December Postal Receipts up Nearly 50 Per Cent

Austin, Feb. 2.-December postal receipts, totaling \$5,779,388 in 61 Texas cities, were 49 per cent above November's and 18 per cent greater than in December 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.



Texas Building Permits Rise 30 Per Cent From Year Earlier

Austin, Feb. 2 .- Texas building permits issued in December rose 30 per cent from a year earlier, the ness Research reported.

7 per cent below November.

After adjustment for seasonal variations, the Bureau's index of building permits dropped 29 per cent from November to 545 per cent of the prewar (1935-39) base level. A year ago the index stood at 417.

Building permits were more than doubled from November to December in Kennedy, Kerrville, Longview and Wichita Falls. Smaller gains ranged from a 5-per-cent increase in San Angelo to a 98-per-cent jump in Lockhart.

November - to - December declines varied from a 5-per-cent decrease in Dallas to a 79-per-cent drop in Bor-

In comparison with December, 1948, large advances in building permits were turned in by Amarillo, Brownsville, Childress, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Kennedy, Kerrville, Longview, Pampa and Sweet-


