Her look of astonishment convinced me that football jargon is just a language of its own.

It will also be free advertisement for the booths and be on the highway for people to see and if they can't stop one time, likely they will remember and make an effort to be there for the next Trade Days.

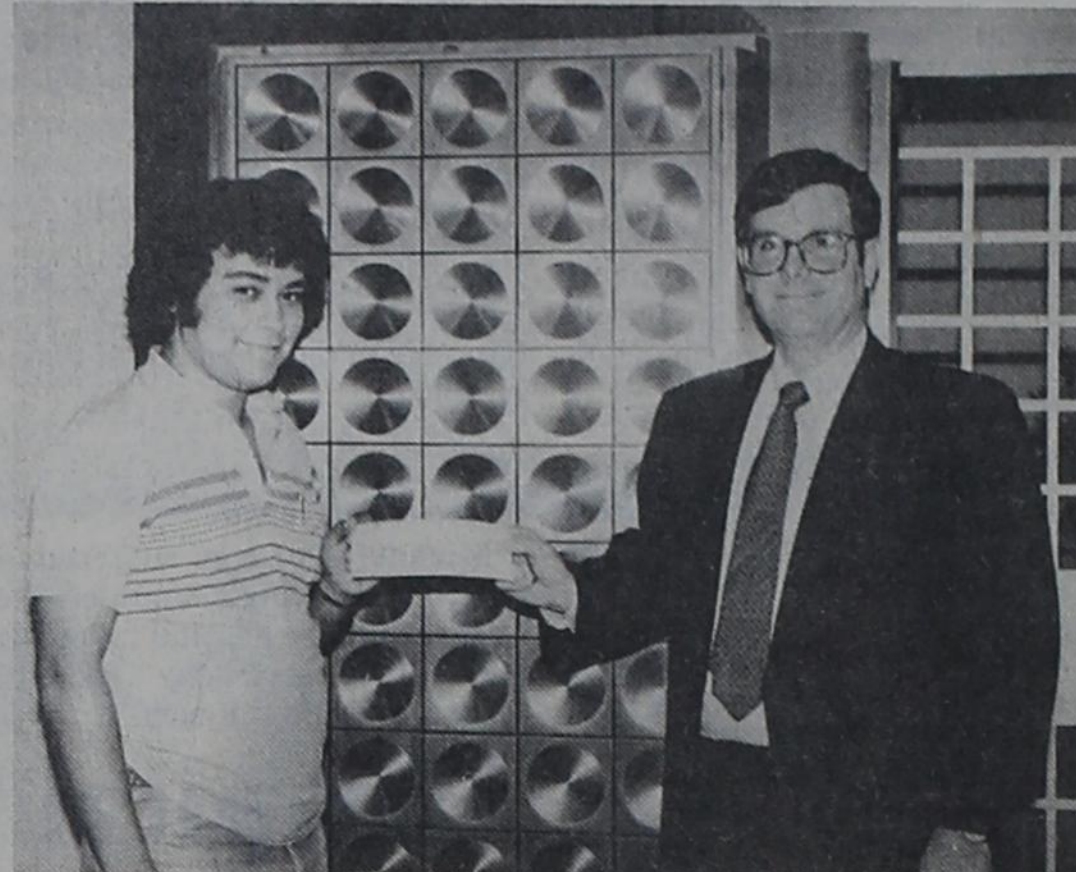
There will be another meeting of the Trade Days committee at the Bovina Mustang Drive-In on Tuesday, October 9 and everyone is invited to meet with them.

Bovina's Mustangs carried the fight to the Farwell Steers in their game at Farwell last Friday, leading the favored Steers twice in the game, before a couple of defensive lapses resulted in scores in the 28-10 loss.

Bovina broke out on top in the game, after recovering a Farwell fumble near midfield. On a third down play, Blake Scaff found Doug Johnson racing downfield, Johnson caught the ball and went in for the score.

Todd Ware's kick gave the Mustangs a 7-0 lead.

Farwell came back on a 60-yard run by Roger Robertson to score. The Steers scored a two-point conversion run by Blake Kelly, to take an 8-7 lead in the game.

Later in the second quarter, Bovina made its second fumble recovery and drove about 30 yards before the drive bogged down. Ware came in to kick a 30-yard field goal, which gave Bovina a 10-8 lead.

Farwell took advantage of a short kickoff and good field position, and Robertson ran about 40 yards to the Bovina two. He scored later, for a 14-10 Farwell lead.

In the third quarter, Farwell put together a 60-yard touchdown drive, and Kelly's run again made two points after the touchdown, for a 22-10 lead.

Later in the game, the Steers took over after a short Bovina punt, and drove 30 yards for their final score.

Bovina had drives in both the third and fourth quarters, but each time the drives bogged down. The Mustangs had six turnovers, and Farwell five in the game, which was hampered by rain.

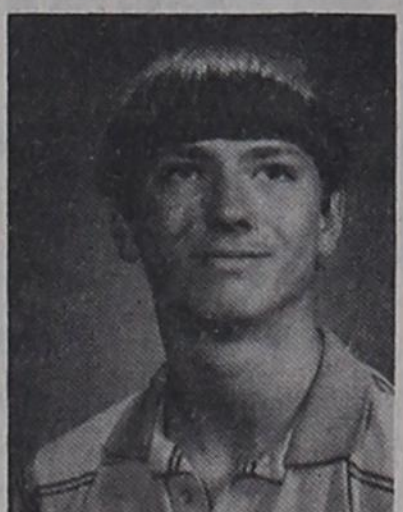

Boys Are Scholars

More than 300 students attending West Texas State University as freshmen have been awarded \$200 Don and Sybil Harrington Scholarships for the 1984-85 academic year.

Scholarships are awarded each year to students who were members of high school National Honor Society chapters or similar organizations.

Don and Sybil Harrington honor scholars may receive an additional President's Honor Scholarship if they score 28 or more of a possible 36 on the American College Test (ACT) or 1,220 points of a possible 1,600 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) college entrance examinations. They receive an additional \$100.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarships were begun in 1979 with an endowment from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo. Additional grants have grown to a total endowment of \$1.2 million and students are eligible to retain the scholarship for four years at WTSU if they maintain a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

A competitive scholarship of \$200 or more at WTSU waives out-of-state tuition.

--School Corner--

In May of 1981 the legislature passed House Bill 246. This bill basically mandated that the State School Board and the Texas Education Agency begin revision of the curriculum in Texas schools.

The agency began the process immediately and in March of 1984 final approval was given the plan by the State School Board. For a period of nearly four years committees worked all across the state. They zeroed in on twelve subject areas which were: English language arts, mathematics, fine arts, other languages, vocational education, science, health, physical education, social studies, economics, business education, and Texas and United States history. In each of these areas a group of "essential elements" was listed. These elements basically stated what was to be taught in each area. Essential elements span all grade levels K-12 in each of the respective areas.

Texas is the only state that has gone through the process of making a major reform and a

renewal of standards for curriculum for students across the entire state. I believe it is a very important moment. However, the real work has now begun. It began at the start of this school year as teachers and administrators across the state began implementation of the new rules. HB 246, now known as Chapter 75, Texas Administrative Code, has changed all of our lives a bit. It has created some problems for us, but because of the quality teachers we have in our system, I have confidence that we will overcome these problems.

This bill represents a dramatic change for educators in this great state, but we have an even more dramatic change to contend with in HB 72 which came from the special session this past summer. I will discuss the impact of this bill next week. Meanwhile let me encourage each of you to contact the school if you have any questions or comments with regard to the way these changes effect your child. I will say again that for us to be successful home and school must work together.
