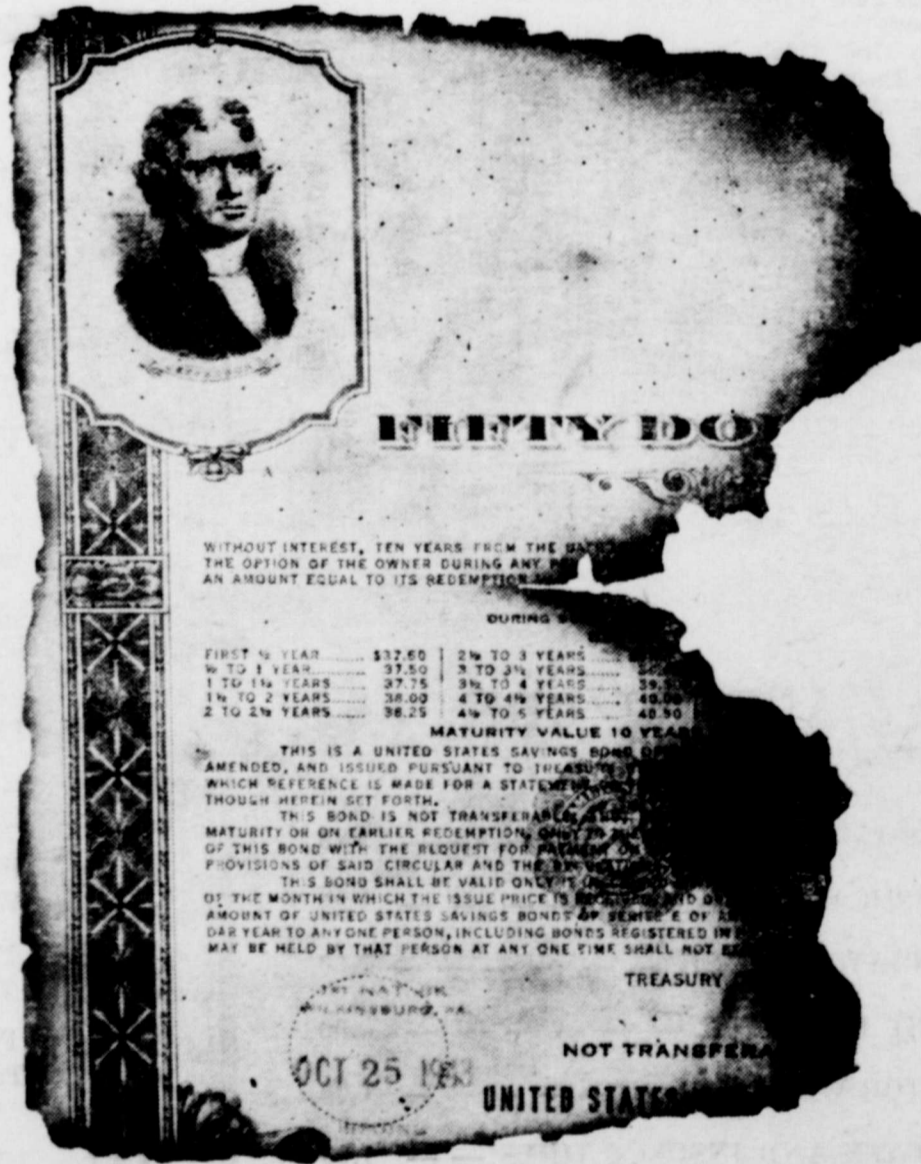

H-SU Enrollment Higher This Year

ABILENE — Enrollment for the first six weeks of the summer session at Hardin-Simmons University has reached 511 — an increase of 9.4 per cent over registration for the same period a year ago.

Registration for the session's second three-week term is being concluded this week. Mrs. Madge Grba, registrar, reported current enrollment includes 96 graduate students, 153 seniors, 110 juniors, 69 sophomores, 74 freshmen, and nine special and unclassified students.

The Union Ridge Home Demonstration Club met in the home of Mrs. O. E. Harwell Friday, June 3.

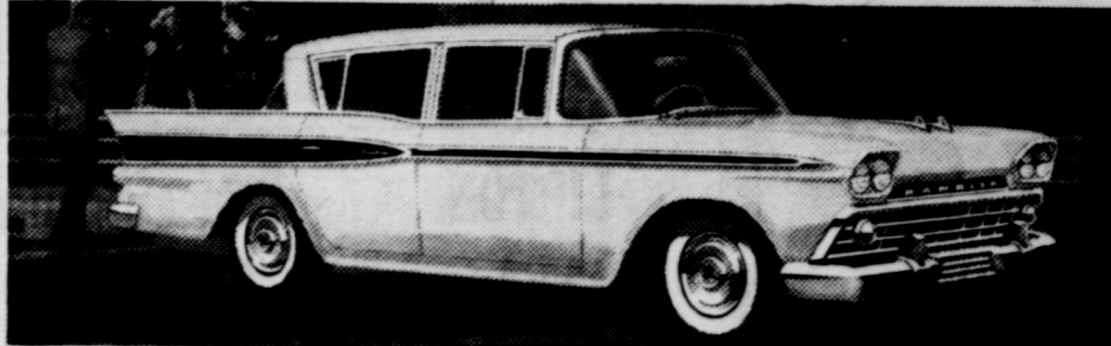

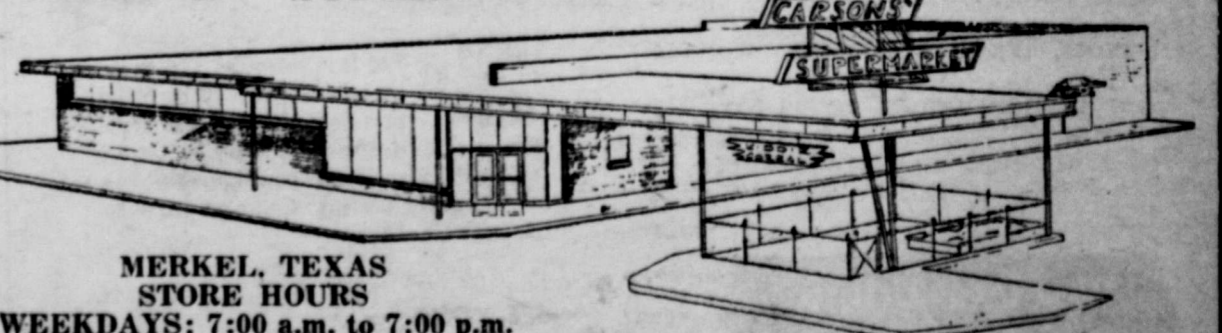
