In particular, the statement applies to the sudden emergence of George W. Bush, who was swept into the Texas governor's office in the anti-Clinton, anti-incumbent tidal wave on Tuesday.

For instance, consider the fact that in the only other political race of Bush's career, he was fairly soundly defeated in 1982 by Kent Hance, when the pair locked horns to become the replacement of longtime Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock, who had just retired.

What Ye Editor remembers most about the Bush-Hance race of 1982 was when the then future president's son scheduled a meeting in Bovina, where he hoped to meet the folks of Parmer County and discuss the issues.

Ye Editor was in his Bovina Blade office the day advertised for Bush's appearance, and at the appointed hour, picked up his camera and sauntered over to the Bank's community room to help George W. greet his public.

Bush was there, putting out his pre-printed materials, as I came in and introduced myself. About five or ten minutes later, Bovinian Fred O'Hair came wandering into the room, and although we didn't realize it at the time, that was the crowd!

Naturally we were embarrassed by the lack of a turnout, even if Bovina voters hadn't planned to vote for Bush (which they didn't--Parmer County gave a landslide to their Dimmitt neighbor).

But we recall that Bush was unshaken, and spent the entire time visiting with Fred and myself, and when it was about time for him to depart, I snapped a picture of the candidate with his audience, for that week's Bovina Blade.

George W. could have stayed a few minutes, and told the two of us, "Well, thanks for coming by, fellows, but I think I'll head on up to Hereford." But he didn't. Just like the old story about the Baptist minister on the snowy Sunday morning in the rural church with one brave soul able to make it to the church, Bush gave us his "whole sermon."

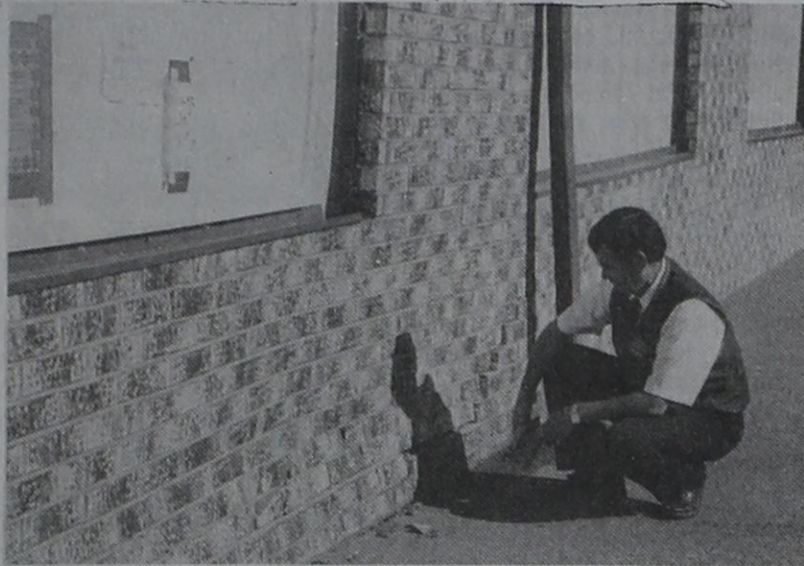

I know next time I'll insist that Carol come along. And we'll stop and get Scooter and Jim. I'm sure that Fred O'Hair would be there.

## Local Grocery Store Has Structural Damage

Bovina's Pay-n-Save Super Market, located at 800 Highway 86, has come up with a big problem, but according to store manager, Joe Olvera, hopefully the reconstruction can begin in a week or so to repair the damage.

The grocery store was built in 1976 by owners, Billy Whitecotton and Billy Smith. It was built where the Vestal residence had been located and there was a basement below the house.

When the house was torn down it was also burned and the old pieces of burned lumber were dumped in the basement hole, along with a lot of debris and tree limbs, according to Billy Smith.

A week ago Tuesday one of the employees, Bonnie Scaff, was walking toward her car out front when she noticed the outside of the building looked as though someone had bumped into it because the brick was cracked and caved inward.

She called Joe Olvera and then it was noticed a large area on the inside of the wall was sinking and the tile cracking.

The floor has come loose from the inside wall and there is a three

or four inch space between the floor and inside wall.

Olvera said the rain gutter between the wall and the sidewalk had also caused the hole underneath to become larger.

Danny Skaggs, supervisor, living in Odessa was contacted and he suggested that Joe contact local contractors to repair the damage. Galen Hromas and B.J. Charles observed the damage and decided they didn't have the right equipment to do the job.

The owner, Roger Lowe of Littlefield, has been contacted and all agree that it is a big problem!

Olvera said the grand opening at the present location was held in August of 1976 and he began working at the store three months later.

Joe is urging all shoppers and youngsters in the area to stay away from the area which is now blocked off until the repair is completed.

## Local Hospital District Shows Recent Growth and Progress

The future looks good for health care in Parmer County according to Hospital Administrator Bill Neely and Clinic Administrator Marilyn Watson.

Since the new hospital district went into effect in early 1990, replacement of old equipment and recruitment of more doctors and PAs have been the primary targets for both the hospital and clinics.

Parmer County Hospital and the Rural Health Clinics are separate entities, but they work together in offering the finest possible health care to residents of this area.

Both administrators feel that the recent re-opening of the Bovina Clinic is a great stride forward in offering better service to the people.

The hospital, being one of the largest employers in the county, has 71 employees with a payroll of a million and a quarter in 1993. The Friona and Bovina Rural Health Clinics employ 19 people, including three doctors and two PAs.

Dr. Bob Alexander is the "granddaddy" of the physicians' staff, having been in Friona for nearly 30 years. Physician's Assistant Linda Conlee has been here two years. Dr. Felipe Jubay and Dr. Anthony Orme have both been with the staff for one year. PA Jose Perez is the newest member of the group, having been here for just a few months.

Between 40 to 75 patients are seen per day in the clinics during the regular work week, according to Marilyn Watson.

Bill Neely indicates that, as the newer physicians build a good patient base, the hospital will be more in use in the future. Currently, the 34 bed hospital has an average of four patients per day. Government regulations affect the

expenses of running the hospital regardless of the number of patients in the facility at any one time.

New hospital equipment and services are now making it possible for area residents to be treated at the local facility more often, instead of being transferred to hospitals in larger cities.

For instance, proceeds from the recent charity golf tournament went to purchase a portable X-ray machine, which can be used in the trauma unit or taken to patient rooms when the patient is too ill to be moved to the X-ray room. The hospital is expecting delivery of the portable X-ray in the near future.

A traveling portable CAT-scan unit is brought to Friona two days each week and has been a great diagnostic aid to the physicians' staff. The hospital now has the facilities to do ultra-sound exams, plus a tele-radiography element enables the doctors to transmit the

image of an X-ray film to a radiologist in another city for interpretation.

A permanent and impressive new X-ray examination room was installed last February and boasts the latest in technological equipment of this type.

Since 1990, the lab has been equipped with automated chemistry equipment for blood testing. This better serves the physicians who no longer have to wait while specimens are sent away to reference labs for testing.

Proceeds from the last two years' "Christmas Card Project," sponsored by Modern Study Club, have purchased two new I.V. pumps and a pulse oximeter. Other new items in the hospital include two new defibrillators in the CCU, new transcription equipment and a microfilm processor which speeds the retrieval of patient records.

## Voters Join Nation In 'Throwing Bums Out'

Friona and Parmer County voters turned out in record numbers for a mid-term election on Tuesday, to join those across the state and nation in their anti-Democratic and anti-incumbent mood.

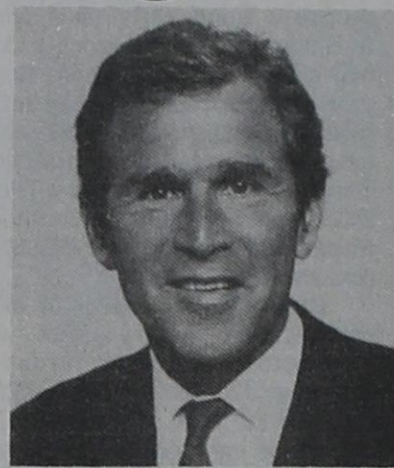
Local voters even extended this trend to the one contested county-wide race, where incumbent Marjorie Watkins was edged by challenger Sandra Warren, 1285 to 1173 in the race for Parmer County District Clerk.

One exception was in Friona's justice of the peace race, where incumbent Frances Euler won reelection with a 785-355 win over Republican challenger Reba Holt.

George W. Bush, who defeated incumbent Ann Richards in the governor's race with surprising ease state-wide, got an even heftier margin locally.

Bush won the three Friona voting boxes, 622-235, or 72.4 per cent. He won at Bovina, 184-137, a 57.3 per cent edge. In county totals, Bush received 1,726 votes to 794 for Richards, a 68.3 per cent margin.

Local voters also went overwhelmingly for Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison in her re-election bid over Richard Fisher. Ms.

Hutchison, who had a campaign stop in Friona, won in that community, 714-106, or a whopping 86.7 per cent margin. She won in Bovina, 257-82, or 75.8. Her margin countywide was 2,040-422, which is an 82.6 per cent margin.

Second only to Sen. Hutchison's vote margin in Parmer County, incumbent state Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry polled 1,880 votes to 462 for Gregory and 12 for Garland.

Perry also has made visits to Parmer County, including serving

## G. Anderson Honored In A&M Ceremonies

Gabe Anderson of Bovina was recently honored by Texas A&M University-Lettermen's Association when he was inducted into the Hall of Honor for Distinguished Service. The award was presented for "loyalty, devotion, dedication and lasting contribution" to the Texas A&M University Department of Athletics.

The event was held in conjunction with the Athletic Hall of Fame awards at a formal dinner held at the Hilton Hotel in College Station. The following day, immediately preceding the A&M-Rice football game, he was honored on the football field and presented a

bronze plaque. His former roommate of four years at A&M, Major General Wm. A. Becker (retired), presented the award.

Anderson received his commission as a Second Lieutenant, when he was sworn into the Army with the entire class of 1941 on graduation day at Texas A&M. He served in World War II in the North African invasion and the Italian Campaign for three years and was discharged as a Major.

He entered the grain storage elevator business in 1947 at Bovina and is president and CEO of Sheryler-Anderson Grain Elevators in this area with headquarters at Bovina.

Anderson has served as president of the Aggie Club (now the 12th Man Foundation) and was on the executive committee three years. He is a Century Club member and endowed member of the 12th Man Foundation at Texas A&M. He currently serves on the Developmental Council of the School of Business and is a member of the Chancellor's Advisory Committee.

Members of the Anderson family attending the award ceremonies included his wife, Anita; David and Lucy Anderson of Lubbock; Tom and Terri Nichols and four sons of Farwell; and the Anderson grandchildren--Alexis, Wellsley and Gabe IV of Amarillo.

Neely also notes that they are now able to take advantage of the commodity food program and that a hospice service has been in effect for the past two years. Plus, the Home Health Service is now a little over a year old and over 700 visits per month are being made through this service.

He indicates that support from Friona, Bovina and the other communities throughout the county, have been most beneficial to the progress made at the hospital. For instance, the lighted and paved parking lot, helio-pad and lighted wind sock, came about through assistance from the EMS and Friona City employees.

"We're a lot better able to serve the patients now than we were in 1990," Neely said. "A great deal of this is due to the support of the community and, in time, other changes will come to pass that will be of further progress."

He also indicates that members of the Hospital Board of Directors have put in a lot of time and effort in effecting many of these changes and advancements. Wendell Gresham serves as president of the board, Dr. Dale Schueler of Rhea is vice president, and Dennis Anthony is secretary. Board members are Anne Corn of Bovina and Danny Kendrick of Friona.

When asked if the hospital sees a goal of resuming surgery services or delivering babies in the future, Neely said "Not at the present time, but we are certainly open to that if a physician comes to us and requests it."

He feels that the recruitment of the new doctors and PAs is, by far, the greatest recent accomplishment of the hospital and clinics.

Employees of the Friona and Bovina Rural Health Clinics are: Dr. Robert Alexander, Dr. Felipe Jubay, Dr. Anthony Orme, PA Jose Perez and PA Linda Conlee, who serves the Bovina Clinic. - 2 cups brown sugar
- 1 egg, unbeaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1-1/2 cup oats
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- 3/4 cup chopped nuts

Cream shortening and sugar together. Then add unbeaten egg and beat well. Add other ingredients and drop by spoonful on greased cookie sheet. Bake about 10 or 12 minutes at 350 degrees.

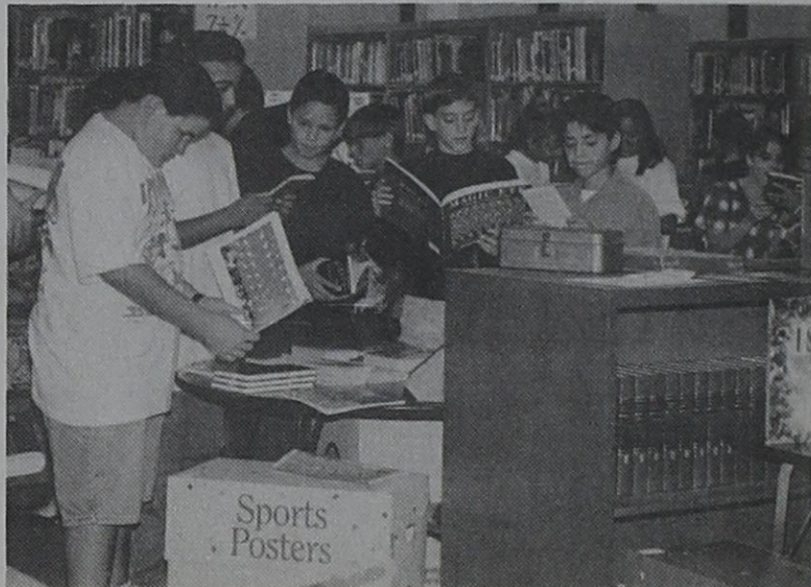

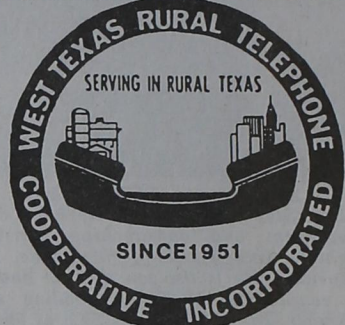
