
# **Ex-Bovinan Exhibits** Heroism In San Angelo

A former Bovina resident, Adam Mejia, was instrumental in saving the life of a man who lives in the same apartment complex as Mejia in San Angelo.

On June 16, just after 7 p.m., Mejia called Billie Chisum, manager of the Chimney Rock Apartments, to say he was hearing his downstairs neighbor calling for help. The man's apartment door was locked, Mejia explained, so he couldn't get in.

"We unlocked the door and found the man lying on the couch. He is a diabetic, and his blood sugar had slipped very low without his realizing it. He had apparently passed out, and when he came to, he was not able to move." Chisum said.

"All he could do was call out. Adam Mejia immediately called 911. We gave the man orange juice, which helped some. The fire department ambulance arrived in a matter of minutes.



Adam Mejia is a graduate of Bovina High School, and is the brother of Gilda Garner and Esther Steelman, Bovina residents.





Not that you care. Especially if you are a nonsmoker. Don't worry, you'll get yours when the state sues the fast food industry. That'll be different for you won't it?

When the State of Texas filed a lawsuit against Big Tobacco a few years back, Attorney General Dan Morales hired five private personal injury lawyers to try the case.

They engineered a deal that paid them \$3.3 BILLION in legal fees. The clients in the case were the people of Texas. The Big Tobacco lawsuit was settled for \$17 BILLION.

In Mr. Butler's article he says, "In fact, it required three years, thousands of hours of legal work, and a decision by the United States Supreme Court to make these

Butler writes that three and sleazy would you be for Bobby, P.C., whose main other prominent lawyers, one a former president of the Texas Bar Association, made sworn statements that they were asked, but refused, to make a \$1 million payment in order to join the team of private lawyers working for the state.

In other words, there was so much money at stake, Morales gave lawyers an opportunity to "buy-in" the

In addition to the \$3.3 BILLION in fees, Butler says the five were reimbursed \$40 million in expenses. And the contract they signed with the state was "changed" numerous times while the lawsuit was going on, no doubt to their benefit.

If you divide the \$3.3 BILLIÓN five ways, each lawyer would receive \$660 million. That is \$904,109 every day, seven days a week, for two years. Or to make it clearer, \$660 million divides out to \$37,671 per hour, every hour, every day, for two years.

Multiply the numbers by five and you see the concern of Attorney General Cornyn and John Butler. How can they justify the money for the actual hours spent? They

Lawyers will argue that the five could have ended up with nothing, zip, nada. They will say that the five lawyers took the case on a contingency fee basis and if Big Tobacco had won the lawyers wouldn't have gotten a dime.

The question remains whether the five paid money to Morales for a contract, whether they lied about the amount and time of expenses incurred in the case, and did they have conflicts of interest and breach their responsibility to their clients, the people of Texas.

You'll never find out. They are not talking. And the money Big Tobacco is paying to the state is not all going to medical care for sick smokers like it was intended.

If the five lawyers haven't done anything wrong, why can't they just explain that \$150,000 an hour is not unreasonable for a good lawyer. Especially if it saves one smoker.

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Lottie Bails, a former resident.

By LOTTIE BAILS I was born in Childress County, Texas on October 26,

1922 to Bert and Ida Hadley. In 1925 our family moved to a farm ten miles south of Friona and lived there until 1959 when my parents sold their farm and moved to

I met Leo Bails who worked for several farmers around the Friona area. We were married on November 1, 1940.
