Rev. Sam Tullock Hurls Challenge At Today's Family

"The moral training of a child is the responsibility of the family," asserted Rev. Tullock. "Basic morality becomes in elemental fashion the province of the first grade teacher. Even religious training is delegated to some helpful volunteer Sunday School teacher for 30 minutes on alternate Sundays at best.

"Rightly balanced schools, both public and religious, are extensions of the home. At best all schools are family cooperatives but the one essential is family participation, not just at pancake suppers and football games either.

"I am one among many citizens of Merkel who are sold on the underlying motives, principals and techniques of our great public education system but I am also one who has discovered how much that great system needs what each family has to give," concluded Rev. Tullock.

"Father was the head of the tribe," stated Rev. Tullock, "today it is least of all likely to be father." He traced the father's relations to his children from biological incidentalism to economic necessity to responsible party for the children's acts and deeds.

"Second was the Industrial Revolution. The family is no longer a manufacturing establishment. All skills are now learned outside the home.

Urbanization came next. "The city way of life cuts like acid the human values in the home life that was so ideally developed in the rural surroundings of most of the families of 100 years ago," went on the speaker.

Then the minister reached the fourth force.

"The emancipation of woman, so called," he stated, "from her position as center of the house has, in thousands of instances, had the effect of leaving the home without a real center. It remains yet to be seen whether woman's contribution outside the home will be anything like as important as what it might have been within the home."

The net results is very little of the necessary learning required to produce adult men and women is a family enterprise.

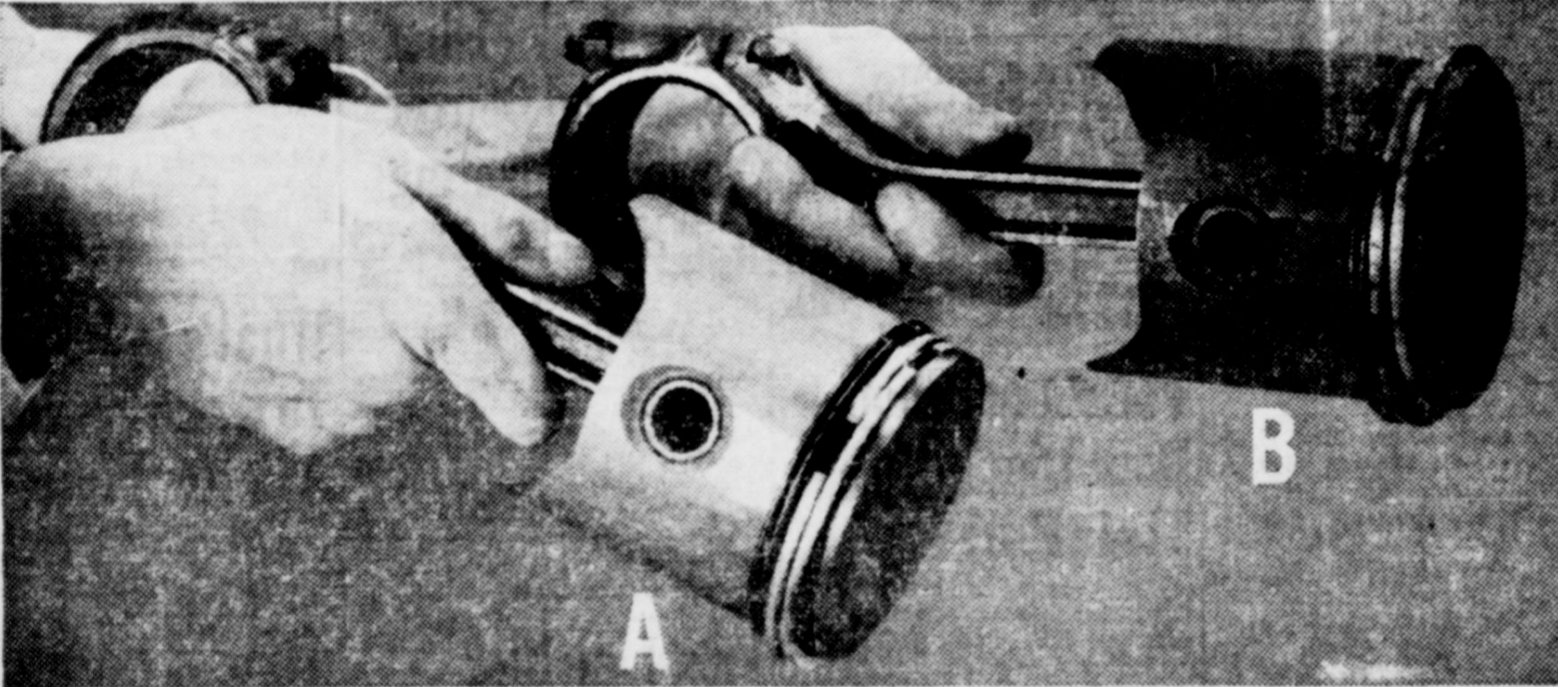

Nominations to the Air Academy are handled on an entirely different basis. Each State is allowed a certain number of appointments for the first class. Texas will receive 12 appointments. Each member of Congress may nominate 10 students to receive entrance examinations—a total of 230 for Texas' two Senators and 21 Representatives. From this number the Air Force itself will select the 12 Texas cadets on the basis of the entrance examinations.

In grandmother's day there were sulphur and molasses, sassafras tea, and "store bought" tonic to tone up the blood each spring. Today this toning up is done the year around by including a variety of vegetables in the diet.

Green vegetables are important in the diet, mainly because of their vitamin A and C content.

The intensity of the vegetable's green color and the part of the plant from which it comes are clues to its food value. In general, the greener the vegetable, the richer it is in minerals and vitamins. The dark green leaves may carry several times as much of some nutrients as green stalks.

The fresher the green vegetables, the better. Flavor and crispness, and perhaps some food value too, are lost when vegetables wilt or are stored.

If vegetables must be held for two or three days before using, refrigerate them. Keep them moist in the vegetable crisper, covered container, or in a plastic bag. Be careful not to bruise leafy vegetables in storing. Store peas and beans in the pod, if possible, to keep them fresh.

For best quality cook green vegetables quickly. Use a cover on the pan to speed the process. Cook until the vegetables is tender but still slightly crisp. Long cooking makes the vegetables limp and changes color and flavor and usually causes a loss in food value.

Recipe of the Week
FRESH PEAS
1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons water
1/2 cup thinly sliced mushrooms
1 1/2 cups fresh peas, or 10-oz. package frozen peas
1 small onion, thinly sliced
1/2 teaspoon salt
Melt butter or margarine and add the other ingredients. Cover the pan tightly and cook over moderate heat until the peas are tender, shaking the pan occasionally to prevent sticking. Cook fresh peas until tender, 8 to 20 minutes.
For frozen peas, begin counting time when steam begins to escape. Cook 5 to 10 minutes. Makes four servings, about 1/2 cup each.

NOT SO DUMB

Are we too old to learn something new?

Can you teach an old dog new tricks?

Do the youngsters have all the brains and the oldsters only memories?

What is this all about? Well, as you all know, we went to Lubbock to see a basketball game and went along with the youngsters in a bus. Seeing how smart the kids were we felt that since we were going to a college, Texas Tech, we might as well look into a class and see if we could understand what was going on.

In short, we believed that since we were going to college we should try and learn something... if we still had the ability to do so.

After the basketball game, the one the Badgers played in, we wandered across the long campus, part of it, and reached the Administration Building.

From one office to the other we wandered to see if a class was in progress on Saturday morning. We finally landed at the registrar's office and the pleasant and accommodating man in charge said that there was one in adult education and that it might interest us.

We lukewarmly consented to try the class and he politely took us upstairs and down the hall and to a closed door. We entered.

What we saw surprised us immensely! Instead of a lot of books being thrown upon a table there were cups and cookies. The cups were filled with tea or coffee.

A bowl of tobacco was also on the table.

There were five persons and the professor.

The accommodating man who

had brought us up introduced us to the professor. He was Dr. Per G. Stensland, head of adult education program. He said that it would be all right for us to sit in the class. It was a seminar, a graduate session.

Dr. Stensland is a tall, handsome man, with an easy, cultured air about him. He is the opposite of the stern or detached university teacher.

As he filled his pipe in a casual manner the other folks sipped their tea and coffee and ate cookies. The class was a working example of how adults should be treated in their educational process.

One man, a college teacher himself but a part of this particular class, began the discussion. The other four were advanced students, themselves teaching or preaching.

Age, he stressed, is no bar to successful learning. An old person can learn (an old dog can learn new tricks!) "Certain powers are lost in adult life because of disuse, but they can be renewed by those who have the inclination to engage in serious and exacting study."

Then he continued, "After mental maturity is reached, the manner in which the mind had been used is a more important factor than age."

Attitudes and prejudices of older adults interfere with their learning, he stated. Motivation, or the reason why older folks want to learn, has a great deal to do with their success at study. Experience also helps increase the learning ability of older folks.

Dr. Stensland made a remark that we particularly liked: "People are not interested in discussion unless they have learned to discuss."

And to show that this class really practiced what it preached the good professor allowed a rank outsider, your editor, to ask as many questions as he wished and impeded the firm flow of knowledge of the appointed speakers.

Texas Tech is doing a wonderful job in stimulating and

strengthening community education activities among adults in West Texas.

We are mighty grateful to Dr. Stensland and his group for allowing us to intrude upon their course of study. How much we retained is problematical but we were greatly stimulated.
