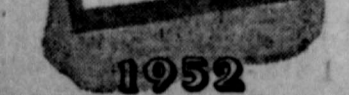

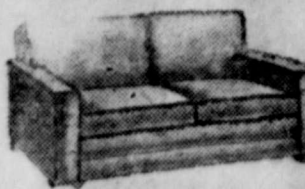

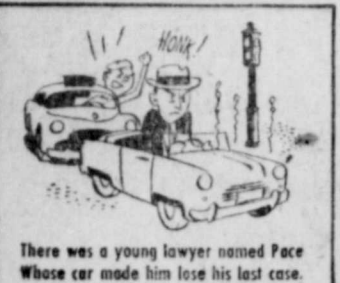

What we want to know is, what size fish was Ira catching while

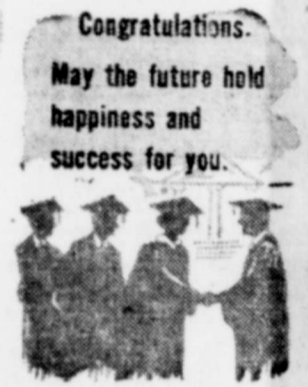
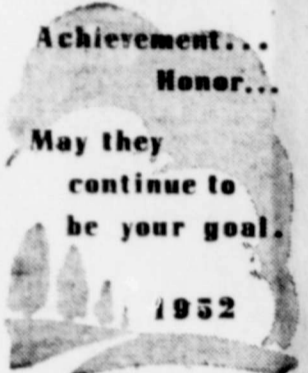
