Last year's figures showed 323 in kindergarten through eighth grade and 130 in high school.

This year's kindergarten enrollment has an oddity of sorts. Of the 55 students enrolled in the group, 47 are girls and only eight are boys.







PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 She carried a cascade million of Texas Water Develop-

Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.
