MAIL FROM THE Texas Press Association this week included the results of "Texas Consumer Survey '84," the largest and most comprehensive study ever conducted on readership, listening, viewing and shopping habits.

Since we have a major investment in the local news and advertising business, we thought we'd share with our readers and advertisers some of the highlights of the report.

The survey showed that: *86.3 per cent of Texans read a newspaper every week, with 80 per cent reading their local community newspaper; *70 per cent of Texas newspaper readers usually read local merchant ads, and *87.6 per cent of the readers say that the ads in their local newspaper are important to them personally.

Other findings of the survey showed: *72 per cent of local newspaper readers responding were married; *over 50 per cent of the families subscribing to local papers comprise three or more people and *79.4 per cent of Texas newspaper readers own their own homes.

"Texas newspapers represent quite a choice from the major direct mailers who often don't even pay state taxes, and the electronic media which must share its hour-by-hour audience with about 50 competitors."

The massive survey was under the supervision of Dr. Ernest Larkin, director of the Journalism Research Center, University of Oklahoma.

Bovina came out with another threat in the third quarter. Johnson ran seven yards, and Johnny Villarreal six, for a first down, and the Ponies looked like they had it together. But Friona's Aguirre stepped in front of a Villarreal pass to snuff out the rally, and set up another Friona

That was it for Bovina, until they mustered their touchdown drive late in the game, on which Villarreal and Johnson did the ball-carrying.

"We looked good in spots, but then we'd find a way to selfdestruct," said Coach Harold Hill.

The game was tough physically on the Mustangs. Guard Todd Glasscock sustained a strained knee, and is to see a specialist with his injury. End Craig Pearson had a bruised knee, but will be able to play this week.

Johnson led the Mustang offense with 89 yards in 23 tries, followed by Villarreal with 69 yards in nine carries.

Hill said that three members of the team--Terry Glasscock, David McKillip and Todd Ware--played Friday in spite of having a virus.
