Mustangs Wallop Lakeview, 80-46

A SALUTE TO Bovina basketball coach Marks Lanham!

Coach Lanham is currently in his seventh year as a Bovina coach, and it has become virtually an annual affair, this time of year, to be watching at least one of his teams compete in the playoffs.

The current season is the fourth time that one of his Mustang teams have made it into the post-season playoffs. Lanham's teams while he was coaching the Fillies (girls team) made the playoffs on three different occasions.

You have to do a little prying, sometimes, to find out, but we learned that going into Tuesday night's game against Paducah, the total win-loss record for Coach Lanham at Bovina High School stood at 227 wins against only 114 losses. That is an enviable 66.6 per cent in the win column. Teams would go to the World Series, or qualify for the NFL playoffs just about every year with this type of winning percentage.

A couple of Lanham's former stars as members of the Fillies, Marie Pesch and Mindy Neal, are currently playing with Southwest Conference teams. Marie won a scholarship to the University of Texas and Mindy to Texas A&M University.

In addition, Peggy Shepherd, who played most of her career in Bovina before graduating at Amarillo Palo Duro, was called this week the sparkplug on the Frank Phillips College Lady Plainsman team.

Miss Shepherd, who also was a member of the Fillies' playoff teams, leads FPC in assists (passes leading directly to scores), and in three-point percentage. She had 16 assists—a new school record—in a 102-76 win over Odessa last Friday.

Underscoring Lanham's all-time record is the fact that for some years his teams competed in the same district with Abernathy and later Nazareth, when both were used to sending their teams to the state playoffs.

His boys teams also were in the district with Farwell for some time, and as you know, the Steers have a habit of making the playoffs.

As a matter of fact, 11 of the teams met on Bovina's 1988-89 schedule made the playoffs. They were Vega, Sudan, Lazbuddie, Farwell, Canyon, Whitharral, Klondike, Adrian, Grady, N.M., Lubbock Christian High and Lakeview.

Of these games, Bovina has posted a 10-4 record, having played Farwell three times and Lazbuddie twice. One of the team's losses has been to Lubbock Christian, which won the state title in the private schools division.

In the first three minutes and 26 seconds of their bi-district playoff game, the Bovina Mustangs appeared to be somewhat nervous—and so were their fans.

The Mustangs missed their first six shots from the field, not coming very close to the basket, while Lakeview managed a pair of early baskets to take a 4-0 lead.

But unfortunately for the Eagles from the small Hall County community, the Mustangs' shooting percentage was given a dose of medicine, and the Mustangs cruised to an easy 80-46 win in the playoff game.

The contest, held at Amarillo High School's Activity Center, was well attended, with an especially good crowd on hand to cheer on the Mustangs.

Scott Scaff, who usually starts out like a house-afire, missed his first three shots from the field, and teammates Corey Kirkpatrick and Woot Sudderth also failed to connect, while Lakeview was enjoying the early lead.

But Denver Riddle gave Bovina its first basket worth three points with 4:34 left in the opening period, and for all their early mistakes, the Mustangs were then down by only a point, 4-3.

The deficit didn't last long. Riddle stole the ball as Lakeview tried to come upcourt, fed it to Kirkpatrick, whose layup gave Bovina a 5-4 lead with 4:20 on the clock, and the Ponies were never headed.

In rapid-fire succession, Sudderth hit from the side, Scaff made good on a follow shot, and Shaun Pinkston made a layup shot as Bovina hiked its lead to 11-6 with just over two minutes to play in the quarter.

Scaff's ragged opening quarter continued when he picked up his second personal foul with 1:18 left, and went to the bench with only two points and two fouls.

But Bud Venable made a layup shot off a steal, and Riddle's follow shot gave Bovina a 15-6 lead. The Eagles scored a fourth basket for a 15-8 score at the buzzer.

Sudderth and Venable both scored to open the second quarter for a 19-8 Bovina margin, and after Lakeview tallied, Riddle's jump shot gave the Mustangs a 21-10 margin with 6:25 left in the half.

Riddle converted a driving lay-

up, was fouled, and then completed the three-point play for a 28-14 score 5:05 before halftime.

A minute later Riddle was back at the line to hit two more free throws for a 32-16 score, and as if to say "I'll take charge," he rebounded Scaff's missed free throw and put it in for two points and a 34-18 lead with 2:51 on the clock.

At that point, Riddle had scored 14 of Bovina's points, hitting six of seven shots from the field and three of three from the line. He went on to hit nine of ten free throws in the game, including his first seven in a row.

Pinkston and Venable scored before the half ended, giving Bovina a 39-20 lead.

The Mustangs' press, which had paid considerable dividends in turning the game around in the first half, continued to pay off in the third quarter.

Scaff, who was able to score only four first half points, began to get his shots to drop in the third quarter, and dominated the boards on both ends of the court. Lakeview was getting only one shot on offense, and if it didn't fall, Bovina controlled.

Scaff scored four of five shots from the field in the third quarter, and Riddle continued to be perfect from the line, hitting four of four, and Kirkpatrick added a basket as Bovina opened up a 59-35 lead.

With three seconds left in the third quarter, Lakeview was called for travelling. Bovina inbounded. The pass came to Scaff, who whirled and fired a 30-footer. The shot hit nothing but net, and Bovina had a 61-35 lead as the buzzer sounded.

Scaff continued to dominate the boards, getting two baskets from in close, and hitting two from the line, and Sudderth's three-point goal gave Bovina a 73-42 lead with 3:50 to play.

Riddle added a three point play (layup plus free throw) for a 76-42 score.

Kenny McLaughlin hit a jump shot, and Sudderth's layup with 1:03 closed out Bovina's scoring.

The Mustangs were playing the game without junior point guard Manuel Porras, sidelined with pleurisy. McLaughlin started in his place, and Pinkston and Venable each saw considerable time as the

team's "fifth man" throughout the game.

Riddle, with one of his better showings of the season, led all scoring with 24 points, including the 90 per cent performance from the foul line.

Scaff, who came back for a 17-point second half, had 21 points, and Sudderth scored 13.

The Mustangs, buoyed by Riddle, hit 15 of 20 shots from the line.

In spite of their slow start, the Mustangs finished by hitting 31 of 71 shots from the field, 43.6 per cent. Scaff hit 64 per cent of his shots and Riddle 63 per cent.

The Mustangs pulverized the Eagles on the boards, getting 53 rebounds to 33 for the opponents. Scaff had 19 rebounds and Riddle 12. Sudderth was the leader in assists with six.

"We really appreciated the big crowd that came to see us play. The kids appreciated the support, and it was good to play in front of such a good following," said Coach Marks Lanham.

Lanham praised his bench, which played well when called on. "They came in and got the job done," the Mustang coach said.

Coach Lanham said that Paducah's best player is Evans, a left-hander, who is a good shooter, or Allen Heard, who hits equally well from inside or outside.

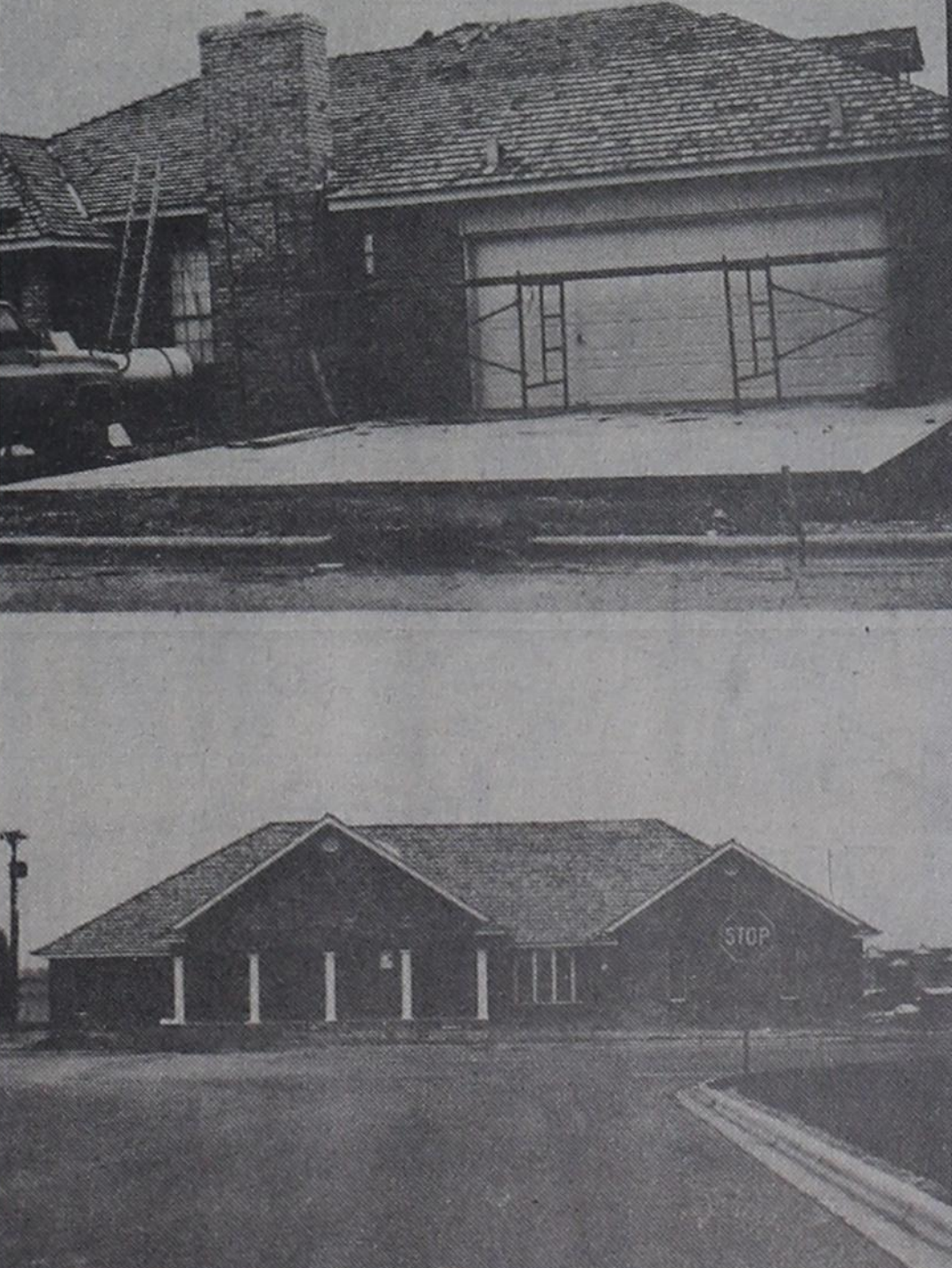
The Mustangs will match up well in size, as Paducah starts three players who are 6-2, one 6-0 and one 5-10.

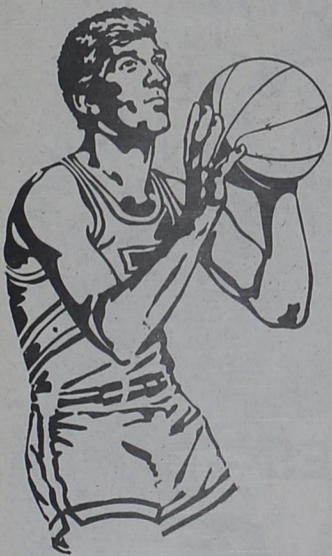

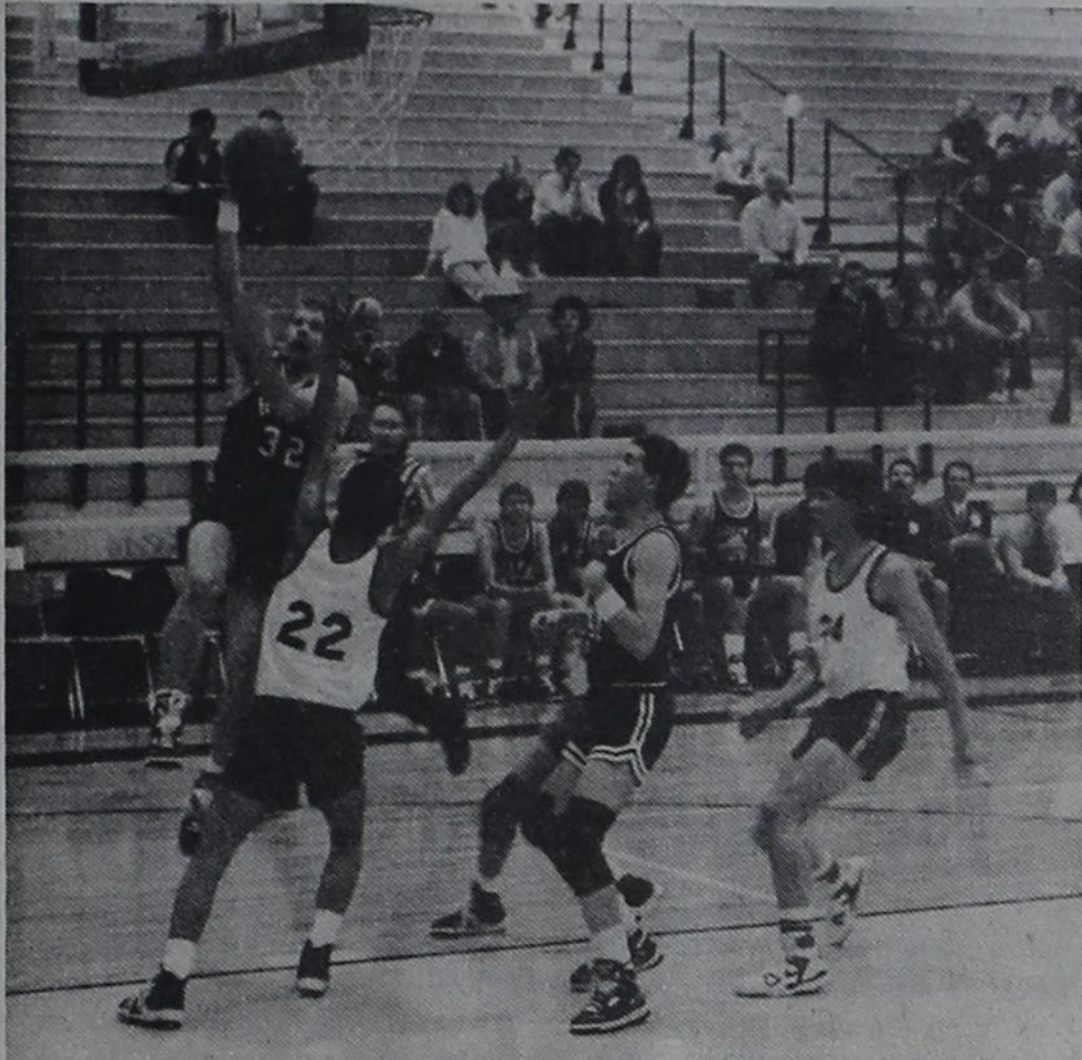

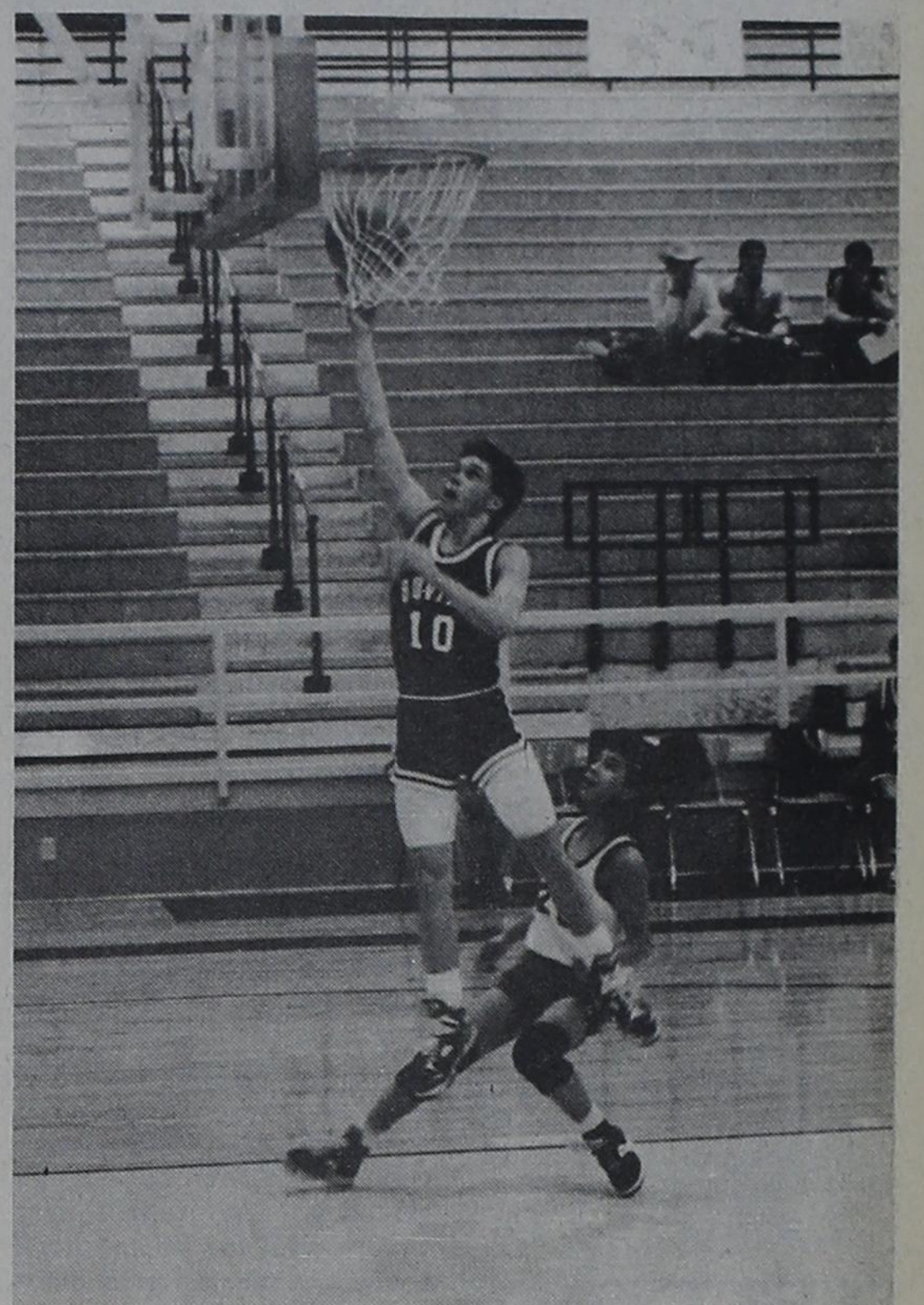

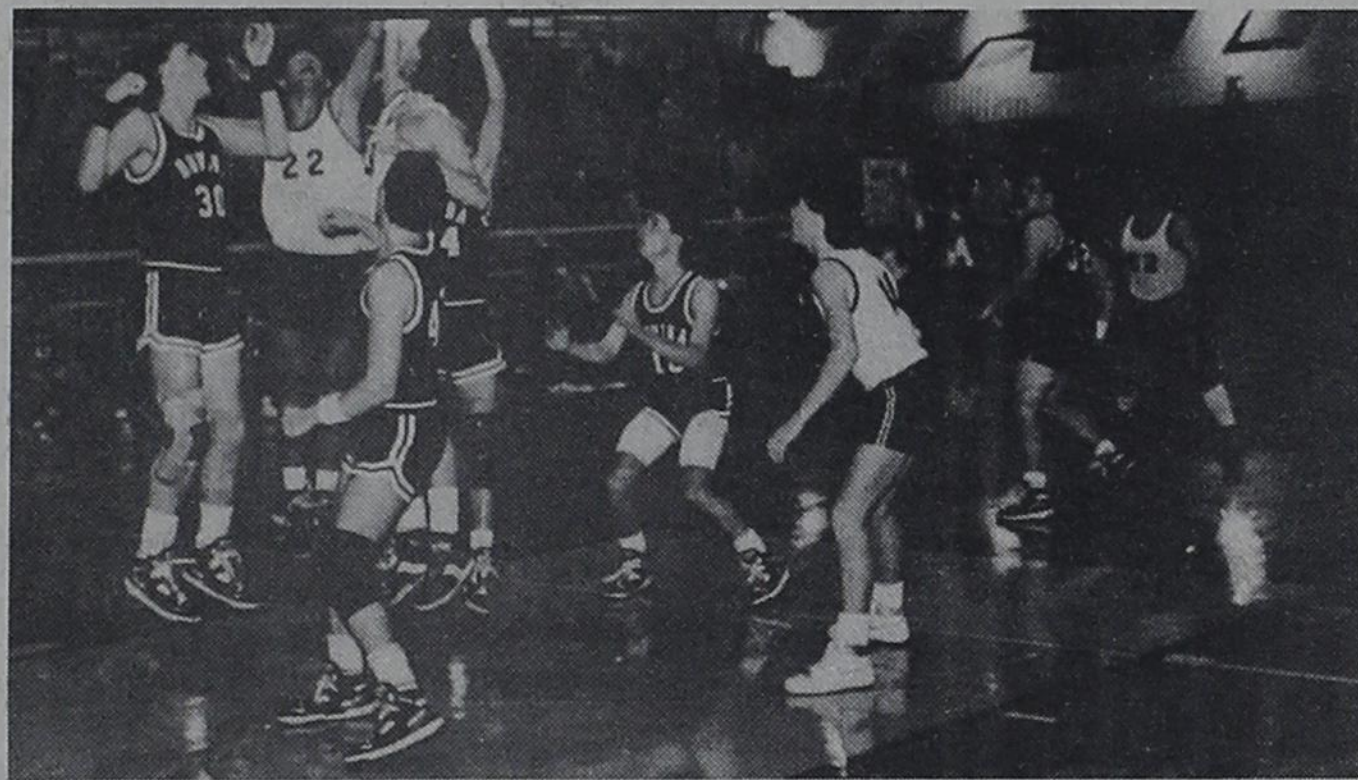

Thorn Attends AAM Meeting

The American Agriculture Movement went to Washington, D.C. last week, this time without their tractors. The family farm advocacy group spent the past week in Washington celebrating the tenth anniversary of the tractorcade to D.C., and meeting with members of Congress to discuss the farm agenda for 1989, a year that promises to bring several tough legislative challenges.

"When we came to Washington ten years ago on our tractors, we had no idea that the protest movement would evolve into a permanent farm organization capable of aggressively fighting for family farmers year after year," said AAM Texas State President Don Kimbrell, "but, we've done it, and we've been able to win some real victories for farmers. We intend to continue this fight until our federal farm policies once again make it possible for farmers to receive fair prices."

Proposed agriculture budget cuts, farm bill reauthorization, increased excise taxes, foreign trade proposals, ground water contamination, expanded ethanol production and farm debt restructuring were among the many issues of concern discussed over the last few days, ending with a joint farm group agricultural meeting Friday.

"We've come a long way in these first ten years," said David Senter, AAM's national director.

He added, "The work we did last year was crucial to win passage of the Agriculture Credit Act and the Drought Emergency Assistance Act, and to repeal the excise tax on diesel fuel for on-farm use. This puts us in a good position to carry on the fight for the family farmer in 1989."

Of particular concern to AAM is the proposed federal budget cut which would further reduce income to farmers and significantly limit the availability of farm credit.

"We're willing to do our part to solve the budget deficit," said AAM National President Harvey Joe Sanner, "but we can do that without bankrupting the family farmer. AAM will be working with congressional leaders to come up with a plan to save the necessary dollars without reducing prices farmers receive for their commodities."

Hundreds of family farmers traveled to Washington, D.C. to participate in various seminars and meetings with congressional leaders during the week. There was a total of 22 farmers from Texas including Don Kimbrell, State President from Happy; Buddie Vance, national delegate from Panhandle; Garvin Thorn, District 1 delegate from Friona; James Long, District 2 delegate from Paducah; Larry Mitchell, District 3 delegate from Arlington; and Authur Chaney, representing District 4.

AAM hosted a giant fish fry and chicken feed with live country music on Tuesday for 800 people, including many senators and congressmen, congressional aids, friends of AAM and farmers from around the country who had come to participate in the celebration.

"It's a great way to bring everyone together, introduce new folks and take care of business," said Sanner, a rice and soybean farmer from Arkansas. "This year's event is a stark contrast to our experience ten years ago, when we sat outside the capitol on our tractors in the snow."

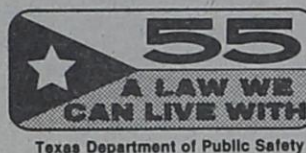
order to insure everyone's safety while at the Park.

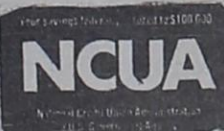
