

Owls Ruin B.H.S. Mustangs' Hopes In Bi-District Game

Bovina High School's Mustangs beat the Silverton Owls in every category except the one that counted in their bi-district playoff game at Amherst last Friday.

Silverton won the game, 16-14, although the Mustangs led in penetrations 5-2, first downs 10-8, and in total yardage, 250-198.

The Mustangs' kicking game, which had been so dependable all year, was the only breakdown, as a missed vital PAT after Bovina's second touchdown proved to be the difference in the game.

Had the game ended tied on the scoreboard, Bovina would have been the winner thanks to their lead in penetrations.

Mustang Coach Terry Bean had a tough decision to make with 6:24 left in the game when Bovina faced fourth and goal from the Silverton nine-yard line.

Bean called a pass, and the Silverton defense, which had been tough all night, came through to thwart the attempt, and that turned out to be the difference.

"Our passing had worked pretty well, and we had failed on a couple of kicks, and had had the PAT kick blocked. It wasn't that I didn't have faith in Bud's (Venable's) leg, we just decided to stick with the passing attack," the Mustang mentor said.

Bean said the fact that the team

was driving into the wind wasn't necessarily a factor in his decision, although the wind had adversely affected the team's play all night long. "I've thought about that decision a lot since Friday," Bean said.

"The wind hurt our passing attack, especially when we were against it. We did fairly well when we had the wind to our backs, especially when Corey (Kirkpatrick) managed to get open on that touchdown pass," Bean said.

The windy conditions hampered what had started out as a nice fall day, but deteriorated late in the day when a fast-moving front caused some severe thunderstorm warnings to be posted in the area.

At one stage in the second half, the wind gusts really hampered the team which was facing west and having to pass or punt.

And freshman punter Corey Kirkpatrick really managed to get his team out of a deep hole on the first play of the fourth quarter when he boomed a 42-yard punt into the teeth of the wind.

The defenses of the two bi-district opponents were about the only thing evident during a scoreless first quarter, as Bovina couldn't manage a single first down.

Late in the quarter, however, Silverton's Jamie Frizzell managed to get behind the Mustang defenders for a 24-yard pass reception that carried to the Bovina 24-yard line.

Neal Edwards and Wayne Henderson took turns lugging the ball for the Owls, and Henderson, a sophomore, finally broke the scoreless tie by diving a yard on the fifth play of the second quarter.

Henderson's kick looked like a dying quail in a hailstorm, but the important thing is that it knuckled its way through the uprights, giving Silverton an 8-0 lead with 7:58 remaining in the half.

Quarterback Scott Sudderth hit Denver Riddle on a safety-valve pass that wound up being the second-longest gain of the night, 30 yards, to the Silverton 19. But Sudderth was sacked two plays later, and Venable was called on to try a 40-yard field goal.

The 190-pound senior boomed the kick plenty long, having the wind to his back, but it sailed wide left with 5:38 to play in the half.

The Mustangs forced a punt, and took over on their own 22 a little later. Riddle took a pitchout for ten yards, Sudderth threw a strike to Shaun Pinkston for seven yards, and then Riddle took a pitchout around end good for 17 yards into Silverton territory.

Helping matters was a personal foul flag against the Owls on the

tackle, and Bovina got the ball first and goal at the Owls' 13-yard line.

Sudderth gained eight yards after being flushed out of the pocket, to the five, and then Genaro Ruvalcaba went in for the touchdown.

Venable's kick split the uprights, for an 8-8 tie with 2:16 left in the half.

Sudderth jumped on a Silverton fumble on the second play following the kickoff, and things looked great for the Mustangs. But three pass plays failed to gain, and Venable was called on to try a field goal from 55 yards out.

Trouble getting the snap down caused the kick to be blocked. Although it went out at the Owls' 12, officials spotted the ball at the scrimmage line—the 35.

Riddle intercepted a Silverton pass on the final play of the first half, running it all the way from the Bovina 20 to the Silverton 17 as time expired.

Good defensive plays by Scott Scaff and Manuel Porras on Silverton's first series of the third quarter prevented the Owls from driving, and gave the ball to Bovina.

The Great Scotts--Sudderth and Scaff--combined on two straight pass completions as Bovina moved from its own 23 to their 39. Then Sudderth scampered ten yards on a keeper, and again ran 12 yards to the Owls' 24 after being chased out of the pocket on a pass play.

But the Owls' defense answered the challenge on three straight pass attempts, and Venable's 44-yard try for four points was barely wide to the left, leaving the score tied, 8-8.

Frizzell, the Owls' big senior end, only caught two passes all night, and both set up touchdowns. His 25-yard completion came on a vital third and ten situation from Silverton's 30. He rambled down to the five before the Mustangs downed him.

But Edwards scored on the next play for a 14-8 Silverton lead. The PAT kick floated wide, but Bovina was called for roughing the kicker, and Henderson hit his second try, another of the knuckle-ball variety, for a 16-8 score with 3:13 left in the quarter.

Talk about responding. Manuel Porras returned the kick from the Bovina 20 to the 32. Two plays later Sudderth lofted a bomb to Kirkpatrick, who was wide open at about the Owls' 20. He caught the ball and raced in for the touchdown. He also had been wide open on the previous play as well.

This set the stage for another bad break for the Mustangs. With the wind gusting, the snap on the PAT try was high, and bobbled just long enough to enable the

Owls to block the effort. That let Silverton cling to its 16-14 lead with 2:34 left in the quarter.

As the fourth quarter started, the Mustangs hit Edwards a blow and the ball was claimed by Pinkston at the Silverton 25.

Sudderth hit Venable on a big third down pass that carried from the Owls' 20 to the five. Only a good open-field tackle by Silverton prevented Venable from scoring.

That set the stage for Silverton to call on its defense. Bovina recovered a fumble on first down, then came the three straight incomplete passes after first and goal went to fourth and goal, with the Mustangs passing up another field goal attempt.

Bovina had the ball back with two minutes to play, and managed to drive from their own 24 to the Silverton 25. On fourth down, Sudderth tossed a short pass to Scaff, who was swarmed by the Owl defense as time expired.

"I thought we played a tremendous game. The kids' effort and attitude going into the game was super. I felt we were ready. Silverton was about as physical as any team we've played. They don't mind hitting you," Bean said.

"We dropped several important passes--the kind we had been (Continued on Page 5)

Local Voters Favor G.O.P. Candidates

Bovina and Parmer County pretty well followed the voting trend for the rest of the region in last Tuesday's General Election, giving an overwhelming edge to the Bush-Quayle ticket in the presidential race.

The local precincts also gave margins to Teel Bivins, Larry Combest and Kent Hance, but switched to favor Lloyd Bentsen in the U.S. Senate race.

Parmer County went for Bush-Quayle by a 73-27 per cent margin, 2061 for Bush and 764 for Dukakis.

In the Bovina precinct, the Bush ticket carried, 261 votes to 146 for Dukakis-Bentsen, a 64-36 per cent margin for the new president-elect.

The Bush ticket had higher margins elsewhere in the county, winning with 77 per cent of the vote at Farwell and 76 per cent in Friona.

In the race for the state senate, pitting Teel Bivins against Mel Phillips, Parmer County gave Bivins about the same margin that he won the race by area-wide. His margin in Bovina was only 200-188, or 51-5, 48.5.

Phillips' only precinct win in Parmer County was in the Black precinct, by a 25-24 margin.

Parmer County voters also gave a good margin to former Dimmitt neighbor Kent Hance in his race for the Railroad Commission. Hance polled 2050 votes to 662 for Clint Hackney, a margin of 75.6-24.4 for Hance.

County voters also went for Larry Combest in his successful re-election bid, 1511 votes to 1254 for Gerald McCathern. McCathern scored wins at Black, 32-16, Friona-2, 86-76, Lazbuddie, 140-100 and Lakeview, 57-25.

The county also went in favor of Panhandle native Boulter in his bid to unseat Lloyd Bentsen in the U.S. Senate race, by 1490-1286, 53.7-46.3 per cent.

In the Friona precincts, Boulter won, 566-400, or 58.6-41.1.

Parmer County gave Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent the majority in his bid for re-election over Ed Emmett, 1521-1051.

Tom Phillips was favored for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, 1821-793 over Ted Robertson. Paul Murphy, GOP candidate for Supreme Court Justice, place 1, was favored, 1462-1153 over Lloyd Doggett.

Nathan Hecht received the county voters' backing for Supreme Court Justice, place 2, over Bill Kilgarlin, 1411-1118. Charles Ben Howell, GOP candidate for Supreme Court Justice, place 3, won over Raul Gonzalez, 1405-1083.

Jack Hightower, former state senator, was given the edge in his race for Supreme Court Justice, place 4, over Barbara Culver, 1483-1210. Eugene Cook, candidate for court justice, place 5, won over Karl Bayer, 1427-1020.

Mike McCormick, Democratic incumbent for presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, won over David A. Berchelmann, 1276-1150. Charles Campbell, judge of the court of criminal appeals, place 1, beat Egon Tausch, 1552-43.

Tom Rickhoff, GOP candidate for judge of the court of Criminal Appeals, place 2, won over Chuck Miller, 1240-1112.

In the race for member of the State Board of Education, District 15, GOP candidate Monte Hasie, who received backing from the local school board, won in the county, 1369-1079, and in Friona precincts, 546-310, or 63.8-36.2.

County Democratic candidates were elected without much opposition. Commissioner Robert White of Farwell withstood a write-in challenge by John Getz to win, 580-194.

In the constitutional election, proposition one passed in Bovina, 406-82 and countywide, 2108-351. Proposition number two carried in Bovina, 98-93, and narrowly won in the county, 1177-1167.

Stowers Wins Freeze Contest

The 24th annual First Freeze Contest, sponsored by the Bovina Blade, has ended with the killing freeze being declared on November 5. Dorothy Stowers is the winner of the \$10 prize money with her prediction of November 6.

Dorothy is the winner of the \$10 prize money. Last year's freeze came on November 10.

Proposition number three failed in Bovina, 187-143, and in the county as a whole, 1430-959.

All three of the propositions carried in statewide voting.

The voter turnout for the county was 2,896, which was less than the turnout in the 1984 presidential election in Parmer County, when 3,135 voters cast ballots.

However, County Clerk Bonnie Warren said the 71 per cent turnout was perhaps the best ever in the county, as the voting rolls had been "cleaned up" this year for the first time in a number of years, with fewer registered voters for 1988 than there were in 1984.

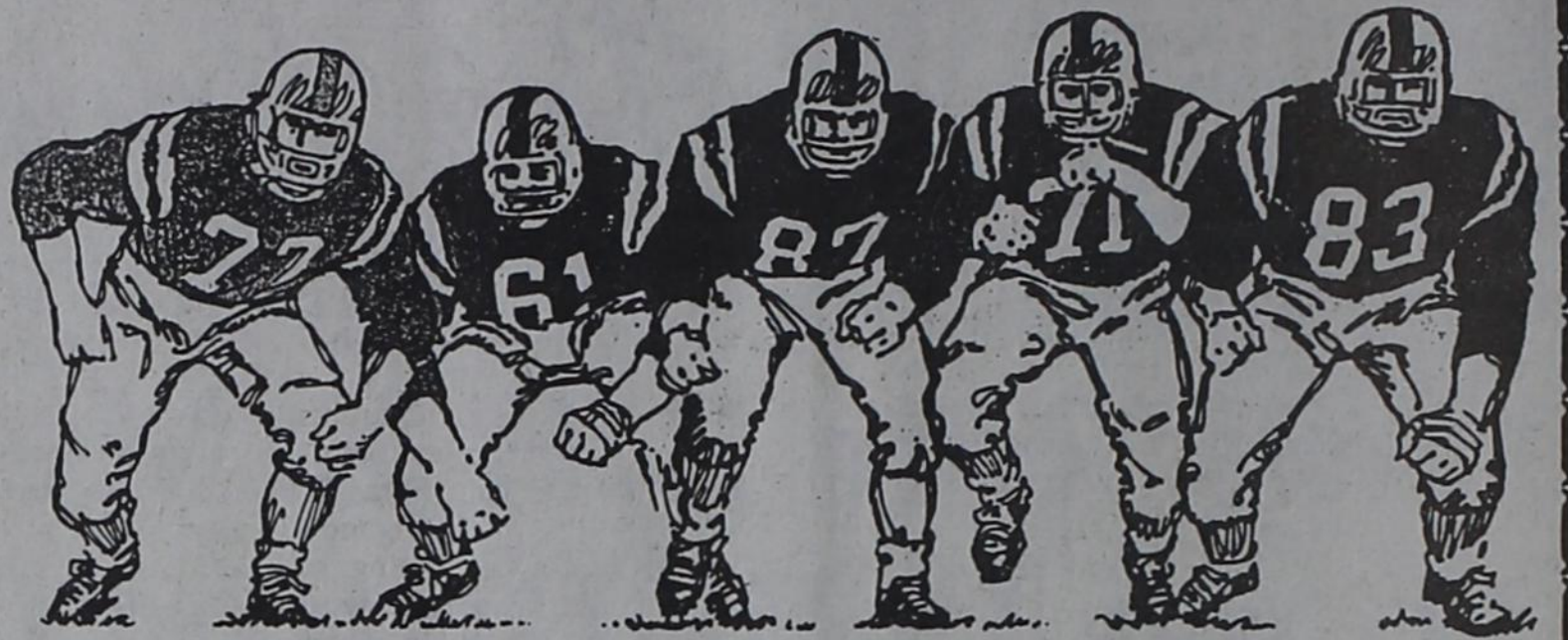
Methodist Women Set Bazaar

The United Methodist Women's Bazaar will be held Friday, November 18 at the Bank's Community Room beginning at 8 a.m. and will last until all items are sold.

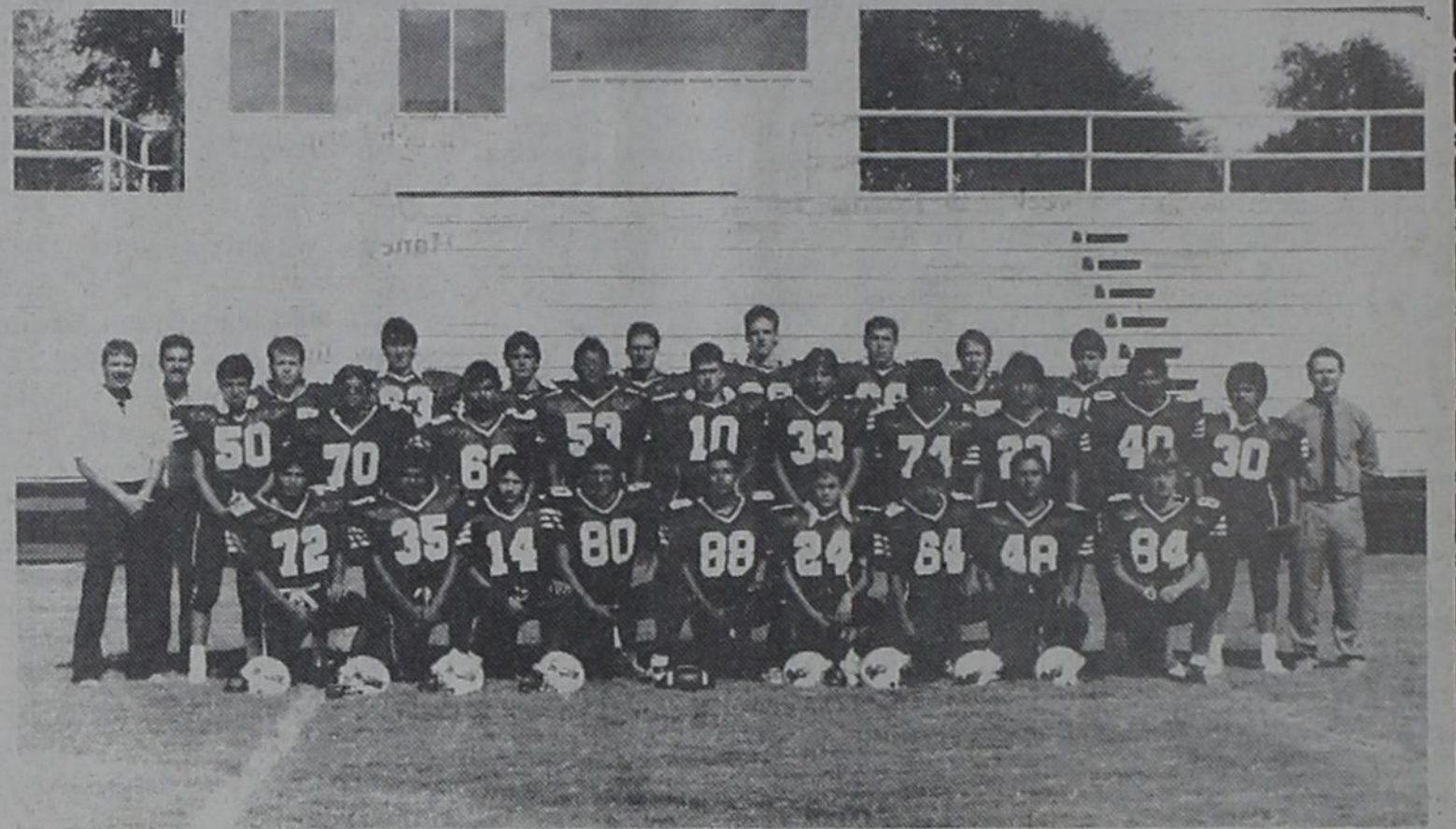
There will be items that can be used for holiday gifts and there will be baked goods and many other items of interest. There will be a table of white elephant items, such as jewelry, silk corsages, etc.

The annual bazaar is a community service to the Bovina residents.

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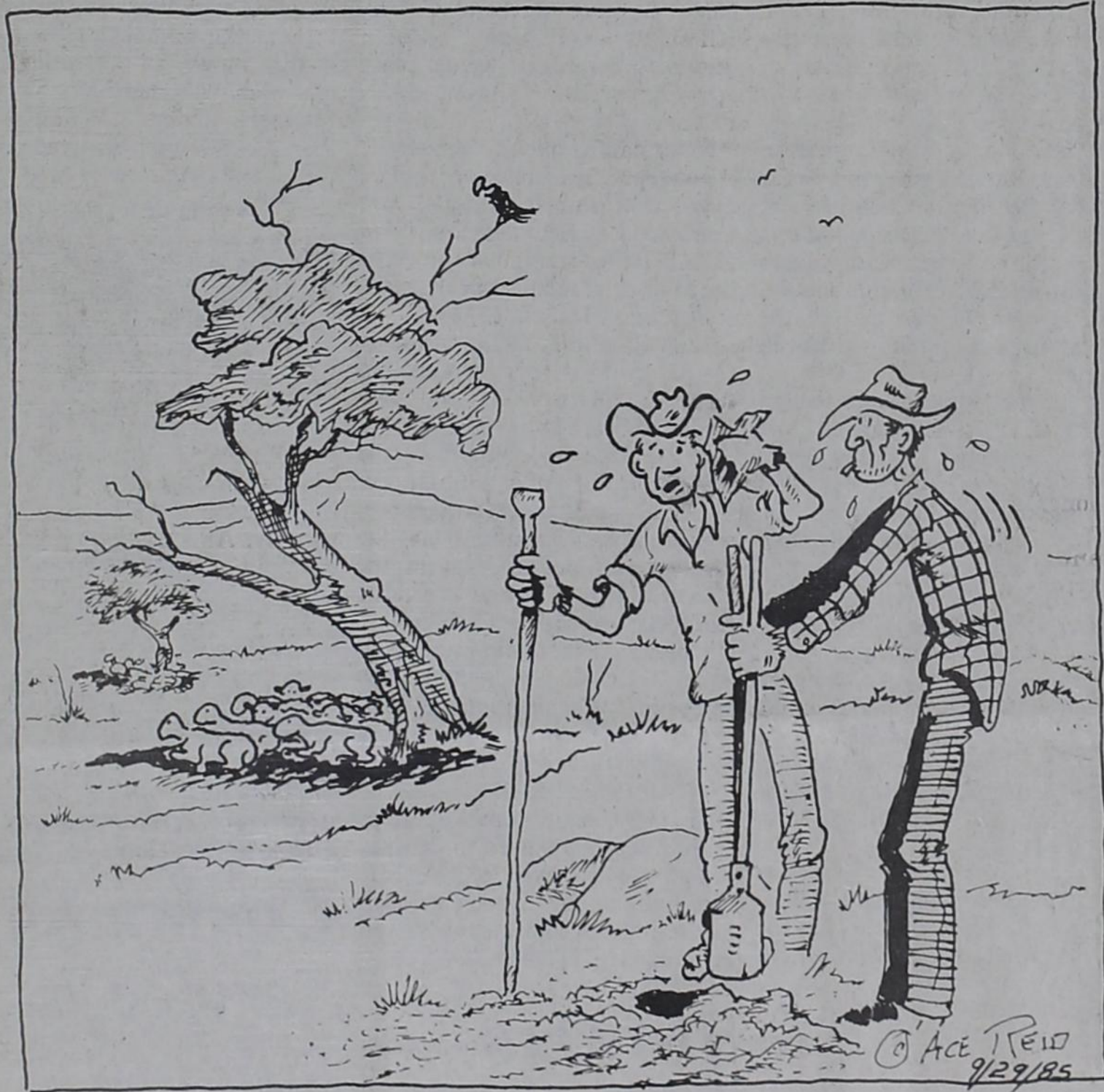

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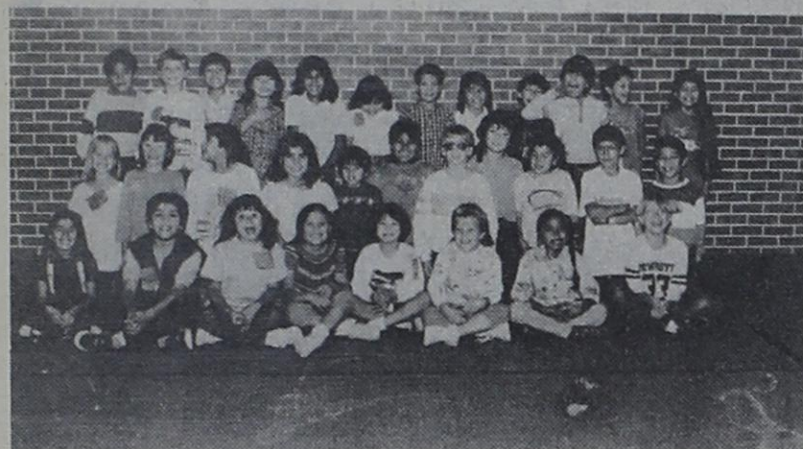

Resident's Rites Are Held Tues.

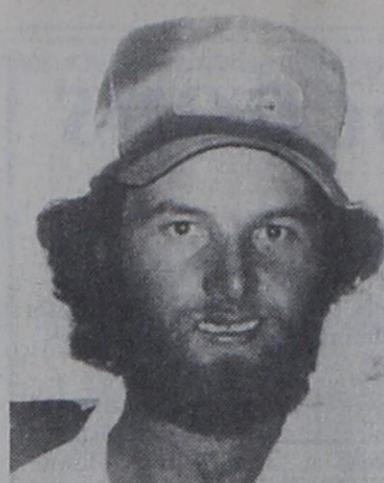
