Bloodmobile Sets Visit Here Friday

Bovina residents are once again urged to be ready to give blood this Friday, September 13.

"Know that no virus, no disease, no illness of any kind can be transferred to you, the donor, by the process of giving blood. Each donor is furnished new, sterile equipment for your donation. This equipment is broken and discarded in sealed containers so no one can re-use it," says the Coffee Memorial Blood Center in Amarillo.

Residents would like to know that when our family or any family needs this life sustaining product, it will be available.

For each pint given here in Bovina, the community is given a "credit." When anyone from here or anyone in Bovina wishes to designate blood to sustain someone's life, they can receive it and \$10 will be taken off the price of each pint, if they are in hospitals who honor this program.

Bovina now has 34 credits from the March 1985 drive that are usable until March, 1986.

Each pint donated next Friday will count as one credit good until September, 1986.

Bovina has never used any of these credits. If you have a family member or know of any Bovina person who needs blood up to

Enrollment Has Gain

Bovina schools began their 1985-86 school term, with an enrollment increase for the first week of school.

The enrollment breakdown showed 349 in kindergarten through eighth grade, and 109 in high school.

Last year's figures showed 323 in kindergarten through eighth grade and 130 in high school.

Sherley Grain Elevator has also received their first load of milo which came in September 4 by Ken Sorley. He will be receiving a \$50 bonus for having the first load.

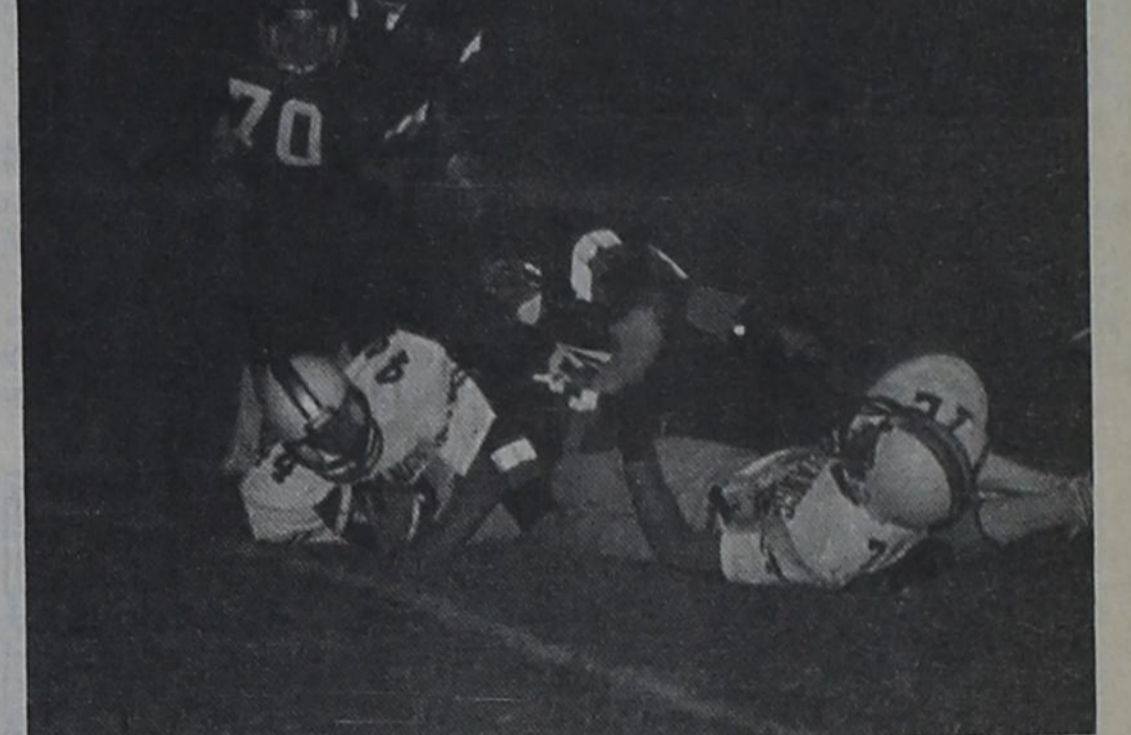
Free Cheese

Talley Hopeful Despite 35-0 Loss

Bovina head coach Bill Talley was philosophical about his team's 35-0 loss to the Happy Cowboys at Happy last Friday night.

"We improved considerably from our Vega scrimmage. We moved the ball well at times, and I was pleased with that. We just try to do the best we can each game, and show some improvement," Talley said.

The Mustang head coach said he felt the team did some good things, but just was not consistent in their play. "We made some mental errors that hurt us. We played a HARD game, but not a SMART game, and I'll take the blame for that," he said.

Bovina quarterback Blake Scaff suffered a slight shoulder separation on the third play of the second half and missed the rest of the game, which further hampered the Mustang cause. Scaff was told by doctors he would be out a week. Whether that means he will miss the team's game with Nazareth this week is not certain at this point.

Blake's younger brother Scott Scaff, a freshman, finished up as

the team's signal-caller. The shoulder injury was caused when the person carrying the down marker failed to drop it so Scaff would not crash into the steel pole.

Talley pointed out that Bovina had some penalties at crucial points, and some critical turnovers, which hurt their cause against Happy.

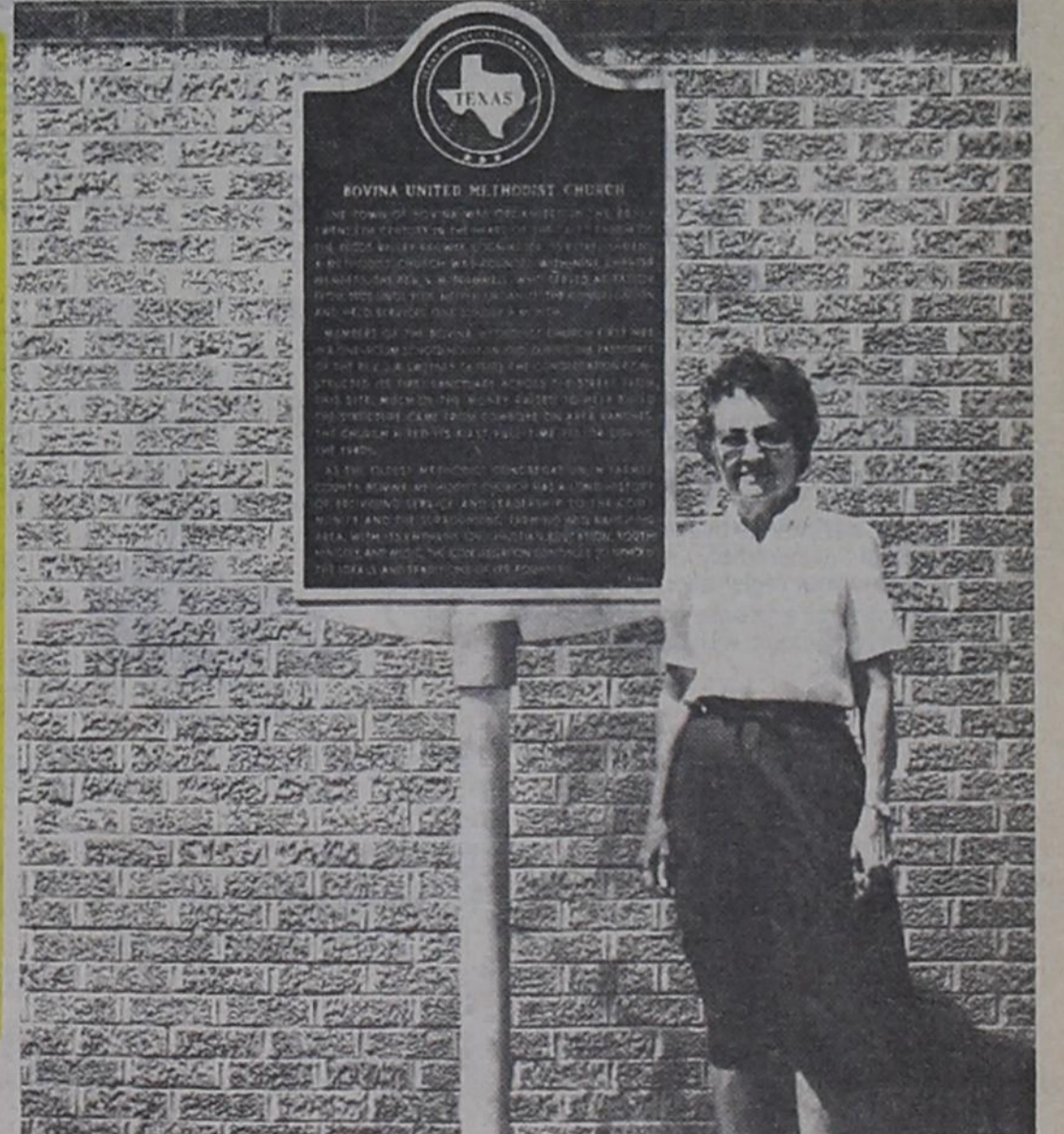
He gave plaudits to Terry Moore at defensive end, and Scott Sudderth at cornerback, for good performances on defense.

"After looking at the film, I felt we played better than 35-0. But it was the small things that hurt us," Talley said.

The new Bovina coach said the squad was up to 20 or 21 people, its high point in numbers, and he was glad for that.

This week the Ponies host Nazareth, a team which was ranked in the state's top ten teams for class A prior to the season. The Swifts were surprised, 21-0, by Lubbock Christian in their season opener, and could be somewhat aroused for their game this week.

"For our sake, I wish they had waxed L.C.C.," Talley said.
