

Mustangs Play Big Time At Dick Bivins

Bovina's matchup with a narrow 13-6 win. the Amarillo Tascosa JV at Dick Bivins Stadium was a treat for the young Mustangs in more ways than one.

and big school atmosphere at Dick Bivins Stadium makes it a popular venue for playoff games with schools of all classifications.

Last Thursday, October 3, the Mustangs got a treat as they took on Tascosa under the lights. In what Head Coach Bruce Scroggins called "the best game Bovina has played since I've been the coach," the Mustangs turned 61 rushes for 288 yards into



The Mustang defense came together under the big time lights, allowing the Tascosa JV only 140 rushing The unique artificial turf yards and 29 yards passing, with a pass interception by Jonathan Chisom that stopped a Tascosa touchdown drive.

Chisom also led the



offense with 22 carries for 100 yards. Nemecio Rodriguez carried 17 times for 68 yards, quarterback Jeff Casas matched with 12 carries and 76 yards, and John Nelson added 10 carries for 44 yards. The Mustangs stuck to

the ground attack as they were 0 for 2 in passing.

Rodriguez scored in the first quarter, Mike Nieto kicked the extra point, then Casas legged out a 13 yard touchdown in the fourth quarter of the closely fought defensive battle.

Final score, Bovina 13, Tascosa JV 6. Bovina enters the district competition with a respectable 3-2 record after going 1-9 on the season last year.

Coming up the next three weeks will be the toughest part of District 4-1A as the Mustangs take on Hart there October 11, Springlake-Earth at home October 18, then Nazareth at Nazareth October 25.


