "Homecoming King" for 1989.

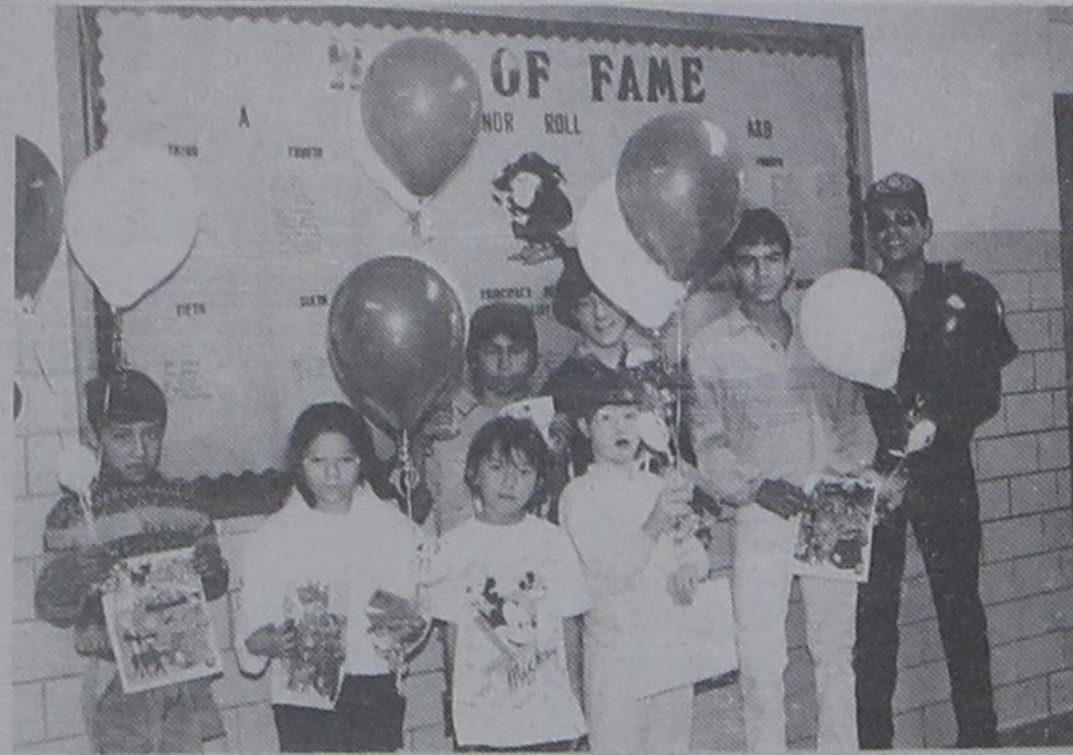
