I have just received several requests concerning reducing diets. As I began to think of information on this, I thought of some pre-cautions a person should take when going on a diet.

Consult a doctor before begining a reducing schedule. Beware of fad diets.

Gradual reduction in weight is he only safe method.

Eat three well-balanced meals

One basic principle to follow while reducing is to eat slightly less food than the body needs to carry out all its activities. In that way, it will have to call foods. Meals should be spaced upon other sources of energy- regularly; none should be skipstores of fat in the body.
