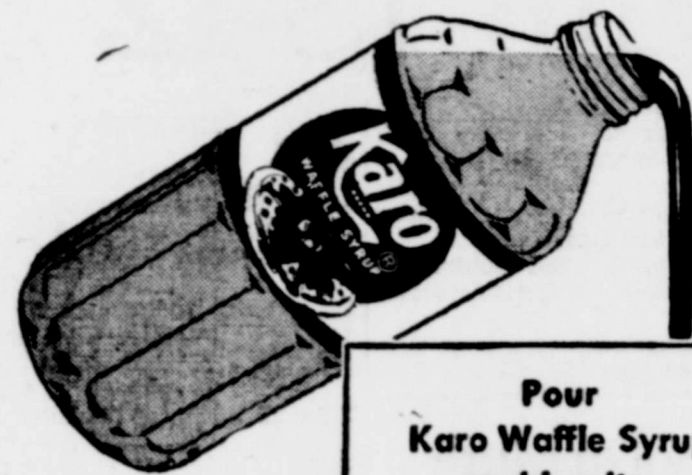

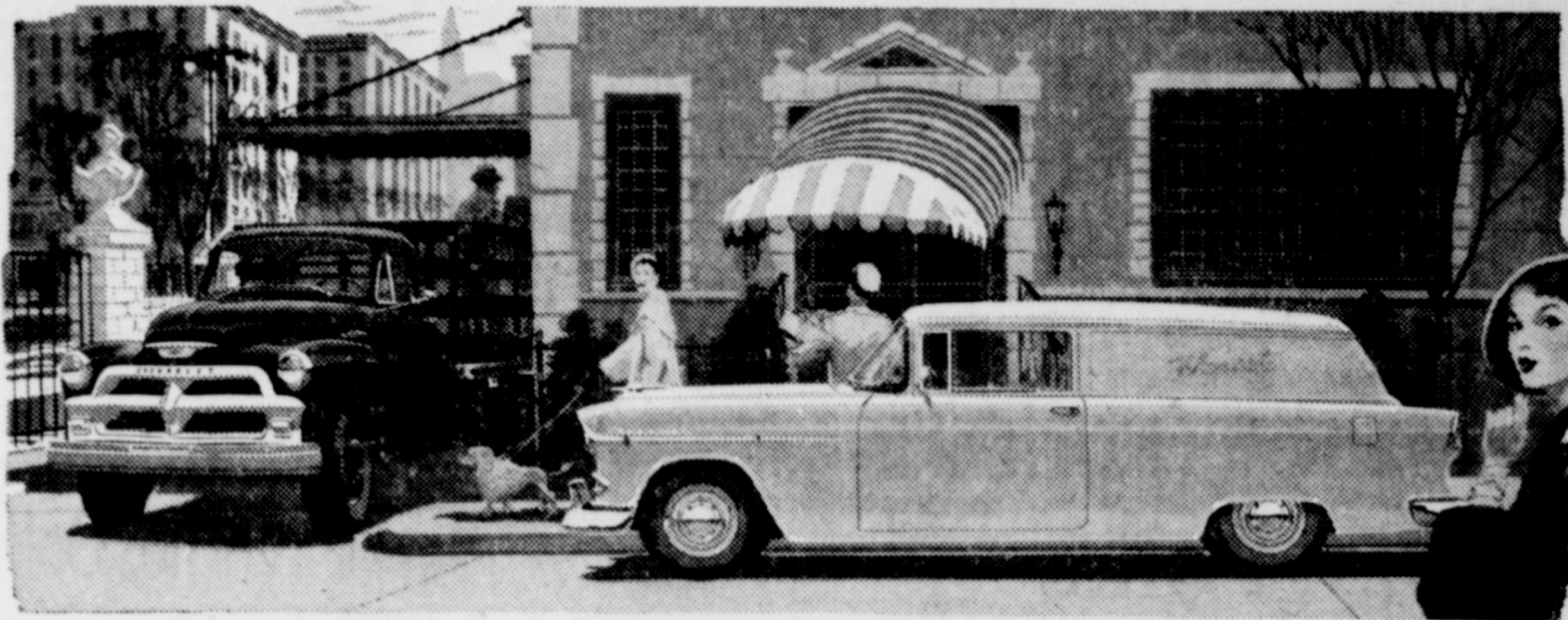

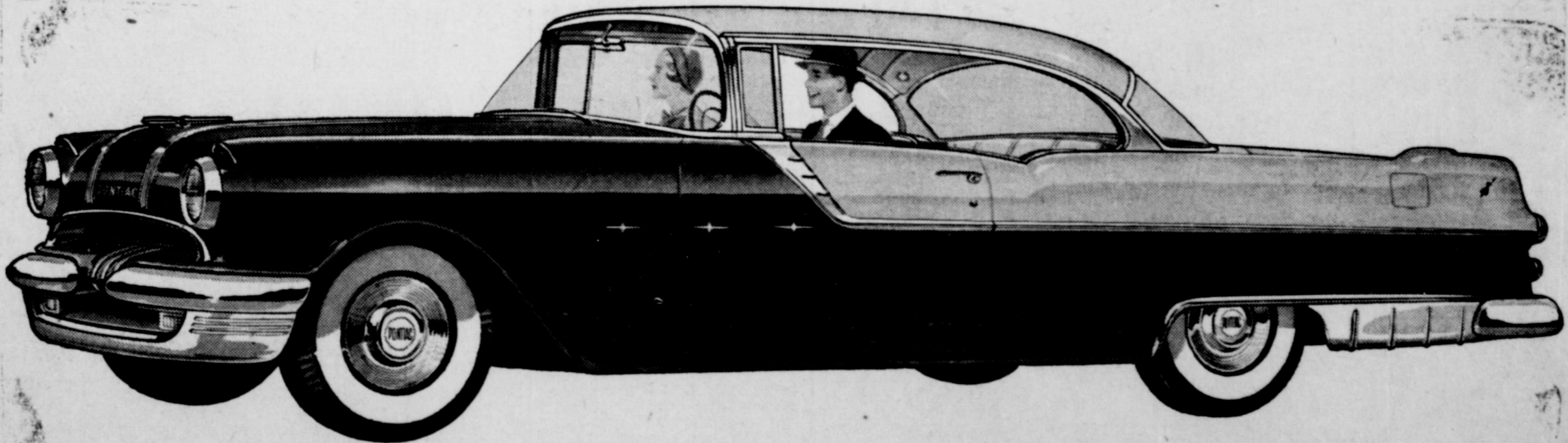

DEER HUNTERS ASKED TO GIVE HIDES OF KILL TO TB PATIENTS

Deer hunters are asked again this year to give TB patients in the state hospitals the hides from their season's kill. The buckskin provided in this way last year is now going into Christmas gifts for the patients are making for their families at home.

The hides should be lightly salted, marked "charity," addressed to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 South Lamar, Austin and shipped by motor freight. If this procedure is followed, most of the motor freight lines in Texas will transport the hides free of charge. Under their direction, the patients are converting the buckskin into such items as baby shoes, gloves, belts, purses, moccasins for their own use of the Christmas stockings at home.

Highway Patrol To Start Using Radar Meters

The Texas Highway Patrol will start using radar speed meters during November to bring high speed drivers on Texas highways under control.

The radar speed meter is the outgrowth of the radar used by American Armed Services during World War II and the War in Korea.

"Speed stands alone as a common factor that determines severity of accidents," stated W. J. Elliott, chief, Texas Highway Patrol.

In Texas, during the last five years, Texas has had 11,729 people killed in motor vehicle traffic accidents. Now 8,557 (72 per cent) of these victims were killed on rural roads.

These 8,557 traffic dead were killed in 6,934 rural fatal accidents. In 60 per cent of these accidents only one driver was involved. And in 37 per cent of these rural fatal accidents, the drivers did not collide with anything.

For the most part they simply ran off the roadway or turned over in the roadway.

A cow nursing a calf will need about 60 pounds of corn or grain sorghum silage or 20 pounds of Johnsongrass hay fed with two pounds of cottonseed meal or cake daily for winter maintenance. — A. & M.

LAYING HENS

Laying hens need plenty of fresh air but chilling drafts can cause trouble. Ventilate the laying house to prevent cross-ventilation. — A. & M.

With the holiday season just ahead, many of you with home

freezers may want to do some cooking ahead of time.
HOW TO MAKE FREEZING FOODS SUCCESSFUL
Freezing is a real time-saver when preparing main dishes such as meat loaves, stews and casseroles — if you follow a few suggestions for success.
DO—leave vegetables and macaroni slightly undone for freezing. Otherwise they will be soft when reheated. Vegetables which are fully cooked are also likely to have less color and flavor or be off-flavor.
DO—Freeze meat pies or turnovers with pastry crusts unbaked. Crusts baked after freezing will have fresher flavor and be more flaky and tender than those baked and then frozen.
DO—Cool the main dish quickly. Set the uncovered pan of food on ice or in ice water. Quick cooking stops the cooking and helps to keep the natural flavor, color and texture of the food. It also retards growth of bacteria that may cause spoilage.
DON'T — Add a cheese or

crumb topping to a casserole before freezing. Such toppings are best added when the food is reheated.
DON'T — Hold main dishes too long in frozen storage. For economical use of freezer space and tip top quality two or three months is long enough to hold main dishes in frozen storage.

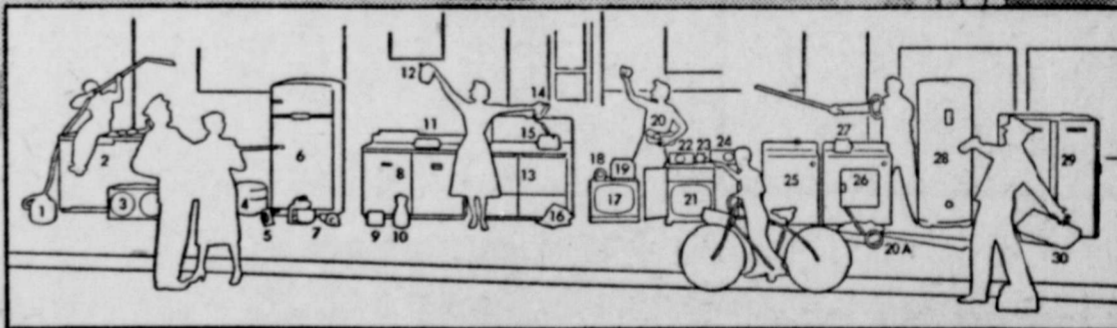

 This time it's a multi-pronged one in which the state auditor, the department of public safety and DeWitt County Attorney Wiley Cheatham are also interested.

Managing Editor R. K. Towery of the Cuero Record unearthed the story.
 He discovered that some Texas veterans in and around Cuero had signed up for what they thought was a free bonus of land, only to learn that they had purchased land with down payments they had never made.

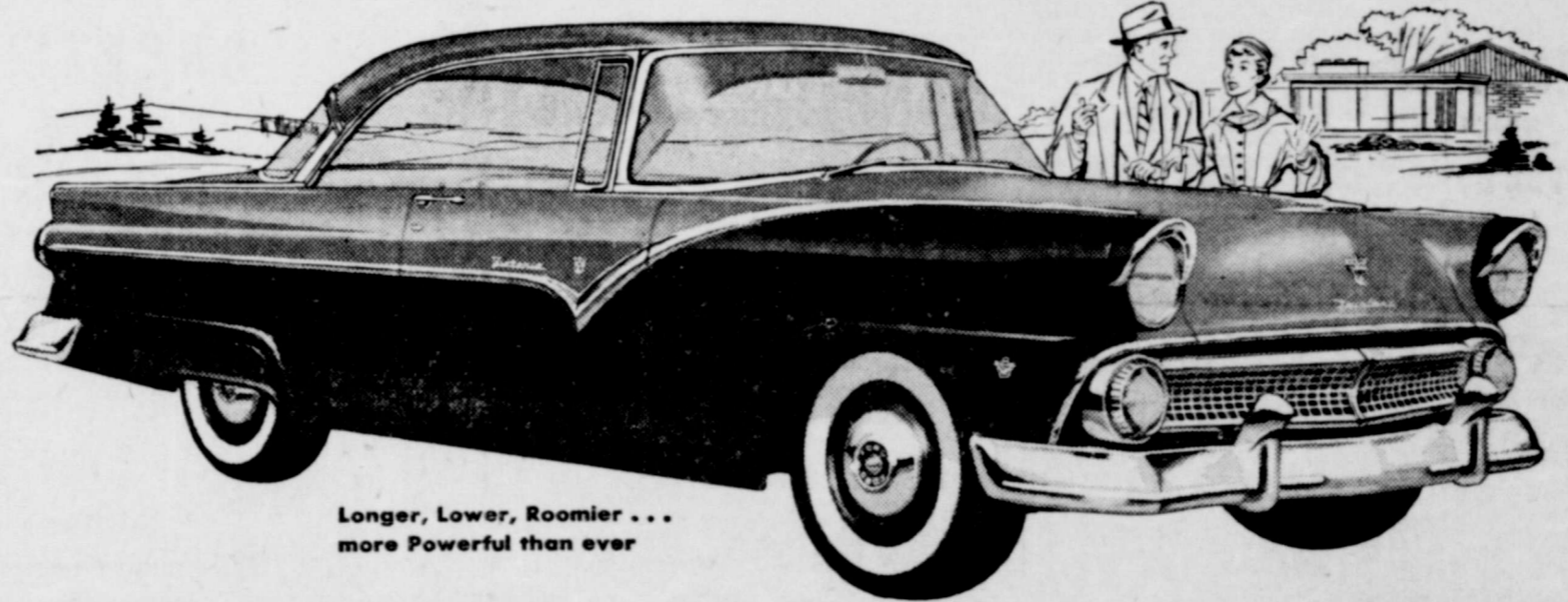

Then begin by checking your Christmas card list this week. Each address should include the full name, street and number, city, zone and state, he continued.

After this, visit the post office to order the stamps you'll need, advised Mr. Durham. Lay in a supply of heavy wrapping paper and strong cord as well.
