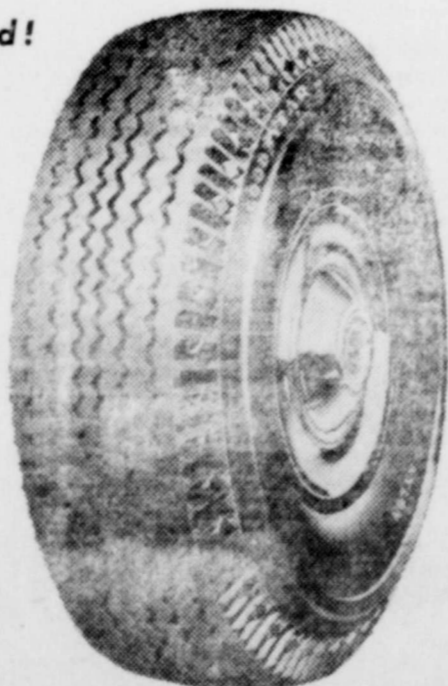

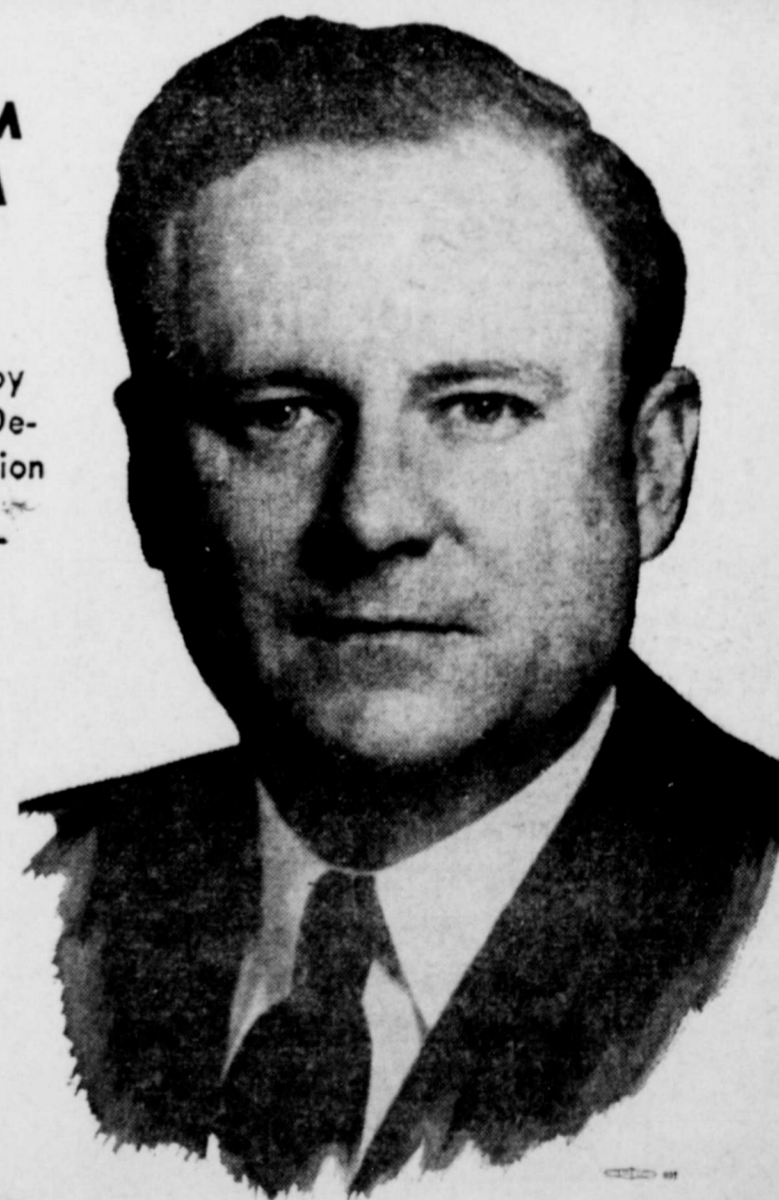

Starbucks Attend Furniture Market

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Starbuck of Merkel, representing Starbuck Co. was among the nearly 7,000 buyers and other retail executives attending the Southwest Furniture Market in Dallas.

The four-day market, open only to retail furniture store buyers and officials, opened July 14 and was to close Thursday, July 17.

Officials of the Retail Furniture Association of Texas, sponsors of the summer and winter markets in Dallas, termed the July, 1958, Southwest Furniture Market "one of the best we have ever had."

Market officials reported that orders written during the opening days of the market indicate total sales probably will exceed \$20,000,000, and estimated that "the market will be responsible for an equal amount of re-orders during the coming months."

More than 300 manufacturers of all types and styles of furniture exhibited their new lines in more than 165,000 square feet of display space in three buildings on the grounds of the State Fair of Texas. This new merchandise will be available in the Southwest's retail stores next month.

A highlight of the market was the installation dinner-dance at the Baker Hotel in Dallas honoring new officers and directors of the Retail Furniture Association of Texas. W. Erle White, president of White Stores, Inc., of Wichita Falls, succeeded Will Ed Kemble of Kemble Bros. of Fort Worth, as president of the organization.

Much of the new furniture shown at the Southwest Furniture Market in Dallas—fourth largest in the nation—reflected the current trend toward the use of medium-dark finishes, as opposed to the rather light finishes in evidence at former markets. Walnut and mahogany continue to be the leaders in cabinet woods used in both medium grade and better chairs, bedroom and dining room groupings.

In upholstered furniture and carpets the furniture manufacturers and rug mills are coordinating styles and colors to provide both harmonious and colorful room groupings. Market officials emphasized that today's home makers can take care of their furnishing needs with the knowledge that styles and colors will be "fashion right" and in any price range to fit within their family budgets.

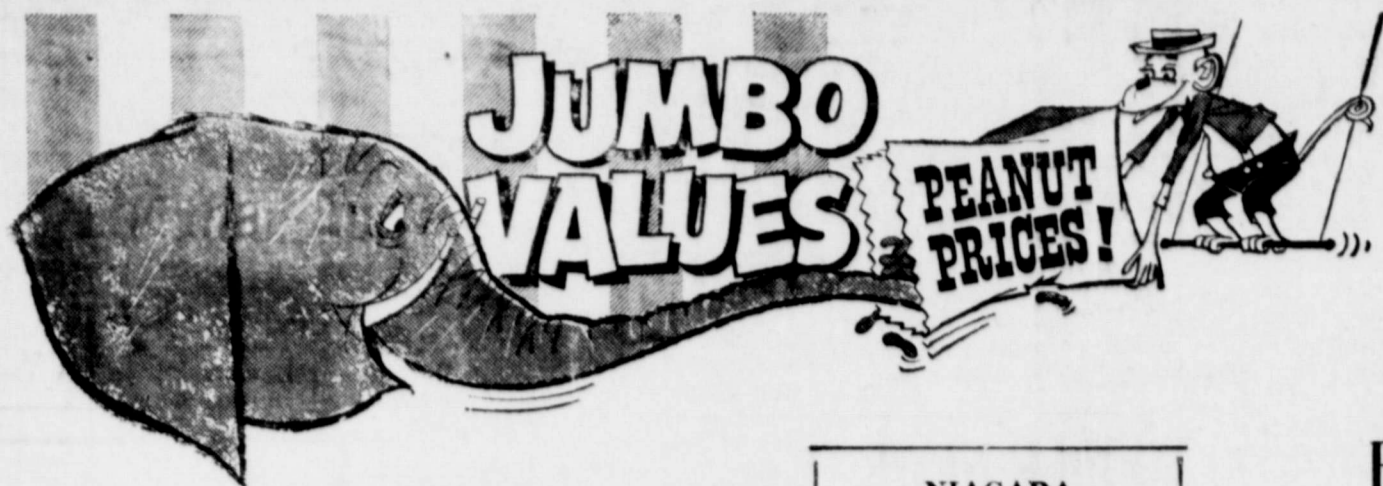

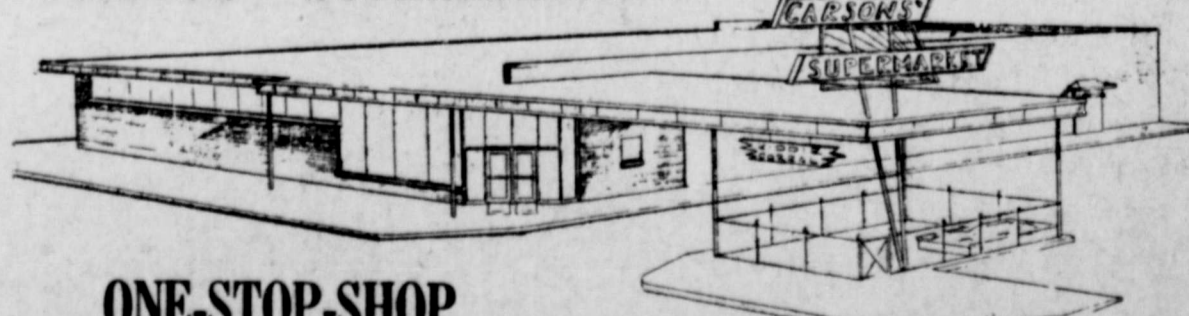
