a look at it's past and present accomplishments. He re-evaluated the objectives on how to plan and present programs, how to accomplish goals and objectives, linking our programs with the past two years, knowledge gleaned for parents and teachers as they work with boys and girls, causing parents and teachers to want to attend P-T-A meetings, telling neighbors about the good meetings. Both groups, he said, will have something to gain from the programs as well as something to contribute.

Mr. Fisher said the local P-T-A has been a real asset in working for the improvement of the Merkel schools and gave as an example, the new paved streets around the school. He commended the P-T-A, City Council and School Board for their part in bringing this improvement.

He mentioned some of the objectives of the schools this year. The faculty of the primary and elementary schools will begin an intensive in-service program which they hope will lead to being accepted into membership of the Southern Association of Elementary Schools.

The high school, he said, went through such a program in 1949-50-51, and at that time became an accredited member of the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, and the grade school received an excellent rating.

By meeting certain requirements, grade schools can work for membership in the association. It will take two years to complete the program. Mr. Fisher stressed the need of local and outside help in the study.

Teaching of "Americanism" is another project planned for the schools in this area. A pageant or mass parade composed of several thousand school children is being planned for February or March. It will be the first time for such a program to be scheduled in Texas or the nation and will probably be televised. Theme of the project will be built around lives of great Americans.

An improved math and science program is another special project in the grade school this year, with new equipment and supplies being added. Approximately \$1,300 will

be spent this year, half of which will be reimbursed by the state.

Mr. Fisher extended a special invitation in behalf of the teachers for everyone to visit school, especially during conferences and the two special weeks, "American Education Week" in November, and "Texas Education Week" in March.

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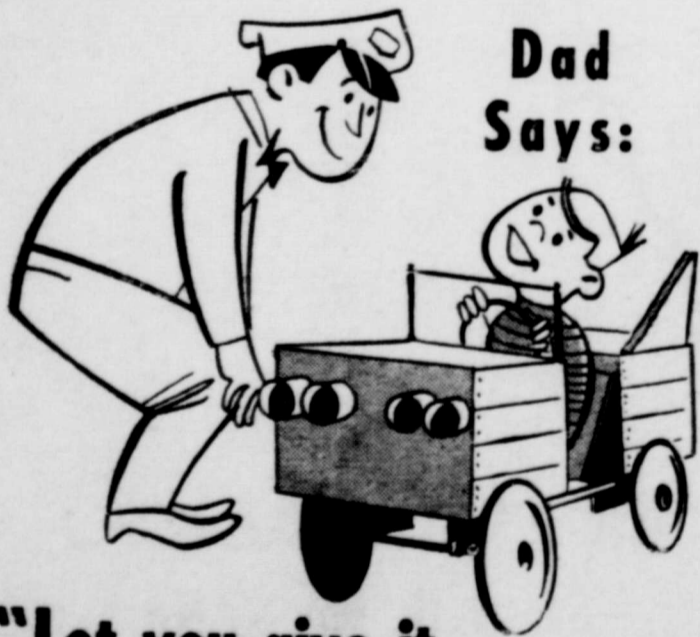
