

Legislators were getting ready this week to tackle again the teacher pay problem as Gov. Shivers put out the word that a special session is coming up soon.

Gov. Shivers' move came quickly after a committee unanimously approved a compromise plan to raise teacher-pay \$402 per year. The committee was appointed by the governor and the Texas State Teachers Association.

Estimated cost of the proposed salary increase is \$23 million per year. The committee's bill, however, does not include a method of financing the cost.

School Superintendent H. W. Stilwell of Texarkana told committee that the governor had indicated the subject of more tax revenue might be submitted to legislators if the money is not in sight from other sources.

Although the bill provides that the pay increase would not start until the 1954-55 school year, Mr. Stilwell said he is hopeful that

In location for a garden these things should be considered: good soil, the lay of the land, water supply and adequate light.

> They emphasized to keep gardens small, plant just what you can care for well. They stressed the importance of having the tools you need to make gardening work easier and more pleasant. They said buy all your seeds at one time.

They told of garden dusts and sprays to use for "Insect Control." Now is the time to start controlling cutworms and wireworms. One good way is to apply 10 per cent chlordane or 10 per cent DDT dust to the open furrow and work into the soil just before setting out plants and planting.


