

Month Ends Very Mild Locally

The month of January, which has been much warmer than usual, was closing out on a warm note in the local area.

The high temperature reached 64 degrees on Monday, marking the 14th time during the month for readings to top the 60-degree mark, and the mercury was expected to hit the 70-degree mark before day's end.

Temperatures reached into the 50s on ten other days in January, marking 24 days of the 31 for the readings to reach at least 50.

The area avoided a shut-out in the moisture department last Friday when a mixture of rain, snow and sleet left a total of .17 inches of moisture. This was the only measurable moisture for the month, and first for the year.

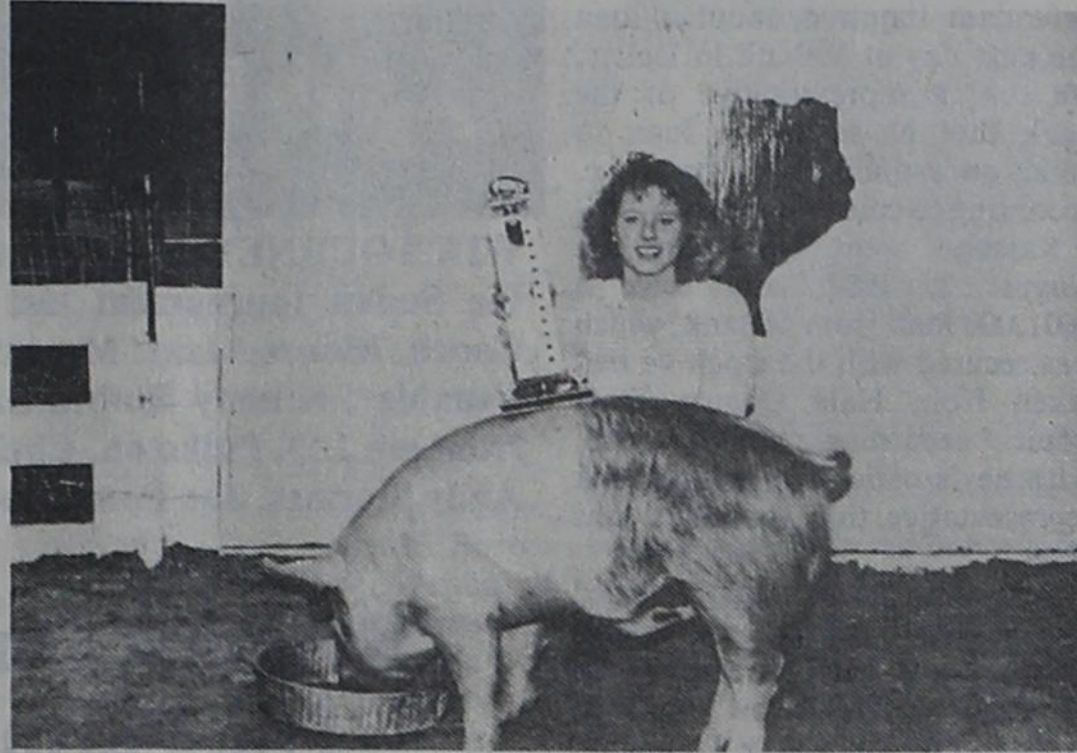

Teams Test Dates Told

Grades 3, 5, 7 and 9 will be taking the required TEAMS Test February 7, 8 and 9, dates set by the Texas Education Agency. During the 1985-86 school year, the Texas Education Agency (TEA) instituted the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) assessment program.

This program mandated by House Bill 72, passed by the 68th Texas Legislature in July, 1984, measures minimum basic skills in the areas of mathematics, reading, and writing in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and in mathematics and English language arts in grades 11-12. The test given to eleventh and twelfth graders, is an exit level examination and both the mathematics and English language arts sections of the test must be passed by students prior to their receiving a high school diploma.

Comparative results from the past three years of the TEAMS program are encouraging. Performance data have shown a marked improvement in test scores and in the percentage of students mastering the reading, writing, and mathematics exams at grades 3, 5 and 7.

The math portion of the test will

Kassahn Given 5-Year Sentence

(From Lubbock Avalanche-Journal) Lubbock cattleman Jim S. Kassahn, who pleaded guilty in November to bank fraud, has been sentenced to the maximum five years in federal custody and ordered to pay more than \$375,000 in restitution.

The restitution amount of \$375,559.58 must be paid to the Hale County State Bank, the Plainview bank which Kassahn admitted defrauding, within five years of his release from federal confinement.

The defendant pleaded guilty on November 21, 1988, to defrauding the Plainview bank by using the same securities as collateral for a loan there and for a loan at a Dallas Bank in the summer of 1987.

According to information filed by the U.S. Attorney's Office, the defendant secured a \$1,875,000 loan to Fiveway Cattle Company at Hale County State Bank on June 1, 1987, with 6,266 shares of American State Financial Corporation stock.

However, he took the stock back

on July 30, 1987, on the pretext of selling the stock and applying the proceeds to the loan.

Hale County State Bank returned the stock to Kassahn on the agreement that it would be sold and applied to the loan, but the defendant inquired about a loan the next day at MBank in Dallas. He told a representative of the bank that he needed a loan to make an estimated tax payment, according to court documents.

Kassahn went to Dallas on August 2, 1987, and took a \$601,000 loan from MBank, which was secured with the stock he had taken from Hale County State Bank, according to the U.S. Attorney's office. He told a bank representative that the stock was clear.

According to information filed by federal prosecutors, Hale County State Bank suffered a loss of about \$500,000 on the loan made to Fiveway Cattle Company, and Kassahn is responsible for a substantial part of the loss.

The case was a federal crime because the bank is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The Hale County State Bank filed a lawsuit on August 20, 1987, regarding the fraudulent misrepresentation of the stock, but the civil case has yet to be tried.

42nd Annual Junior Livestock Show Set

The 42nd annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 30-February 2 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

Judging will be held on Wednesday and Thursday, with the premium sale scheduled for Thursday night.

Animals are to be weighed in from 3-7 p.m. on Monday, January 30.

Classification of lambs and steers will begin at 7 p.m. Monday, following the weighing in.

Tuesday, January 31 will be an off day so as not to conflict with varsity basketball games.

Judging begins on Wednesday, February 1 with the annual free breakfast sponsored by Friona State Bank at the Showbarn, from 6:30-8 a.m.

Judging begins Wednesday at 8 a.m. with the lamb show and judging of the barrows will follow immediately the conclusion of the lamb judging.

On Thursday, the steers and heifers will be judged starting at 5 p.m. The premium sale starts at 7 p.m.

Judging the lambs will be Denny Balew of Tahoka, vo-ag instructor at Tahoka High School. Lanny Tucker, vo-ag instructor at Memphis, will judge the barrows. Both Balew and Tucker have judged the county show previously.

Jimmy Walker, county extension agent for Oldham County, will judge the steers and heifers.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals in the 1988 show were Clint Hurst of Friona in the barrow division, Michael Head of Friona for steers and heifers, and Guy Ellis in the lamb show.

Hurst, who won his second barrow title in a row at the county show, gave Friona showmen only their tenth county title in the barrow show's 41-year history, but fifth in the past 11 years.

Hurst's animal was a Hampshire

barrow, marking the sixth straight year for a Hamp barrow to claim the county title and stretching that breed's overall lead to 14 titles since the county show began.

Duroc barrows have won eight times, crossbreds have been tapped on seven occasions, Polands have won six titles and Chester Whites four.

Head won the steer title with a 1300-pound exotic steer. It was the tenth time for an exotic or exotic crossbred steer to win the county steer title, and stretched Friona showmen's record in that division to 23 titles of the 41 awarded.

Stock show boosters and buyers are urged to attend the premium auction sale. The animals placing on the top portion of each class will be eligible for the sale.

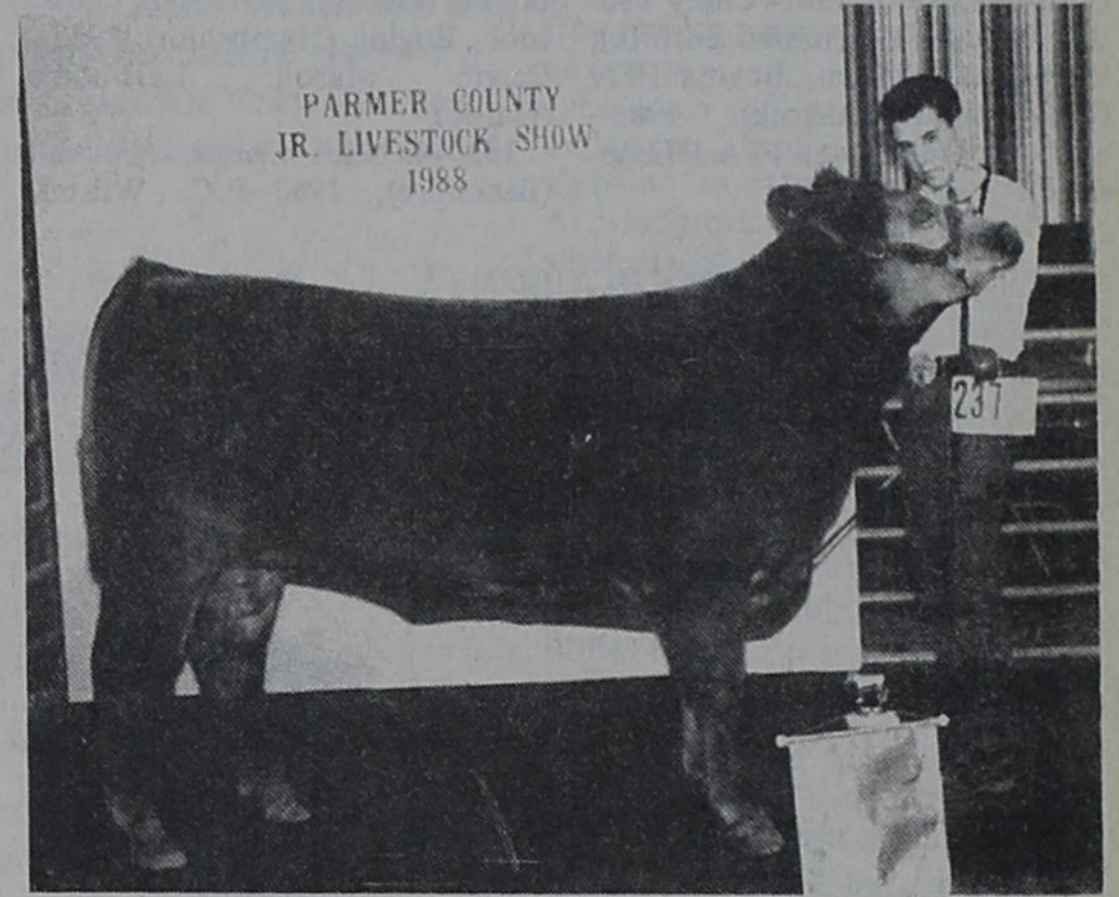

GRAND CHAMPION STEER...Michael Head's steer was named Grand Champion Steer at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last year.



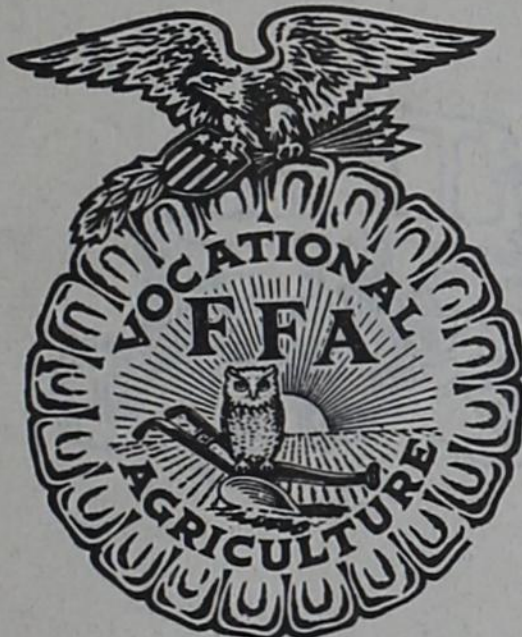

Low Int. Money Is Available

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm announced Saturday the State of Texas will make available low-interest rate home mortgages to qualified buyers of foreclosed properties owned by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

"This state-federal initiative was developed to reduce the inventory of foreclosed properties in Texas while enhancing the ability of low- and moderate-income families to qualify for a loan," Gramm said in a press conference in Dallas.

Thomas T. Demery, Federal Housing Commissioner, said the \$16.9 million Texas Housing Agency financing program will be offered exclusively to first-time home buyers of low- to moderate-income who elect to buy one of 3,685 HUD-owned properties in Texas.

The average purchase price of these properties is \$36,531.

"I am delighted to be able to announce this good news for the hundreds of hard-working families throughout Texas," Gramm said. "The attractive home prices available on HUD properties coupled with this affordable state financing program should allow families earning as low as \$15,000 to qualify for an average-priced HUD property," he said.

No Need To Pay For SS Services

People in the Clovis service area have been receiving direct mail solicitations asking that they pay \$7 to join an organization that says it will provide many services related to Social Security, Carl Thompson, Social Security manager in Clovis, said recently.

First, Thompson said, there is no need to pay any firm money to obtain any of the services provided by Social Security.

In return for the \$7 payment, this firm offers to provide a statement of a person's earnings covered by Social Security, a plastic Social Security card, and a guide to Social Security.

Any person can obtain a statement of Social Security covered earnings without paying anybody. All a person has to do is call any Social Security office and ask for a

request for statement of earnings form. After completing the form and mailing it, the person will receive the statement in a few weeks. This firm can do no more.

In addition, there is no need for a plastic Social Security card, Thompson said, it is of no use for Social Security purposes. The Social Security number card issued by the Social Security administration is the only official card and should be used whenever a Social Security card is needed.

People can obtain many publications about Social Security free at any Social Security office. Just call or drop by to pick it up, he said.

DPS Gives Accident Report

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties, announced, "For the month of December, our troopers investigated seven fatal accidents, 84 personal injury accidents, and 123 property damage accidents. There were seven persons killed and 133 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Billy D. Scott of Hereford stated, "In Parmer County, our

troopers investigated no fatal accidents, three personal injury accidents, and six property damage accidents in the month of December. No one was killed and four persons were injured in these accidents.

For the calendar year, DPS officers investigated three fatal accidents in Parmer County, 36 personal injury accidents and 57 property damage accidents.

Four people were killed in the Parmer County accidents, and 65 others were injured.

Assistance May Be Available

AUSTIN—Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Acting Commissioner Charles Stevenson.

Stevenson said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other low-income individuals may request an application from local DHS offices during the enrollment period of Jan. 16 through Feb. 16.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$589.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$781.49 for households of two persons, \$973.49 for three, \$1,165.49 for four, \$1,357.49 for five, and \$1,549.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

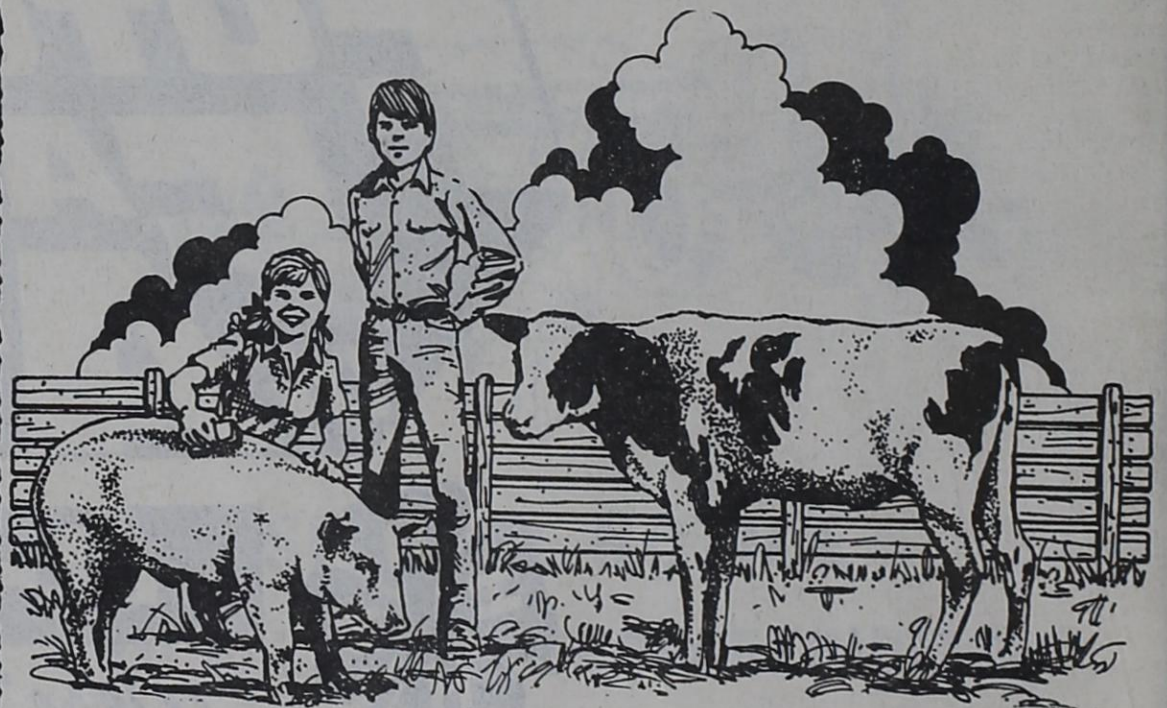
Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.
