"Follow Up" Field Day At Russom Ranch Shows Benefits Of Plowing, Seeding

A "follow up" field day was held on the Tom Russom Ranch in Mulberry Canyon area Tuesday afternoon to show the benefits derived from root plowing and grass seeding of badly infested mesquite rangeland.

Russom, one of the county's leading farmers and stockman and chairman of the Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation District, showed the group of more than 55 persons over 75 acres covered with a lush growth of blue panic. The acreage was root plowed and seeded to two pounds of panic to the acre the latter part of March, Russom said. The work was done by M. E. Hand, contractor, at a cost of \$14 an acre, plus the cost of seed. Under the cost-share program, the ASC paid 50 per cent of the cost of plowing and 70 per cent of the seed cost. Russom's actual cost was from \$3 to \$10 an acre. Observers estimated that the value of the land had been increased at least \$20 an acre. He is running about 25 head of cattle and around a couple of hundred head of ewes on the grass.

The best growth of grass, Russom said, was obtained on virgin pasture land that had been infested with heavy mesquite growth. Clipping tests showed this land to be producing 3,500 plus pounds of forage.

McAninch Home Burns Monday Damage Estimated at \$8-10,000

The Welden McAninch home at 1406 Herring Drive was listed as almost a total loss following a fire Monday afternoon which apparently started in the attached garage.

McAninch, an oilfield worker who works in Tulsa, was asleep in the house when he was awakened by the roaring fire. He ran for the telephone but was driven back by the searing heat. The front door of the house was stuck or locked and he had to break it down to get out, shirtless but without injury.

Wreck Hospitalizes L. D. Barnes

L. D. Barnes was admitted to Sadler Clinic Hospital Wednesday night suffering from shock received as the result of an accident involving two cars in front of his house on the corner of 4th and Ash.

Barnes was mowing his lawn when a 1953 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. Helen Hall was in collision with a 1954 Ford driven by Jerry Frank Patterson. The impact caused Patterson's car to swerve into the yard knocking Barnes down. He was taken to Sadler Clinic Hospital by Starbuck Ambulance and will be kept there overnight for observation.

Patterson who suffered a cut on his hand, was treated and released. Mrs. Hall, wife of an Air Force sergeant stationed at Dyess Air Base, was uninjured.

The accident which occurred at 6:20 p.m. was investigated by Henry Martin, local officer. It was reported that damage to both cars was extensive.

The Merkel Volunteer Fire Department was called by neighbors at 4:45 p.m. and had the blaze under control in 15 or 20 minutes and out shortly afterwards. The firemen were driven back several times by thick smoke pouring from the home. A nearby fence was the only adjacent structure reported burned.

Two rooms of the home were completely burned out, while other rooms were heavily damaged by heat, smoke or water. Fire Chief, Waymon Adeock estimated total damage to the five year old home at \$8-10,000.

McAninch salvaged some clothes and neighbors helped salvage a few pieces of furniture, but most of the house contents were destroyed. An older model pickup truck in the garage was charred inside and heavily damaged also.

Mrs. McAninch, a bookkeeper at Palmer Motor Co., was at work at the time. Her two sons are away at Texas Tech College.

\$800 Scholarships To 4H's In Agronomy, Textiles

CHICAGO — Four scholarships of \$200 each are available this year to college students who have completed three years of 4-H Club work and who plan to major in either agronomy or textiles, G. L. Noble, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, announced today.

"The scholarships are offered on a national basis," stated Mr. Noble. "To be eligible, applicants should have a satisfactory scholastic and 4-H Club record and must have completed their sophomore year in an accredited college or university."

Two agronomy scholarships are made possible for the first time to agriculture students by the California Spray-Chemical Corporation, Richmond, California. The Colgate-Palmolive Company, Jersey City, New Jersey, for the second year is offering two home economics scholarships for girls majoring in the clothing and textile fields.

At the time the two national winners are chosen for the agronomy and home economics scholarships, four alternates for each scholarship will also be selected on a descending basis. If the scholarship is not used by the winners, they will be made available to the first alternates. Half of the scholarship will be granted during the junior year, and the remaining half will be provided for the senior year.

Students wishing further information regarding the awards should contact the state 4-H Club leader. All applications must be submitted by the state 4-H leader

Speech Correction Class At H S U

Another first at Hardin-Simmons University, academically speaking, will be initiated this fall when a speech correction class and clinic is added to the schedule of evening courses.

Mrs. Nora Everton, veteran of 15 years in the teaching of speech correction among exceptional children, will conduct the class and clinic from 7 to 9:45 p.m. each Monday.

The course is open to everyone either for college credit or training for professional guidance in the home. Exceptional children, with speech defects, may attend the class sessions for free instruction and professional guidance.

Mrs. Everton, who lives at 1945 Simmons Ave., has invited interested persons to call her at OR 2-5368. She is particularly interested in talking with mothers of children who have speech difficulties.

"It is particularly appropriate," Mrs. Everton said, "that mothers be instructed in speech correction." She said they have a chance to help the child more than anyone with daily guidance in the home.

All phases of speech defects are considered in the class, but greatest emphasis is placed on stuttering.

The course has been offered for many years at H-SU, but this is the first time it has been scheduled in the evening.

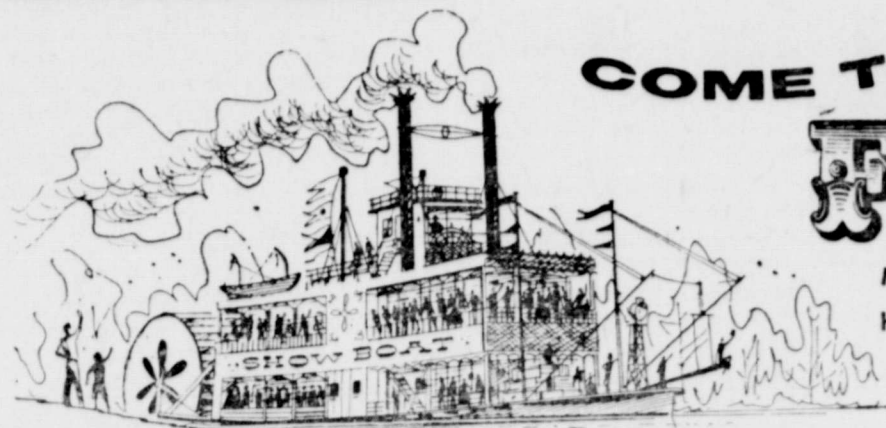

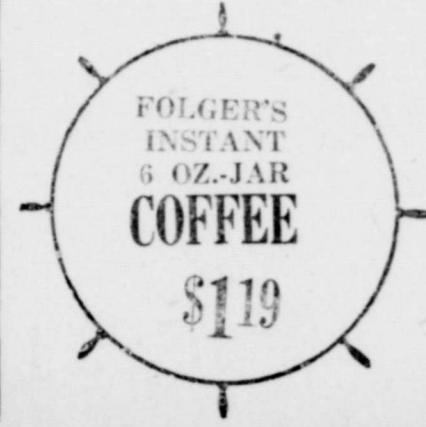

That guarantee established the fact that free government of free men does not need to live in fear of the thoughts and words of its free citizens."

Thomas Jefferson once said: "We've it left for me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers or newspapers without government. I should not hesitate to prefer the latter."

Governor Daniel seems to concur when he says, "the freedom of America depends on the freedom of the press. The free flow of information to the public is essential to the preservation of our American way of life, and we must be continually vigilant against any efforts to impede this freedom of information."

So we turned the old car toward that peak but we followed the paved road and came out where the little town Nubia used to be and it had disappeared. When I was there, there were several stores, homes and churches. How 51 years can make changes! I went there expecting to find everything the

same and I didn't find any of the children that I used to play with. They would not have been the little boys and girls I was expecting to see. I found Mr. Harry Riney who was a grown young man those days.

Those mountains have not changed to me only closed in a smaller circle. All these years my mind always wondered back to those years lived there and that little Riney School. Miss Ollie Johnson was our teacher and she boarded at our house. I shall never forget her. There were the Toombs, the Farmers, Blairs, the Caseys, Bowdens, Bradleys, Smiley family, Barnes, Rineys, Swaines, Carrol Walden and family, the Campbell family, the Gants, the Quisenberry family. One store at Nubia was operated by Mr. Boyd. The family doctor was Dr. Martin.

In Sept., 1909, we loaded all our belongings in a covered wagon and my mother, father, brother and I left that little canyon and

I am the only one of the family that is still alive. I shall never forget the years I spent there. We left that hot Sunday afternoon and went by the Castle Peak and I looked back as long as I could see it. It finally disappeared and then on my recent trip to Abilene it appeared again.

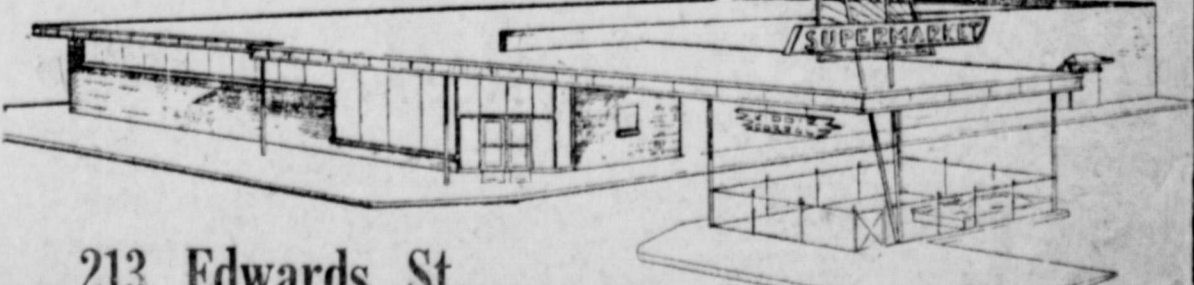
