

2 School Trustees To Be Elected

Voters in the Bovina Independent School District will name two trustees to the school board Saturday when the annual election is held in the main foyer of Bovina Schools.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. with Johnie Horn serving as election judge. Assisting as clerks will be Mrs. Dean McCallum and Mrs. Bob Turner.

Six candidates seek the two positions on the board this year. Terms of Earl Whitten and C.E. Trimble expire.

The candidates are Whitten and Trimble, who are seeking re-election, and Leroy Mayfield, Jerry McClaran, C.C. "Cap" Naegle and Lowell Boozer.

Whitten is completing his second three-year term while Trimble is completing his first three-year term on the board. The remaining four candidates have not served pre-

Whitten is a certified public accountant and employed by Sherley Grain Co. Naegle is manager of Parmer County Cattle Company. Trimble, Mayfield, McClaran and Boozer are farmers.

The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will serve three-year terms on the board.

Holdover members of the sevenman board are Leon Ware, Billy Smith, James Clayton, Edwin Lide and Leon Schilling. Lide and Smith have one year remaining on their terms with Clayton, Schilling and Ware having two years remaining on their present terms.

In absentee voting, which ended Tuesday, Miss Sheryl Moore at the school's tax office, reported 10 absentee ballots had been cast.

**Voters To Elect** Two Councilmen

Two councilmen will be elected for the City of Bovina as residents here go to the polls Saturday.

Polls will be open at American Legion Hall from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. that day, according to J.E. Sherrill, election judge. Five men are running for two

positions on the five-man council. Seeking re-election are Billy

Whitecotton, co-owner and operator of Bovina Supermarket, and Vernon Estes, a farmer and cattleman.

Also seeking places on the council are Ken Horn, manager of Horn Insurance Agency; C.N. "Big Nick" Trienen, owner of Big Nick Machinery; and Kenneth Whitecotton, a salesman for Riverside Chemical Company. None of the

three have served on the council

The two-year terms of Whitecotton and Estes expire in April. Whitecotton is serving his first term on the council, Estes has served several terms.

Holdover members of the council, with one year remaining on their present terms, are Mayor Tom Bonds and Councilmen Durward Bell, Dickie Clayton and Bedford Caldwell.

## Reflections From The Blade

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO-MARCH 30, 1960

A new flame broke out this week in the network of brushfire controversies that has plagued Bovina Schools for the past year and a half.

Petitions were circulated last week stating that the signers were "grossly dissatisfied with faculty and administration of the school." The signers called on state school officials to conduct an investigation of Bovina Schools as soon as possible. The petitions (reportedly there were 12 circulated) also called for an audit of the school's records in addition to a thorough inspection of the entire school system by an outsider.

A large turnout is expected in school board election Saturday. Four nominees and two write-in candidates vie for two places on the board.

Names on the ballot will be D.R. Bushnell, Grady Sorley, J.B. Barrett and J.R. Boardman. These men were selected by a special nominating committee chosen by the school board. Marion Carson and Billy Marshall are standard bearers for the write-in forces.

Framework for the educational portion of First Baptist Church's new plant went up last week and foundation for the auditorium has been laid.

Lavoida Newbrough, sponsored by Bovina Restaurant, was crowned Miss Bovina Tuesday evening in Bovina school auditorium. Second place winner was Judy Roach with third place going to Marilyn Brandon.

Ann Lynn Wilson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Wilson and an eighth grader in Bovina Schools, won first place in the Parmer County Spelling Bee Tuesday.

Prior to the storm's unexpected arrival, temperatures were comfortable enough for a late March day and offered no advance warning of what was to come. Several minutes before the storm hit here, tornado alerts were announced for the area. Within minutes after the blizzard struck, travel was virtually impossible and remained so until after midnight.

The blizzard stranded travelers here and in other area towns. All commercial rooms here were filled quickly and traveling families were placed in homes, Williford Gym and Bovina Restaurant. Numerous residents from here were stranded in neighboring communities. Over 100 vehicles were stalled and abandoned between Bovina

Two children, an eight year old boy and his seven year old sister, were frozen to death in the storm four miles south and seven miles east of Bovina. An 11 year old sister was in serious condition at the hospital in Friona.

RAY CROMLEY in the KILLEEN DAILY HERALD'S "Washington Window": Larry Pressler, freshman representative from the First District of South Dakota, is a most unusual young man.

He's decided that as long as he's in Congress, his income tax returns, all personal financial dealings and business connections will be open to the public. Top members of his staff will follow the same rule.

Pressler plans to co-sponsor a bill to levy the same requirement on all senators, representatives and their

He refuses honorariums for speech making, an important source of income for many congressmen. In his campaign, he turned back all contributions from organizations--business, agricultural, labor and educational. Three-fourths of his money came in donations of \$25 or less.

When running for office, Pressler promised to return 10 per cent of his congressional salary. Finding he could not legally make a unilateral pay cut, he's turning a tenth of his pay over to the government of his state.

The big fancy, expensive congressman's chair that came with his office makes Pressler nervous. He's attempting to exchange it for a smaller, less pretentious

He figures no representative should serve more than four terms, and intends to quit after eight years.

In the few weeks he's been in office, he's become concerned over the huge amounts of money easily available to congressmen from special interest groups this year even though there are no elections. By his estimate, he could pick up an easy \$10,000 for incidental expenses, a few hundred dollars, here, a few hundred there, from one lobbying committee or another--even as a freshman with little political clout on the Hill. He's amazed at the number of senators and representatives who snap up this money.

At home, where he goes three weekends out of four, Pressler is attempting to draw more small farmers,



labor union men and small businessmen into South Dakota's Republican party, where power for years has centered in a rather small, tight-knit group. He attempted unsuccessfully to get a labor union man to run for the GOP chairmanship in one of his First District counties. Friends are now putting together a group of 100 to 200 young men and women, 25 to 40 years of age, that they've checkmarked as future leaders. Both Republicans and Democrats are included. Pressler plans to meet with this group several times a year to develop political issues and congressional reforms.

This approach is the only means, Pressler believes, by which the image of the Republican party can be meaningfully changed at a time when polls say 60 per cent of all Americans call themselves conservatives, but less than one out of five admit to being Republicans.

Pressler is already in an open public fight with the Republican National Committee, and its chairman, Mary Louise Smith. He thinks there's too much emphasis on raising funds from special interest groups. And he's written a letter to the editor in the Washington Post, opposing the National Committee's \$2 million raise-the-GOP image public relations campaign, holding the dollars would be better spent if given to Republican candidates. In return, Pressler's been threatened with retaliation in 1976 when he's up for re-election.

There is one special point that should be noted in this matter. In the Democratic landslide of 1974, when 36 House Republican incumbents went down in defeat and when GOP strength, in its traditional Middle West stronghold was severely weakened, Pressler was one of only four Republicans nationwide to upset a Democratic







## -- What was the purpose of the comparative study made by a group of concerned parents?

The physical facilities at our school were in poor shape. It was dirty and maintenance was sadly lacking in many areas. We were concerned that we did not have enough money to adequately fund our school.

#### -- What did the survey reveal?

The survey showed that we did have an equal amount of money based on the average daily attendance and total budget. It showed that we were lacking in many areas.

## --What has been done since the study was presented to the school board?

1. They began an immediate campaign to clean-up the school and make necessary repairs. Several people worked during the Christmas holidays, replacing the gym doors, replacing boarded-over windows and doors, fixing the clocks, water fountains, exit signs, replacing screens, painting the auditorium and windows in the gym, washing windows and repairing the leaky roof.

2. They have hired an outside evaluation team to evaluate the school. (It will be cleaner and more presentable for the study.)

cleaner and more presentable for the study.)

3. They have contacted the Title I, Migrant Program authorities and requested a survey to determine if Bovina is eligible. This is a free survey and could provide additional teachers and teacher aides at government, not local, expense. Two other district schools taking advantage of this program had nothing but praise for the program. Hidden costs, if any, must be overcome by the total program. The other schools mentioned had the necessary initiative to investigate and implement the program.

THE FACT that most of the recommendations presented in the report have been acted upon would indicate the report was NOT blased or for purposes other than upgrading our school system.

C.C. NAEGLE

C.C. Naegle, a candidate for one of two positions on the school board, told the Jaycees he believed there was a lack of communication between the school and community; that the present school board had a "poor attitude" but was making progress; that some areas had been "short-changed"; and that a change for a positive approach was needed on the school board.

**EARL WHITTEN** 

Earl Whitten, incumbent school trustee who is running for re-election, stated that a positive attitude at school along with parents and children was needed; there was no end to what could be done with the support of the community; and that he hoped everyone would encourage the good that could be found in school while the problems were being worked out. Whitten noted that possible future problems were inflation and finance, stating that Bovina had been on the current tax rate for the past eight or nine years.

C.E. TRIMBLE C.E. Trimble, incumbent school trustee who is running for re-election, told those attending that "....while some people consider me a trouble-maker, I feel the school board has to be run for the majority and not for the minority." Trimble stated that even though he was not in favor of the recent hair code change, he would still work with the majority to carry out the wishes of the school board; that Bovina Schools had problems as well as other schools but the problems could be faced and worked out; and that older citizens need to become involved more. LOWELL BOOZER

Lowell Boozer, a candidate for one of the two positions on the school board, stated that he believed all the candidates were well-qualified; that his primary advantage was his age, saying, "....since I am younger, I can identify with the problems of the kids, yet I am old enough to make a mature decision"; that many problems in the school are based at home where a positive attitude should be developed.

Not present at the meeting were C.N. Trienen, candidate for the city council; and Leroy Mayfield and Jerry McClaran, candidates for the school board.
